45-Mile Speed Limit Becomes Effective Soon

Signs To Be Placed On Highways Within Few Days

The new maximum speed of 45 miles an hour authorized in an ordinance passed by the board of supervisors last Tuesday and signed by Mayor Wright yesterday will become effective as soon as signs are erected in the zones where the new maximum is permitted.

According to Ben F. Rush, city engineer, the new signs are now being made and will be placed on the highways within a few days.

The new speed limit applies to all improved sections on the Kaimukua highway (about 45 miles). These sections will be plainly marked. Engineer Rush said, and strict enforcement of the lower speed limit on other parts of the highway will prevail.

Left-Hand Turn Law Protested

Service Station Operators Ask Repeal

Further objection to the new traffic ordinance prohibiting left-hand turns in the congested district of the city and on four lane highways was registered at the city hall yesterday. The new law is in the form of a petition by the owners of 12 service stations whose business is affected by the ban on left hand turns.

Under the new ordinance left-hand turns may not be made except onto streets and highways. Turns into alleys, service stations and other places between streets are prohibited. One service station operator on Fort street, where one-way traffic prevails, pointed out that the ordinance makes all entrance to his place of business contrary to law. The station operator asks repeal of that section of the ordinance.

Local Writer Wins Acclaim With Novel On Bronte Family

One is overwhelmed by astonishment, by emotions and by appreciation for the truly beautiful work which comes from the pen of Kathryn MacFarland Thompson (Mrs. Robert Russell Thompson) in her first novel, "Divide the Desolation," which has been released by Simon and Schuster publishers.

Books upon books have been written about the Bronte family about Charlotte, author of "Jane Eyre," and her brother Branwell. Thompson began writing her saga, chose the life of Emily as it has been recorded, concerning her.

The wonder of Mrs. Thompson's novel is that she has never seen the moors. When employed at the University of Hawaii as a library assistant, she is a native of California and her first remembrances of reading were the books concerning the Brontes. Two years before Mrs. Thompson began writing she read everything she could find about the family. She wrote her book three times before she added "fins" to it.

BEAUTIFUL PHRASING

The pages of "Divide the Desolation," the first sentence of Emily's "Wuthering Heights," are a proof of the loving, meticulous care which Mrs. Thompson has put into her book. Beautiful polished phrases and sentences flow from her thoughts. Every page contains words that are as clean-cut and perfect as a gleaming crystal.

The author dipped her pen in many colors. Some are vivid, some are grey. The scene is hushed as she writes of the moors which held the soul of Emily. It was on these moors Emily spent her life. She loved the clean night, the steady wind. She loved the heather buds fresh and green in the spring time, ripe and flaming in the autumn and black and red in the winter. No weather kept Emily away from her beloved spot. It was heartbreak for Emily to leave Haworth and go to Miss Thorpe's school or to be at Law Hill.

WROTE IN CHILDHOOD

Mrs. Thompson paints an etched picture of Emily, a somber, stern person, but a right one. From early childhood she wrote in her precious notebooks. She wanted no one to read her efforts.

Emily's privacy was her sacred heritage, which often was invaded by Charlotte and Branwell. Thompson created a kind of her own world. Her people were more real and enchanting to her than any she had ever known. She loved the dear and familiar.

Emily's writings were influenced by the readings of "Duchess of Malfi," Volpone, and "Dr. Faustus." Her offering, "Wuthering Heights," was at first received.

FDR Makes Gain In Digest Poll

Landon Still Has Big Lead In Vote

(United Press by Radio)

NEW YORK, Oct. 16.—Quarterly returns of the Literary Digest presidential poll revealed President Roosevelt was steadily cutting down the lead of Gov. Alf Landon, Republican nominee, assumed early in their counting.

Landon had a total of 1,004,086 votes, against 728,084 votes for the president. Rep. William Lemke, Union party nominee, had 61,981 votes.

Landon maintained a lead in 32 states and the president in 18.

Parker to Open Office On Shore For Island Unit

Itasca Leaves For South Seas On Last Trip Before Post

Comdr. Stanley V. Parker, U. S. Coast Guard, arrived on the President Harrison yesterday to take over temporary command of the coast guard service here. He said he expects to remain several months organizing a shore office for the service.

He was accompanied by Walter L. Shuck, special agent of the treasury department, William Bruen, customs agent, and Carl F. Eidler, newly appointed chief inspector of customs in Honolulu, who comes from duty in Los Angeles.

CLOSER CONTROL

Comdr. Parker will effect a closer administrative control of the coast guard forces here. Eidler succeeds John H. Oliveira as chief inspector, while Shuck and Bruen are here on routine business.

Comdr. Parker said that the new 327-foot cutter Duane, in command of Comdr. P. Beach, is due here the latter part of this month, replacing the Itasca temporarily until the new cutter Roger B. Taney, in command of Comdr. W. F. Towle, arrives for permanent duty December 31.

2 FAST CUTTERS

Two new fast sea-going cutters, 78-foot patrol boats will also be sent here soon.

The Itasca left yesterday afternoon on her last trip to the Equatorial Islands, under command of Lt. Comdr. Frank T. Kenner. She carried supplies and replacement men for the cutter Duane, which she will replace in 18 days. Following her return she will be sent to the Hawaiian Islands to participate in coast guard maneuvers after which she will proceed to San Diego for permanent station.

The six lectures will be entitled: "Europe, War or Peace?" "Mussolini and the Mediterranean," "Soviet Russia—The Rise of Communism in France and Spain," "The Danger Spots in Europe."

Dr. Taylor is back at the University of California, where he has been for the last three years, two of which he spent as lecturer in economics at the University of British Columbia. His lectures are open to anyone interested who registers for the series at the first meeting, 7:30 p.m. next Thursday, or at the office of the Adult Education division, 112 W. Hall, University campus.

Kauai-Born Girl En Route To Eastern Centers

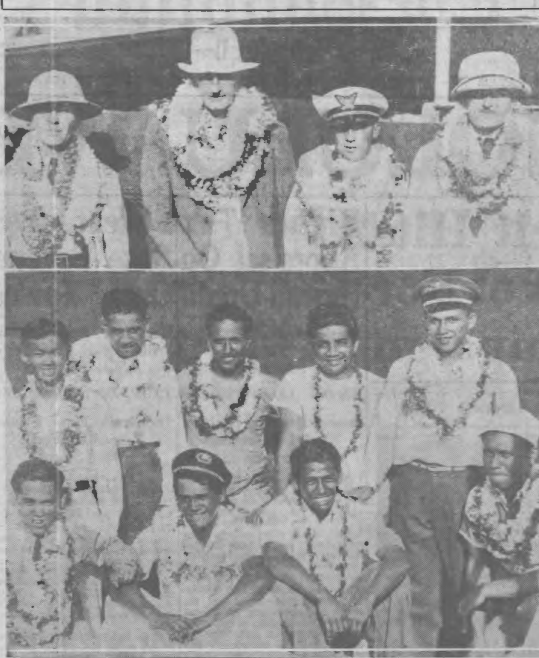

College Graduate Has Model Dirt Farm On Kauai Hillside

When a Hawaiian-born, college-educated nolo goes into dirt farming, it is news in Hawaii. The main crop is not usually following up on the island of Kauai is such a young nolo lad who is operating a 73-acre farm. His name is Robert Eckart, a graduate of the University of California, who hails from California.

Out in the field his brother-in-law, Bill Dennis, another young nolo, who hails from California, was supervising the planting of the fall potato crop. He and five helpers had prepared the land for potato planting. A large fall portion of the farm has been selected for the planting of the fall potato crop as Eckart is going to plant 18 acres for the winter market. This land was combed over three times with leguminous plants prior to planting. Soybean was planted first, followed by a crop of alfalfa and a crop of bush lima.

This practice of cover-cropping to build up the soil before planting the main crop is not usually followed by our farmers.

Eckart has the largest asparagus field on Kauai. There are three acres in asparagus. Two varieties—Mary Washington and Palmetto—have been selected by him for his farm. Although they are only two years old, he is already harvesting a nice crop of asparagus, selling at 20 cents per pound on Kauai.

GOOD EXAMPLE

A portion of the farm is devoted to fruit trees. There are between 700 to 800 macadamia nut trees, 37 varieties of citrus plants, 178 cashew nut trees and several other tropical fruit trees.

A farm of Eckart's type is very valuable to the agricultural extension service, as it serves as a splendid example of how farms should be managed and operated in Hawaii. This is especially true for the young citizen farmers of Hawaii who have never seen any type of farm but the small "manana" type, semi-subsistence type based upon Oriental economy of living. But rapid changes are taking place here in Hawaii, and the improvement in transportation facilities from California to Hawaii are making it possible for farmers to be directly in competition with the California farmers.

The only way to meet them on equal footing is to reorganize our farming apparatus on the California type or one even similar. From that standpoint, young citizen farmers who visit Eckart's farm leave his farm with new inspiration and vision. They return to their farmsteads with a new incentive and a desire to improve their farms and homes.

The extension service has been cooperating very closely with Eckart. Timely information on

marketing and other valuable ideas on farming have been given to him. It is the hope of the Extension Service that there be one or two promising young men starting a large-scale farming like Eckart for demonstration purpose.
