INSTRUCTORS WIN ACADEMY AWARDS FOR ART EXHIBITS

Mr. John Olsen, instructor in art at the Kamehameha School for Boys, and Mr. Benjamin Norris, former art instructor at the school, won the Hono-Iulu Art Society purchase prize Tuesday evening at the annual Honolulu Artists' Society exhibit. This means that both artists will be represented in the academy's permanent collection.

Mr. Olsen's painting is a water color, treated in a semi-abstract geo-metric style and is entitled "Koko Head III." Mr. Norris' painting is a composition in water color of large trees and rolling fields and is called Sugar Country.

Another painting by Mr. Olsen was awarded the Patten prize as being "the best water color in the exhibit." This painting was tagged "Landscape V." It is a study of the mountains near the reservoir on the leeward side

Miss Evelyn Erickson, art instruc-tor at the Kamehameha School for Girls, also had exhibited two paintings. One, a landscape called "View From My Lanai," is a water color From My Lanai," is a water color painting of Honolulu Harbor as seen from Dormitory K. Her other painting is a study of some amaryllis and is a water color treated in her fresh and colorful technique.

FORMER CADETS LEAVE ON TANEY FOR LINE ISLANDS

James Kamakaiwi, Louis Soares and James Kinney, former students at the Kamehameha School for Boys, sailed on the Coast Guard Cutter Roger B. Taney for the Line Islands on Sunday,

February 27, at 5:00 p.m.
Colonization of the islands began three years ago this month. In three years 13 trips have been made to the

islands.

The Taney took improved radio equipment for each island. Seismographs, used to record earthquakes, were also taken and might be placed on each island, also equipment to complete the lighthouses which have been started on each of the islands. The one on Howland island was named Earhart Light in memory of Amelia Earhart's attempted fight.

The Taney also took about a 1000 magazines which were accumulated by Mr. Donald Mitchell for the boys. Also a large amount of Anu Anu seed (dried watermelon seed) was sent to

the boys by Mr. Mitchell. The boys who are stationed on the various islands are as follows:
