Women's Body Found In Parked Automobile

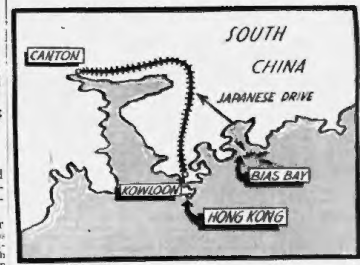
