

TANEY TO TAKE FARMING AIDS

The chief guard cutter Roger H. Taney will assemble an agricultural warehouse when he sails Saturday for islands to the south with a party headed by Dr. Ernest H. Grumming, head of the division of territories and insular possessions of the department of the interior. Chickens, chick feed, plants, trees, shrubs and fertilizer will be taken by the cutter to several of the islands.

The cutter will pick up a large number of coconuts at Palmyra to be planted on other islands visited.

Nakashima Tells Japan's Purpose In Far East War

He was asked by this paper to get a statement of the official viewpoint of Japan in the Sino-Japanese war in the conflict now raging.)

TOKYO, Japan, Oct. 19.—The masses are not as yet feeling any serious effects of the new 12-hour month old hostilities. Commodity prices have advanced, to be sure, and naturally so because of the increase in demand for a variety of necessities, but not to any such scale as to arouse any uneasiness.

While the Bank of Japan's composite average index of prices for 1937 is a commodity index in Tokyo for 8 a year, the advance in Japan rice, for instance, most necessary food in this country, is only 3.3 per cent over last year's. Agricultural products as a whole registered a 1.8 per cent gain and other foodstuffs, 8 per cent.

Unemployment is any noticeable extent from the conflict has not yet been seen. One of the 12 cases is that of several American moving picture agencies which have seen fit to either reduce the number of employees or altogether abandon their offices, in view of the government's prohibition as of October 1 of the importation of foreign motion pictures—a move invoked under the import control law with the view of reducing the nation's adverse trade balance which was \$46,000,000 as of September 30, or three and a half times larger than the amount of the corresponding date last year.

No Shortage of Labor

As a matter of fact, at present there is an actual shortage of labor in the industries, those especially of coal and iron.

The truth of the situation is that the nation is on somewhat of a boom from wartime conditions, and the finance ministry has found it necessary to caution certain sections of the public not to squander their profits, instead to save them for such a move would be complying with the nation's desire for economy in consumption as a measure to cope with the present crisis.

Hope For Early Victory

At the situation now stands, there are those who think that the Japanese forces will have won a complete victory by the end of this year, and all hostilities will be over by March of next year at the latest. They contend that with the recent fall of Peking in Hopei and Tientsin in Shantung, Japanese forces are virtually in complete control of North China. As for Shanghai, the decisive battles will take place before this month is over—and the end of the Chinese resistance is said to be in the near future.

So for these reasons, outside of the enthusiastic farewells given to soldiers departing for the front—shoots of battle at the railway stations—there is little excitement in the country. The masses are not in the least excited about the Japanese war of 1904-5 when on both occasions, Japan's national life was at stake.

BOWLING CLUB MAY GET LAND

The city-county may lease to the Honolulu Lawn Bowling Club a municipal lot at the corner of Kuehio Ave. and Leeward Rd. where it is planned to establish a bowling green.

A ruling to that effect was written to the board of supervisors' finance committee today by Gerald R. Corbett, deputy city-county attorney.

A hearing on the club's request for a lease of the property was to be held by the finance committee this afternoon.

Mr. Corbett said the lease may be granted so long as it does not interfere with the use of the property by the city-county for the purpose for which it was acquired or for any other necessary public use.

The lot in question, he said, has been acquired and used solely for a sewer pump site. The pump, however, occupies only a small portion of the lot.

The lease would be according to Mr. Corbett, subject to the following conditions:

1. That it be executed only after bids are called on an upset rental fixed by the board.
2. That the term of the lease does not exceed 10 years.
3. That the term may be terminated at any time at the city-county's option if a public need of the property arises.
4. That the lease may be terminated if the use of the lot becomes annoying or offensive to neighboring residents.
