KAM CADETS TO PARADE ON MONDAY

Major James Carroll Heads
Troops In Armistice Day
Affair At Kapiolani Park

Kamehameha's well-known battalion will again take an active part in the Armistice day program on Monday, November 11. Kamehameha has participated in most of the important parades in Honolulu, impressing many and earning a reputation for good marching.

James Carroll, cadet major of the Kam battalion, will head Kam's cadets in this affair, and the rest of the officers in charge are Theodore Awana, cadet captain of Company A; Irving Maby, cadet captain of Company B; William Toomey, cadet captain of Company C; Archie Ching, cadet captain of first company; Maurice Kong, cadet captain of the band; and Herbert Cockett, cadet first lieutenant adjutant. The sponsors who will also march with the battalion are Minerva Carroll, honorary major for the staff; Hazel Goo, honorary captain for the band; Katherine Sakuma, honorary captain for first company; Ululani Weight, honorary captain for Company A; Thelma Kauka, honorary captain for Company B; and Harriet Awana, honorary captain for Company C. They have just been selected by the cadet captains of K. S. B., and will parade with the battalion in any reviews or parades.

The uniform for the parade will be the whole gray uniform; with white cross-belts and well-polished brass buckles; new and old uniforms will be mixed.

R. O. T. C. units will form on Ohua street and will parade along the Kapiolani park to the War Memorial Natatorium, where they will be reviewed.

Captain Sidney R. Hinds, professor of military science and tactics at Kamehameha, will take charge of the Kam battalion with Sgt. Dale Frazier assisting him.

Because of the parade a new schedule will take place on Monday at K. S. B. Here is the schedule:

10:45 a.m.—Return to K. S. B. in street cars.

After returning their rifles, sabers, and instruments, the entire student body of K. S. B. will be allowed to stay out the rest of the holiday.

Quinten's blood was of the common O type. Clarence's and Daniel's blood was of type A, which is quite common. Raymond's blood was of the AB type, which is very hard to find. The O type can be used with any type.

Home Hygiene Class Demonstrates Topics

Sophomore home hygiene class continued demonstrations of different topics from the last class. Different members of the class demonstrated their topics. Miss Lydia Frelsen, instructor, demonstrated the use of bandages for the ears and eyes. Margaret Clarke showed the class how to resuscitate an unconscious person.

Faculty members of both the school for girls and the school for boys are invited by Mr. Albert Judd, trustee, on a tour of the Hawaiian forest.

The forest contains such trees as akia, used for fish poisoning and, the 'nnr bark, for rope. For agricultural implements the Hawaiians used the alahoe or walahee.

A tree near Miss Maude E. Schaeffer's office, the bixa or elana or alaea, was used for making red dye.

Other trees of importance in the forest are hala, hau, iliahi, kamani, kukui, koa, kokio, lama, loulou, milo, ohia, or mountain apple, and ohia lehua.

The loulou in the Hawaiian forest is the only loulou that one can see from the road. The milo tree is used for making calabashes.

JOBS COMMENCED BY ART CLASSES

Various projects have been started by the Art Craft club under the supervision of Miss Winifred Wing, Mr. Milton E. Ballengee, and Mr. George Hitchings.

Under Miss Wing an applied wall hanging, linoleum blocks and wood carving are under way.

In wood work under Mr. Hitchings, bookcases, waste baskets, vases and book ends are well under way.

Daphne took the commercial course at Armstrong Business school in San Francisco. Aileen attended Miss Phillip's Commercial school.

KAM BOYS LEAVE JARVIS, HOWLAND AND BAKER ISLES

Louis Soares, '37, Arthur Harris, '37, and Elmer Williamson, '35, will return to Hawaii in mid-December. The Kinkajou, schooner of the Comman scientific expedition, left on Monday for Jarvis, Howland, and Baker islands to pick up the boys and other members of the scientific expedition formed to collect data on natural resources of the islands, which on October 13 were claimed by United States as possessions.

Harold Gatty, famed aviator, left with the Kinkajou as a guest of his friend, Dr. Coman. The boys will meet Gatty and will have two weeks, more or less, of his company.

Contact will be kept with the Kinkajou by amateur radio station K6BAZ in Honolulu after the schooner visits Jarvis. On Jarvis, the Kinkajou will pick up Louis Soares and William Chadwick who is a radio operator and who operates the Kinkajou's radio. The Kinkajou will visit Howland to take off Elmer Williamson and Kenneth Lum King, who is the owner of K6BAZ in Honolulu. Chadwick, who at present operates station K6KJJ on Jarvis, has had the boys listen in on broadcasts from Honolulu. King operates K6KJJ on Howland and the boys have had much fun with it. Many friends of the boys have talked to them over station K6BAZ. The boys, however, can only answer by code.

After picking up Arthur Harris and Julius Rodman from Baker, the Kinkajou will leave for Honolulu.

The Kinkajou took this expedition to the islands on July 24.

CADETS TO HAVE INSPECTION SOON
