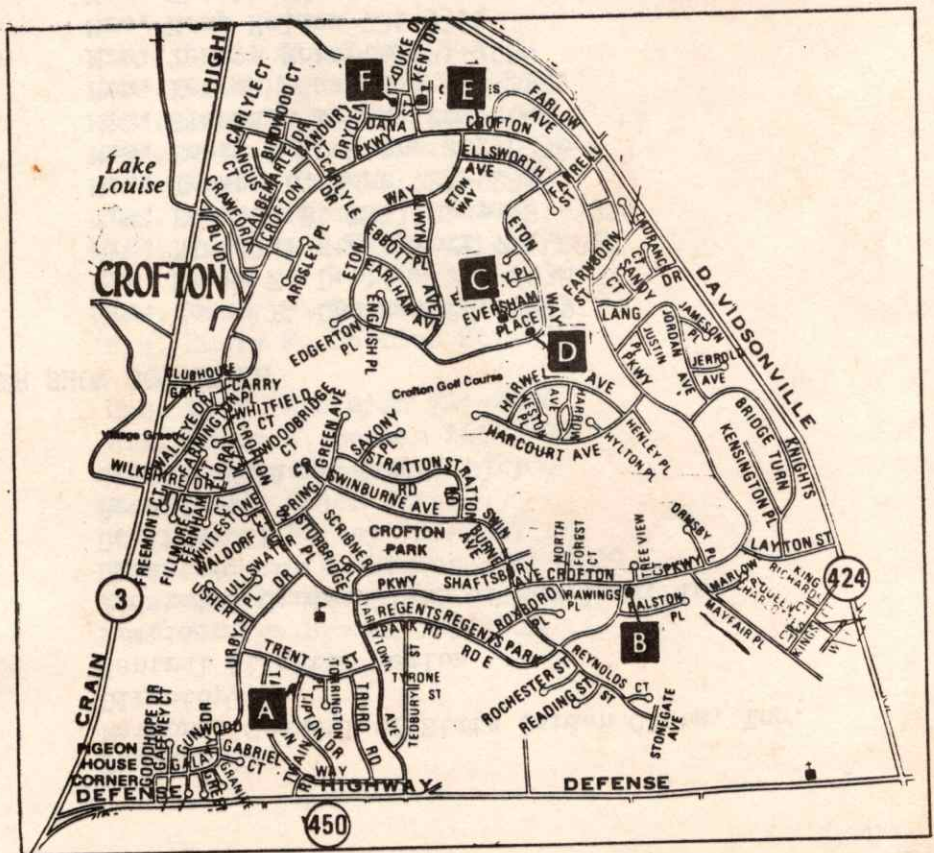

GENERAL RULES AND INFORMATION

1. All members of the Crofton Village Garden Club must enter the show.
2. Entries will be received on Wednesday, April 28 from 4 P.M. to 6 P.M. and on Thursday, April 29 from 8 A.M. to 9.30 A.M. Exhibitors WILL NOT BE ALLOWED in the Exhibit Area after 10 A.M. and are responsible for leaving the area neat.
3. Exhibitors are allowed only one entry in each class or subdivision.
4. Exhibits must be removed between 8 P.M. and 9 P.M. the day of the show.
5. Awards will be determined by the National Council Standard System as set forth in the 1977 edition of the HANDBOOK FOR FLOWER SHOWS. Decision of the judges will be final.
6. Plant material on the Protected List of the Federated Garden Clubs of Maryland, Inc., 1976 revision, may not be used, except in educational and/or conservation exhibits.
7. The Flower Show Committee is not responsible for containers or other properties, although all reasonable care will be exercised. Properties should be inconspicuously marked with exhibitor's name.
8. Entries must be approved and the entry card initialed by the Classification Committee before being placed by the Placing Committee.

RULES FOR THE HORTICULTURE DIVISION

9. Entries must have been grown by the exhibitor. Container grown plants must have been container grown by the exhibitor and in her possession for at least three (3) months. Multiple planting prohibited except where stated.
10. Entries must be well groomed, containers clean, and specimens correctly labeled with botanical name (genus, species, and/or variety/cultivar) unless specified otherwise in the schedule. Container grown plants must have drainage saucer where needed. Double potting permitted.
11. Cut specimens will be exhibited in appropriate size green glass bottles to be supplied by the Committee.
12. The Classification Committee reserves the right to sub-divide, if warranted, according to number and character of entries.

SECTION A - Hedera ~~Helix~~ (Ivy) - Multiple plantings of same variety permitted
To be judged according to the Scale of Points of The American Ivy Society
and as classified in The Ivy Book - The Growing and Care of Ivy and
Ivy Topiary by Suzanne Warner Pierot Eligible for Award of Merit

- Class 1. Container-Grown. Container not to exceed 8" in dia.
(a) Bird's Foot (other than variegateds)
(b) Curlies (Curly-edged Ivies) (other than variegateds)
(c) Variegated or multicolored Ivies
(d) Any other
2. Ivy Living Wreath - 12" frame with hanger (more than one variety permitted)
3. Hanging Containers not to exceed 8" in dia. (limit 12 entries)
(Decorative Containers and Hangers may be used)

SECTION B - Tree and Shrub Branches in bloom, specimen branch 12" - 24"
(except Rhododendron) Eligible for Arboreal Award

- Class 4. Azalea, one spray (a) single (b) Double

5. Rhododendron (one truss) foliage attached
6. Tree branch in bloom
7. Any other Shrub branch

SECTION C - Narcissi (Daffodils) one specimen bloom, varietal name, with color code

SECTION D - Tulipa (Tulips) one specimen bloom with foliage attached, with species
and varietal name Eligible for Award of Merit

SECTION E - Other Spring Flowers not previously listed

- Class 17. Iberis (Candytuft) - 3 stems
18. Lunaria - 1 stem
19. Phlox - 3 stems
20. Any other

SECTION F - Container-grown Plants (excluding Ivy) - one Plant per container
Containers not to exceed 8" in dia. Eligible for Award of Merit

- Class 21. Flowering Plants, excluding African Violets
 22. Foliage Plants
 23. Saintpaulia (African Violets) - single crown - named variety -
 Container not to exceed 5" in dia.
- (a) Single flowered (limit 9 entries)
 (b) Semi-double and/or Double (limit 8 entries)

RULES FOR THE DESIGN DIVISION

13. Advanced entries required in all classes by Tuesday, April 20, 1982. For reservations contact class consultant. IF THE EXHIBITOR IS UNABLE TO FILL THE RESERVED SPACE, SHE MUST FIND A SUBSTITUTE AND NOTIFY THE CLASS CONSULTANT IMMEDIATELY. NO JOINT ENTRIES ARE ALLOWED.
14. Plant material used, which need not be grown by exhibitor, must be listed on a 3 x 5 card with botanical name and placed with exhibit.
15. Prepared food, flat silver, and cut fruit/vegetables may not be used.
16. Artificial flowers, fruit, vegetables, and foliage are forbidden.
17. Treating of fresh plant material is not allowed.
18. Naturally dried plant material may be used and a minimum amount of treated plant material may be used only where specified in the schedule. Treated plant material is any plant material that has had the surface texture, color or substance changed yet recognizable as plant material.
19. Containers must be waterproof and placed on a piece of clear plastic (provided by the Committee) to protect furniture.
20. Accessories and Features permitted only where specified.

Definitions:

<u>Accessory</u>	Anything in an arrangement in addition to plant material, container, base, background, or mechanics, subordinate in the design
<u>Feature</u>	Anything dominant in a design. Features may be any object, a color, selected plant material, etc. Anything may be featured but only when it dominates

- (a) A pedestal (carved drum - Nigeria) 16" long x 14" wide, 27" high, against a green and white geometric background
- cris* - (b) A piano 57½" long x 13½" wide x 35" high against white wall
- (c) A glass top coffee table 50" long x 26" wide x 15" high (base - Ashanti Throne "King's Stool")
- Butler* - (d) A credenza 72" long x 16" wide x 24" high

- (a) A pecan dining table 72" long x 39" wide x 30" high
- (b) A server (background - white wall) 52" long x 18" wide x 31" high
- (c) A cabinet (background - mirrored wall) 30" long x 15½" wide x 23" high
- (d) A standing arrangement in a corner with floor area 48" x 36" (background white) Height of arrangement unlimited.

- (a) A black mantel 33" long x 9" wide x 22" high (background white brick)
- (b) A white coffee table 32" long x 16" wide x 16" high
- (c) A round oak table 41" dia. x 27" high
- (d) A white island counter-top 65½" long x 29½" wide x 36" high

- (c) A dark oak credenza 60" long x 19 3/4" wide x 34" high
(background - pale green with wrought iron sconce - sconce may not be removed)
- (d) A corner pedestal 18½" high x 10" dia. top (background pale green)

- (d) A white rattan table 48" dia. top pale green x 25" high

TOP HONOR AWARDS

1. AWARD OF HORTICULTURAL EXCELLENCE may be awarded to a NAMED blue ribbon winner scoring 95 or over, judged to be the finest in the entire Horticulture Division.
 2. AWARD OF MERIT may be awarded to a NAMED blue ribbon winner scoring 95 or over in each designated section of plants having a common characteristic. Eligible: Sections A, C, D and F.
 3. ARBOREAL AWARD may be awarded to a NAMED blue ribbon winner scoring 95 or over in a section of classes of specimens composed of tree or shrub branches shown for beauty of the flower, fruit, or foliage. Eligible: Section B.
 4. TRICOLOR AWARD may be awarded to a blue ribbon winner scoring 95 or over. All plant material must be fresh and Distinction (marked Superiority) a quality to be judged. Eligible: Classes 27, 28 and 29
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5. EDUCATIONAL AWARD may be awarded to an exhibit scoring 95 or over designed to instruct the public, and meeting all requirements. Eligible: Classes 30 and 31
 6. SPECIAL AWARDS may be given in Divisions III and IV, competitive or non-competitive Classes, if merited.
 7. SWEEPSTAKES AWARD (FLOWER SHOW COMMITTEE AWARD) may be awarded in the Horticulture Division to the exhibitor accumulating the most blue ribbons. In the event of a tie, red ribbons will be counted.
