

On March 20 and 21, the Upper Keys Garden Club presented a "Standard Flower Show", with two main categories for entries: Artistic Design and Horitcultural. There were eight classifications of designs plus 14 Horticultural divisions with numerous sub-categories.

Artistic Awards were given to Fran Atmus who won the coveted Tricolor Award: blue, red and yellow rosette, Silver Urn Trophy; June Mesnard who received the Silver Tray Award for Miniature (fresh flowers); and Ruth Shier who won the Sweepstakes Award: green and white rosette.

The Horiculature Excellence Award went to C.W. Watherwax who won the Silver Vase for 1987 plus the green, orange and blue rosette. Other Horitculture awards were the Sweepstakes Award: green and white rosette and Large Silver Tray to Elissa DeVries and the Award of Merit: orange rosette that was awarded to Helen Dudek, Camille Kloski, Dorothy Saunders, Marty Vaughn and C.W. Watherwax.

#### THE UPPER KEYS GARDEN CLUB HOSTS ANNUAL SHOW

The 1987 Flower Show theme was announced by the chairman Barbar Green at the regular meeting the Upper Keys Garden Club, Inc. of Tavernier, "Let's Celebrate - Keys Style." Mrs. Green demonstrated various technics for grooming house plants to be entered in the March 20-21 event, being held at the Frances Tracy Garden Center, M.M. 94 and

open to the public.

Mrs. Green told the club members that the show would be judged by nine state and national master accredited judges, and that a Flower Show Evaluation panel, consisting of three of these judges, would be acting on the show as a whole for State and National Flower Show Awards for this club. Weekly classes on artistic floral arrangements are being conducted each Thursday morning at the Frances Tracy Center, under the guidance of Ruth

Bragen of Marathon.

The rules, divisions and classifications listed below apply: In the Artistic division there are 8 classifications of celebrations: 4th of July - "Let Your Spirits Soar;" Christmas - "Here Come Santa Claus;" St. Patrick's Day - "Top of the Morning to You;" Thanksgiving - "Sharing a Bounteous Season;" Labor Day - "Casual Entertaining;" Wedding - "Celebration in the Keys;" Miniature, (a) all fresh material; (b) all dried material, 3x3x3; small, (a) all fresh material; (b) all dried material not to exceed 8" high x 5" wide.


All of the shows will be judged on design, creativity, color harmony, conformance, and interpretation. All artistic entries must be in place before

9:30 Friday, 20th.

The Horticulture Division: All specimen plant containers must be neat and clean. Potted plants must have been in exhibitors possession for at least 90 days, leaves must be free of residue, but not oiled, and no damaged leaves. Entry tags must show botanical and common names. Deductions are taken for failure to conform. The following listed sections must be at the club on Thursday, March 19, 10-5: Gesneriads, Bromeliads, Orchids, Ferns, Aroids, Begonias, Ivy, Cacti, Succulents, Dish Gardens (incl. Bonsai), and Hanging containers. Only cut specimens will be accepted between 8 and 9 AM on Friday, the 20th.

All exhibitors should contact the co-chairperson, Floyce Torrey 852-8949 immediately. All members and Upper Keys gardeners are asked to participate

with entries.

#### AWARDS

ribbons (white). one Second (red); one Third (yellow); and one or more Honorable Mention The standard system shall be used. There will be only one First (blue);

Tricolor Award: Best blue ribbon in Classes 2, 3, § 4. Material must be all fresh. Represented by blue, red and yellow rosettes. Silver Urn Trophy.

Material may be fresh and/or dried. A minimum of painted and/or contrived material may also be used. Originality must be one of by a purple rosette. the categories used in the evaluation of exhibits. Represented

Silver Tray Award: Best miniature in Class 7.

Award of Merit: May be awarded to a named blue ribbon winner scoring by an orange rosette. 95 or more points in Horticulture Sections A thru 1. Represented

Sweepstakes Award: One in Horticulture and one in Artistic Division.

For exhibitor winning the highest number of ribbon points in each and white rosette. Large Silver Tray for Horticultural Sweepstakes division. Blue 5; Red 4; Yellow 3; White 2. Represented by green

Horticultural Excellence Award: May be awarded to Horticulture exhibit judged finest in the entire horticulture division. Represented by green, orange, & blue ribbon. Silver Vase.

HORTI CULTURAL AWARDS

Award of Merit Sweepstakes Horticultural Excellence

- (1) Competition is open to any amateur or grower.
- The exhibitor is allowed only one entry per class; as many classes as desired may be entered.
- (3) All exhibits must be in place by 9:30 AM, March 20, 1987. will open at 8:00 AM, to permit set up of fresh displays. The Club
- 4 Dry arrangements or any other exhibits which will not suffer from between 10:00 AM and 5:00 PM. early placement should be brought in Thursday, March 19, 1987,
- (5) Exhibits must not be removed before 4:30 PM, March 21, 1987.
- (6) Plants on the State Conservation List may be used if legally obtained or grown by the exhibitor.
- (7) All decisions made by the Judges are final.
- (8) Only authorized personnel will be allowed in the building after 9:30 AM on March 20, 1987, until the judges and clerks finish their duties.
- (9) The Upper Keys Garden Club will not assume liability for damage or loss of personal property or for personal injury.

## ARTISTIC DIVISION RULES:

- Flowers and foilage used need not be grown by exhibitor, except as in General Rules #6.
- (2) Entries must be the work of exhibitor.
- (3)Plant material used should be listed on a 3"x5" card. give an interpretation of design. Entrant may
- 4 space, except in Class 6, where drapings are permitted. Bases and backgrounds may be used in all classes. Backgrounds and fastening material must not be visible on opposite side of furnished
- (5) All Artistic Division backgrounds are 24" wide, 30" high, deep, except Classes 1, 6, 7, & 8. See Section A. and 15"
- 6 Wilted flowers should be replaced by 9:30 AM, Sat., March 21, 1987.
- (7) Four entries in each Artistic Division except Section A, Class 1 (Pedestals); Class 7 (Miniatures); and Class 8 (Small Arrangements)
- (8) No artificial flowers, foilage, or fruit may be used in Class 1.
- (9) Any exhibitor not able to exhibit at show time must provide a substitute to ensure that each space is filled and that no designer is penalized an award due to an omitted entry.

- Class 1. 4TH OF JULY - "LET YOUR SPIRITS SOAR" Five entries. Staged on pedestals. Should not exceed 14" wide, 14" deep, and 36" high. Dried and/or fresh material. for CREATIVITY award. Accessories permitted. Emphasis on originality. Eligible Minimum amount of painted or contrived material may be used.
- Class 2. OHRISTMAS "HERE COMES SANTA CLAUS"
  Four entries. Line arrangement using all fresh material.
  Accessories permitted. Eligible for TRICOLOR award.
- Class 3. ST. PATRICK'S DAY "TOP OF THE MORNING TO YOU!"
  Four entries. All fresh green material. Accessories
  permitted. Eligible for TRICOLOR award.
- Class 4. THANKSGIVING "SHARING A BOUNTEOUS SEASON"
  Four entries. Fruit and/or vegetable arrangement. All
  fresh material. Eligible for TRICOLOR award.
- Class 5. LABOR DAY "CASUAL ENTERTAINING"

  Four entries. All dried materials. Driftwood and appropriate accessories may be used. Eligible for CREATIVITY award.
- Class 6. WEDDING "CELEBRATION IN THE KEYS" Exhibition tables.

  Four entries. Material fresh and/or dry. Drapings permitted. Background is 36" wide, 48" high, and 18" deep. Accessories permitted. Eligible for CREATIVITY award.
- Class 7. MINIATURES
  Six entries.
  Not to exceed 3" x 3" x 3".
- Group A. All fresh material. Group B. All dried material.
- Class 8. SMALL ARRANGEMENTS
  Six entries.
  Not to exceed 8" high x 5" wide.
- Group A. All fresh material. Group B. All dried material.

HORTICULTURE DIVISION RULES:

- (1) Specimen plant containers should be neat, clean, free from mineral deposits. Either clay or plastic.
- (2) Potted plants must have been in exhibitor's possession for at leat 90 days.
- (3) Leaves must be free of residue, but not oiled. No damaged leaves.
- (4) Entry tags must show botanical and common name. conform results in automatic 5 point deduction. Failure to
- (5) Containers will be furnished for cut specimens. to exceed 18". Specimens not
- 6) An exhibitor may make more than one entry in a class, provided that each entry is in a different section.
- (7) Cut specimens consist of 3 blooms to a container except one rose, one orchid or spray of orchids, one aloe, one hibiscus and one
- (8) Roses must be shown with foilage.
- (9) Judges may subdivide. More classes may be added
- (10)Only cut specimens will be received March 20, 1987 between 8:00 AM  $\S$  9:00 AM. All horticulture entries, except cut specimens, MUST be brought in on Thursday, March 19, 1987, between 10:00 AM and 5:00 PM.
