Creativity Award: To a blue ribbon winner in Classes 1, 2, & 6. Material and/or contrived material may also be used. Originality must be one of the categories used in may be fresh and/or dried. A minimum of painted ple rosette. the evaluation of exhibits, represented by a pur-

Silver Tray Award: Best miniature in Class 7.

Award of Merit: May be awarded to a named blue ribbon winner scoring 95 and K. One may be awarded to each section. or more points in Horticulture Sections A thru I, Represented by an orange rosette.

Sweepstakes Award: One in Horticulture and one in Artistic Division. For white 2. Represented by green and white rosette. exhibitor winning the highest number of ribbon points in each division. Blue 5; red 4; yellow 3;

Horticultural Excellence Award: May be awarded to Horticulture exhibit Represented by green, orange, & blue ribbon. judged finest in the entire horticulture division.

General Rules for both Horticulture and Artistic:

- 0 Competition is open to any amateur or grower.
- 20 desired may be entered. The exhibitor is allowed only one entry per class; as many classes
- S All exhibits <u>must</u> be in place by 9:30 AM February 21, 1986, will open at 8:00 AM, to permit set up of fresh displays.
- 40 placement should be brought in Thursday, February 20, 1986 between Dry arrangements or any other exhibits which will not suffer from early 10:00 AM and 5:00 PM.
- 50 Exhibits must not be removed before 4:30 PM, February 22, 1986
- 60 Plants on the State Conservation List may be used if legally obtained or grown by exhibitor.
- 7. All decisions by the Judges are final.
- 00 on February 21, 1985, until the judges and clerks finish their duties. Only authorized personnel will be allowed in the building after 9:30 AM
- 9. of personal property or for personal injury. The Upper Keys Garden Club will not assume liability for damage or loss

- Flowers and foliage used need not be grown by exhibitor, except as in General Rules #6.
- 20 Entries must be the work of exhibitor.
- S Plant material used should be listed on a $3^{11} \times 5^{11}$ card, give an interpretation of design. Entrant may
- 40 Bases and backgrounds may be used in all classes. Backgrounds and space, except in Class 6, where drapings are permitted. fastening material must not be visible on opposite side of furnished
- 50 All Artistic Division backgrounds are 24" wide, 30" high, and 15" deep, except Class 1. "Arranging for Fun", Class 6 "Arranging for a New Day", Class 7 "Miniatures" and Class 8 "Small Arrangements". See Section A.
- 6 Wilted flowers should be replaced by 9:30 AM Saturday, Feb. 22, 1986
- 70 Four entries in each Artistic Division except Section A, Class I (Pedestals), which has five entries.
- 00 artificial flowers, foliage, or fruit may be used in Class 1.
- 9. Any exhibitor not able to exhibit at show time must provide a substitute. This is to make certain that each each space is filled and that no designer will be penalized an award due to an omitted entry.

- Class 1. "Arranging for Fun" or fresh material. Minimum amount of painted or contrived (We believe in fun - our plants help). Staged on pedestals. Should not exceed 14" wide, 14" deep and 36" high. Dried and/ originality. material may be used. No accessory permitted. Emphasis on igible for Creativity Award - Five entries.
- Class 2. (We like to do things in a different way). Line arrangement with "Arranging for Experience" - Four entries. emphasis on "Keys-grown" materials. Accessories permitted. Eligible for Greativity Award TAICOLOR
- Class 3. (We are busy people - in home and community). All fresh material. 'Arranging for Activity' - Four entries. Eligible for Tricolor Award No accessories permitted.
- Class 4. (We welcome the opportunity to express our love to friends - how "Arranging for Friends" - Four entries, arrangement. All fresh material. excited we are to share our bounty.) Fruit and/or vegetable Eligible for Tricolor Award
- Class 5. We love to entertain our friends with a cook-out!) All dried "Arranging for Pleasure" - Four entries. Eligible for Tri Golor Award materials. Driftwood and appropriate accessories may be used CREATIVITY
- Class 6. "Arranging for a New Day" - Four entries, Exhibition tables for breakfast - I place. Material fresh and/or Eligible for Creativity Award Drapings permitted. Background is 36"wide, 48" high & 18"deep Accessories permitted.
