AWARDS:

The standard system shall be used. There will be only one FIRST (blue); one SECOND (red); one THIRD (yellow); and one or more Honorable Mention ribbons (white).

TRICOLOR AWARD, if merited: best blue in classes 1-4, all fresh plant material.

CREATIVITY AWARD, if merited, classes 1-5, all fresh and/or dried plant material.

11 AWARDS OF MERIT may be awarded to a named blue ribbon winner scoring 95 points or over in Sections A through I, K and O.

2 SWEEPSTAKE AWARDS, 1 in Horticulture and 1 in Artistic Divisions for the exhibitor winning the highest number of ribbon points in each division.
(Blue, 5 points; Red, 4; Yellow, 3; White, 2; 1 point for entering.)

EDUCATIONAL AWARD, if merited, to an educational exhibit

AWARD OF APPRECIATION, to a commercial exhibit

GENERAL RULES:

1. Competition is open to all Garden Club members, as well as other amateur gardeners and arrangers.
2. One entry per person per class is allowed. As many classes as desired may be entered.
3. All exhibits must be in place by 9:30 AM, March 27, 1981. Club will be open at 8:00 AM to permit set-up of fresh display.
4. Dry arrangements, or any other exhibit which will suffer no effect from early placement should be brought in by Thursday, March 26, between 10:00 AM and 4:30 PM.

GENERAL RULES: (cont.)

4. (cont.) All Horticultural entries, except cut specimens, must be brought in on Thursday, March 26, between 10:00 AM and 4:30 PM. Only cut specimens will be received on Friday, March 27, between 8:00 AM and 9:00 AM.
5. Six entries in each Artistic Division, except Section A, Class 1, (Pedestal).
6. Exhibits may not be removed before 4:00 PM, March 28.
7. Late entries will be received, but will be marked, "Not in competition".
8. No artificial flowers or foliage may be used. Contrived, treated or sprayed material may be used in Class 4-A, 6-B and 7-B.
9. Plants on the State conservation list may be used in exhibits, if so labeled, and only if they have been legally obtained or grown by the exhibitor.
10. All decisions of the judges are final.
11. Only authorized personnel will be allowed in the building after 9:30 AM March 27 until judging is complete.
12. Upper Keys Garden Club will not assume liability for damage to or loss of personal property or for personal injury.

ARTISTIC DIVISION RULES:

- 1. Flowers and foliage used need not be grown by exhibitor. (* Exception, see General Rules, #9)
- 2. Entries must be the work of the exhibitor.
- 3. Plant material used should be listed on a 3"x5" card.
- 4. ~~Accessories in Classes 2 and 4 are permitted.~~ ^{ALL CLASSES} Bases and backgrounds may be used in all classes.
- 5. Backgrounds and fastening material may not be visible on opposite side of furnished space.
- 6. Section A arrangements should be 20" wide, 30" high, 15" deep.
- 7. Wilting flowers in any arrangement should be replaced on Saturday at 9:30 AM with material as near as possible to the original.

SECTION A, ARTISTIC DESIGN DIVISION

Classes 1-4 eligible for Tri-Color Award.
All fresh plant material required.
Accessories are permitted.
Classes 1-5 are eligible for Creativity Award
Plant material may be fresh and/or dried.
Accessories are permitted.

CLASS 1. "Enchanted Hammocks"; pedestal display.
Arrangements should be 14" wide, 32" high, 14" deep.
Plant material: All fresh native foliage. Blooms, seeds, pods, and/or fruits permitted.
Accent on design, color harmony, conformance, interpretation, and creativity.

*CLASS 2. "Keys Rainbow"
Plant material: All fresh.
Accent on color harmony, interpretation, design and conformance.

ARTISTIC DESIGN DIVISION (cont.)

CLASS 3. Line Arrangement: Design for entrance hall to depict a mood or idea.
Entry must have a title.
Plant material: All fresh.
Accent on design, conformance, creativity and interpretation.

*CLASS 4. "Artistically Oriental"
Plant material: Fresh. Sprayed or treated material is permitted.
Accent on design, color harmony, conformance, and interpretation.

CLASS 5. "Rhythm in Driftwood"
Plant material: All dried. Shells, coral and/or driftwood permitted.
Accent on creativity, interpretation, conformance, and design.

SECTION B, ARTISTIC DESIGN DIVISION

CLASS 6. Miniature: not to exceed 3" high, 3" wide.
Group A: All fresh plant material
Group B: All dried plant material

CLASS 7. Small arrangements: not to exceed 8" high, 5" wide.
Group A: All fresh plant material
Group B: All dried plant material

HORTICULTURE DIVISION RULES:

1. Specimen plant containers should be neat, clean, and plain clay or plastic so as not to detract from the plant.
2. Potted plants must have been in the possession of the exhibitor for ninety days or more.
3. Leaves must be free of residue, but not oiled. No insect damaged leaves.
4. Entry tags must show botanical and common name.
5. Containers will be furnished for cut specimens. Size of specimens should not exceed 18".
6. An exhibitor may make more than one entry in a class, provided that each entry is in a different section of the class.
7. Cut specimens must consist of three blooms per container except: one Rose, one Orchid, one Aloe, one Hibiscus.
8. Roses must be shown with foliage.
9. There must be three entries in each class to be judged. Judges may subdivide. More classes may be added if necessary.
