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### Look for the Garden Walk Pennants

MR. AND MRS. JIM LEE, 128 Bay View Isle Dr. Coral boulders delineate the attractive entrance berm laden with 35 varieties of Hibiscus and other colorful bushes. In the side yard the owners have made orchids and native plants the main attraction. Waterside is for dining and easy living with a Tiki and palms giving a truly tropical feel.

MR. AND MRS. DON JENSEN, 195 Plantation Shores Dr. Colorful Bougainvillea and Bird of Paradise are interplanted with the owners' favorite palms. Many varieties abound here including an endangered Buccaneer Palm and a Bismarck Palm. There are also many native trees such as Lignum Vitae and Strongbark. On the oceanside is a large patio bordered by Scaevola, Silver Buttonwood and Seagrape. Be sure to note Mrs. Osprey above on her nest watching over the garden.

MR. AND MRS. RANDY HETHERINGTON, 110 Rushton Lane. The entrance to this lovely garden has a canopy of beautiful palms. Note the ferns growing from the base of one. There is also a "tree" Bougainvillea and colorful ground covers of Blue Daze, Liriope and tropical philodendron. Following the pathway bordered by coral boulders to the canal side you will see ferns, more philodendron and other shade-loving plants. Wooden pathways, brown pea rock and potted plants make up the waterside living area.

MR. AND MRS. BOBBY JACK, 23 N. Bounty Lane. Large palms shade this attractive Keys garden. They are underplanted with ground covers and scaevola. For color Bougainvillea and Hibiscus are strategically separated with coral boulders. On the waterside note the Tiki on the dock for "fish watching". Many of the native mangroves have been preserved and add to the landscaping of raked sand and wooden walkways.

MR. AND MRS. GEORGE ARTHUR, 35 N. Bounty Lane. Pathways of old Chicago brick lead you through this lovely garden. Beautiful hardwood trees including a Sausage tree (Kigelia) overlook the ground covers and colorful Ixora. On the bay side travelers palms and ornamental grasses border the raked gravel and sand beach. A Tiki completes the feeling of Keys living.

MR. AND MRS. BRUNO CASOLARI, 74 N. Bounty Lane. This beautiful garden is owner-landscaped. The focal point is the attractively landscaped pond which was dug by Bruno. Scattered about the grounds are various planting beds with colorful bushes and ground covers and designated by brown pearock. There is a Tiki on the dock and even a small sand beach. Beautiful roses encircle a tree the owners rescued from "Andrew". Ask Sue her secret for cultivating these beauties!
