Look for the Garden Walk Pennants

MR. AND MRS. BO BARE, 35 Sunset Rd. The owners here are weekenders and thus devised an easy-care, yet very attractive garden. Beautiful Buttonwood trees are hung with Spanish moss and dotted with colorful bromeliads. The Zoysia grass is low maintenance as are the flowering bushes. On the water side simple raked sand is bordered by colorful vines and plantings and a charming derelict boat has been added to the landscape.

MR. AND MRS. RAY GRETH, 71 N. Bay Harbor Dr. This beautiful garden is protected by large native trees and palms which are underplanted with many varieties of shade-loving plants. A wooden walkway leads you through beds of heliconias, ferns, bromeliads and philodendrons. There is a seating area and a stone fountain as an accent. Crotons add color to the street side.

CINDY AND EDNA HOROWITZ, 208 Tide Ave. A beautiful Paradise tree welcomes you at the entrance to this unusual garden. If you check closely you will find an example of almost every native tree. Among them are Sapodilla, Mahogany, Tabebuia, Frangipani, Mahoe and several varieties of Palms. There are beds of cacti, bromeliads and other plants. Be sure not to miss the striking Bonsai garden on the patio.

MR. AND MRS. DONALD CLARK, 89401 Old Highway. The owners' love of flowers is evident in this old-fashioned Keys garden. The bed of pink Pentas is especially handsome. Note the large Autograph tree on the driveway and the rare Joewood tree by the house. Beds of flowers surround the back and a sweeping lawn leads to a tiki with a cannon guarding the dock.

MR. ROBERT EBERT, 89375 Old Highway. Upon entering this outstanding estate note the fig tree growing out of the rock. The brick walkways leading to the house are banded with plantings and to the left is the fruit grove with many tropical varieties. Beyond the orchid house and behind the garage is a ginger garden that also holds an unusual banana species. Past the pool and toward the ocean you see Palms and Scaevola overlooking the water.

CAPT. AND MRS. SKIP BRADEEN, 219 Plantation Blvd. As you stroll the front yard note the lovely flowering bushes and the Pandanus (Screw Pine). Also say hello to Adios and his little friend. The back yard has been landscaped into a pocket garden of lush shade-loving heliconias, gingers, ferns and orchids. A pathway winds among the plants and a table is set for dining al fresco or just enjoying the beauty of the setting.

MR. AND MRS. FRANK MANSON, MM 89 Old Highway. Colorful Periwinkles line the road to this charming Keys garden. Note the large fig tree guarding the front yard, underplanted with tropical philodendron and ferns. Orchids and bananas also abound. On the oceanside the lawn is dotted with many varieties of Palms making a wonderful view from the house.
