- 1. Entries are open to members of the Garden Club of Mountain Lakes, and others.
- 2. Horticulture exhibits may be entered between 7 and 10 PM on Thursday, September 23 only. Artistic design exhibits may be entered between 7 and 10 PM on Thursday, and between 8 and 10 AM on Friday, September 24. Judging will begin promptly thereafter.
- 3. Exhibits may not be removed before show closing time, at 9 PM Friday, September 24. They must be removed by 9:30 PM that day.
- 4. One entry is permitted in each class to an exhibitor in the Artistic Design Division. One entry permitted in each subdivision in the Horticulture Classes.
- 5. The National Council of State Garden Clubs Standard System of Judging will be used. Ribbons will be awarded if merited.
- 6. No plant material in the New Jersey Conservation List may be used unless grown by exhibitor or legally obtained and so stated on a 3x5 card accompanying exhibit.
- 7. The Garden Club of Mountain Lakes will exercise reasonable care on safeguarding exhibits, but cannot assume responsibility for damage or loss. All property must be labeled with name and telephone number of exhibitor.
- 8. All entries must be passed by classification chairman before placement.

#### ARTISTIC DESIGN RULES

- 9. Advance entries must be made in writing to Mrs. Frederick R. Jackson, Jr. 177 Lake Drive, Mt. Lakes, N.J. 07046 before August 15, 1982.
- 10. After an entry is accepted, any exhibitor who is unable to exhibit must provide a substitute.
- 11. All plant material in design must be legibly listed on a 3x5 card accompanying exhibit.
- 12. Plant material need not have been grown by exhibitor. However, garden grown plant material should be used when possible.
- 13. No artificial plant material or painted fresh material may be used in the show.
- 14. All fresh cut material must be used in classes 3,4, and 6. They are eligible for Tricolor Award.
- 15. Classes 1,2, and 5 eligible for Creativity Award. If treated plant material is permitted, it is so stated in class description.
- 16. Accessories and bases permitted in all classes.
- 17. Where backgrounds are permitted to be changed in any way, it is so stated.

#### HORTICULTURE RULES

- 18. All advance entries should be made by September 17 to Mrs. John Rooney, 7 Larchdell Way, Mountain Lakes, New Jersey 07046.
- 19. Entries must have been grown by the exhibitor or have been in her possession for a minimum of 90 days. Exception: vegetables and flowers grown from seed.
- 20. The flower show committee reserves the right to make any classification or placement changes deemed necessary for improvement of the show.
- 21. Specimens should be legibly labelled with botanical and common name on a 3x5 card accompanying specimen. This is a requirement to receive any of the top National Council awards.
- 22. Containers for cut specimens will be provided by Show Committee.
- 23. Sections 1,3,5,6 are eligible for Awards of Merit.

# AWARDS

The National Council System of Awards:

Blue Ribbon - 90 points or above Red Ribbon - 85 points or above Yellow Ribbon - 80 points or above White Ribbon - Honorable mention

- Tricolor Award A rosette, combining blue, red, and yellow ribbons, awarded to a blue ribbon exhibit scoring 95 or above, and composed of all fresh plant material.
- Creativity Award A rosette of purple ribbons, awarded to a blue ribbon exhibit scoring 95 or above. The exhibit is to be designer's choice of fresh and/or dried plant material, with or without other components. Treated plant material may be permitted, if so stated in schedule.
- Award of Merit A rosette of orange ribbons, awarded to a NAMED blue ribbon winner scoring 95 or more in back of a designated number of sections. Section 1,3,5,6, eligible for Award of Merit.
- Award of Horticultural Excellence A rosette of green, orange and blue ribbons, awarded to the named exhibit judged as finest in the entire Horticultural Division.
- Award of Appreciation A rosette of orchid ribbons with gold lettering, presented to the non-competitive exhibits in our show.

### ARTISTIC DESIGN

#### WOMAN IS .....

Class 1 - Creative - A special dinner for two. A functional table, of approximately card table size, to be provided by exhibitor. Treated plant material permitted. Occasion to be described by exhibitor. Eligible for Creativity Award.

4 entries

Class 2 - Ingenious - Design on a hat, of exhibitor's choice.

Designer's choice of fresh and/or dried plant material, with or without other components. No treated plant material permitted. To be staged on spindles 15 3/4" diameter. Treatment of spindle designer's choice, eligible for Creativity Award.

4 entries

Class 3 - Reverent - Design to be composed of all fresh plant material. To be staged behind "cathedral" shaped frame 40" high, 30" wide. Eligible for Tricolor Award.

4 entries

Class 4 - Industrious - Design composed of all green plant material. 7
To be staged in a niche 32" high, 24" wide, 12" deep.
Eligible for Tricolor Award.

4 entries

Class 5 - Reflective - A design to complement an art work. Exibitor's choice of subject. To be staged on table in front of oak panel 38" wide. Background may be covered. Treated plant material permitted. Eligible for Creativity Award.

4 entries

Class 6 - Peacemaker - Design of all fresh plant material in two containers. To be staged with background 40" high, 30" wide, 18" deep. Background may be covered. Eligible for Tricolor Award.

4 entries

Class 7 - Dainty - Miniature designs, not to exceed 5" overall. To be staged in cubicles 7" overall.

a. fresh plant material 4 entries b. dried plant material 4 entries

Class 8 - Provocative - Interpretive design. Invitational, not to be judged. To be staged on a pedestal 40" tall, with an 18 diameter. Design may extend beyond 18" top.
