We have passed through quarrelsome epochs and reached the compromise stage. Our people are now realizing that they can "arise more quickly by going in the same direction at the same time. They are beginning to realize that it is worth doing at all. It is worth doing at once, even if they must do it themselves.

Our prices both in and out of the city, have been boosted by optimistic promises of deep water. If these promises are not made good, further advance can not only not be expected, but present value must decline. Our people are looking their situation, are over-estimating their efforts and concealing the case before them. Our working strength has been more than the reputation for doing things, rather than waiting for them to be done by others.

The board of trade as heretofore will doubtless continue to treat day-tenable water for Miami, both inland and outside, as of paramount importance. The forces of its energy, particularly be exerted in moulding and harmonizing sentiment that the harbor may not be uncertain when the issue of election is called looking to the purchase of additional frontage. Its active encouragement will doubtless be given to the organization which is endeavoring to take care of the channel between the city and the Government cut, and to the East Coast Canal association which is advocating Government control of the canal.

# TREASURE FOUND WORTH FORTUNE BURIED NEAR SNAKE CRK.

Negroes Digging Ditches Unearth Seven Jars Filled With Doubloons Buried By Buccaneers

Buried treasure believed to be worth several thousand dollars was unearthed near Snake creek about two miles inland from the bay by two negro laborers last Saturday night. The buried doubloons being supposed to have been the property of some pirate in the days gone by. The coins are all gold, and fill seven earthen jars which hold about half a gallon each.

The two men were running ditches around a farm in the locality mentioned last Saturday, and about four feet below the surface a few rods back from the creek, the treasure was found near an old oak tree, but there were no other signs about the place to mark it or to lead any particular significance to it. Foster said today that he did not know the name of the man who owns the land where they were running the ditches, and does not know whether or not he was apprised of the rich find.

The two negroes quit work immediately upon discovering the treasure and started for the coast. Thompson persuaded Foster to go to a neighboring town to get a mule for some purpose or other, and during his absence, Foster, with the entire booty, hurried out a warrant for Thompson's arrest, as he figures that half of the money belongs to him.
