







## CHART OF ADMINISTRATIVE ORGANIZATION



The City Council consists of two aldermen from each of four wards who are elected for two year terms by the qualified voters of their respective wards.

The Mayor, the City Treasurer, the City Marshal and Collector, and the City Supervisor are elected annually by the qualified voters of the City.

The Police Magistrate is elected for a four year term by the

The City Attorney, the City Clerk, and the City Surveyor and Engineer are elected annually by the City Council.

The Chief of Police is appointed annually by the Mayor.

All other City officers are appointed annually by the Mayor, by and with the consent of the City Council.

Members of the several Boards and Commissions are appointed for varying terms by the Mayor, by and with the consent of the City Council.



# CITY GOVERNMENT

The City of Lake Forest, with a population of approximately 8900, is administered under the Mayor-Council plan. The Mayor and Aldermen compose the City Council, the meetings of which, open to the public, are held at 8:00 p.m. on the first Monday of each month in the Lake Forest City Hall, 220 E. Deerpath, L.F. 2600.

The following officers are elected on the second Tuesday in April for one year terms, except the Police Magistrate who is elected every fourth year.

## CITY REVENUE

About 77 per cent of revenue for the City of Lake Forest is derived from the General (Property) Tax. The rest comes from Vehicle Licenses, Municipal Retailers Occupation tax, Building Permits and other charges, licenses and fees.

# LAKE FOREST CITY COUNCIL

The City of Lake Forest is divided into four wards, as shown on the map, p. 15. The voters in each of the four wards elect two Aldermen to represent them on the City Council. These Aldermen are elected on the second Tuesday in April, for two-year terms, one half in the even-numbered years and one half in the odd-numbered years. The aldermen and the Mayor serve without compensation.

# LAKE FOREST CAUCUS

In February, 1956, under the leadership of Mayor Donnelley, the rules of the Lake Forest Caucus were put into writing and the scope of the Caucus was extended. The purpose of the Caucus is to insure good representative government. The function of the Caucus is to nominate candidates for elective offices of The City of Lake Forest and to recommend to the Mayor and the City Council persons to be appointed on the City's recreation, library, zoning and zoning appeal boards and planning commission. The Caucus likewise recommends candidates for members of The City of Lake Forest School Board and for members from Lake Forest for the Lake Forest High School Board. It also selects its own committee on candidates.

All voters are entitled to attend the meeting of the Caucus which is to be held annually on the second Sunday of February at a time and place to be given by notice in The Lake Forester and Lake Forest News. Each year a President and Secretary of the Caucus are to be elected at the annual meeting, to serve for the succeeding year. Mr. Albert D. Farwell is presently serving as President and Mr. John E. Baker, Jr. is serving as Secretary.

The Caucus has a committee on candidates consisting of 32 persons, 8 of whom are elected from each ward in the City. Of the persons initially elected in 1956, two members from each ward shall serve one year, two members shall serve two years, two members shall serve three years, and two members shall serve four years. As the terms expire the successor of each member shall serve four years.

It is the duty of the committee on candidates to recommend to the Caucus a slate of candidates for nomination and recommendation by the Caucus. Such committee shall during the year prior to making such recommendations ascertain from the voters of their respective wards the best qualified and most representative candidates. In carrying out this policy the committee on candidates will avoid officer seekers and let the office seek the candidate.

It is the policy of the Caucus to limit the time of consecutive service of various officers in the City and School Districts as follows:

Mayor: Not more than three one-year terms.

Aldermen: Not more than three two-year terms.

Members of School Boards: Not more than four two-year terms.

Recreation Board: Not more than two five-year terms.

The Caucus rules also provide that there may be a public policy committee consisting of five members from each ward, selected annually by the Caucus. It is the duty of the public policy committee to recommend to the Caucus a course of action on matters of public interest. Such committee shall select a Chairman and Secretary. This committee was not appointed at the 1956 meeting of the Caucus.

## **SPECIAL CHARTER OF THE CITY OF LAKE FOREST**

The City of Lake Forest was incorporated by a special act of the Legislature approved February 21, 1861 and amended in 1869. This act was a complete act for the operation and government of The City of Lake Forest and is known as the City's Special Charter. It was passed before the adoption of the present Constitution of the State of Illinois in 1870, which prohibits special acts. Under the Constitution the Legislature has passed a general act for the incorporation of cities and villages. The Legislature also has power to make general laws applicable to cities incorporated under special acts and, as a result, most of the important provisions of the City's special act have been superseded by general law. However, the special act is still effective as to the provision for officers of the City and the method and time of their election. The provision for control of the elementary public schools by the City Council is also still in effect and the school property is held by the City in trust for the schools. Under a general act relating to cities having charge of their own schools, members of the Board of Education are appointed by the Mayor and subject to confirmation by the City Council.

## **CITY PLAN**

The official plan for the City of Lake Forest, comprehensive and revised, was drawn up under the direction of the Plan Commission in consultation with Harland Bartholomew and Associates, of St. Louis, City Planners, in February of 1955. It was adopted by the City Council, April 4, 1955.

## TOWNSHIP GOVERNMENT

Townships are subdivisions of the county with responsibility for carrying out certain county functions. The Supervisor is a member of the County Board (assistant supervisors, elected where population warrants, also sit on the board, but do not act as town officers) and also serves as treasurer and overseer of the poor for the township.

The Assessor has the duty of setting property valuation for tax purposes for both real and personal property, technically under supervision of the County Treasurer, but in practice quite independent.

These officers, together with the Clerk, Highway Commissioner, Justices of the Peace, and Constables are elected the first Tuesday in April of every odd year for four year terms, but not all are elected the same year.

Compensation for these officers is as follows:

The Supervisor receives a salary as overseer of the poor and per diem sums for his other duties.

The Assessor receives a salary as set by statute.

The Clerk's salary is set at the town meeting.

Highway Commissioner's per diem wage is set by the town meeting.

The former office of Township Collector was discontinued by the November 6, 1956 referendum.

Constables and Justices of the Peace are remunerated by fees.

A Board of Town Auditors, composed of the Supervisor, Clerk, and Justices of the Peace, audits town officers' accounts and makes appointments to fill certain vacancies. They are paid a per diem amount set at the town meeting, but not to exceed \$10.00 per meeting.

## TOWN MEETING

Each Township holds an annual Town Meeting on the first Tuesday in April. All residents of the Township may go to this meeting and all qualified voters may vote. The most important work of the Town Meeting is the adoption of the yearly budget, and the determination of the tax levy. The Town Meeting is the only governmental unit in which voters may vote directly on matters of government rather than through elected representatives.

In Lake County there are 18 Townships each with an area of approximately 36 square miles.

Township revenue is derived from the general property tax.



### ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS

The boundaries of the Lake Forest Public Schools, District 67, are co-terminous with the city limits established by the special state charter under which Lake Forest functions as a municipality.

Four schools are maintained. According to residence, children in Kindergarten or Grades 1-4 attend Everett School, Gorton School, or Sheridan School. All children in Grades 5-8 attend Deerpath School.

Members of the Board of Education are appointed by the mayor and approved by the city council. Eight members, two from each of the four city wards, serve two-year terms; the ninth member serves a one-year term as president.

As the Township is a division of the County, so the County is a legal division of the State.

The functions performed by the County are: the administration of election machinery; the enforcement of the State laws and preservation of the peace; the collection of taxes (general property) and the administration of finance; construction and maintenance of county roads; the protection and control of public health; and the supervision of public education.

Lake Forest is located in Lake County. Waukegan is the county seat.

COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS consists of the supervisor and assistant supervisor from each township. It is the chief governing body of the county.

COUNTY TUBERCULOSIS BOARD is administered by a board of three unpaid directors, one of whom must be a licensed physician, appointed by the chairman or president of the county board with the approval of the board. The president of the Lake County Tuberculosis Board is Dr. Charles K. Petter.

COUNTY HEALTH DEPARTMENT. It was voted to establish a county health department at the November general election of 1956. The department will consist of a Board of Health, to be appointed by the County Board of Supervisors, composed of seven non-salaried citizens (including two physicians and one dentist) and a full time professional staff—a public health officer, sanitation officer, public health nurses and such other personnel as needed.

The chief source of county revenue is the general property tax, the distribution being about 7% of the amount levied in each township.

The State of Illinois is a sovereign state with powers set forth in the State Constitution of 1870. As Lake Forest voters living in the State of Illinois we directly nominate and elect the members of the State Senate and the House of Representatives, (commonly referred to as the State Legislature or the General Assembly) and the following State officials:

(All except the Superintendent of Public Instruction are elected for four year terms at the General Election in November of every year that is divisible by four.) The Superintendent of Public Instruction is elected for a term of four years at the General Election in November in the even numbered years that are not divisible by four. The Clerk of the Supreme Court has a term of six years. The Treasurer is ineligible to succeed himself.

## STATE SENATE (58 State Senators)

Illinois is divided into 58 Senatorial Districts (as shown on the map, page 28). Each District elects one member of the Senate. Candidates for members in the Senate are nominated at the primaries and elected at the November General Election for four year terms. Senators from the even-numbered Districts are elected in years divisible by four; those from odd-numbered Districts are elected in alternate even-numbered years. The presiding officer is the Lieutenant-Governor.

Lake Forest is in the 52nd Senatorial District and the State Senator from the 52nd District is Robert McClory, Lake Bluff (Republican).

## HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES (177 State Representatives) 59 Districts

The voters of each Representative District elect three members of the House every even-numbered year at the November election, for two-year terms. Cumulative voting is employed in the election of State

Representatives to insure minority representation. The presiding officer is the Speaker, elected by the membership of the House.

Lake Forest is the 31st Representative District.

Regular sessions of the State Legislature commence on the Wednesday after the first Monday in January of every odd-numbered year (next session—January 9, 1957) and usually adjourn in June of the same year. Visitors are always welcome when the Legislature is in session.

### STATE REVENUE

The main sources of State revenue are taxes and contributions for specific purposes from the Federal Government. The three largest sources of tax money are the Retailers Occupational, motor fuel and motor vehicle taxes.


### UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS

The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, created by action of the general assembly, controls and manages the properties of the university, prescribes courses of study, makes appointments, and fixes salaries. It is composed of the Governor, the Superintendent of Public Instruction (ex-officio), and nine members elected by the voters of the entire state. Three trustees are elected every even-numbered year at the general election in November. Their term of office is six years. Trustees serve without compensation. A vacancy in the office of trustee is filled by appointment by the Governor until the next general election.

# NATIONAL GOVERNMENT

Under the Constitution of the United States the functions of the federal government are divided into three branches: the legislative, the executive and the judicial.

The chief executives, the President and Vice-President, are elected by the votes of the entire United States, but they are not elected directly. They are chosen by the Electoral College, composed of electors from every state, elected at the November General Election of every year divisible by four. They are the only members of the Executive Department who are elected.

Each State is entitled to a number of electors equal to the number of its representatives in both Houses of Congress. This makes a total of 531 electoral votes, a majority of which, or 266 votes, is necessary for a choice. Names of electors do not appear on the ballot. Names of candidates for President and Vice President appear instead, and voting for them is equivalent to voting for the electors.

Illinois with 25 Representatives and 2 Senators chooses 27 electors.

The National Congress consists of the Senate and House of Representatives. It convenes on January 3rd each year.

## SENATE

(96 Members)

The Senate is composed of two senators elected from each state. One-third of these senators are elected every even-numbered year at the November General election for six-year terms. The Vice-President of the United States is President of the Senate.


Illinois elects 25 Representatives—one from each Congressional District at the November General Election in every even-numbered year for two-year terms. The presiding officer is the Speaker of the House, who is chosen in majority party caucus and approved by the House.

The largest source of national revenue is the tax on the income of individuals and corporations. Revenue is also derived from customs duties, inheritance taxes, excises levied on some articles rated as luxuries.

## NATURALIZATION REQUIREMENTS & PROCEDURE

### Requirements

Any man or woman over 18 who has been lawfully admitted to the United States for permanent residence; has lived in the United States for 5 years (or 3 years if married to a U. S. citizen); is able to carry on an ordinary conversation in English; is of good moral character; and has an understanding of the principles of the Constitution and the Government of the United States may apply for Form N-400 from the Naturalization Office in the Post Office Building, Van Buren and Canal Street in Chicago or from the Circuit Court Clerk's Office, County Building, Waukegan.

### First Hearing

The applicant will be notified when and where he is to come for First Hearing. He shall appear before the Naturalization Examiner, accompanied by two witnesses who will testify to his character and other qualifications.

The Examiner will question the applicant on knowledge of American History and Government. The Examiner will help the applicant file a Petition for Naturalization. A fee of \$10.00 is paid to the Clerk of the Court.

### Final Hearing

When notified (usually after 30 days) the applicant must appear when and where designated.

The Judge, on the recommendation of the Immigration and Naturalization Service, grants the Petition for Naturalization.

The applicant takes an oath of renunciation to his foreign citizenship and of allegiance to the United States.

The applicant is then a legal citizen of the United States of America.

In the United States, political parties are an integral part of our system of democratic government. They have definite and legitimate responsibilities. They nominate candidates, formulate platforms and policies and arouse interest among the voters.

## National Party Organization

Each major political party—Republican and Democratic—directs its affairs through a system of committees and conventions. Each party is governed by precedent and by rules adopted by its National Convention.

National Party Convention Delegates—At the April primaries every year divisible by four, Illinois elects two delegates from each of its twenty-five congressional districts, and the State Convention selects the additional delegates and alternates-at-large to comprise the state delegation to the National Convention. From their ranks, each state delegation chooses one man and one woman to be members of the National Committee. There is also one man and one woman from Alaska, District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, and Hawaii. In addition the democratic committee has representatives from the Virgin Islands and the Panama Canal Zone.

National Party Committees—These are made up of National Committee members and they plan the organization of the party, propose the rules for the convention, apportion to each state its number of delegates, and select the party chairmen and officers.

Congressional Committees—These are composed of one representative from each state which has party representation in Congress. They conduct Congressional campaigns in even-numbered years between Presidential elections. Their aim is to secure party majority in Congress.

National Party Conventions—These are held in the summer of every year divisible by four to nominate candidates for the office of President and Vice-President of the United States, and to adopt a Party Platform.

## Party Organization in Illinois

Precinct Committeemen—Except in Cook County, within the city limits of Chicago where ward committeemen are elected for four-year

teeman for a two year term at the April Primaries. In the proceedings of all party conventions, each committeeman is entitled to the number of votes cast in his district by the members of his party at the preceding primary. It is therefore important that each committeeman work to get out the votes.

(Lake Forest Precinct Committeemen and polling places appear on page 14).

County Central Committee—This is composed of all the precinct committeemen within a county and its function is to manage party affairs in the county.

Municipal Committee—This is composed of precinct committeemen within a municipality, but it does not function where local elections are on a non-partisan basis.

Congressional Committee—This is composed of precinct committeemen in the district or chairmen of central committaes if the district contains more than two counties. The State Central Committeeman of the district is the chairman. This committee directs party affairs in the congressional district.

Senatorial Committee—This is composed of the county central committee chairmen of counties in the district and other party officers serving ex-officio. Its sole function is supplying nomination for a vacancy in the office of state senator in the general assembly.

Representative Committee—These committeemen are elected at the primaries for a two year term. There are three elected to each district or one to each county in the district. The purpose of this committee is to determine the number of party candidates to be nominated for the seats in the Illinois House of Representatives. Each state representative district elects three representatives.

State Convention—It is called by the State Central Committee. Each county is entitled to send one delegate for every 500 ballots cast by party members in the preceding primary. The State Convention nominates candidates for electors of the President and Vice-President. The number of electors from each state is equal to the number of Congressmen and Senators. The State Convention nominates candidates for Trustees of the University of Illinois and appoints delegates and alternates-at-large to the National Convention. It adopts the State Party Platform.

## KINDS OF ELECTIONS

### 1. Primary

Primary elections are party elections with separate party ballots. It nominates candidates for political office and elects party committeemen.

At a primary the voter must declare his party and he may not change this affiliation at any Primary held within 23 months. This law applies only to primary elections; a voter does not declare his party affiliation in a general election and is free to vote for any candidate.

Primaries are held for all parties on the second Tuesday in April every even numbered year. Candidates names are placed on the Primary ballot by party caucus, or by a petition which must be signed by a specified number of qualified voters and certified by proper authorities.

### 2. General

General elections are held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November of every even-numbered year. The voter may vote for:

1. Election of candidates whose names were placed on the ballot by  
(a) Nominating in the Primary; (b) Petition; (c) Party Caucus.
2. Adoption or rejection of proposed amendments to the State Constitution.
3. Propositions submitted by the State Legislature, City Council, or by petition of the people.
4. Question of public policy.

In a democracy, the government is run by the people who live under it. By exercising the right to vote the citizen indicates his preference in the nomination or election of his representatives to the law making bodies.

## Who May Vote

Any citizen who is properly registered.

## Who May Register

Any citizen 21 years of age who is born in the United States; is a naturalized citizen thereof; has resided in the precinct for 30 days, in the county for 90 days, and the state for one year.

Once registered, the voter need never register again unless he fails to vote in four years; moves into another election district; or changes his name.

## Where to Register

A citizen may register at the office of the County Clerk, County Court House, Waukegan; at the Office of the Shields Township Supervisor, 738 N. Western Avenue, Lake Forest; or at any Lake County Township Supervisor's office.

## When to Register

Any time in the year except during the 30 day period beginning 28 days before and ending two days after a primary or general election.

## Procedure at the Polling Place

Being properly registered, the voter presents himself at his polling place (see p...) and after being properly identified he receives his ballot, which he takes into a booth to mark in secret.

Ballots are marked by putting an X in the quarter inch squares before the names of candidates, or in the half inch circle at the top of the party column. No other mark will do.

After marking his ballot the voter folds it so that his own marks do not show and the judge's initials on the back do show. He hands his ballot to the judge who puts it in the ballot box (by law he is not permitted to deposit it himself).

## Information About Candidates

The Lake Forest League of Women Voters has a Voter's Service which furnishes information about all party candidates before elections on a non-partisan basis. Mrs. Walther H. Buchen, 370 Onwentsia Road, L.F. 3094, is in charge of this service and will be glad to give help and information to everyone. Your local newspapers, party clubs and organizations also provide information.

There are three kinds of absentee ballots:

1) Any qualified voter absent from his county on election day may apply for a ballot, either in person or by letter, to the Lake County Clerk at the County building in Waukegan. This must be done not more than 30 days nor less than 5 days before an election.

2) Members of the armed forces. They are not required to register and may make application in the same manner as above, but may do so 100 days before an election.

3) Incapacitated voters may write, or have a friend do so, to the County Clerk, Waukegan for an application for an absentee ballot, specifying that it is for an incapacitated person notarized.

second form must be notarized and filled out by the doctor of Christian Science practitioner. The patient then sends these two forms back to the County Clerk who in turn sends an absentee ballot to the voter.

## Procedure

The voter must mark the ballot secretly, but in the presence of a Notary. The ballot must be returned to the County Clerk who will then send the sealed ballot to the judges of the voter's precinct, before the polls close on election day.

## JUDICIARY

### Federal

The Constitution vests the judicial power of the United States in one Supreme Court and such inferior courts as Congress may from time to time ordain and establish.

Federal judges are appointed by the President, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, and hold office during good behavior.

The Supreme Court has a Chief Justice and eight Associate Judges.

### THE UNITED STATES COURTS OF APPEALS

The United States is divided into eleven judicial circuits. Illinois is in the 7th judicial circuit which also includes Wisconsin and Indiana.

### THE UNITED STATES DISTRICT COURTS

Each judicial circuit is divided into judicial districts. There are 84 district courts in the 48 states and one each in Puerto Rico and Hawaii. The District Courts are the trial courts in the federal system except in extraordinary cases.

Illinois has three districts—the northern, southern, and western. They are divided into five divisions, with courts in Chicago, Freeport, Peoria, Springfield, Quincy, Danville, Cairo, East St. Louis, and Benton.

The Federal Courts hear matters arising under federal statutes such as bankruptcy violations of federal criminal laws, Fair Trade cases, Pure Food and Drug cases, federal tax cases (on appeal from the Tax Court) and suits between states and citizens of different states when more than \$3,000 is involved.

ILLINOIS STATE GOVERNMENT

The Constitution of Illinois vests the judicial powers of the State in the following courts:

## 1. The State Supreme Court

The Supreme Court sits in Springfield for a three-week period every other month from September through May of each year. The State of Illinois is divided into seven judicial districts. One justice is elected from each of these districts and these seven men constitute the State Supreme Court, and hold office for a term of nine years. Once every six years a Clerk of the Supreme Court is elected from the state-at-large.

Lake Forest is in the seventh judicial district.

The judge from the Seventh district is Walter V. Schaefer of Lake Bluff.

## 2. Appellate Courts

Illinois is divided into four districts with one Appellate Court in each. Lake County is in the second appellate district. The court for the second district meets in Ottawa, Illinois on the first Tuesday of February, May and October of each year. Three judges for each of these Appellate Courts are chosen by the Supreme Court for three-year terms. At least two judges must agree in every decision. Appellate Courts have no original jurisdiction; they review cases appealed to them from the lower courts. A clerk of each Appellate Court is elected in each district every six years.

## 3. Circuit Courts

Illinois is divided into eighteen judicial circuits. Each circuit, outside of Cook County, elects three circuit judges for six-year terms. These are courts of general jurisdiction with authority to try all cases, both civil and criminal. A Circuit Court Clerk is elected in each county for a four-year term.

Lake County is in the seventeenth judicial circuit and the court meets in the County Courthouse in Waukegan.

There is in each county a County Court which is a court of record and which has jurisdiction in the following matters: probate and appointment of guardians and conservators, where there is no special probate court; insolvent debtors proceedings and assignments for the benefit of creditors; care of the insane; and tax matters. The County Judge also acts as family court judge in all counties except Cook. The County Court has concurrent jurisdiction with the Circuit Court in adoptions, appeals from justices of the peace; eminent domain; election contests for certain offices; drainage matters; civil cases where the amount does not exceed \$2,000; non-indictable criminal cases when the punishment is not imprisonment in the penitentiary or death.

The County Judge is elected and is paid a salary fixed by statute in accordance with the population. The County Clerk of each county serves as Clerk of the County Court.

## **Probate Court**

There is a probate court in all counties having a population of 125,000 or more; in counties having a population of 70,000 and not over 125,000, the County Board may establish a Probate Court. These courts have original jurisdiction in all probate matters, in the appointment of guardians and conservators, and in the settlement of their accounts.

There is one judge for each probate court, elected in the same manner and for the same term as the County Judge. He receives the same salary as the County Judge and is paid by the county. A probate court clerk is elected for a four-year term in every county which has a probate court.

## **Justices of the Peace and Police Magistrate Courts**

Inferior courts in the county system are justice of the peace and police magistrate courts. Justices of the peace are elected in townships and police magistrates in municipalities.

Justices of the peace and police magistrates have concurrent jurisdiction in civil cases up to \$500, and in criminal cases where the punishment does not exceed a fine of \$300 or imprisonment in the county jail for a term of more than one year. They also have criminal jurisdiction for conducting preliminary examinations and admitting accused persons to bail or committing them to await grand jury action. Jurisdiction is county wide.

Justices of the peace are elected in each township and in each election precinct in non-township counties. The number varies from two to five according to the population of the township or precinct.

Constables are elected in each township and precinct in the same manner as justices of the peace and in numbers corresponding to them. They serve writs and processes for justices of the peace and police magistrate courts.

## MUNICIPAL JUDICIARY

The Legislature has made provision for the establishment of city and municipal courts. These two courts differ in jurisdiction. A city court is a court of general jurisdiction whereas a Municipal Court has only the limited jurisdiction conferred by Statute. Both are courts of record.

**CITY COURT.** Any city or incorporated town with a population of 3,000 or more, or a village with a population in excess of 30,000 may establish a city court if, on referendum submitted by city council, two-thirds of the voters approve. The territorial jurisdiction of the court is limited to the city in which it is established.

Judges of city courts are elected for six-year terms at an election date fixed by city ordinance (but not at the same time that other city officers are elected). Judges are paid by the state on a sliding scale in accordance with the size of the municipality.

A clerk is elected for each city court for a six-year term and his compensation is determined by the governing body of the municipality. City court judges may appoint masters in chancery to hear and report on cases.

**MUNICIPAL COURT.** Any city or village of 15,000 or more may establish a municipal court on petition and referendum. These courts have a wide civil and criminal jurisdiction which includes action on contracts; actions for damages for injury to personal property or persons; all classes of common law cases for the recovery of money; and certain quasi-criminal activities and non-indictable criminal offenses in which the punishment is by fine or imprisonment other than in the penitentiary.

The number of judges is determined by the city council or village board, except that there shall not be more than one judge for every 35,000 inhabitants or fraction thereof. Judges are elected for six-year terms and the municipality pays the expenses of the court and receives the fees.

A municipal court clerk is elected for a four-year term. The baliff is appointed by, and is a deputy of, the sheriff of the county in which the court is located.

**POLICE MAGISTRATE COURT.** Cities and villages may elect a police magistrate, who has limited jurisdiction in the trial of civil and criminal cases.


