

Program Planning - Your Voice Needed!

ATTENTION ALL MEMBERS! Program (our set of positions and action foci) is a big part of what League is all about, and we need YOUR input to help us make sure we're representing our membership.

We held a preliminary local program planning session last Thursday, and while it was a stimulating and productive conversation about our priorities for the coming year, we need more members represented.

Please take this quick poll to help us choose a date for our next Program Planning Workshop.

Our Role in National Program Planning

The LWVUS Biennial Convention is coming up this summer, and local Leagues get a say in National program decisions.

There are two big, and related, issues that we are being asked to weigh in on.

- Concurrence on new LWVUS voter representation/electoral systems position: LWVUS is asking all Leagues to consider concurrence on a new national position intended to "provide a clear, flexible base of principles for evaluating electoral options to enhance the voice of more voters." Get the details here.
- 2. LWVUS Position to abolish the Electoral College: For more than 50 years LWVUS has had a position to abolish the Electoral College. However, because it's not a National action focus, state and local Leagues are not able to advocate for it. The State League's Electoral College Committee is looking to change that by proposing it as an action focus at the LWVUS Convention. The State committee is asking local Leagues to support this effort. Get details and be prepared to vote yea or nay on this.

So, when are we discussing and voting on the LWVUS Program? We're thinking of having an online meeting for this: There WILL be opportunities for open discussion during the meeting.

You DO NOT need any special equipment to participate. You'll get a link to open in your web browser that will allow you to see discussion documents.

You DO NOT need a camera or microphone on your computer.

You will be given a phone number so you can call in to the meeting on your phone.

The meeting can be recorded for the benefit of those who are not able to participate.




FUN FACT OF THE WEEK:



FUN FACT OF THE WEEK:

The origin of Presidents' Day lies in the 1880s, when the birthday of George Washington was first celebrated as a federal holiday. In 1968 Congress passed the Uniform Monday Holiday Bill, which moved a number of federal holidays to Mondays. The change was designed to schedule certain holidays so that workers had a number of long weekends throughout the year, but it has been opposed by those who believe that those holidays should be celebrated on the dates they actually commemorate. During debate on the bill, it was

proposed that Washington's Birthday be renamed Presidents' Day to honor the birthdays of both Washington (February 22) and Lincoln (February 12); although Lincoln's birthday was celebrated in many states, it was never an official federal holiday. Following much discussion, Congress rejected the name change. After the bill went into effect in 1971, however, Presidents' Day became the commonly accepted name, due in part to retailers' use of that name to promote sales and the holiday's proximity to Lincoln's birthday. Presidents' Day is usually marked by public ceremonies in Washington, DC, and throughout the country. - Encyclopedia Britannica



FUN FACT OF THE WEEK:

It takes the Earth about 365 days, 5 hours, 48 minutes and 45 seconds to circle once around the sun. However, the Gregorian calendar we rely on has only 365 days, so if we didn't add an extra day to our shortest month about every four years, we would lose almost six hours every year. After a century, our calendar would be off by about 24 days.

Julius Caesar introduced the first leap year around

46 B.C., but his Julian calendar had only one rule, which was that any year evenly divisible by four would be a leap year. It turns out that the extra day every four years was an over-correction, but the error wasn't discovered until Pope Gregory XIII introduced his Gregorian calendar more than 1,500 years later. So there's a leap year every year that is divisible by four, but century years also must be divisible by 400. So, the year 2000 was a leap year, but the years 1700, 1800 and 1900 were not, nor will 2100 be

Fair Maps Amendment Vote Coming Soon--Last Chance to Call Your

LWVIL is working, in partnership with Change Illinois, to get lawmakers to vote on the Fair Maps Amendment, our redistricting reform proposal. The deadline for the vote is on May 3, 2020, to place a constitutional amendment proposal on the November 2020 ballot to affect the redistricting process in 2021. We are asking you to call the offices of Speaker Madigan (217) 782-5350, Senate President Harmon (217) 782-8176, as well as your State Senator and State Representative, and urge them to support the Fair Maps Amendment (HJRCA41/SJRCA18) and call it for a vote.

POSITION IN BRIEF

All districts shall be drawn in compliance with the United States Voting Rights Act of 1965 and subsequent amendments

 Support for a redistricting process which is timely, orderly and meets the basic criteria relating to population, compactness and contiguity and the requirements of the 1965 U.S. Voting Rights Act and subsequent amendments

The League supports the following criteria for drawing state legislative districts:

- timely and orderly and which includes a formal announced timetable.
- makes information and related data available to all who wish to participate in the process,
- offers ample opportunities for expert testimony and public reaction to the proposed maps.
- encourages compromise among partisan representatives,
- · avoids a partisan stalemate, and
- results in maps which offer the voters a choice of candidates for election.
- Population equity: The average deviation among all districts in each house shall not exceed a range of 1 percent, with no more than a 5 percent variance between the most populated and the least populated districts. Districts shall be based on current census statistics.






Fun Fact of the Week

LWVIL Position (1976) Handgun Control

To curb the proliferation of the private ownership of handguns and their irresponsible use, the League supports a ban on the further manufacture, sale, transportation and importation of handguns and their parts.

LWVIL Position: (1989) Assault Weapons Control

- The League advocates restricting access to automatic and semi-automatic assault type weapons by private individuals. These weapons present a clear and unequivocal danger to public safety. Therefore, the League believes that it is essential to restrict or prohibit the possession and sale, manufacture, importation and transportation of semi-automatic assault type weapons for private ownership. Additionally, the sale of ammunition for these weapons should be restricted or prohibited.
- The League favors restrictive legislation at both the state and federal levels.

LWV Observer Corps Needs You!

The League has been a champion of government transparency since our founding in 1920. It is one of our core principles and a vital part of our mission. Our efforts in this area reinforce our reputation of fairness, nonpartisanship, and trust. As an advocacy organization, we must monitor our government. League members attend governmental meetings as members of the Observer Corps to learn what their government is doing and to monitor whether those meetings are conducted in an open and transparent way. Experience has shown the importance of the League being present to watch—and to take action when necessary.

If you are looking for a way to become involved in local government, consider the possibility of participation in the LWV-LF/LB Observer Corps.

Decisions such as determining how our schools will

be run, the level of community safety funding, and how the land in our towns will be used impact our lives and are vital to our well-being. These kinds of decisions need to be made with public input and oversight. Observer Corps makes a statement that the community is watching the process of government.

The League Observer is a representative of the public at these meetings. They attend meetings, note what happens at the meeting, and report back to the League and (hopefully) the community. By attending public meetings of local governmental bodies/agencies, Observers learn more about what their government is doing. They learn about the issues facing their community and are empowered to take action, if warranted. They also learn how issues are being addressed. Observers keep elected and appointed officials on notice; they let them know that someone is watching what decisions are being made and how they are being made.

This summer, we are offering you the opportunity to participate in our League's free online LWV Observer Corps Training. If you are interested in observer corps training, please contact Vice President Emily Watts for more information about what is expected of an observer. It does not usually require a significant time commitment since most sovernmental units only meet once a month.

On June 13, 1966, Chief Justice Earl Warren delivered The Supreme Court landmark Miranda vs. Arizona decision, which held that the admission of an elicited incriminating statement by a suspect not informed of their rights violates the Fifth and Sixth Amendments. Thus, if law enforcement officials decline to offer a Miranda warning to an individual in their custody, they may interrogate that person and act upon the knowledge gained, but may not use that person's statements as evidence against them in a criminal trial.



Fun Fact of the Week

Yesterday was the Summer Solstice, the longest day of the year. The solstice is usually on June 21, but can occur between June 20 and June 22. It's never exact due to the calendar not being exact to the Earth's rotation. You may wonder why, if the solstice is the longest day of the year—and thus gets the most sunlight—the temperature usually doesn't reach its annual peak until a month or two later. It's because water, which makes up most of the Earth's surface, has a high specific heat, meaning it takes a while to both heat up and cool down. Because of this, the Earth's temperature takes about six weeks to catch up to the Sun.

Summary of Legislative Update with State Senator Julie Morrison

LWV-LF/LB held a legislative interview with our State Senator Julie Morrison on Wednesday, June 24, at 11:30 AM via Zoom, with over 30 participants. The effort was coordinated by our Vice President of Voter Services, Mary Mathews.

LWV-LF/LB President Laurie Rose gave a brief welcome and introduced Senator Morrison, who then spoke briefly on what happened in Springfield during this last session, and a bit about what to expect in the veto session. She noted that she had personally purchased a dog for the Lake Bluff 125th Anniversary, which she has fondly named "Artie". The moderator, Director of Communications Lynette Foss, then asked the wide variety of questions that had been submitted in

advance by those who registered to participate.

Senator Morrison stated that \$30 million has been allocated for mental health care, as well as an increase of 20% for the DCFS budget, as a result of COVID-19 related stresses. She discussed efforts to balance the state budget in the wake of the pandemic. While the Vote by Mail efforts have been largely successful, she clarified that it is only for the 2020 election, and that further legislation would be required for the measure to hold in the future. The "Fix the FOID" efforts will probably have to wait until the "lame duck" session, as well as some criminal and pension reform efforts.

In closing, Senator Morrison stated her top priorities for the next legislative session. They are: 1. Fix the FOID, 2. increase funding and oversight for DCFS, 3. balancing the budget and restructuring state debt, and 4. improving ethics in the General Assembly, with a focus on campaign contributions and conflicts of interest.


Fun Fact of the Week

The Chinese invented fireworks centuries ago, but the Italians figured out how to make them colorful and propel them in an aerial shell as early as the 1830's, Firework color concoctions are comprised of different metal elements. When an element burns, its electrons get excited, and it releases. energy in the form of light. Different chemicals burn at different wavelengths of the visible light spectrum. Strontium and lithium compounds produce deep reds; copper produces blues; titanium and magnesium burn silver or white; calcium creates an orange color; sodium produces yellow pyrotechnics; and finally, barium burns green. Combining chlorine with barium or copper creates neon green and turquoise flames, respectively. Blue is apparently the most difficult to produce. Pyrotechnic stars comprised of these chemicals are typically propelled into the sky using an aerial shell.

Fair Tax Amendment/ Illinois Constitutional Amendment Overview, from LWVIL

For more than 40 years, the League of Women Voters has supported a graduated rate income tax for Illinois. In May of this year the General Assembly determined that the public deserves to vote on whether the state constitution should be amended to remove the requirement that income shall be taxed at a flat, non-graduated rate. This change would permit income to be taxed at different rates, with higher income taxed at higher rates, and lower income at lower rates, as in the federal income tax system.

In the general election in November 2020, at the top of the ballot, we will have the opportunity to amend the constitution in this way. All it takes is our votes - there is no need for a Constitutional Convention. To amend this section of the state constitution, approval is needed by either the majority of those voting in November 2020, or 3/5 of those who do not skip the question and vote on the proposed amendment.

Why does the League believe that a progressive income tax is a "Fair Tax", and why have we supported it for so long? The Fair Tax meets League criteria in Where We Stand:

- Equity and Progressivity: The Fair Tax is based on the ability to pay. This is not the case with the current flat tax. According to the Institute on Taxation and Economic Policy, currently, the bottom 20% of wage earners in Illinois have twice the tax burden of the top wage earners, and the bottom 20% pay more than they would in any other. Midwestern state.
- Stability and Responsiveness: Taxing our lowest
 wage earners at a higher percentage is counterproductive since they generally must spend
 most of what they earn, returning it to the
 economy. Furthermore, most of our economic
 growth since 1970 has benefited our top wage
 earners, but they have only paid taxes at the
 same flat rate as low wage earners.

The state has about \$6.5 billion in unpaid bills despite serious funding cuts. Since 2000,cuts in spending on core services (healthcare, human services, and public safety) - have exceeded 20% and cuts to higher education have exceeded 50%.

The constitutional amendment resolution passed by the General Assembly was paired with a law that sets out what the new tax rate structure will be upon passage of the amendment. With that rate structure, a Fair Tax should raise more than an additional \$3 billion each year, while 97% of Illinoisans - people earning \$250,000 or less - will not see their income taxes increase in 2021. The state's need for additional revenue stems in

part from past decisions to shirk its pension obligations. For decades, the state has kicked the can down the road, passing mounting debt to future generations. With our flat income tax structure, the wealthiest Illinoisans have benefited most from those decisions over the years, paying less than their fair share. It is time to put the state on a steady path to meet its obligations with a modern income tax structure.

Here is the wording that will be on the ballot:

The proposed amendment grants the State authority to impose higher income tax rates on higher income levels, which is how the federal government and a majority of other states do it. The amendment would remove the portion of the Revenue Article of the Illinois Constitution that is sometimes referred to as the "flat tax," that requires all taxes on income to be at the same rate. The amendment does not itself change tax rates. It gives the State the ability to impose higher tax rates on those with higher income levels and lower income tax rates on those with middle or lower income levels. You are asked to decide whether the proposed amendment should become a part of the Illinois Constitution.

The Dangers of Coal Tar Sealants

Coal tar sealants are asphalt pavement sealants that contain high levels of polycyclic aromatic hydrocarbons (PAHs). PAHs are known carcinogens, and they cause birth defects and learning problems like ADHD. They are a danger especially to young children and to fetuses growing in moms with high levels of PAHs in their bodies.

How do PAHs from coal tar sealants get into our hodies?

- through skin contact--for example, kids sitting on a driveway drawing with sidewalk chalk have direct contact with sealed surfaces.
- by breathing fumes while the sealant is fresh, and
- through ingestion, or swallowing dust containing sealant particles.

The sealant wears off over time as sun and rain break it down, and cars and foot traffic abrade it, creating fine dust. The dust enters nearby homes and also runs into nearby streams and rivers through storm water runoff.

In waterways, the dust settles in the sediment where it is toxic to small aquatic creatures at the bottom of the food chain. Sediment in many locations has been tested for PAHs, and elevated levels of the pollutant have been found.

People who want to seal their pavement can use sealants that do not contain coal tar. Consumers can choose asphalt sealants, which are readily available at similar cost. Big box stores know that high PAH products are bad and they no longer sell them. However, some smaller retailers may sell high PAH sealants and commercial applicators may use them. Consumers, including schools, houses of worship, and park districts, have no way to ensure that they aren't getting poisonous sealants.

Anecdotal experience reveals that a number of commercial companies do offer asphalt sealant options but the consumer must firmly and specifically request them.

The League's Position:

LWVUS Position: Support measures to reduce pollution in order to protect surface water, groundwater and drinking water

LWVIL supported efforts to develop a state comprehensive groundwater protection plan based on a policy of non-degradation and continues to work for stronger legislation to protect groundwater quality. Local Leagues have sponsored educational forums and successfully waged groundwater protection and water quality campaiens.

Tests in DuPage County indicate that, as in other urbanized areas, more than half of the PAHs in the waterways come from coal tar sealants. In 2014, the LWVIL signed on to three letters supporting bans on coal tar sealant use and sales, and continued annual support for state legislation which would ban their use through 2019.

Celebrating Women's Suffrage

The summer of 1920 marks the 100th anniversary of women being granted the right to vote. The League is a coalition partner with the 2020 Women's Vote Centennial Initiative, with myriad resources and programs.

Conservation in the United States

This article is the first in a series of articles on conservation in the United States and the people who have been in the forefront of the conservation effort. Some of these people are well-known, but many are not.

When we talk of conservation, we are generally referring to the protection and wise use of the land and its natural resources, both organic (protecting wildlife and plants) and inorganic (protecting and conserving our supply of water, soil, and minerals). The earth has a limited supply of many of its natural resources even though to many, these resources seem like they are endless. Factories, mines, and farms have been dumping contaminated substances including human and animal wastes, toxic chemicals, metals, and oil into rivers and streams making its way to groundwater and eco the oceans.

Early European settlers to the country seemed to believe that the supply of wildlife, of trees, was limitless. Animals were slaughtered by the tens of thousands. Early settlers killed wolves, blaming the wolves for the decline in game populations, and later for killing cattle on ranches. In the 1800s,

there might have been as many as 15 million buffalo living at the end of the Civil War. But by the 1880s, they were on the very verge of extinction. An estimated 100,000 buffalo could be slaughtered in a single day for their hides. Mountain sides were clear-cut of trees for their lumber, leading to massive erosion and avalanches since there was no longer a flourishing root system to hold the soil.

An important conservationist in this country's history is John Muir, a Scottish-American naturalist and environmental philosopher who was an early advocate for the preservation of wilderness in the United States. Muir was a cofounder, in 1892, of the Sierra Club, a conservation organization which was one of the first large-scale environmental preservation organizations in the world. He helped to persuade President Theodore Roosevelt to set aside 148 million acres of forest.

Muir authored letters, books, and essays describing his adventures. He was an environmental activist who campaigned for the conservation of land, water, and forests in the United States. His activism helped to preserve and establish Yosemite Valley and Sequoia National Park. Muir exemplified what it means to respect, cherish, and preserve our nation's natural resources.

August 6, 1945 - The first Atomic Bomb was dropped over the center of Hiroshima at 8:15 a.m., by the American B-29 bomber *Enola Gay*. The bomb detonated about 1,800 ft. above ground, killing over 105,000 persons and destroying the city. Another estimated 100,000 persons later died from the effects of radiation.

Three days later the second atomic bombing of Japan occurred as an American B-29 bomber headed for the city of Kokura, but because of poor visibility chose a secondary target, Nagasaki. An estimated 70,000 persons were killed, and half the city was destroyed.



Chicago's Silent Sentinels

(Chicago History Museum) The Silent Sentinels were a group of suffragists organized by the National Woman's Party (NWP), who began picketing outside the White House on January 10, 1917. After daily silent protests and facing antisuffragists who shouted insults, threw fruit at them, and tore their banners, the first arrests came in June 1917. Two of the women arrested in these protests were from Chicago.

Lucy Hyde Ewing was born in 1885 in Chicago and was a relative of Adlai Stevenson, who served as the twenty-third vice president of the US. Ewing was arrested on charges of obstructing traffic for picketing with a banner and served thirty days at Occoquan Workhouse, a prison facility in Lorton, Virginia. Madeline Upton Watson, who was born in 1885 in Illinois, served as treasurer of the Illinois branch of the NWP. She was arrested twice, first for picketing the White House in August 1917 and again in 1918 for her participation in meetings at Lafayette Square. She served time in Occoquan for hoth parests.



A Way Out of Substance Abuse

"A Way Out" is a Lake County, Illinois Law Enforcement Assisted Diversion pilot program designed to fast-track those who need treatment to substance abuse programs and services. This program is available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week at participating police departments across Lake County and ensures no criminal charges will be sought for those that may be in possession of narcotics or paraphernalia as long as assistance is sought out by the prospective program participant. Participants will not be turned away even if they are unable to pay for treatment due to lack of insurance or financial resources.

"A Way Out" is a program developed by the Lake County Opioid Initiative to create additional treatment access points, reduce crime, reduce substance-related harms, re-frame the role law enforcement plays in community safety, and unite the community. For too long, substance use has been stigmatized and dealt with as a criminal issue. Substance use is a public health problem that needs to be addressed as such. Lake County Opioid Initiative is committed to developing innovative ways to create positive change in our community as

it regards substance use and mental health.

Find A Way Out in a few easy steps:

- 1. Locate any police department in Lake County
- Walk in through the main doors of the participating police department nearest you
- 3. Tell the clerk at the reception window that you want to participate in "A Way Out". If you are seeking help after open lobby hours, locate the call box on the wall and tell dispatch you want to participate in "A Way Out." Around Town in the League

Mary Mathews recently spoke on behalf of the LWV Lake County to the Illinois Pollution Control Board, Springfield, IL, during public comment on proposed new 35 ILL. ADM. Code 845 on the disposal of coal combustion residuals.

Here are excerpts of her testimony.

"Four and ½ years ago, I testified on behalf of the League of Women Voters of Lake County, I'm back today to follow up and advocate again for strong regulations regarding coal ash. It is polluting our air, water, and harming our health. Coal ash contains toxic metals including arsenic, boron, chromium, lithium, and sulfate, and more. The toxics in coal ash can cause cancer, heart disease, lung and kidney disease, and birth defects. Illinois is one of the worst states for pollution from coal ash.

"Because of the federal government's withdrawal from environmental protection, strict measures are called for at the state level. Robust and enforceable rules for the Coal Ash Pollution Prevention Act must require the safe disposal or storage of coal ash, actively involve the public, and promote a healthful environment."

"In Waukegan, Lake County, Illinois sited next to Lake Michigan is NRG's subsidiary Midwest Generation coal burning power plant. For decades coal ash has been stored in impoundments (ponds) or historical coal ash storage areas. The toxic coal ash is contaminating the groundwater and the drinking water locally and for millions of residents in Illinois and surrounding states. We need to stop future contamination and clean up the pollution already in our water caused by these active and inactive coal ash dumps."

"In order to protect the groundwater's chemical integrity, rules for cleanup and closure of coal ash sites must provide permanent protection from coal ash pollution. When coal ash gets wet, heavy metals drain into the groundwater. Even ponds with high-quality liners have leaked due to cracks or tears. Rain on coal fill leach metals into the groundwater. Cleanup cannot be considered complete as long as the coal ash can get wet. This applies to not only the impoundments but also to coal ash landfills, dumps, and scattered fill."

As Waukegan is considered an environmental justice community, it should receive priority in closure of impoundments. To facilitate the decision-making process, the League believes that public understanding and participation are essential. The public has the right to know about pollution levels, dangers to health and environment, and proposed policies and options. Accordingly, the rules should include expanded outreach and require that opportunities, materials, and documents be made available to non-English speaking stakeholders. Additionally, hearings should be held in easily accessible locations, at convenient times, and, when possible, in the area concerned."

"The League supports inspections and monitoring and is pleased with the proposed rules regarding the frequency of monitoring and its continuation until groundwater meets the protection standards."

19th Amendment Centennial Cookbook!

The American Bar Association released a free digital cookbook containing 100 recipes to mark the centennial of the 19th Amendment. Recipes were contributed by legal figures who include Judge Diane P. Wood of the 7th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals (meatloaf); retired 7th Circuit judge Ann Claire Williams (African cornbread); professor Kim Yuracko of Northwestern Pritzker School of Law (easy chocolate chip muffins); professor Eric Posner of the University of Chicago Law School (chicken miso soup with spring vegetables); and Jack Rives, ABA executive director (green marshmallow salad).

Please step up if you can and encourage your friends and family members to join you. This year, school will be closed on November 3, making it easier for students at least 16 years old to work. And the pay is a nice incentive.

Make Your Voice Heard!

Start by Registering to Vote

The start to making your voice heard is by participating in our democratic process through voting. But if you are not registered, you cannot vote. Are you registered? Do you need to reregister due to an address or name change?

The qualifications to vote in this upcoming Illinois election are - you must:

- be a United States citizen,
- be at least 18 years old by November 3, 2020,

- live in your election precinct at least 30 days prior to the election.

not be convicted and in a penal institution, and

- not claim the right to vote anywhere else.

If you meet those qualifications, registering online at the Illinois State Board of Elections website is quick and easy https://OVA_ELECTIONS.IL.GOV The instructions will ask you for a valid Illinois Driver's License or an Illinois State I dentification number, and the date it was issued. Other requirements include the last four digits of your social security

For this election, online voter registration is available until Oct. 18th.

Voter registration is nonpartisan. A voter does not register for a political party.

If you received a ballot by mail and do not want to return it through the U.S. Postal Service, take advantage of the many postage-free drop boxes around the County. Election judges will collect ballots daily and bring them to the Lake County Clerk's office for processing. On November 3, all drop boxes will be locked at 7 PM. Click here for the complete list

Branch Court Drop Boxes

You will have 24/7 access to OUTSIDE drop boxes located at the exterior main entrances of four Lake County Branch Court buildings. These locations are well-lit, have 24-hour recorded video surveillance, and offer nearby parking.

Early Voting Drop Boxes

All seventeen Early Voting sites will have drop boxes INSIDE the voting sites while open. You will need to park your car and walk into the building.

Election Day Drop Boxes

Only two voting sites will offer INSIDE drop boxes on Election Day while the polls are open.

Additional Options for Returning Your Vote by Mail Ballot

By Mail

Your ballot must be postmarked no later than November 3, 2020 and received in the Lake County Clerk's Office by November 17, 2020 at 5 PM.

Hand Deliver to Lake County Clerk's Office Not Placed in a Drop Box

If you are returning someone else's ballot to the Lake County Clerk's office, the voter must complete the back side of the certification envelope giving you authorization. Before we can accept the voter's ballot, you must present valid identification with the same name as the voter indicated.

Environmentally Safe Pool Drainage

Swimming pool maintenance involves chemicals that may be harmful to the environment, so it's important to consider the use of proper procedures when draining pools. Before you drain your swimming pool or hot tub, remember these easy instructions from the City of Lake Forest:

1) First, ensure that the water is de-chlorinated by allowing the pool to be fully exposed to the sun for 2-3 days without adding chlorine.

2) Once de-chlorinated, allow the water to slowly discharge across your own lawn and not into a storm drain, ravine, or neighbor's property, over a period of 2-3 days.

Conservationists of the United States

We continue our monthly series on those who have made a significant contribution to conservation in the U.S. by featuring Aldo Leopold, who was an author, philosopher, scientist, ecologist, forester, conservationist, and environmentalist. His philosophy of nature and wildlife preservation was a belief that while people should enjoy wilderness areas, the "wildness" of these areas should be preserved. He believed in the importance of biodiversity and the ecological importance of the interactions among organisms and their environment. He is considered to be one of the founders of the science of wildlife management.

While working for the Forest Service, Leopold had been assigned to hunt and kill bears, wolves, and

mountain lions in New Mexico. The local ranchers wanted these predators eliminated because of livestock losses. Leopold, however, came to respect the animals. Humans have always felt the need to be dominant over their environment. The approach has been to just completely eradicate that which you don't want. His realization of the importance of predators in the balance of nature has resulted in the return of bears and mountain lions to New Mexico wilderness areas. In 1935, he helped found the Wilderness Society, which is dedicated to expanding and protecting the nation's wilderness

Leopold's A Sand County Almanac was published in 1949. The book is a collection of essays regarding Leopold's idea of a land ethic, the responsible relationship between people and the land they inhabit. One of the well-known quotes from the book is "A thing is right when it tends to preserve the integrity, stability, and beauty of the biotic community. It is wrong when it tends otherwise."

Fun Fact of the Week

In the late 1800s, at the height of the Industrial Revolution in the United States, the average American worked 12-hour days and seven-day weeks in order to eke out a basic living. Despite restrictions in some states, children as young as 5 or 6 toiled in mills, factories and mines across the country, earning a fraction of their adult counterparts' wages. Workers often faced extremely unsafe working conditions, with insufficient access to fresh air, sanitary facilities and breaks.

As manufacturing increasingly supplanted agriculture as the wellspring of American employment, labor unions, which had first appeared in the late 18th century, grew more prominent and vocal. They began organizing strikes and rallies to protest poor conditions and compel employers to renegotiate hours and pay.

Many of these events turned violent during this period, including the infamous Haymarket Riot of 1886, in which several Chicago policemen and workers were killed. On May 11, 1894, employees of the Pullman Palace Car Company in Chicago went on strike to protest wage cuts and the firing of union representatives. On June 26, the American Railroad Union, led by Eugene Debs, called for a boycott of all Pullman railway cars, crippling railroad traffic nationwide. To break the Pullman strike, the federal government dispatched troops to Chicago, unleashing a wave of riots that resulted in the deaths of more than a dozen workers.

In the wake of this massive unrest and in an attempt to repair ties with American workers, Congress passed an act making Labor Day a legal holiday in the District of Columbia and the territories. On June 28, 1894, President Grover Cleveland signed it into law.

September is National Suicide Prevention and Awareness Month

Per the National Alliance on Mental Illness, suicidal thoughts, much like mental health conditions, can affect anyone regardless of age, gender or background. In fact, suicide is often the result of an untreated mental health condition. Suicidal thoughts, although common, should not be considered normal and often indicate more serious issues.

Here are a few warning signs of suicide:

- Increased alcohol and drug use
- Aggressive behavior
- Withdrawal from friends, family and community
- Dramatic mood swings
- Impulsive or reckless behavior

Suicidal behaviors are a psychiatric emergency. If you or a loved one starts to take any of these steps, seek immediate help from a health care provider or call 911:

- · Collecting and saving pills or buying a weapon
- · Giving away possessions
- Tying up loose ends, like organizing personal papers or paying off debts
- · Saying goodbye to friends and family

From the City of Lake Forest: Crisis Intervention

Over the past few decades, the disproportionate involvement of persons with serious mental illnesses in the criminal justice system has captured the attention of advocates, policy makers, practitioners, and news media. While mental health budgets are being siashed, resources are being devoted to approaches intended to stem the flow of persons with serious mental illnesses in the criminal justice system.

With the assistance of the Licensed Clinical Professional Counselor Linda Porter, Lake Forest Police have built a Crisis Intervention Team program for Lake Forest. The program was started to recognize and identify those consumers within the City who could benefit from the service. Working with the families, these CIT officers are often able to provide services instead of arrest. Officers who may come into contact with these individuals on a daily basis are made aware of any special circumstances or contact information that is available through the dispatch center. The individuals can be identified by name or address. This allows officers to have the information prior to arriving on scene and allows them the ability to contact a CIT officer, if needed. Individuals, parents, guardians and caregivers can complete a Special Needs Awareness Profile which provides public safety personnel with important information about a special needs person when responding to a specific address.



Fun Fact of the Week

Filling a Vacancy on the US Supreme Court

Article II section 2 of the US Constitution states that the President "shall nominate, and by and with the Advice and Consent of the Senate, shall appoint ... Judges of the Supreme Court..." U.S. Const. art. 2 § 2 cl 2

- 1. The President usually will consult with Senators before announcing a nomination.
- 2. When the President nominates a candidate, the nomination is sent to the Senate Judiciary Committee for consideration
- 3. The Senate Judiciary Committee holds a hearing on the nominee. The Committee usually takes a month to collect and receive all necessary records from the FBI and other sources, about the nominee and for the nominee to be prepared for the hearings.
- 4. During the hearings, witnesses, both supporting and opposing the nomination, present their views. Senators question the nominee on his or her qualifications, judgment, and philosophy.
- 5. The Judiciary Committee then votes on the nomination and sends its recommendation (that it be confirmed, that it be rejected, or with no recommendation) to the full Senate.
- The full Senate debates the nomination.
- 7. The Senate rules used to allow unlimited debate (a practice known as filibustering) and to end the debate, it required the votes of 3/5 of the Senate or 60 senators (known as the cloture vote). In April 2017, the Senate changed this rule and lowered the required votes to 51 to end debate on Supreme Court nominations (this is commonly known as "the nuclear option").
- 8. When the debate ends, the Senate votes on the

nomination. A simple majority of the Senators present and voting is required for the judicial nominee to be confirmed. If there is a tie, the Vice President who also presides over the Senate casts the deciding vote.

The LWV and Presidential Debates

After last week's chaotic Presidential debate, many pundits stated that they longed for the days when the LWV moderated them. Here is a bit of history where that issue is concerned from the national website.

There was a 16 year period in which there were no public presidential debates, but then in 1976 the League of Women Voters Education Fund (LWVEF) sponsored three presidential debates. These debates between Jimmy Carter (D), former governor of Georgia and Gerald Ford (R), President of the United States, were the first to be held since 1960. In 1976 the League also sponsored one vice presidential debate between Senator Walter Mondale (D-MN) and Senator Bob Dole (R-KS).

The League continued to sponsor the presidential and vice presidential debates every four years through the 1984 elections. Following that election cycle, the Democratic and Republican national parties came together in a decision to move sponsorship of the debates under the purview of the parties

Between 1985 and 1987 the League challenged this move and sparked widespread public debate on the matter. The LWVEF argued that a change in sponsorship that put control of the debate format in the hands of the two dominant parties would deprive voters of one of the only chances they have to see the candidates outside of their controlled campaign environment.

In 1987 the parties announced the creation of the Commission on Presidential Debates. The Commission chose LWVEF to sponsor the last presidential debate of 1988, but placed so many rules and restrictions on the possible format of the debate that the LWVEF was finally unable to agree to participate. In a press release at the time, Nancy Neuman, then LWVUS President, stated that the League had "no intention of becoming an accessory to the hoodwinking of the American public."

The nonprofit Commission on Presidential Debates sponsored all the presidential debates since 1988 (1988, 1992, 1996, 2000, 2004, 2008 and 2012).

However, the League continues to directly ask the candidates questions through our online election source www.voffe411.org, VOTE411.org provides information on how to watch debates with a critical eye, information on candidates, contact information for your election elections officials and much more. VOTE411.org not only provides information on the presidential candidates, but also on all candidates running for U.S. Senate, U.S. House, gubernatorial offices, and state legislative offices in specific communities across the country.

State and local Leagues across the country continue to host debates for candidates running at all other levels of government, from U.S. House of Representatives and Senate to statewide offices, to city government and everything in between. The grassroots nature of the League enables us to engage communities in the process by hosting debates and other election activities."

Mail-In Mayhem?

Ballot FAQs

Summarized by LWV-LF/LB Member Carol Russ

Is it better to vote by mail or to vote in person? Both voting methods allow your vote to be counted. Your choices are to vote on election day (this must be in person), early voting (which is also in person), and vote by mail ("absentee", "snowbird" "student" and "military" voting all have mail in options).

Is mail in voting reliable? Forty-six states now use mail in voting. American troops abroad have relied on it since the Civil War. Five states successfully conduct all-mail elections. This year our election authorities had a huge increase in the mail in vote

requests due to COVID. In some cases, election procedures changed rapidly to accommodate this surge, and local election administrators were overwhelmed by the extra hours needed to process and count mail-in votes in the primaries. The resultant legal challenges and court rulings are still being appealed.

How do I get a mail in ballot? You can request your ballot online at LakeVoter Power.info or in person at the County Clerk's Office, 18 N. County St. in Waukegan. Or you can call the Clerk's Office at 847-377-2406. The deadline to request a mail-in ballot is October 29th. If you apply for a vote by mail ballot after Oct. 1, the Clerk's Office must mail it out within two business days of receiving the application

How can I make sure my application to request a mailin ballot was received? For Lake County voters, go to <u>LakeVoterPower.info</u>, and after filling in your personal information, click the button, "Track My Mail Ballot"

How do I return my mail-in ballot, and what's the deadline? When you receive your ballot, there are complete instructions and the options for returning it.

A ballot placed in the U.S. mail and postmarked by Election Day will be valid as long as it is received within 14 days after Election Day, Nov. 3. The Lake County's ballot takes a regular first-class stamp. Returning the completed ballot as soon as possible is advisable.

Another option is to return your mail-in ballot by

placing it in any of the official ballot drop boxes. The instructions include a sheet with the dates and hours drop boxes are available. This information also can be found online at https://www.lakerountvil.gov/DocumentCenter/View/36233/Drop-Box-Locations-all

If you choose, you can hand-deliver your mail in ballot to the Lake County Clerk's office, 18 N. County St., Waukegan, see the dates and times online or in the instructions.

What if I don't understand how to fill out and return my VBM ballot? Your VBM ballot will come to you with clear instructions, including illustrations.

Why is there so much concern nationally that the mail-in ballots won't be counted this time? The most common reason that mail-in votes are not counted is that they weren't returned in time, or weren't requested in time. Mail yours in PDQ. The Lake County government website recommends that you send back your ballot a whopping two weeks before election day. Another difficulty evidenced by the spring primaries was that many jurisdictions couldn't upscale their mail-in services for the covidinduced demand.

What happens if I decide to vote in person instead of using my mail in ballot? Don't lose that ballot! It's best if you take your mail-in ballot and its certification envelope with you to vote in person. An election judge will give you a regular ballot. Without your previously-issued mail in ballot, you will be asked to sign an affidavit to vote. Your inperson vote will be classified as provisional, which will be held until all mail in ballots are processed.

Provisional ballots will not be counted until after all the mail in ballots have been counted. As ballots are tracked, this process ensures that no one can vote twice

If you applied for a ballot but didn't receive it, you can vote in person if you fill out an affidavit attesting you didn't receive a mail in ballot and wish to vote in person. If you have any questions, you can contact the Voting by Mail Department at 847-377-VOTE or yotingbymail@lakecountvil.gov.

Why is there talk that the election won't be decided on election day? Not all votes are cast on election day. In 21 states the mail-in ballots are accepted long after the election, up to 17 days after November 3rd. In 16 states the mail-in ballot count doesn't start until after the election day polling places close. Nationally, the number of mail-in votes to be counted this fall could be a third of the total votes cast.

Columbus Day

On October 12, 1492, after a 33-day voyage, Christopher Columbus made his first landfall in the New World in the Bahamas. He named the first land sighted as El Salvador, claiming it in the name of the Spanish Crown. Columbus was seeking a western sea route from Europe to Asia and believed he had found an island of the Indies. He thus called the first island natives he met. 'Indians.'

The anniversary of this date has been celebrated in the US since the late 18th century, especially by Italians, who consider the day important to their heritage. Columbus Day became an official federal holiday in 1968.

Many reject celebrating him, saying that he represents "the violent history of the colonization in the Western Hemisphere", and that Columbus Day is a sanitation or covering-up of Christopher Columbus' actions such as enslaving Native Americans.

Now many celebrate Indigenous Peoples Day

instead. This movement began in 1989 in South Dakota and has gained popularity over the years as more people learn the detailed history of European colonization of the New World.

Elections Have Consequences -Show Up!

As we recognize the 19th amendment which allowed women their right to vote, remember "elections have consequences". Do not be blase this year after women had fought for so long and hard for their right. Elections are decided by those who show up, and your input is vital.

Educational resources about this election are available. If you need more information about the Candidates and other voting information, go to the League's voter guide, Illinois Voter Guide, o.gr., Also, Lake Forest Library has on their website a voter guide with a wider range of topics, but no candidate information. The Lake Bluff Public Library produced two short videos, one explains how to register to vote and one how to vote by mail. The Illinois State Bar Association provides judicial evaluations for the retention of judges.

Beginning on Monday, October 19, you will be able to vote early locally in person. Lake Forest City Hall is an early voting site and will be open from October 19 through Sunday, November 1. The hours are M-F, 8:30 AM - 7 PM, and Saturday and Sunday, 9 AM - 5 PM Or if you choose, you may put your mail-in ballot in a drop box located inside City Hall during early voting hours or at other early voting sites.

If you prefer, you may wait until Election Day, November 3, to vote in person at your assigned polling site from 6:00 AM to 7:00 PM. Your polling location can be found on your Voter's Certificate of Registration Card.

Election Night Cocktail Recipes

Here are some drink recipes that you can mix up to celebrate Election Day and the 100th Year of the Women's Right to Vote! (Coincidentally, 2020 is also the 100th anniversary of Prohibition...) They are included today so you have time to shop for ingredients, and will be included again next week so you can have the recipes handy for election night (or day--it's always five o'clock somewhere!)



Blue State Citrus Martini

Moisten the rim of chilled martini glass with lime wedge. Sprinkle coarse sugar onto small plate, and dip moistened rim into the sugar to coat lightly.

Fill cocktail shaker with ice. Add 1/4 cup cranberry juice, 1 shot of vodka, 1 shot of blue curacao liqueur, and 1 tablespoon lime juice. Shake and strain into a chilled martini glass.



Red State Raspberry Martini

Fill a cocktail shaker with ice. Add 1 shot of raspberry or plain vodka, 1/2 shot of Chambord raspberry liqueur, 1/2 shot of triple sec, and 1/4 cup of cranberry juice. Shake and strain into a chilled martini glass. Add raspberry garnish.



Suffragette Sling

This spin on the classic Singapore Sling will add a kick to your celebration of the 19th Amendment!

In a cocktail shaker, mix the following ingredients except the club soda, and pour into a tall glass over ice. Top with the club soda and garnish with a pineapple slice and cherry.

- · 1 shot of gin
- 1/2 ounce Grand Marnier
- 1/2 ounce cherry liqueur

- 1/2 Chambord raspberry liqueur
- 1 ounce pineapple juice
- 1/2 ounce fresh lime juice
- 1 dash bitters
- club soda, to top



HER-icane

This adaptation of the classic Hurricane claims equal rights for being boozy, so do not drive or operate heavy machinery after consumption.

Mix the following in a cocktail shaker, then pour over ice into a hurricane glass. Garnish with orange slice and cherry.

- · 2 ounces light rum
- 2 ounces dark rum
- · 1 ounce fresh lime juice
- 1 ounce fresh orange juice
- 1/2 ounce passion fruit puree
- 1/2 ounce simple syrup
- 1 tablespoon grenadine



Nonalcoholic Red White and Blue Spritzer

Fill your glass with ice and insert straw if desired. Slowly pour cranberry juice into the glass over the ice until the glass is 1/3 full. Repeat the process with Sprite or 7up for the middle layer, and blue Gatorade for the top blue layer.



Star Spangled Spritzer

Lightly mix 1 part Pinnacle® Citrus Vodka and 2 parts lemon soda in a cocktail shaker with ice and set aside.

In a tall glass, add 1 part grenadine slowly to the bottom. Fill the glass with crushed ice and strain the

vodka soda mixture over the back of a bar spoon, followed by 1 part DeKuyper® Blue Curacao Liqueur.

Garnish with fresh mint and berries



Star Spangled Berry

You Can Have Confidence in Our Voting System!

Amid efforts to cast aspersions on the democratic process in the US by some candidates who lost their election, it is worth reminding everyone that the procedures this year are no different than they have been in the past. The difference was in the greater number of mail-in ballots due to the

COVID-19 pandemic, which of course has prolonged the counting process.

According to Ballotpedia, the online encyclopedia of US politics, "election results are finalized through processes called canvassing and certification. Canvassing generally refers to how state and local officials confirm the validity of ballots cast in an election. Certification is the process authorities use to formalize the election results based on the canvass. However, some states, localities, and commentators use the terms interchangeably to describe the entire process of counting ballots and formalizing results." November 11 is celebrated in the U.S. as Veterans

Day with parades and military memorial ceremonies. It was first called Armistice Day. On November 11, 1918 at 5:00 AM, in Marshal Foch's railway car in the Forest of Compiegne, the Armistice between the Allied and Central Powers was signed, silencing the guns of World War I effective at 11:00 AM – the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month. In many places in Europe, a moment of silence in memory of the millions of fallen soldiers is still observed.

Twenty years later, on November 11, 1938, Irving Berlin's God Bless America was first performed. He had written the song especially for radio entertainer Kate Smith, who sang it during her regular radio broadcast. It soon became a patriotic favorite of Americans and was one of Smith's most requested songs.

League Poll Watching on Election Day

While accounts swirled around the country about voter suppression, some local voters were concerned about potential intimidation tactics here. In spite of COVID-19, LWV-LF/LB members sought to relieve voters' concerns. League poll watchers were stationed at all voting sites in Lake Forest, Lake Bluff, and Knollwood on Election Day.

The Voter Services committee is pleased to report that the voting process went smoothly on Nov. 3rd. As usual for our area, just a few glitches or small errors were noted. Our volunteers were pleased that there were a good number of new voters who took advantage of same day registration just prior to voting on site. They noted there was no shortage of friendly election judges. At a few sites, a couple of poll watchers from other organizations sat. The health safety precautions were evident. Additionally, if any situations arose, the local police were readily available, as was a lawyer from the State's Attorney office, LWV Illinois had provided a hot line phone number to call for questions needing clarification. There was only one story of perceived electioneering. A small group of people wearing partisan ciothing started to enter to vote. The rules were explained and they left, no argument, A number of voters were confused about how to vote in person after receiving a vote by mail ballot. Some went home to retrieve the ballot, and some voted provisionally. Many experienced election judges explained the relatively low turnout on Election Day to the massive number of people who voted early.

Thanks goes to Happie Datt, Lynette Foss, Ann Grant, Mary Mathews, Nancy Novit, Laurie Rose, and Marilyn Turchi for their time and efforts.

Finally, we await the Lake County Clerk's final tabulations due on November 17.

The League of Women Voters position is that climate change is a serious threat facing our nation and our planet. The League believes that an interrelated approach to combating climate change—including through energy conservation, air pollution controls, building resilience, and promotion of renewable resources—is necessary to protect public health and defend the overall integrity of the global ecosystem.

The Village of Lake Bluff and the City of Lake Forest have partnered with the Metropolitan Mayors Caucus to offer Community Solar Subscriptions for residents on a first-come firstserve basis. Consumers will receive net metering credits on their monthly ComEd bills for their share of the electricity generated by a Community Solar Farm.

There is no cost or obligation to sign up on the CS² Program waiting list. The CS² Program Administrator – MC Squared Energy Services – will review your account for the following:

- Ensure that your account qualifies under ComEd's rules; and,
- Identify the Subscription size that is right for your account.

MC Squared Energy Services will inform you by email once your account has been confirmed, and again when a community solar farm that is participating in the CS² Program is ready to commence operations. At that time, you may choose to complete the enrollment process and paperwork and start receiving your net metering credits. There is no enrollment fee. There is no termination fee. Once you are enrolled in the program, the subscription lasts for 2 years.

Homeowners and ComEd customers have other solar options. The Citizens Utility Board has information on evaluating solar programs.

In 1614, he was kidnapped by English explorer Thomas Hunt, who brought him to Spain where he was sold into slavery. Squanto escaped, eventually returning to North America in 1619. He then returned to the Patuxet region, where he became an interpreter and guide for the Pilgrim settlers at Plymouth in the 1620s. He died circa November 1622 in Chatham, Massachusetts.



An Update on Ethylene Oxide (EtO) Issues in Lake County

On November 4, the Legislative Committee of the Lake County Board presented its draft of its Legislative agenda for 2021. The purpose of the Agenda is to formalize the County's positions on legislation both anticipated and sought to be considered and serves as a guide when considering legislation that would impact Lake County. The draft includes a change whereby it will shift its position from "monitor" EtO regulation-related legislation to "support" and deem the issue of EtO an "initiative of interest", giving a wider range of advocacy possibilities. Board members summarized an overall desire of stronger environmental

regulation. The Legislative committee intends to reconvene in January 2021.


