NATIONAL L.W.V. CONVENTION

The national convention of the L. W. V. will be held in St. Louis, April 25-29. Mrs. Robert Spiel and Mrs. Anthony D. Eastman have been appointed as the local delegates. The national current agenda for 1960-62 will be decided at the convention.

The national League board reported through the February "Voter" the consensus of suggestions made by the local Leagues throughout the country for this agenda. At this time Leagues may participate in a "second round" of suggestions before the convention in St. Louis.

The Lake Forest "Water Resource" committee, Mrs. Richard Bentley, chairman, reiterates the hope that "water" will again be one of the two national items and not simply returned to Continuing Responsibilities. (See Feb. "Voter"). Local Leagues have done an excellent job but their attention has been directed almost wholly to the problems of coordination of administration. Such problems as crosion, land use (which will be more and more in the public eye), wilderness areas and forest preserves have not been sufficiently studied. It is perfectly possible that with the increasing use of nuclear energy for domestic purposes it may not be necessary to make great investments in huge dams, which could become obsolete all too quickly. Mrs. Bentley reports that her committee believes that more basic scientific research is needed since not enough is known about stream or river management and that with this greater background of knowledge, government agencies will be in a better position to coordinate their work.

The proposed Foreign Policy National Agenda item (see Feb. "Voter" again) has great scope, though its emphasis is economic. New and pressing problems such as "balance of perments deficit, synchronizing of regional trade blocs with expanding world trade, can be studied and new directions for League legislative action already envisaged.

Mrs. Granger Brown, chairman of the Lake Forest League's Foreign Policy Committee, reports her committee's belief that important as economic policy is, it must be recognized as only a part of our overall national foreign policy. The local League's board would hope that a statement to that effect might be made at the national L. W. V. convention in April.

The National Program - - 1960-62

Delegates to the national convention of the L.W.V. in St. Louis, Missouri, in April, voted to concentrate on a single agenda item: that of Foreign Economic Policy. This had been clearly indicated as the League's number-one choice in the recommendations of the local leagues.

"Support of U. S. economic policies which promote world development and maintain a sound U. S. economy."

A new CR was added when "Water" which had been on the active agenda, was placed on the list of Continuing Responsibilities. The special interests of different geographic areas, the desire of the Leagues to act, as well as the overall concern of the League for coordination, long-range planning and proper cost sharing is indicated in the wording of this CR. (see National Voter).

The other six CRs concern the United Nations, the loyalty-security program, self-government for the District of Columbia, the President's veto authority on appropriation bills, tax rate limitations, and the maintaining of the constitutional power of the Executive in regard to treaties. (see National Voter for further explanation.)

Lake Forest League Receives Award

The L. W. V. of Lake Forest has been selected by a distinguished panel of judges to receive a "World Understanding" award for studies and activities in the field of international affairs. This is an award made annually by the Chicago Council on Foreign Affairs. The award was presented to Miss Julia Mae Hamilton, as President of this League, at a luncheon at the Congress Hotel, Chicago, Thursday, May 26th. Chairmen of the Foreign Policy study in Lake Forest during the period covered by this award have been, Mrs. Granger Brown, Mrs. Strabo Claggett, Mrs. Frederick Dilg and Mrs. William Frost.

SERVICE TO MEMBERS

Membership Social Activities

During an election year the responsibility of VOTERS SERVICE is especially demanding and challenging. In May 1959, together with the Lake Bluff League, a tea was held for the senior women of Barat and Lake Forest Colleges, in order to acquaint them with the procedures of registration and voting, as well as to

encourage them to participate in the LWV.

On December 16 at a coffee at the home of a League member, League chairmen had the honor of interviewing Representative Marguerite Stitt Church. Sixty representatives from Leagues in the 13th Congressional District heard Mrs. Church interviewed by Mrs. Granger Brown on Foreign Policy, Mrs. Richard Bentley on Water Resources, and Mrs. Frank Hixon on Continuing Responsibilities.

In March, 1960 postcards of registration information were sent to newcomers in Lake Forest. Articles on registration, absentee ballots appeared in newspapers as well as the "Candidates" issue of the Lake Forester. By furnishing non-partisan information on about fifty-seven candidates of the primary election, the League was fulfilling one of its responsibilities to voters.

Since April, 1959, the League has welcomed 25 new members, bringing the membership to a total of 250, the largest to date. It is hoped that their participation in the League program will broaden and strengthen the Lake Forest League.

Regular monthly meetings of the League were preceded by Bring-A-Sandwich Luncheons for new members, held at the homes of members.

The 1959-60 Membership activities culminated in an orientation luncheon on October 28th at the home of Membership Chairman, Mrs. George Reilly, who was assisted by her committee: Mmes. Martin Burns, Edward Chainski, Henry Dettenmeyer, Herbert McLaughlin (Co-Chairman), Roger Mellen, Martin Pesek. A Panel headed by Mmes. Granger Brown, Frank Hixon and John Nagel outlined the League's organization, its purposes and general program. Mrs. Walter Fischer, former Illinois State President, spoke of the past achievements of the League and stressed the need for a constitutional revision and the fight ahead to secure it.

The teas and scheduled luncheon meetings were arranged by Mrs. Uri B. Grannis and her Co-Chairman, Mrs. Fred Dilg, assisted by a committee of League hostesses.

NATIONAL AGENDA ITEMS

 Evaluation of the U. S. Foreign Policy with Continued Support of the United Nations System, World Trade and Economic Development, and Collective Security.

The year 1959-60 was one of many activities, starting with a general membership meeting in April, 1959 and three workshops on U. S. foreign policy. In October, there were three workshops devoted more specifically to foreign economic policy and the general meeting in October was a panel presentation of existing Common Market and Free Trade problems and some foreign economic aid program problems. The workshops (40 to 50 members in attendance at each) carried on from there with one devoted particularly to Africa. The final workshop, on October 27th, succeeded in reaching agreement on four questions posed by the National Board Report of September, 1959 which is the workshop consensus and rather fairly represents membership opinion. The consensus reached by the LWV of Lake Forest and reported to the Board March, 1960 was for "The support of U. S. economic policies which promote world economic development and maintain the strength of the American economy in order to promote political development toward free worldwide cooperation". At the National League Convention, this last part was deleted and we have the following: "Support of U. S. economic policies which promote world development and maintain a sound U. S. economy".

At the time of the Lake Forest League Foreign Policy study, the Lake Forest Library displayed reading material, both League and non-League, as well as two show cases with maps, UN flags and duplicate books and pamphlets, as supplementary aids for this study. Later in the year, an important League publication, "World Economic Development" was used extensively.

The activities culminated in a Panel Discussion on U. S. Foreign Policy, open to the public, held in the home of Miss Lilace Barnes on March 27, 1960. Three members of the Lake Forest League, Mmes, George S. Read, Frederick H. Dilg and Granger Brown, participated in this discussion, which was moderated by Carter Davidson, Executive Director of the Chicago Council on Foreign Relations. The other speakers were three distinguished Lake Forest residents: Mr. William R. Odell, Vice President of International Harvester Co.; Mr. Charles A. Meyer, Vice President of Sears, Roebuck & Co. in charge of Latin American affairs, recently returned from accompanying President Eisenhower on his trip to South America; and Mr. Lawrence A. Carton, an attorney. The items discussed were: the need for economic assistance to under-developed countries whether this should become a permanent national policy, whether the U.S. can afford these programs, the problem of balance of pay ments and how foreign aid affects them. Another question discussed was whether the U. S. can continue its present wage and full employment policies without losing its competitive trade position in the world. Discussions and opinions both from the panel and the floor contributed to a most stimulating program.

As a result of the extensive and effective study and activities of the Foreign Policy Committee, the Lake Forest League was selected by a distinguished panel of judges to receive from the Chicago Council on Foreign Relations a "World Understanding" award for studies and activities in the field of international affairs. The award was presented to Miss Julia Hamilton as President of this League at a luncheon at the Congress Hotel, Chicago.

NATIONAL AGENDA ITEMS

II. Water Resources: Support of those national water policies and practices which promote coordinated administration, equitable financing and regional or river basin planning.

Three workshops in November were preceded by a talk before the general membership by Mr. C. J. McLain, Technical Adviser to the Northeastern Illinois Metropolitan Area Planning Commission. He emphasized the extent to which our Lake Gounty problems merge with those of metropolitan Chicago.

During the workshops old problems of water conservation were studied and a review made of three bills concerning aspects of water conservation which were the most likely to come up during the winter months in Congress. These were: The Water Pollution Control Act, 3610, known as the Blatnik Bill, its purpose being to amend public law 660, (later defeated): The Resources and Conservation Act of 1960, 5-2549, to declare a national policy on conservation development and utilization of national resources (still in committee ass of August 18, 1960).

The Committee recommended that Lake Forest send to the National Board for the first round of program making its suggestion that Water Resources be continued as one of the two national items for the next two years. This recommendation was approved by the membership and accordingly, the suggestion was sent in. Later we learned that one hundred and twenty-six other Leagues across the country had voted that the item should be continued on the National Current Agenda. However, at the national convention in St. Louis in April 1960, "Water" supporters were unable to muster sufficient votes to insure it a place on the National Current Agenda. Instead, the convention decided to add Water Resources to its list of Continuing Responsibilities.

Since the convention, the National Board, in its report of May 1960, has stated: "Because League convention delegates expressed clearly their wish for an active Water CR, boards should give special consideration to early planning for continued and effective work on the Water CR, capitalizing on the real assets the League has built up over the past four years, as the value of League water studies has been publicly recognized."

Finance Drive 1959-60

The Lake Forest League is over the top again. During its annual fall finance drive it raised \$2,138.00, from 185 contributors, of whom 106 were League members.

STATE AGENDA

 Study and support of measures to provide an equitable and flexible tax structure for Illinois

The Revenue Committee had six productive planning sessions in January and February to prepare for our March general meeting and workshops.

Mr. Bernard Peskin, Representative Sixth District, spoke at the March 8th meeting. He emphasized the fact that classification of property and a state income tax are the most difficult hurdles for the state legislature.

At the first of the March workshops a tax chart was used in order to attempt to evaluate which taxes were most equitable using the criteria of ability to pay, laws of administration, etc.

It was generally agreed that a graduated income tax is the most equitable tax, meeting the requirements of justice (treating those in similar circumstances alike), administration, yield (second highest), and ability to pay, though it does not have as broad a base as some or meet the benefits-received requirement. There was still a definite feeling at this workshop that this was not the tax we would wish to see enacted in Illinois, since the Federal Government has so preempted this source.

Agreement was definite that the sales tax was not equitable since it meets only two requirements, the broad base of taxpayers and the yield (highest). Rather than eliminating it, two improvements were suggested: (1) To broaden the base of items taxed and (2) To remove the sales tax on food. The latter cannot be accomplished without a constitutional amendment.

It was thought that real property should be classified as to income-producing and non-incomeproducing, vacant and improved. In essence, assessments are made on this basis, but the change should be made in the constitution.

There was agreement that the personal property tax is neither equitable or efficient and should be removed.

The second workshop on March 21st was most successful. Comparing the Model Constitution, the constitutions of Alaska, New Jersey and the United States with that of Illinois, the Revenue workshop did nothing less than offer a proposed new revenue article.

"The General Assembly shall have the power to raise such taxes as may be needed and spend the revenue for public purposes. There shall be no earmarking of funds. Debts shall be incurred by referendum only except for repelling invasion or insurrection. The Governor shall propose and present a budget one month before the legislature convenes. An auditor shall be appointed by the legislature.

The third workshop, March 28th, was more realistic. Mrs. Ronald Christie joined us and suggested we work on detailed areas of conflict, specifically classification and income tax, in order to send recommendations to the state committee in the fall.

Plans for the coming year 1960-61? The state board requests that we prepare our membership to take action at the 1961 legislative session by (1) reaching consensus regarding the statutory measures which will be proposed in order to meet the current shortage of state funds; by (2) deciding on an amendment to the Illinois Revenue Article which can meet the long range needs of the state.

The help of all League members will be needed in October to find the answers to these important questions.

STATE AGENDA

II. Constitutional Convention Committee

The April 11th Annual Meeting was devoted to the study of the Constitutional Convention with a Panel Discussion, demonstrating what a constitution should be, and whether the constitution measures up to the standard. Mrs. Henry Connor, Chairman of State Constitutional Convention Committee, moderated the Panel. Mrs. Alfred Kamin, member of the State Committee, defined and outlined the structure of a constitution, illustrating her talk with a felt-board figure. Analyzing and discussing various articles of our own constitution were our committee members: Mmes, Robert G. Andrus, J. M. Feemster, Robert E. Spiel, Daniel Sinclair, B. Botsford Young, George Oliver and Graham Ely.

The first workshop, held April 18th, stressed the importance of functions of state covernment, and how it regulates our lives from birth to death, Mrs. Francis O. Spaulding showed its control over our personal lives and families; Mrs. Sinclair over our property; Mrs. Spiel outlined state government's responsibilities for health and general welfare. Miss Daria Brown demonstrated its regulation of businesses and professions: "doctor, lawyer, merchant", warehouseman; noting, at the same time, how many of these provisions are a part of our constitution. Mrs. Feemster explained the difference between statutory and constitutional law, outlining basic principles of the latter.

In the second workshop on May 16th, Mmes. Andrus, Feemster and Brown compared the legislative, executive and judicial provisions, respectively, of our constitution with those of Alaska, New Jersey and the model constitution of the National Municipal League. Purpose of this workshop was to demonstrate more modern thinking in the basic structure of governments of states with recognition for the need of various branches to be able to fulfill their functions within a broad and flexible framework.

On May 23rd, the study of the amending process and the provisions for change in the constitutions of Illinois, Alaska, New Jersey and Missouri were considered. Mrs. Spiel discussed the value and functions of legislative commissions for constitutional revision, briefly outlining where such procedures have been used in other states, sometimes successfully and sometimes unsuccessfully.

In view of the fact that such a proposal is very likely to be introduced in the 1961 session of the Legislature, the group is interested in studying further which forms and structures of commissions would be most suitable for Illinois. Would the League want to sponsor a bill for the establishment of such a commission? Another question of interest to the League would be provisions for calling a Constitutional Convention and for the selection of delegates as established by Article XIV, Section 1 of our present constitution. This, also, might be discussed in the next legislative session.

The Committee, therefore, has decided to cover these two questions at two workshops, on September 19th and 26th, preparatory to the general meeting of October 3rd.

STATE AGENDA

III. Improvement of election laws and procedures.

The month of February, 1960 was devoted to the study of the "Improvement of Illinois Election Laws and Procedures, with emphasis on the Primary, the Short Ballot and the Centralized Supervision of Elections".

Mr. George Mahin, Executive Secretary of the Better Government Association, was guest speaker at the February meeting. He spoke briefly on all phases of Election Laws, with special emphasis on Primaries, stressing the importance of voting in the primary elections. He urged the promotion of greater voter education among adults, as well as school children.

Four workshops followed the general meeting, with 25 in attendance each time. On February 15th, County Clerk Garfield Leaf spoke on the mechanics of running elections; on February 22nd, State Representative Paul Elward, from District 8, spoke on the Short Ballot, strongly recommended by him.

As a result of the year's study, the following consensus of the Lake Forest League was reached: SHORT BALLOT -Agreed that the ballot could be shortened by statute and constitutional amendment. and that it was possible that Trustees of U. of Ill. be appointed rather then elected. PRIMARIES - Agreed that the Primary is an effective system and recognized that there is great value to the Closed Primary. especially to the two parties. There was acknowledgement, however, of certain values to be derived from the Open Primary. possibly increased voter participation. A later date for the Primaries might also stimulate a larger vote. MANDATORY TRAINING OF JUDGES - Agreed on mandatory training of all new judges, and mandatory refresher courses for all others.

Next year's study will include a series of workshops in November. It is hoped the discussions will lead to specific recommendations for changes in Election Laws and Procedures, as requested by the State LWV.

STATE CONTINUING RESPONSIBILITIES

Continuing Responsibilities are positions on governmental issues which have been moved from Current Agenda after a League study has been made and upon which the Board may take action if the membership is informed and is in agreement that the League can take action effectively.

On April 25th, 1960, one workshop was held in order to discuss a Bond Issue which will combefore the voters in November and on which the state LWV Board asked the local Leagues for an opinion as to "whether or not the League has the authority to take a position on a Bond Issue in the amount of \$150,000,000, proceeds from which are to be used for making permanent improvements at mental, health and other public welfare institutions". Mrs. Marshall Schwimmer spoke at the Lake Forest workshop representing the State Board.

At the May general membership meeting, the members of the Lake Forest League voted that the State League did have the authority to take a position on this issue. However, at the May State board meeting, the Lake Forest League was over-ruled. It was voted that "the State Board finds that the League of Women Voters of Illinois has no authority to take a position on this issue and will confine its efforts to Voters. \(^\text{L}\) Service Work". The consensus of this meeting was that the vote (23 "yes", 23 "no", 14 "no vote", 12 absent) did not constitute strong League support.

LOCAL AGENDA

I. Study of the official city plan with special attention to conservation and beautification in business areas with possible appropriate action.

With the cooperation of a Citizens' Committee, the Garden Club and the Chamber of Commerce, much work has gone into supporting measures to promote conservation and beautification in business areas. A map of this section of town was made in order to show existing planting and desirable future planting. Soon after this was presented, landscape architects were engaged by the city to create a professional plan for city beautification. The Planning Commission, City Council and Board of Appeals were present at discussion of these plans,

A general League meeting in May 1959, to which the public was invited, featured a Panel Discussion entitled "Strip of Green - What's to become of Lake Forest?" Participating in the panel were: Mr. Frank Read, Chairman of Planning Commission, Mrs. Charles F. Clarke, representing the Garden Club, Mr. Hempstead Washburne, Jr., President Chamber of Commerce, Mr. Richard Hart, President Hart Shaw Co., Mr. Tharton Ware, Jr., Northeastern Illinois Metropolitan area planning commission, Mr. Fred LaBastille, Lake County Planning Commission, Mrs. Samuel Taylor, Citizens' Committee, Mr. James Welles H. Citizens'

Committee

At the June 1960 general meeting Mrs. Arthur Rooney, and her co-chairman Mrs. Taylor, presented Mr. Dean Swartzel, Northeast Metropolitan Housing and Planning Commission, who spoke on "Community Appearance - A neglected asset". He emphasized the importance of creating a design as a supplement to the over-all plan for the city, which would develop the aesthetic values of the community as a whole. Such a design, a new concept in city planning, would provide a positive approach to the problem of preserving and extending those characteristics which are the chief assets of the city of Lake Forest: Natural beauty and pleasant living. Mr. Swartzel suggested the formation of a committee of interested citizens to devise a municipal design-plan through which the community could show the kind of initiative which created Market Square.

The League will continue to work for a land-scape plan which can be supported by the mer-chants and accepted by the City Council. To be effective this plan must eventually be legally incorporated into the official City Plan.

II. Continued study of county government with emphasis on planning, and co-ordinated action where indicated with special attention to the forest preserve district and improved county health services.

The speaker at the January general membership meeting was the director of the new County Board of Health, Dr. Arthur Baker. He outlined the services offered, some of the present problems and future goals. During this month two workshops were held. The first of these was a tour of county offices and institutions in Waukegan, an hour's interview with the director of the County Planning Commission, and visits to the County Hospital, County Youth Home and the Lake County Tuberculosis Sanitarium. In this way League members became more familiar with the county offices and more aware of the problems facing the directors of the county institutions.

The speaker at the second workshop was the assistant director of the Lake County Forest Preserve District, Mr. Robert Kelly.

One of the important components of this county study has been the attendance of League members at the meetings of the County Board of Supervisors and at the meetings concerning the Forest Preserve. Reports of these meetings have been made at workshops and at certain board meetings by these League observers in order to keep the membership informed on the actual functioning of county government.

The editors of the bulletin have compiled for this annual "League Lines" the reports of the chairmen and officers of the Lake Forest League. (See League Lines, April and May 1959 for a complete list of board portfolios.) The analysis reported by these chairmen of the work accomplished this past year and of their future plans and hopes is of interest to all the membership as a record of achievement, as a guide to the future, and, in certain instances, a vision of League potential. This record should help each member to decide in which study or action groups she wishes to participate during the coming year.

Those members who wish to extend their understanding of the scope of League activities with find especially helpful those general meetings where there are open membership discussions regarding national and state program items. These discussions are the basis for recommendations made to these respective boards. This kind of individual member participation is essential if our League is going to arrive at a sense of agreement (consensus - in the League vernacular) on those issues relevant to our League program. These areas of League agreement and decisions are the background for an informed response to the "Time for Action" calls which come from the National and State offices and which can directly influence legislation. It is only as our membership is well-informed that we become an effective group as we take action at the local, state, and national levels toward desirable legislation.

The increase in the number of League publications sold and distributed to our membership is also indicative of a better informed League. These publications are available at board and general meetings as well as through subscription services. One of the goals for the coming year is to extend the use of these publications throughout the community.

The respect this community holds for the L. W. V. should be a source of pride to each which is responsible for this. An even deeper confidence and an extended rapport with an expanding Lake Forest can develop as our membership grows both in size and in activity. In this way our League contributes to the strength and effectiveness of the L. W. V. in the national community.



WORKING FOR A CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION FOR ILLINOIS

This fall the Con-Con study group focused its attention on some steps toward achieving our goal. If and when a constitutional convention is called, the delegates to that convention will be chosen; two from each senatorial district to be nominated and elected in the same manner as state senators. In 1954 the reapportionment amendment was passed which stated that the senatorial districts of the state should number 58. Of these 24 are allotted Cook County; 18 in Chicago and 6 from the rest of the county. 34 senators are elected from the rest of the state from contiguous areas. There are some who feel that since delegates must be chosen according to districts which are geographically determined, without regard to population shifts, this clause is a major stumbling block in the calling of a constitutional convention. Your local League studied this problem at its September 19th workshop and came to the conclusion that it was not a major one throughout the state and should not deter us in our efforts toward a convention, even though our district is one which would be under-represented.

There is a strong possibility that the creation of a commission for constitutional revision may be introduced in the coming session of the Legislature. Your League took up this topic September 26th. Generally speaking there are three types of commissions; one created by joint action of the legislature and governor; one created by the legislature alone; and one created by the governor alone. Since those in the first category would have the widest support, consensus was that this would be preferable.

In reviewing experiences of other states making use of commissions in the past decade, other considerations were brought out. A commission cannot substitute for a convention. Only a convention has the drama and popular support necessary to achieve comprehensive revision of our basic law. Conventions are elected, commissions are appointed. This fact, however, lends inherent worth to a commission in that its personnel can consist of experts and public-spirited citizens who would not compete for election. Commissions are smaller (15-25) which allows for open discussion and thorough deliberation. The existence of a commission enables voluntary civic organizations and private and public educational institutions to do a more effective job than they could with the limited resources at their disposal.

A commission must have resources sufficient to furnish an adequate research staff and funds to publish its reports in sufficient quantity to be available to civic organizations and to the public. The September 26th workshop agreed that such a commission created by the 1961 Legislature would be a step toward constitutional convention if it were properly set up, had sufficient funds and were required to report the following (1963) session.

YOUR COUNTY IS SHOWING

As long ago as 1946 the Council of State Governments in its report on State-Local Relations said of county government "Organizational defects of counties are so great that they serve as genuine barriers to effective government. In the vast majority of counties, the government has no central legislative body which is elected by all the voters of the county. ... Responsibility is diffused among a large number of independently elected officers and boards. ... The diffusion of official responsibility makes it impossible for citizens to understand the mechanism of their county government. ... Because county government is unresponsive to public control, it is undemocratic." Of course, this was not the first time such comment had been made and today the same criticism is valid.

Did you know that your county (and every County in Illinois) can govern only so far as is permitted by the state? Did you know your county (and every County in Illinois) has no real executive officer and no real legislature? The two are blurred together in the Board of Supervisors or Board of Commissioners and many committees charged with both administrative and policy making functions. But did you also know that your Lake County government has, in recent years, taken significant measures to develop a more efficient government so far as it can do so under present constitutional and statutory limitations? What are these?

On February 6th the League's committee for the county program item (see Page 1) will attempt to answer these questions and invite comment and discussion. Specifically, Mrs. Eugene Richardson will give a review of the structure and functions of county government generally and in Lake County particularly; Mrs. Granger Brown will describe recent developments in Lake County; Mrs. Gregory Huffaker will analyze the Model County Charter drawn by the National Municipal League; and Mrs. Jack Nelson will report on the situation to date of the Lake County Forest Preserve District. This will be at the general membership meeting at Lois Durand Hall at 1:30 P.M.

Three workshops will follow: February 14th, Mr. Karl Berning, Chairman of the County Board of Supervisors will discuss urgent county problems; February 21st, The workshop will move to a meeting of the Forest Preserve Commission in Waukegan where important land acquisition will be discussed. February 28th, We will talk it all over. On March 6th, at Lob Durand Hall, Dr. William McGovern, professor of Political Science at Northwestern University and consultant to the County Problems Commission, will give us a look ahead in county government. port from the League's County Government Chairman, Mrs. Granger Brown:

Emerging from the League's intensive study of county government last month appear to be at least two points of agreement: first, that county government needs to be rather basically remodelled and second, that Lake County is moving toward modern administration and procedures as fast as is possible within the existing pattern set by the constitution and state laws.

To take the first point first and briefly: no basic change in the structure of county government is possible without revision of the constitution and even, to be quite practical, without a constitutional convention. For instance, the earlier concept that responsible democratic government requires the election of many officials, no longer meets our needs but it is widely and sincerely held by most county officers. Therefore, piece-meal amendment of the various articles having to do with the county would meet insuperable opposition; not until the whole constitution comes under review by a convention chosen solely for that purpose would it seem likely that an efficient structure of county government could be created.

Now the second point: please recall that a county is an administrative agent of the state it can do only what the state says it may do, or shall do. (One of the complaints often voiced at hearings of the County Problems Commission was that the county was required by statute to provide certain services without being given an adequate tax base by which to provide them).

Let us see now specifically what the Lake County Board of Supervisors has done:

Appointed a Supervisor of Assessments. He serves as clerk of the Board of Review but his chief duty is the training and supervision of township assessors to achieve uniform assessment. Since he must equalize assessments as between townships, if local assessors do not meet standards set by the State Department of Revenue, he may require re-assessment or make it himself. Assessment is now at 55% of full value which gives us a state multiplier of one - practically perfect!

Established a Department of Finance. This office will have initial responsibility for preparing the budget and for investing county funds not immediately to be spent in short term securities, thus earning sizeable interest amounts. In time, it may also serve as a central personnel office; presently, there is no one place where a person seeking county employment may apply; he has to go to each separate office.

Created a Public Building Commission to build a new courthouse and has appropriated \$150,000 for a preliminary survey of its requirements and to screen plans and recommendations.

Begun an audit, by an outside firm of auditors, of county finances. This is the first outside audit in almost thirty years and will, when completed, continue on a four-year cycle, one-fourth of the business each year.

Through the Lake County Housing Authority, is building low rent units for both white and negro families and is studying the need for housing for "senior citizens"; the Board has appointed a full-time doctor for the County Home and a therapist who will try to find some occupations for those indigent old people other than watching the cars whiz by on Milwaukee Avenue has started a study of control of the Dutch Elm disease; has set up a citizen's committee to study water problems and the allied problems of pollution and sewage disposal.

Report from the League's County Government Chairman, Mrs. Granger Brown: (Cont'd.)

Administrative reforms are microfilming of records, a more economical telephone switchboard system, and a perforating machine for tax bills.

Looking ahead are ideas for combined maintenance of all county buildings, codification of ordinances, a personnel policy and the possibility of a county medical director to supervise and coordinate work of the county hospital, county home, tuberculosis sanitarium and the Department of Health.

And last, but perhaps most important, has set up the Lake County Regional Plan Commission and appointed a professional director. After a careful inventory of current land use throughout the county, the Commission has drawn up a Land Use Plan to serve as base for a new zoning map and ordinance. This Plan shows projected population density areas to about 1980 (total anticipated population of 550,000) and ideal allocation of land by usage. Based on this Plan will be the zoning ordinance now in preparation and expected to be completed this coming fall.

N.B. A zoning ordinance is the legal instrument by which a Plan becomes effective.

In spite of these impressive achievements here in our county, there remains the problem of an efficient foundation structure for county government. The National Municipal League has drawn up a Model County Charter, very broad and flexible in its provisions and deserving of serious study. When - - not if but when - - a constitutional convention is called, the League should be ready to write a county article broad and flexible enough to meet future conditions and firm enough to ensure responsible and capable local government.

SJR-15 asking for a referendum to call such a constitutional convention is in committee. League members should be prepared for timely action.

I. CR For our civil rights and liberties

Senate Bill #609 creates a fair employment commission to equalize employment opportunity by hearing complaints of unfair discrimination.

2. CR For Court Reform

HJR #40, and SJR #21 provide that the constitution be amended to provide for court reorganization and a mandatory referendum on nonpartisan selection of judges.

©CR For establishing central election authority

House Bill #199 creates a permanent election laws commission.

4. CR For the welfare of children

House Bill #601 proposes a commission on services for children and their families.

THE LEAGUE AND THE COMMUNITY

Voters' Service

Residents of Lake Forest have come to supplied by the League prior to each election. 1960, a presidential election year, offered additional opportunities to be of service to our community.

Voters' Service placed 150 striking red, white and blue "YOU CAN'T VOTE" (unless you are registered) posters in Lake Forest stores, railroad stations, colleges and the Library. There was a total of 660 registrants at the township supervisor's office in August and September,

In August, letters containing registration and absentee ballot information were mailed to the homes of 350 Barat and Lake Forest College students of voting age.

The Lake Bluff League joined in preparing mimeographed non-partian information on local candidates and their stand on issues. Four hundred of these 14 page booklets (stapled by sixth-grade Girl Scouts) and copies of the Illinois Voter were distributed at the First National Bank of Lake Forest, Remaining copies were handed out by the Girl Scouts at commuter trains the evening before election.

At the General Membership Meeting in October, the five candidates for the Illi General Assembly discussed the state items of the League before an audience of about 200.

The Voters' Service Committee secured pictures of each state and local candidate, prepared biographical information and the stand on issues, of each candidate. This was published in a special election issue of the Lake Forester.

The Voters' Service Chairman was invited to write a guest editorial for the Lake Forester, emphasizing the citizen's responsibility not only to vote, but to think and vote.

Mrs. Bruce Beck was Chairman of Yoters' Service and her Co-chairman was Mrs. S. L. Cochran.

Publications

Mrs. Martin Pesek and her committee were alert for opportunities to get League publications to the community as well as to members. A total of about 400 copies of 20 different publications were distributed to social studies teachers in the grade schools and the high school, to school and public libraries and to our state representatives.

Schools were particularly interested in material on the United Nations and the constitution of Illinois.

Publicity

A Publicity Council has been formed by the Publicity and Public Relations Chairmen to co-operate with the chairman of each monthly item in order to formulate an over-all policy on releaseg to the papers.

The new Publicity Council and the addition of another newspaper on the North Shore have greatly increased the League's newspaper publicity. The League has the active co-operation and interest of both local newspapers.

"Letters to the Editor," calendar notices, weekly stories of meetings and workshops as well as feature articles with pictures appeared in both the <u>Lake Forester</u> and the <u>North Shore Life</u>. Notices of special events have also appeared in the Chicago metropolitan newspapers.

The special Lake Forester Centennial Edition on February 16, 1961, using excerpts from a panel discussion of past presidents and current officers, devoted one and one half pages, with pictures, to the thirty four year history of the Lake Forest League.

Under the chairmanship of Mrs. Richard Carbray and Mrs. Anthony Eastman the Publicity Council plan to continue the excellent newspaper coverage and are looking forward to featuring reports on any League "Call-for-Action" and on the League's support of the local, county and state agenda items.

Finance

The Lake Forest League does not solicit contributions from any business firms in our area. Our solicitations are made only by personal letter and contributions come from interested citizens, many of whom are local businessmen.

The campaign goal of \$2,000,00 was met by the contributions of 118 members and 76 nonmembers. Congratulations to Finance Chairman Mrs. Francis Spalding and her committee members.

Social Activities

Mrs. George Reilly, Membership Chairman, and her Co-chairman, Mrs. William Lane, arranged a series of "Bring-a-Sandwich" luncheons for new members and members and their guests. The luncheons, which preceded the general membership meetings, were held at the homes of Mrs. George Bates, Mrs. Edward Chainski, Mrs. James Traa and Mrs. Reilly.

In November, there was an Orientation meeting and luncheon for new members at the home of Mrs. William Lane. A study of the League's history and its activities was presented by Mrs. Frank Hixon, Mrs. Maurice Pollak and Mrs. John Christie. Hostesses for the luncheon were Mrs. Leonard Aldridge, Mrs. Henry Dettenmeyer, Mrs. Martin Burns, Mrs. George Tittman, Mrs. Richard Winter and Mrs. James Traa.

The teas at the general membership meetings, special meetings and scheduled lunche meetings were arranged by the Social Chairman, Mrs. Victor Frary, and her Co-chairman, Mrs. Roger Bronson. They were assisted by a committee of League hostesses.

THE LOCAL LEAGUE PROGRAM

Local Agenda Item 1 - City Planning and Conservation

The committee for City Planning and Conservation, under the chairmanship of Mrs. Arthur C. Rooney, held two workshops in May, 1961. At the first workshop, Mrs. Samuel G. Taylor, III, and Miss Julia Mae Hamilton reviewed city planning and the committee's activities to date. Mrs. Beckwith Lee described some of the many rare trees and Mrs. Eugene Richardson gave the history of old and architecturally beautiful homes of Lake Forest.

At the second workshop, Mrs. Anthony teastman discussed English laws designed to preserve space and beauty. Mrs. Richard Bentley related the thoughts of Lewis Mumford on city planning, and then gave some of the history of early Lake Forest. Recommendations on city planning to present to the general membership were then discussed.

For the general membership meeting June 5, 961. Mrs. Rooney and her committee arranged a chartered bus tour of the trees and houses described by Mrs. Richardson and Mrs. Lee at the first workshop. After a "Bring-a-Sandwich" luncheon at the home of Mrs. Frederick A. Preston, Miss Hamilton and Mrs. Rooney summarized the activities of the workshops. Mrs. Rooney then presented the committee's recommendation on city planning to the membership. At this point in the meeting, the chartered bus arrived. The two conductors, Mrs. Edward Arpee and Mrs. Beckwith Lee provided every one with a detailed map giving the location of trees and houses to be pointed out on the tour. The wealth of information from the conductors, Mrs. Arnee and Mrs. Lee. combined with a beautiful day made it a memorable excursion. Immediately after the tour, the meeting was resumed at Mrs. Preston's home to vote on the committee's recommendation. There was little time for discussion and clarification of e recommendation and it was not passed,

A second general meeting was held on June 19, at the home of Mrs. Arthur Rooney, for further discussion of a recommendation. The text of the recommendation, which was unanimously passed at this meeting, reads: "The League urges the city to seek, now, professional planning advice on a continuing basis, to aid and counsel the plan commission, to review the city plan in its entirety, and to add much needed provisions for conservation and beautification."

This recommendation was submitted to the city council in June by Mrs. Robert Spiel, League president.

The League, a pioneer in turning attention to city planning and beautification, has had for its goal an ordinance requiring a set-back in the business district. When an ordinance requiring an eight foot set-back on Forest Ave. was proposed, the League took an active part in urging its passage, and was very gratified when the ordinance was passed December 5, 1960.

Local Agenda Item 11 - Continued study of county government with emphasis on planning, and coordinated action where indicated with special attention to the Forest Preserve District and improved county health services.

On Monday, February 6, 1961, Dr. William McGovern of Northwestern University, spoke to a general membership meeting on problems of county government. Although Dr. McGovern is best known in the field of international politics and strategic planning, he has been consultant to the County Problems Commission established by the legislature to make a continuing study of county government and to recommend any possible statutory changes as needed. The talk by Dr. McGovern, originally scheduled for March 6, opened the League's

month of particular concern with the County item, instead of the panel discussion announced in League Lines, January, 1961. (This issue of League Lines also contains the pertinent report Your County is Showing by Mrs. Granger Brown. In the issue for March, 1961, is her report on County Government.)

February 14, the first workshop, at the home of Mrs. Granger Brown, heardMr. Karl Berning, chairman of the Board of Supervisors, describe the urgent problems in Lake County. For the second workshop on February 21. League Members went to a meeting of the Board of Commissioners of the Forest Preserve District at the courthouse in Waukegan. The third workshop, again at Mrs. Brown's home, was devoted to the planning function of the county as exercised by the Lake County Regional Planning Commission; Mr. Waterstreet and Mr. Abel of the Commission staff showed maps and explained the newly adopted Land Use Plan as a base for a new zoning ordinance and its relation to the Northeastern Illinois Metropolitan Area Planning Commission.

Between ten and fifteen League members attended the workshops and two or more observers attended every meeting of the Board of Supervisors and of the Board of Commissioners of the Forest Preserve District, Chairman and Co-chairman of the committee were Mrs. Granger Brown and Mrs. Gregory Huffaker, respectively; other members of the committee were Mrs. Jack Nelson and Mrs. Eugene Richardson.

Local CR - Publication of the handbook
"Facts for Lake Foresters."

Since 1950 the League has published binnially a voter's handbook for the citizens of Lake Forest. Paid for by advertising, it is distributed free as a community service. Individuals, businesses, schools and organizations of all kinds welcome this publication and have come to depend upon it for local information as well as that having to do with county, state and national government.

The Lake Forest City Council has aided in compiling the facts about city government from the first. This year the City Manager's office co-operated to an even greater extent. It provided a large detailed map of the city marked with precinct, ward and township lines and paid half the cost. It helped secure the list of presidents of organizations by sending out letters and reply cards. Office secretarial service was given for operating the address-o-graph and space was provided for stuffing envelopes. In addition it gave the use of the city permit for bulk mailing and provided transportation to the post office.

Of the 3,500 copies printed, all but 250 have been mailed or distributed. Remaining copies are available at the City Hall for Lake Forest residents not included in the mailing list.

The scope of the work in publishing the "Facts for Lake Foresters" is apparent.

tate Item 1 - Study and support of measures to provide an equitable and flexible tax structure for Illinois

At a series of workshops in October, 1960, held at the home of Mrs. Charles Dabney and a general membership meeting in December, agreement was reached on the following statutory measures to increase revenue to the State:

a) Opposition to any increase in the "sales" (R. O. T.) tax;

 Support of broadening the base of the "sales" tax to include application to custom made articles, and also to sales connected with certain services, now exempt;

c) Opposition to increase in the present corporation franchise tax;

d) Support for a corporate franchise tax based on income,

On constitutional measures, it was agreed to support classification of personal property. It was preferred that a new Revenue Article should make no mention of an income tax, either to permit or forbid.

In the event a revenue article should:

a) Prohibit an income tax:

Food should be exempted from the "sales" tax; The tax on intangible property should be abolished; The "sales" tax should be raised and broadened.

- b) Allow a flat rate income tax, with exemptions and a ceiling: Food should be exempted from the "sales" tax; The tax on intangibles should be abolished.
- c) Allow a graduated income tax, with exemptions and a ceiling: Food should be exempted from the "sales" tax; The tax on intangibles should be abolished; The "sales" tax should be broadened.

These recommendations were forwarded to the State Board.

At the general membership meeting on December 5, 1960, Dr. H. Murry Herlihy spoke on What Taxes are Equitable? Dr. Herlihy is Assistant Professor of Economics at Lake Forest College.

Mrs. Graham Ely was Chairman of the Revenue Item and her Co-chairman was Mrs. George Blossom, Jr.

State Item 11 - Improvement of election laws and procedures with emphasis on primaries, a

Mrs. George Oliver and her committee concluded a two year study of this item in November. The workshops were held at the home of Mrs. Robert Spiel. Consensus was reached on four phases of the election procedures. To summarize:

The Primary -

No alternative method is as promising, but there is need for education on its value and on individual responsibility to it. It should be held in the early fall after a pre-primary convention to select party sponsored candidates.

The Short Ballot -

The governor, it. governor, senators and representatives should be elected. Non-policy making officers should be eliminated from the ballot and appointed by the governor and/or the legislature (as indicated in the full report) on the Merit System. Judges would be chosen according to the present recommendation of the Bar Association; county officers, with the exception of the county clerk to be appointed by the chairman of the county board...

Centralized Supervision of Elections -

A state superintendent of elections with a 3-member bi-partisan advisory board was recommended, the advisory board to be appointed by the governor or the secretary of state; a county superintendent of elections answerable to the state superintendent; civil service examinations for lower election officials. Ballots with removable numbers and a rubber stamp for marking ballots were also recommended.

Mandatory Training for Judges -

Training for judges should be made mandatory by law; the state superintendent of elections would formulate training plans to be implemented by the county superintendent of elections; initially all judges would take the training and be certified. Veteran judges must take a refresher course when new election laws are passed or every four years. There would be two sets of judges with the teller set coming at the close of the polls; the number of judges in each set should be from 3 to 5 depending upon the size of the precinct...

These recommendations, in full, were made to the State Board. Although not in the scope of this item, the committee agreed on the value of shortening the residential requirements for voting in the presidential election and would have liked to take up the matter of the electoral college.

The State has adopted for the 1961-63 program the following CR3: Support of statutory and constitutional revision to clarify and improve election laws and procedures; to establish a central election authority; to require certification of election judges; to shorten the ballot; and to reduce residence requirements for voting for president and vice-president.

STATE CURRENT AGENDA (Continued)

State Item 111 To work for a constitutional convention for Illinois.

Pursuing its second year of study and action under this item, your Con-Con Committee held two workshops in September and the general meeting October 3rd at which Professor S. A. Hartzo of the Department of Political Science of Lake Forest College spoke to us on State Constitutions Today and their relation to our federal system.

The first workshop, September 19th, at the home of Miss Daria Brown, consisted, first, of a review of the importance and functions of State government and a demonstration of how our 1870 constitution restricts the efficient administration of these functions. This was presented by Mmes. Spalding, Feemster, Eastman, Bina and Miss Brown. Mrs. Oliver reviewed the amending process under Section 2 of Article XIV, and the difficulties involved in achieving coherent constitutional revision by this method. Then, Mrs. Alfred Kamin, a State committee member, presented the findings of her study on the selection of delegates to a Constitutional Convention, under Section 1 of Article XIV, and how it could be affected by the results of the 1960 census. (See LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS OF ILLINOIS publication "Representation at a Constitutional Convention in Illinois," February, 1961.)

The question is whether the difference of only 5 to 6 delegates elected from Cook County or downstate, brought about by amending this Article before calling a Constitutional Convention, is worth the tremendous effort involved, and the risk of further delay in obtaining comprehensive revision. The consensus of the workshop was that it was not.

The second workshop on September 26th, held at the home of Mrs. Robert Spiel was avoted to the subject of legislative commissions for constitutional revision as described in the November issue of the Bulletin. The consensus was that a commission appointed by both houses of the legislature and the Governor, and directed to report to the 1963 General Assembly, would be a step toward pointing out the need for general constitutional revision. In February, Senators McClory, Arrington and Maher introduced a bill to establish such a commission. The State League voted to support this bill and State Board members testified before the Senate Judicial and Appropriations Committees. The State asked for action from those Local Leagues whose Senators were members of these committees. The bill passed the Senate. As amended it provides for a bi-partisan commission of 18 members, 6 each to be appointed by the President of the Senate, the Speaker of the House, and the Governor; with an appropriation of \$25,000. It is directed to make an interim report to the Governor in 1962 and a final report to the Legislature in 1963. In May, those Leagues whose Representatives were members of the House Committee on Governmental Economy were asked to take Action. The Con-Gon Committee contacted their Representatives. The bill passed both Houses, and our final "Time for Action" was July 7th, to urge Governor Kerner's signature,

State Continuing Responsibilities

Mrs. Dettenmayer and her committee reviewed the State CR program at a workshop meeting in December, 1960, at the home of Mrs. Melvin Lackie.

Their conclusions were presented at the January, 1961, "Lake Forest League Convention." They reviewed the CR program, made recommendations to retain some items, to drop others, and to add new ones, together with their reasons for these decisions.

Their recommendations were sent to the State Office.

The Lake Forest League Convention

The January membership meeting at the home of Mrs. William N. Lane was in the form of a miniature convention. Its purpose was to formulate the proposals of the League of Women Voters of Lake Forest for the State Program for 1961-63.

In her keynote address, the President, Miss Julia Mae Hamilton, stressed the fact that in the League all major decisions are made by the members themselves. Therefore, the members would now make their choices for a new state program.

Reports began on the current State Program, with Mrs. John Christie presiding. Mrs. Ely discussed Item 1, Revenue; Mrs. Oliver discussed Item 11, Election Laws; Mrs. Spiel discussed Item 111, Constitutional Convention, and Mrs. Dettenmayer reviewed the Continuing Responsibilities.

During the luncheon recess, members went into caucus groups which especially interested them in order to formulate the wording and plan the presentation of proposed items.

The meeting reconvened at 1 o'clock, with Mrs. Christic again presiding. Presentations for new areas of study were made by Mrs. John Clark, Mrs. John Forester, Mrs. Richard Bentley and Mrs. Granger Brown, followed by debate and action on Current Agenda and on Continuing Responsibilities.

The Lake Forest League Convention voted to propose "Con-Con" and Area Planning for the State Current Agenda. (See the May-June, 1961, Illinois Voter for the program adopted by State.)

At three o'clock the meeting was adjourned,

NATIONAL AGENDA

<u>furrent Agenda Item</u> - Support of U. S. economic policies which promote world development and maintain a sound U. S. economy.

The National Agenda item on foreign economic policy was the subject of two membership meetings (March and April, 1961) and four workshops between March 13 and May 1, 1961. Attendance at the workshops held at the homes of Mrs. Ralph Stover, Mrs. Edward Arpec and Mrs. George Reilly, was between 16 and 20 members at each one. Twenty three copies of Hard Choices were sold. In addition to the membership meetings and workshops, a meeting open to the community was held in January, 1961, at the home of Mrs. H. J. Hemingway, at which Mr. John Scott of Time spoke on "The New Europe." About 250 persons attended.

At the first membership meeting, a panel of five members explained the mechanism of the balance of payments and gold movements with the aid of maps and charts. At the second lecting, held at the home of Mrs. W. Press Hodgkins, Mr. Charles Partee, Associate Economist of The Northern Trust Company, discussed the various items in the balance of payments and the various methods of correcting the current deficit.

At these two meetings, it was pointed out that our changed balance of payments position is a long-term rather than a crisis situation and calls for long-term, well-thought-out remedies rather than crisis measures such as devaluation, restrictive exchange controls, quotas or tariffs. Decreased foreign aid is not the solution as the major part of our foreign aid results directly in increased exports.

At the workshop on agricultural surpluses, Mrs. Edith Slayton, the midwest director of CARE, described their program of distribution of food overseas. In addition, several members outlined the Food-for-Peace program. Concern was expressed over the use of agricultural export subsidies. The question will be studied further in the fall.

At the third workshop, two members informed the group concerning American overseas investment and its impact on the balance of payments. In general, it was felt that overseas investment is not harmful to our balance of payments position in the long run. However, the question was raised whether direct foreign investment might reduce exports and employment in the U. S.

Two workshops were concerned with forcign aid. There was general agreement that a reasonable but not unlimited amount of foreign aid is highly desirable and emphasis should be placed on the most effective use of aid. The most important consideration both for the U. S. and the rest of the world is a sound dollar and an expanding U. S. economy.

For the most part members approved of President Kennedy's program as it attempts to meet some of the major criticisms of foreign aid: improved organization, partial long-term financing, more emphasis on loans as opposed to grants, emphasis on social reforms and self-help as a prelude to substantial assistance and long range planning.

Two calls for action occurred during the spring, one in support for the OECD and the other in support of the \$500 million appropriation for Latin American aid, Members were informed of these in workshops and membership meetings.

No consensus was requested from the national board. The foregoing comments are not intended to indicate consensus.

NATIONAL CONTINUING RESPONSIBILITIES

Three workshop meetings were held in January, 1961, two on CR1 - Water Resource Development, and one on CR4 - Home Rule and National Suffrage.

Workshop attention was given to:

- CR1 Water resource development because of existing great interest.
- CR2 United Nations It was felt that our background on this was a solid one so no time was allotted to it. However, those who attended the State meeting (held after our workshops had taken place) reported that the Connalley Reservation and other questions may render further study of this necessary, perhaps during the autumn.
- CR3 Loyalty-Security Two members undertook to keep abreast of this topic and report to the whole group if it becomes active.
- CR4 Home rule and national suffrage for the District of Columbia Considerable time was devoted to this because so few members could remember ever having studied this particular subject.
- CR5 Item veto Report made to workshop by one member.
- CR6 Constitutional limitation on taxes No action or interest.
- CR7 Treaty powers Bricker Amendment One member undertook to keep abreast of this topic and report to the whole group if it becomes active.

Mrs. Richard Bentley, Chairman Mrs. Harry B. Clow, Co-chairman A Letter to the Membership from the President of the Lake Forest League of Women Voters:

The foregoing reports tell of the strong and effective work of the Lake Forest League of Women Voters for this past year. There are three aspects of the year's work which I want to mention as illustrative of different parts of the purpose of the League.

- This being the year of a National Election, the work of the Voters' Service Committee was a most essential part in securing an "informed and active participation of citizens in government." The work of this committee and the large number of members who took part in it, was imaginative, extensive and effective.
- The Lake Forest League has always been concerned about membership participation in program making for the National, State and local levels. The "little" state convention accomplished this to an unusual degree. Many members experienced the uniquely democratic way of arriving at program making. Furthermore, this was good preparation for the actual State Convention.
- The League has a great sense of responsibility to bring the issues upon which it is working to the attention of the community. This is done in many ways, through publicity—which has been particularly effective this year because of a publicity council which coordinated all forms of communication—publications, bulletins, general meetings and workshops, which are always open to the public.

A special effort was made to bring to the community the League's concern on foreign economic policy, our National program item. An evening meeting was arranged with Mr. John Scott of Time as the speaker. Five hundred personal invitations were issued to men and women, including city officials, faculty members of the colleges and schools, and to the heads of other organizations. The speaker was stimulating and illuminating and the community response was most gratifying.

As I write this final report as President of the Lake Forest League of Women Voters, I must express my deep appreciation for the superb work of the Board and committees and for the cooperation of the membership. The competence of the Board has been outstanding and strengthened by the fact that individual members have not only carried their own program responsibility, but have had a concern for and have helped to carry the total League program. Decisions were made on an objective basis on what was good and appropriate for the League, and never on a personal basis. It is my conviction that work in the League of Women Voters tends to promote growth in stature. These three years as President of the Lake Forest League of Women Voters have been a time of stimulus and joy and I am grateful to all concerned.

Local Agenda 1-A City Plan with Conservation and Beautification

On June 19, 1961, after three years' study on City Beautification, your League reached agreement on a proposal to submit to the Mayor and the City Council:

"The League urges the City to seek, now, professional planning advice on a continuing basis, to aid and counsel the Plan Commission, to review the City Plan in its entirety and to add much needed provisions for conservation and beautification."

Following is the reply of the Mayor to the League and the League's response to the questions. The response was drafted, at the suggestion of the Board, by a committee composed of the chairman and co-chairman of Local Agenda Item-I, the two Vice-Presidents and the President.

July 10, 1961

Dear Mrs. Spiel:

As a sequel to my letter of June 26th, I feel that it would be helpful to the Plan Commission and the City Council if the League of Women Voters would more precisely define its objectives and the means of achieving them.

Some of the questions which would stand further exploring are:

- Is the present City Plan, which was designed to anticipate and prepare for the evolution of Lake Forest, already useless and outdated six years after its adoption?
- Can not the development of the City be controlled more readily and effectively by the pressure of public opinion exerted by individuals and organizations such as yours, instead of enacting, and attempting to enforce, local ordinances of questionable legality?
- Are we justified in spending a minimum of \$10,000 for a new City Plan prepared by another firm, who by nature of the commission, must and will find unsatisfactory aspects in the present plan? As I am sure we will both agree, there are several approaches to a problem of this nature, any one of which will enlist numerous supporters as well as opponents.
- As to the possibility of employing a staff planning director—all of the problems inherent in questions raised under paragraph 3 exist here, plus saddling the City with a continuing annual cost in the neighborhood of \$12,000. Then there is the further factor of whether a city of our size has enough activity to keep such a man gainfully employed.

In conclusion, I want to emphasize my sympathy with, and concern over, this problem, In short, I feel we should all be sure of what we are seeking, and that it is not change and regulation, merely for their own sakes.

I personally will be glad to meet with you individually, or with a small committee of your organization. I hope, in any event, that you and the League will ponder the questions. I have raised and let us have the benefit of your thinking.

Gentlemen:

Following are the answers to the questions which you requested of the League of Women Voters in your letter of July 10th:

We do not think the present City Plan is useless or outdated. Our recommendation was that it be reviewed as recommended on page 26 of the plan itself: "Where a full time planning staff is not available, several communities are following a policy of having their plan reappraised and adjusted about every five or ten years."

We find that it does lack provisions for conservation and beautification and feel these should be included.

- 2. No, the development of our city can not be controlled more readily and effectively by individuals and organizations. The ultimate expression of public opinion is to create a philosophy for city development implemented by ordinances and administered by city government. Other communities in Illinois have such ordinances, Highland Park and Danville are examples. If Lake Forest is interested in preserving its heritage (as you must be aware, there is currently considerable expression of public opinion to this effect) it should certainly be willing to assume leadership in enacting ordinances of this nature.
- As in our answer to your first question, we are not suggesting a new city plan. We are recommending that the 1955 Plan be reviewed to see if it is now adequate to meet the many changes that have been taking place throughout the city. It is within the scope of the City Council to determine the cost and choose a competent firm, not necessarily a different one, to review our Plan.
- 4. Our recommendation urges that the City Council seek professional advice to review the City Plan, and to keep the Plan consistent with the philosophy of the community through periodic consultation with professional advice, monthly, quarterly or semiannually as needed.

The League of Women Voters appreciates the foresightedness of the City Council in adopting a Plan in 1955. It is our hope that the same foresightedness will prevail in keeping our Plan and its instruments adequate to develop the kind of community the citizens want.

- (6) Support of an adequate effective U. S. foreign aid program which is consistent with a sound U. S. economy, and emphasizes self-help by developing countries; is long-range in scope and coordinated with more aid from industrialized countries and international organizations.
- (7) Support of liberal trade policies designed to permit the U. S. to negotiate freely with other countries for world wide reduction of trade barriers, while maintaining the strength of the U. S. economy.

* * * * * *

In February we will receive from the National Board a proposed agenda based on the recommendations from all the local leagues. After further study at the local level, final adoption of the program will be made at the national convention next May.


The Lake County Council of the Leagues of Women Voters of the six component Leagues is resolved that:

Time is running out in Lake County (part of a burgeoning metropolitan area, third largest in the country) for wise allocation of land use for all categories—homes, business, industry, open space, recreation space, etc. The League is fearful that Lake County may become a mass of rural slums. The Regional Planning Commission is endeavoring to prevent such an unhappy development; it deserves full support by the County Board and also by all Lake County residents.
- II. They also commend the action of the Board of Commissioners of the Lake County Forest Preserve District in designating ten forest preserve sites; they urge rapid acquisition of these sites; and they suggest immediate exploration of future sites, in order to enlarge the Lake County Forest Preserve District before it is too late, and too expensive, to acquire open space area for the enjoyment and education of future generations.

THE LAKE FOREST LEAGUE VOTES SUPPORT OF PROPOSED SCHOOL REFERENDA

At the Annual Meeting April 9th the League gave unanimous support to the Lake Forest High School's proposed increase of the educational tax limit from 65 cents to 85 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation. May 26th is the date for the referendum. The League also endorsed the anticipated raise in the educational tax rate for the Lake Forest public elementary schools. The date for this referendum has not yet been amnounced by the school board, but it is expected in the fall or early next year.

The membership gave approval following the report of the committee studying the public schools in connection with the League's Continuing Responsibility: "Support of adequate public education for Lake Forest."

The study of the schools included three workshops and one general membership meeting. Two of the workshops were devoted to presenting materials and discussion on enrollment projections and figures, tax limits, class size, salary schedules, the state school code, the Lake Forest charter, and curricula and costs with financial comparisons with other north shore schools. At the general meeting, the membership was addressed by Dr. Albert E. Poole, Superintendent of the Lake Forest Elementary Schools, and Dr. Clyde N. Carter, Superintendent of the Lake Forest High School. At the request of the members attending the previous workshops, a third workshop met to study the Intermediate School Plan adopted in February by the elementary school board.

It was the consensus of those attending the workshops to support the proposed referenda.

Centennial Meeting

A meeting was held in late September; names for letters were taken by seventeen members. The number of names for each person varied from one to ten. The results were splendid. Five of those taking names reported 100% responses, and others met with varying success. The total from these letters was \$1,144,00.

To all members of the League, a very short request was mailed in late September. The response was excellent, and the total from 91 members was \$1,149.00. The combined sum was \$2,293.00, which was above the goal the Finance Committee knew must be obtained for the League to meet its financial responsibilities.

The Chairman and Co-Chairman were and are so grateful that they have asked if they may "do it again" for 1962. They have the deepest appreciation to all who gave, as members, and to members who wrote the letters which brought the total to over the \$2,100.00 goal.

Publicity

The League received excellent co-operation from the local and area newspapers during the past year. THE LOCAL LEAGUE PROGRAM

Local Current Agenda 1A - The City Plan with conservation and beautification

The Committee had a meeting during the summer to answer the Mayor's questions in regard to the League's Resolution passed at the June 19, 1961 meeting. The Mayor's letter and our answers were printed in the October League Lines.

League Lines

September 25 was the date for a special membership meeting to consider support of a proposal for the formation of an Architectural Board of Review for the Plan Commission. The League voted in favor of establishing the Board. It was decided to organize support for it by a series of talks acquainting people with its merits and urging attendance at the Plan Commission's public hearings on this subject.

The League was well represented at the two Plan Commission meetings on October 11 and November 14, and members spoke in favor of creating the Board. During the winter the Committee attended Council meetings and the monthly public Plan Commission meetings where they spoke in favor of a professional review of the City Plan. Letters to the Editor were published in The Lake Forester. One letter on city planning was written in the hope of making the public aware of the great advantages of giving thought and planning to a growing city and to cite legal devices employed by other cities to insure the preservation of beautiful trees and to decourage landscaping.

On February 8, at the home of Mrs. Charles DeLong, the Committee had a meeting with the Garden Club to discuss making a map together for the purpose of planning for the visual appearance of Lake Forest and to call to the attention of the public and the City Council the aspects we would like to see preserved. It was hoped that this would inspire the Council to take advantage of the new official map law passed at the last session of the legislature.

It has been decided to continue the effort toward city beautification by putting it on Continuing Responsibilities with this wording: "Continued support of measures which would include provisions for conservation and beautification in the administration of the City Plan."

Local Current Agenda 1B - The City Plan with Zoning and Building Code

After overall study of the Plan and Zoning Ordinance, each member of the Committee took a special aspect for detailed study: business and shopping districts, signs, residential district by areas, parks and schools. The Committee met several times, once with Mr. R. C. Morris, the director of the Lake County Regional Planning Commission, to discuss with him questions growing out of our study, in preparation for the general membership meeting.

At the general membership meeting on February 5, 1962, Mr. Morris was the moderator of a panel consisting of members of the Committee. Planning and zoning were discussed, with the panel asking questions which arose out of our study.

Men interested in a new apartment development and seeking a zoning classification for apartments-as such, requested permission twice to come to committee meetings to explain their plan and seek our support. The request for apartment zoning was to be based on their assumption that there is urgent need for this kind of housing among city employees and teachers. The (Continued)

Local Current Agenda 1B - The City Plan with Zoning and Building Code (Cont'd.)
Committee made an informal survey of city employees, including police, firemen, and
teachers, to ascertain the need for these proposed apartments. The result was that a possible
nine people were interested. A letter with the results of the survey was given to the Plan
Commission for whatever use they cared to make of it.

At a workshop on February 19, the Committee reported on: 1 - the possible use of an official map as outlined in the new bill No. 1324, 2 - the survey re the need for the proposed apartments, 3 - obnoxious signs. (This is now under the attention of the Architectural Board of Review.)

Local Current Agenda Item 2: Preparation of a booklet for Lake County with special emphasis on planning and on the Forest Preserve.

The survey is to be prepared by all six Leagues in Lake County. Each League was assigned a chapter; Lake Forest was assigned planning and the Forest Preserve.

At a workshop held January 8, 1962, our members went over all the material so far prepared for the handbook, and decided to recommend to the Lake County Council as next year's item on county government, a study of water with special attention to the Lake County Public Works Department; distribution of the flood hazard maps issued by the U. S. Geological Survey; and possible creation of River Conservancies. At the February meeting of the Council, after discussion with the other Leagues, the item was broadened to read: Support for continued Lake County planning with emphasis on zoning and conservation of natural resources.

The workshop also recommended as Continuing Responsibilities for the Lake Forest League: Support for expansion and sound administration of the Forest Preserve district. Support for implementation of the land-use policy adopted by the Lake County Board of Supervisors.

The committee attended all meetings of the Board of Supervisors of Lake County; all meetings of the Forest Preserve Board of Commissioners; and hearings by the Land Acquisition Committee of the Forest Preserve District.

Local Continuing Responsibility 2: Support of adequate public education for Lake Forest.

On learning that school district #115, the Lake Forest High School, was proposing to ask for a referendum on May 26th to increase the maximum educational tax limit from 65¢ to 85¢ per \$100 of assessed valuation, the League decided to hold three workshops and a general meeting in March to determine the League position on the referendum. Two of the workshops were devoted to presenting materials and discussion on enrollment projections, tax limits, class size, salary schedules, the state school code, the Lake Forest charter, and curricula and costs with financial comparisons with other North Shore schools. The third workshop met to study the Intermediate School Plan adopted in February by the Elementary School Board. At the general meeting the membership was addressed by Dr. Albert E. Poole, Superintendent of the Elementary Schools, and Dr. Clyde N. Garter, Superintendent of Lake Forest High School.

At our annual meeting April 9th the League gave unanimous support for the High School's increase in the educational tax limit, and also endorsed the anticipated raise in the educational tax rate for the elementary schools. The date for this latter referendum has not been announced, but it is expected in the fall or early next year.

STATE LEAGUE PROGRAM

State Current Agenda: Work for a Constitutional Convention to provide an improved constitution for Illinois

A workshop was held January 22, 1962. Mrs. Granger Brown discussed the proposed changes in the "Model Constitution." These changes were discussed article by article with the reasons for the changes.

The second workshop was a discussion on Metropolitan Area governments. Mrs. Robert Spiel gave the report on Dade County, Florida, and Mrs. J. H. Feemster reported on the Toronto, Canada, area. Mrs. Granger Brown reported on the meetings she had attended at the National Municipal League Convention in Florida. The meetings were informal discussions on what is happening to our cities and how the problems may be remedied.

State Continuing Responsibilities

With a "Time for Action" notice in <u>League Lines</u> May 1961, the membership was alerted to the bills in the <u>Legislature</u> on Civil <u>Liberties</u>, Court Reform, <u>Election Laws and Child Welfare</u>.

In June 1961, letters were sent to members asking them to write Governor Kerner urging his signature on the following bills: Election Laws, Child Welfare, Civil Liberties, and the Cook County Correctional System.

After the February 15th,1962 State Meeting on the Judicial Amendment, plans were made to inform the membership of the content of the Judicial Article.

NATIONAL AGENDA

Current Agenda Item: Support of U. S. economic policies which promote world development and maintain a sound U. S. economy.

In the past year the foreign policy committee was concerned primarily with the United States foreign trade policy with special emphasis on desirable changes in view of current economic developments such as the growth of the European Common Market and the changed balance of payments position of the United States.

At the first workshop in October, Mrs. George Hale, Lecturer in Economics, Lake Forest College, discussed the basic economics of foreign trade. The second workshop in November and the third in April were general discussions of current proposals on foreign trade.

At the April general membership meeting there was a mock congressional hearing on President Kennedy's trade proposals.

The major action in the community was a panel discussion by Illinois businessmen on foreign trade policy. The participants were: Dr. William Cole, President, Lake Forest College; Mr. William Hewitt, President, Deere & Co.; Mr. L. B. Hunter, Vice President, Inland Steel Co.; Mr. Donald J. Miller, President, Foreter Textile Mills, Inc.; Mr. Charles Percy, Chairman, Bell & Howell Co.; and Mr. A. Thomas Taylor, Chairman, International Packers Ltd. About 250 persons attended the meeting.

As a result of its study, the Lake Forest League approved the current national League of the Noter's position that international trade should be liberalized and barriers systematically reduced. It supports the proposal of empowering the President to make across-the-board rather than product-by-product tariff concessions in negotiations with other countries. It also approved the President's proposal for assistance to industries and workers adversely affected by the reduction of trade barriers.

NATIONAL AGENDA (Cont'd.)

National Continuing Responsibilities Item 1: Conservation and development of Water
Resources

Two workshops were held for discussion of water pollution, salt water conversion, and flood plain mapping as it is being carried on by the U. S. Geological Survey,

The League gave support to the distribution of the Flood Plain maps, which became available in 1962 and will continue to be available in the next year.

Attention was given to the Clean Streams Committee of Lake County, the Lake County Public Water District, Illinois Division of Waterways' proposal to prevent flooding, and the proposed creation of a Department of Public Works,

Mr. Robert Tieken, U. S. District Attorney from 1952 to 1960, spoke at a general membership meeting on water as it is covered by federal legislation. He defined navigable streams and outlined water legislation as it applies to Lake County as well as on the state and national level.

Some brief study was made of the ground water law as it applies in Illinois.

National Continuing Responsibilities Item 2 : Support of the United Nations

In observance of United Nations month, October, Mrs. Edison Dick, U. S. Representative to the Social Commission of the United Nations, and a member of the Lake Forest League, addressed a general membership meeting on October 2nd.

On United Nations Day, October 24th, as a part of the Lake Forest College Community Program, Dr. Charles A. Hogan spoke on the "United Nations in the World Today." Dr. Hogan is Deputy Secretary of the Economic and Social Council, and Secretary of the Technical Assistance Council of the United Nations. Several classes of students from the public schools, League members as well as college students and faculty heard Dr. Hogan tell of some of the problems which have faced the UN this year, particularly those arising after the death of the Secretary General, Dag Hammarskjold.

One background workshop was held to attempt to show the problems of the UNe's first 15 years and how it has changed and must continue to change. The size of the General Assembly, the many problems of finance, how the UN affects or is affected by the U. S. foreign policy, should there be a troiks or a single secretary-general, and should Red China be admitted, were some of the questions considered in October 1961.

At the national convention of the League this apring, it was voted to make the study more intensive in the next two years, and the UN item, by an overwhelming vote, was put on Current Agenda as "Continued support of the United Nations System and evaluation of means to strengthen it under present day conditions."

Letter to the Membership from the President of the Lake Forest League of Women Voters:

In trying to be objective about what is a rather subjective experience; in trying to stand back enough from the woods to see the trees, one phrase catches my attention as I peruse reports which summarize our past year's activity. It is that which heads the first two pages of this bulletin: "The League and the Community." This title could also introduce the section describing the coverage of our program.

The purpose of the League of Women Voters gives its program an essentially public service, public relations character. In the League we have an organization which, it has been said, could well be the envy of any professional public relations firm. Every League chairman and every League member contributes to it. Some characteristics of a good public relations program, as defined by our State Public Relations chairman, are: that it begins with the work the League does in the community; it should be adapted to the community and its needs; and to the local League and its resources. The achievements recorded in the above reports clearly demonstrate the resources of the League of Women Voters of Lake Forest, through its chairmen and their committees, to carry the program to the community. The attendance at our community meetings, and at Council meetings and Plan Commission hearings, would indicate the response of the program to the needs and interests of Lake Forest, it seems to me that we have been in very close touch with our community whether through a panel of businessmend discussing the importance of foreign trade, or by direct communication with our city officials. I believe we can all take pride in our contribution to the celebration of Lake Forest's buth Anniversary.

The quality of our program as a public relations tool is achieved in the League through greater participation of the individual member in the selection of the program. The realization by each member that the League program is her program results in greater enthusiasm in carrying it out and greater satisfaction in its achievement. As more members participate in the selection of the program the more does it reflect the needs and interests of the local, state, and national community.

In coming months we will all have further opportunities to participate in interpreting the purpose and program of the League. As elections approach we have our continuing Voters Service responsibility to distribute impartial information on candidates and obtain maximum registration and a maximum vote. We must all make every effort to see that the community le aware of the importance of the passage of the Judicial Amendment. We have a particular opportunity to emphasize the nonpartisanship policy of the League through wide distribution of our new folder which explains the difference between support of a candidate or party and taking a position on an issue.

Let me thank all those whose patience with my inexperience has made this a most instructive year. I am looking forward to another stimulating year of working with all of you.



THE LAKE FOREST PUBLIC SCHOOL REFERENDUM FEBRUARY 16TH

February 16th is the date for the referendum to increase the educational tax limit for the Lake Forest Elementary Schools from the present 96¢ per \$100 assessed valuation to \$1.17. The increase of 21¢ is expected to appear on the property tax bills in the following amounts: 1964 - 7¢ increase, 1965 - 7¢ increase, and 1966 - 7¢ increase.

At the Annual Meeting April 9th 1962, the general membership of the Lake Forest League gave unanimous support to the anticipated increase in the educational tax limit for the Lake Forest public elementary schools. This action followed a series of workshops and a general meeting which were held last spring. Consensus for support was reached in the workshops after presentation and discussion of materials on enrollment figures and projections, class size, salary schedules, the school code, and the Lake Forest Charter. Curricula and costs with financial comparisons with other north shore schools were also included in the study.

The Lake Forest League has a long record of support for good public school education in Lake Forest. Vote February 16th!

MOCK CONVENTION - JANUARY 14TH THOUGHTS ON STATE PROGRAM

On January 14th all members of the League of Women Voters of Lake Forest will have the opportunity to say toward what new achievements, what new areas of study, the efforts of their State League should be directed for the next two years. Now begins the process by which the membership of the League selects the items for study and action to be adopted by the delegates of all the Leagues at the State Convention in April. The proposals we submit now form the base of what will be discussed and adopted at convention.

What areas of study and work will best help our members understand the structure and operation of government in Illinois? Which important issues in the State do you feel are most likely to be under general consideration and interest during the next two years?

Passage of the Judicial amendment last November rewards a nine year effort of the League to modernize our court system. What other areas of our 1870 constitution are most in need of revision? Our revenue system? Legislative procedures? The executive system? Should we work toward shortening the ballot? Shall we approach these areas one by one as before, or shall we continue to work for a constitutional convention to achieve an integrated whole?

In what new areas do you feel the League could make an effective contribution, not only for the benefit of the State, but also for the education of its members? Are there local problems which require a state-wide solution? And finally, which of our former studies and positions do we feel we are still prepared to pursue and support? (Election laws, Civil rights, Legislative apportionment, Education and school redistricting, Improved personnel administration in government service?).

All these decisions are in the hands of the local League member to be resolved by discussion and debate through the convention process. So come with your ideas in order that we may formulate an interesting and effective program - OUR PROGRAM.



HIGH SCHOOLS AND LEAGUES PLAN MOCK CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION MARCH 15th - 16th

On March 15th and 16th, nine high schools in the north shore suburban area, assisted by fourteen Leagues, will hold a mock constitutional convention at the Highland Park High School. This convention is planned as a pilot project with the hope that other areas in the state may set up other student conventions.

While the purpose may seem obvious—to arouse interest in a constitutional convention—there is also a deeper purpose, namely to further the education of young people, who will shortly become voting citizens, in the whole democratic process of government. The convention will be in the hands of the students themselves; they will elect their chairman, set up committees, adopt rules, and draft proposals for constitutional revision and they have already chosen the articles in the constitution which they will debate. Since work at the convention and most work preparatory to it have to be extra-curricular and since the actual working time of the convention (Friday afternoon to Saturday afternoon) is too short for discussion of the whole content of the constitution, they have limited debate to the legislative, executive, revenue, suffrage, and amending process articles.

Last summer a steering committee was formed under the chairmanship of Mrs. Louise Greenchaum of Highland Park composed of a representative of each League, from the State League Board (Mrs. Sylvia Root), and a representative from each school: the schools to be responsible for selecting and preparing the delegates—the Leagues for doing all the mechanics—and the State Board for assisting in any way particularly with reference materials and publicity. Now the schools are so enthusiastic that they have assumed the chairmanship of the steering committee.

As many students as volunteer will take part but there will be only 116 acting as delegates, two from each of the fifty-eight Senatorial Districts. The League has assigned districts to each school so that, as nearly as possible, each school will represent both Cook County and Downstate. The two delegates from each district will actually play the role of each particula district; they are writing to the senators and representatives, to newspapers, and to business men to learn their views. Each school will be responsible for presenting proposals for amendment for two articles; every article will have four schools presenting proposals. The League will appoint a professional parliamentarian and provide someone with skill in constitutional law to help draft such final proposals as the convention may adopt. The League also will provide kits, credentials, pages, typists, a reference library at the convention, make all arrangements for meals and help with transportation.

A major problem has been that of finance. Money will be needed for printing materials, folders, badges, etc. and for meals for delegates, faculty personnel and special guests—observers must buy their own meals. The Highland Park High School is donating its building and any of its facilities that may be needed such as extra rooms, use of the cafeteria and parking space. Estimated cost to be underwritten by the League is \$700.00 and each League has agreed to secure \$50.00 either from its regular budget or from special gifts. Such gifts may be made to the Citizen Information Service and designated for this purpose and then become tax deductible for the donor.

CONFIDENCE IN LAKE COUNTY ZONING

The concept of planning has not really flowered in the county as it has in the municipalities. A fear of losing individual property rights over-shadows the greater realization that a plan awards the rights of many. It is not for one farm but for all farms, not for one stream but for all whole water-shed, for highways and parks and suburbs set in green-a plan for a living county growing from core to periphery with balance and beauty and serenity.

The present Lake County Zoning Ordinance dates back to 1939 and has been amended seven times. In 1957 a Regional Plan Commission was established, and a professional director with

staff located in Waukegan shortly afterward.

A Land Use Plan covering areas outside municipalities and projected ahead for approximately twenty-five years was presented and approved by the County Board of Supervisors in April, 1961. This map was to be used as a base and guide for revision of the County Zoning Ordinance,

The Lake County Regional Plan Commission is composed of the Chairman of the Zoning Committee of the County Board (Kenneth Henke, Benton Township); Superintendent of the Map Department (G. M. Dixon, Gurnee); and seven other persons chosen from the county at large and appointed for four year terms:

Edward H. Bennett, Chairman, Lake Forest John R. Quay, Vice Chairman, Lake Zurich Elbert E. Elsbury, Secretary, Gurnee Nelson Forest, Barrington Louis H. Kahn, Highland Park Paul Serdar, Wadsworth

A proposed new ordinance was first presented at public hearings from January 14th to February 15th, 1963. Our League received three copies of the text with maps and studied it detail. At 18 of the 21 hearings, we had a representative. A letter was printed in the Waukegan News Sun, and a speech was given at a General Text hearing on Man's responsibility not to use the land for the comfort, convenience, profit and pleasure of only one generation.

A special workshop presented the zoning story, and the consensus was that the Lake Forest League could support the concept of zoning, under the agenda item adopted last April.

To do this, we could express confidence in the Regional Plan Commission and appreciation of its intent to perfect an ordinance in accord with the best interests of the whole county, taking into account individual objections where they are justified.

This proposal will be presented to the Lake Forest League at the Marth 4th meeting.

The Official Map is a part of the ordinances specifying the regulations of the community with regard to streets, alleys, public ways, parks, playgrounds, school sites and other public grounds. The Official Map is a regulatory ordinance, the Official Plan is only advisory. Section 11-12-8 of the 1961 Municipal Planning Act provides that whenever a plat of subdivision is approved and there is designated therein on the Official Map a school site, park site or other public land, the corporate authorities shall acquire, or commence proceedings to acquire such land within one year from the date of approval of the plat.

Inose attending the workshop March 5th proposed that the League urge the Plan Commission to recommend to the City Council the adoption of an Official Map implementing the proposals of the Official Plan. We will discuss this further at our Annual Meeting.

VIEWS OF OUR STATE LEGISLATORS

Leagues in the 52nd Senatorial and 31st Representative Districts interviewed our legislaters seeking their views on areas of State League Program and their own particular interests. A summary of these interviews follows:

Senator Robert Coulson (R) Waukegan

Constitutional revision could always start with revenue; also favors annual sessions of the Legislature, the removal of constitutional restrictions on supply allowance, and the deletion of unnecessary details. Thinks delegate selection should be changed before calling a convention; has no favored formula. Would support a Constitutional Revision Commission. Feels election administration should be responsibility of the Parties. Questions whether State has drastic financial problem; could fill loop-holes, better enforcement; curtail expenses. Foresees some struggle for partisan advantage in reapportionment. Interested in expanding exemptions in property tax (homesteads), and re-enforcing authority of the Lake County Safety Council.

Representative Jack Bairstow (D) Waukegan

Has introduced HJR-13 to amend constitution to provide that delegates to a constitutional convention be selected on a basis of 3 from each Congressional District, with cumulative voting. Would not support a convention or commission at this session. Agrees with report of Election Laws Commission. Had not read Revenue Commission report. Foresees no problem in reapportionment. Interested in implementation of Judicial Amendment.

Representative John H. Conolly (R) Gurnee

Revenue Article main area of constitution in need of change. Many economies can be effected under present system. Opposed to flat-rate income tax. Would vote for constitutional convention. Feels activities of other groups (LWV and Bar Associations) make appropriation for Revision Commission unnecessary. Feels election authority should remain at county level. Reapportionment problems in districts losing seats.

Representative W. J. Murphy (R) Antioch - Majority Leader

Would hold line on Revenue, plug loop-holes, better enforcement, Reapportionment problem for those losing jobs. Selection of delegates constitutional convention stumbling block. Revision Commission waste of money unless set up with Concon. Remove obsolete items from Revenue Article. Favors shortening ballot. Interim sessions on Budget. More authority to Secretary of State for uniformity of election administration. Implementing Judicial Amendment big job this session. Interested in authorizing counties to set up a county-wide school district for handicapped children.

CONSERVATION COMMENTS

(For your information, only)

LAKE COUNTY FOREST PRESERVE: A \$1,000,000 Bond issue has been approved for the purchase of more land. On May 7, 1963, a new Committee, Land Development, was appointed. The president of the Forest Preserve Commissioners, Taisto Aho, of Waukegan, announced a plan for considerable advancement in land acquisition in 1963. The recently reorganized Committee of the Leagues of Women Voters of Lake County is issuing a statement commending the Commissioners for this policy. In view of our local agenda item, the Lake Forest League will want to watch these proposed steps.

SOIL CONSERVATION STUDIES IN LAKE COUNTY: The Zoning Committee of Lake County has worked with the U.S. Soil Conservation Service to map Warren, Lake Villa, and portions of Avon townships this summer. In these areas information will be obtained for planning and zoning decisions, and soil types adjacent to the Des Plaines River can be studied in correlation with the Flood Hazard Mapping Program.

ILLINOIS NATURE PRESERVES BILL: Senate Bill 579 is sponsored by Senator Robert R. Canfield. It seeks to establish a nature preserve system under a commission and to provide for safeguards of areas dedicated as nature preserves.

WILDERNESS BILL: The U.S. Senate has approved this bill, as it did in 1961, when it was then bottled up in the House Interior Committee. It proposes to set up a new preserve system with 6.8 million acres of National Forest and authorizes the President to add as much as 54 million acres more in the next ten years. Congressman Wayne Aspinall (D. Golorado) is Chairman of the House Committee and opposes the bill.

An article in the March, 1963, Atlantic Monthly, discussed CANYONLANDS in Utah and the conflict of principle on national parks. Land requirements for the exploding population, withdrawing of acres from the local economy, and secondary uses such as mining, grazing, and hunting; these are balanced against the conservationist concern that man shall not alter everything be touches, and that the integrity of the park system shall not be threatened.

1962-63 IN REVIEW

Voters Service

Voters Service has this year primarily concerned itself with providing the community with election, registration and candidate information through various media. In July the Lake Forest League was host to 99 newly naturalized citizens at the Court House in Waukegan, serving them coffee and assisting them to register.

A candidates' meeting of State Representatives and county candidates was held in October followed by information on all the contestants in the Lake Forester. A unique situation arose in connection with this meeting when the Republican Party announced that their candidates would not appear opposite the Democratic Party candidates in any discussion or debate. The League has in the past—as a part of its non-partisan policy—presented all aspirants for a specific office with no consideration for party alignment. Since there was a question as to whether we could present a meeting any other way and not violate our non-partisan policy, these facts were brought up for consideration at the League regional meeting with the State President and Voters Service chairman participating in the discussion. It was the consensus of this group that the final decision on a candidates' meeting was up to our local League, but that in the future we should give some thought to other ways in which Voters Service could serve the community. Although the other Leagues in the County cancelled similar plans, we proceeded with our candidates meeting, complying with the Republicans' ruling by presenting all candidates of one party first and then the candidates of the other party.

In December a meeting was held at which Mr. William Douglas, City Manager, explained the operation of our city government, and Mr. W. Paul McBride, President of the Caucus, clarified the procedures by which the appointed and elected officials of the city are nominated.

For the first time in many years there was a contest for alderman in the fourth ward. It was the decision of your Board not to sponsor a candidates' meeting involving only one of the city's four wards. An extensive telephone campaign reminded voters to participate in both the city and township elections.

The League believes that the voter must vote, his vote should be an informed one, and that the citizen should participate in government. The latter objective is carried out by the program in which the members collectively study, discuss, and arrive at a position leading to governmental action. The other half of the League's purpose is fulfilled by Voters Service; an impartial non-partisan presentation of the facts of registration, voting procedures, and

information on candidates. The question remains, in view of the increased activity in partisansponsored candidates' meetings in our area, whether our League could serve the community better by diverting its energies into other Voters Service activities.

Membership

In our 1962-63 year the number of new members of the Lake Forest League was 25, the number of those not renewing, 16. Six "bring-a-sandwich" luncheons were held during the year at members' homes with old members as well as prospective members invited. One luncheon was opened to the general membership as well. Attendance averaged 20 or more.

Interest questionnaires were presented to new members and distributed at meetings and were also mailed to all members. New members also received various publications to further acquaint them with the League.

We were invited to present our "Membership Success Story" this year at the State Convention.

Local Current Agenda 1: Support for continued Lake County planning with emphasis on zoning and conservation of natural resources.

Under this item and CR. 3 "Support for the implementation of the land use policy adopted by the Lake County Board of Supervisors," a workshop October 29, 1962, covered the proposed County Zoning Ordinance as it would be presented in open hearings to start in January. The Lake Forest League arranged to have the text with map sent to all the Leagues in the County and to two additional members of its own League. The committee had representatives at 18 of the 21 zoning hearings which ran from January 14 to February 15. Cards were sent to all members living in the unincorporated areas (the jurisdiction of the ordinance) and to other concerned citizens, informing them of specific hearing dates. Our Bulletin also contained dates and locations of the Township hearings.

At the General Text hearing in Waukegan the Chairman spoke, as an individual, on man's responsibility to use the land not for the comfort, profit, convenience and pleasure of only one generation. A letter on similar themes was printed by the Waukegan News-Sun on the following day, and the paper wrote an individual letter thanking the author and hoping she would write again. A second letter by another League member was submitted, it discussed the inevitable by-products of weak zoning and the benefit of a plan for the best interests of the whole county.

On February 14 a special workshop summarized the hearings by members who had attended, and arrived at a consensus of support for the Lake County Regional Planning Commission.

The March Bulletin presented the developments in the field of zoning and listed the Supervisors in the Townships where the League has members (there are seven of these, and they elect 16 of the 37 members of the Board of Supervisors). At the March 4th membership meeting a review was presented and a motion was made that the Lake Forest League express public confidence in the Lake County Regional Planning Commission as well as appreciation of its intent to alter the Zoning Ordinance in accord with the best interests of the whole county, taking into account individual hardships where justified. This motion was approved and a copy of it was sent to all newspapers in Lake County and to the 16 Supervisors representing the Lake Forest League who met on March 8th.

Local Current Agenda 2: Evaluation of the City Plan, Zoning Ordinance and Building Code, with support for needed changes and protection of the taxpayer.

During the spring and summer of 1962 the League continued study undertaken earlier on the need for apartments in the city of Lake Forest, and an evaluation of a proposed amendment to our Zoning Ordinance permitting apartments in the Office and Service areas. Committee members attended hearings of the Plan Commission to seek clarification of the proposed amendment. In July a special membership meeting was called at which we compared the proposed amendment with present regulations regarding apartments, and reviewed our earlier survey of the need for the type of apartment which the present regulations, or the proposed amendment, would permit. As a result, we decided to urge the Plan Commission to recommend no change in the Zoning Ordinance until a more extensive survey could be made of the need for apartments, and particularly what kinds of apartments were desirable for Lake Forest. Committee members so testified at subsequent Plan Commission hearings. League members were also urged to write their own Aldermen expressing our position. The Plan Commission submitted the proposed amendment to the City Council which voted it down in September.

Local Continuing Responsibility No. 4: Publication of the handbook, "Facts for Lake

The 1963 edition of the handbook was published and mailed to everyone on the City's water list. Extra copies were distributed through City Hall and the real estate offices for those who did not get them by mail. The Welcome Wagon received a supply for new residents, and both the College and High School received several copies for the use of the faculty and students. Seventy-three merchants assisted the publication by taking advertisements.

Local Continuing Responsibility No. 5: Support of adequate public education for Lake Forest.

As a result of the series of workshops conducted last year when we studied public education in Lake Forest, our League voted at the Annual Meeting in April 1962 to support an educational tax increase referendum for the Lake Forest High School and at the same time endorsed an anticipated raise in the educational tax rate for the elementary schools. Our League representative continued regular attendance at the elementary school board meetings and when the expected tax increase referendum was announced the League was prepared to support it. Members of the League were invited by the Board of Education to a special briefing session. In support, phone calls were made around the community, and the president of the League wrote a "letter to the editor" of the local newspaper. Both referenda were passed—the one for the High School on May 26, 1962, and the one for the elementary schools on February 16, 1963.

Local Continuing Responsibility No. 6: Continued support of improved county health services.

On October 29 a workshop report covered the past year's activities of the Health Department, with emphasis on sewage control actions. The Lakes and Streams Survey, 1962, a publication of the County Health Department, was made available to committee members, as was the Consoer-Townsend Report on County Water. The flood hazard maps prepared by the U.S. Geological Survey were consulted also. In the summer and fall interviews were their with the County Sanitarian and pollution of the Des Plaines River was discussed in detail. In cooperation with some interested citizens and the Chicago Academy of Sciences, a movie was prepared to show polluted parts of the Des Plaines River. Sites to be photographed were selected by League members. This film was shown at the Chicago Academy on April 7, and to a group of Supervisors and interested citizens on May 12. On June 3, Dr. Eugene S. Richardson, Jr., of the Chicago Natural History Museum, spoke to the membership on the secology of the Des Plaines River and its current situation.

State Current Agenda: Work for a convention to provide an improved constitution for Illinois.

Further to create public awareness of the need for a convention to accomplish thorough revision of our 1870 constitution, the State Board last year authorized the Highland Park League to take the initiative in organizing a mock convention to be held by High School students in the North Shore suburban area. Nine schools (including our own) and fourteen Leagues participated. The civics and social studies faculty of the schools selected and prepared the 116 delegates. The Leagues were in charge of the mechanics and provided materials. The convention was in the hands of the students themselves. They elected their chairman, set up committees, adopted rules, and drafted proposals for constitutional revisions. The

convention was held March 15th and l6th at the Highland Park High School, and was deemed so successful that this coming year the Niles Township Schools and the Skokie League are planning another. Your League and High School have been asked to participate again.

State Continuing Responsibilities

The major effort of the League in the field of continuing responsibilities was directed in the summer and fall of 1962 to passage of the Judicial Amendment. We met a number of times with members of the Lake County Bar Association and other Leagues in the County to make plans for organizing Citizens Committees for Modern Courts, and to pool our resources for a speakers' bureau. In July our Co-Chairman, Mrs. Frank Zillmer, set up and decorated a booth at the County Fair. This booth was manned during the five days of the Fair by the six Leagues in the County. In September we had a table at the Deer Path Art League's festival in Market Square where we distributed literature and balloons. A Lake Bluff-Lake Forest Citizens Committee for Modern Courts was organized under the chairmanship of Mr. Elliott Donnelley who wrote an excellent letter to the editor of the Lake Forester on behalf of the Committee. Together with the Lake Bluff League we sent speakers to other organizations in the vicinity having meetings in September and October. Members of our committee spoke to the Business and Professional Woman's Club of Libertyville, the Lake Forest American Legion and American Legion Auxiliary, the Lake Forest Woman's Club, and a PTA in North Chicago. The Lake Forest Girl Scouts handed out fliers at the Northwestern Station and at grocery stores on election eye, and on election day members of the committee handed out reminders to voters at three polling places in North Chicago.

The successful conclusion of the League's long struggle for judicial reform was thanks in large measure to the able and energetic assistance of the committee: Mrs. Gordon Bina, Mrs. Kenneth O. Birney, Mrs. Granger Brown, Mrs. John C. Christie, Mrs. Graham Ely, Mrs. Charles Hummer, Mrs. Rhoades V. Newbell, Mrs. Alvin J. Schiffmann, and Co-Chairman Mrs. Frank Zillmer.

A general review of the other six Continuing Responsibilities was presented at the mock convention we held in January to formulate our proposals for the new State program. With Mrs. Charles H. Brown, one of our former presidents, presiding, we re-examined our positions on Revenue, Election Laws, Givil Liberties, Apportionment, Education and Personnel Administration. Assisting in conducting the review were Mrs. Douglas Blossom, Mrs. Francis Beidler, Miss Julia Mae Hamilton, Mrs. William G. Cole and Mrs. Graham Ely. We voted to propose that the State Convention retain all but Personnel Administration. We felt that it had been so long since this item had been studied that a thorough re-examination of the subject would be necessary for the League to determine the criteria for improved personnel administration in government service under present day conditions.

National Current Agenda No. 1: Continued support of the United Nations system and an evaluation of means to strengthen that system under present day conditions.

In September 1962, under the chairmanship of Mrs. George F. Tittmann, the committee met to plan ways of increasing awareness of the functions of the United Nations, in the community. On United Nations Day (October 24th) a film was shown to all 5th and 6th grade students at the Gorton School. A special display was set up in the Library for two weeks around this day in addition to our permanent shelf of U.N. publications. Other displays were put up on the bulletin boards in the public schools. We assisted church groups in collecting contributions for the U.N. Children's Fund on Halloween, and made UNESCO Christmas cards available to the general public. A League workshop was conducted discussing the new Facts & Issues pamphlets on the United Nations: The Changing Scene; Who Cares for Peace?; and Dollar Doldrums.

In March of 1963, after Mrs. Tittmann had moved away, we received a Time for Action from the State Board to oppose a bill in the General Assembly which would prohibit the flying of the UN flag on public buildings. At least thirty members were contacted to write our legislators, and happily the bill was defeated. At the Annual Meeting April 1st, Mr. Donald M. Schwartz, staff correspondent for the Chicago Sun-Times, gave us a most classic discourse on "The Real United Nations,"

National Current Agenda No. 2: Continued support of U.S. policies to promote world economic development and an evaluation of opportunities to expand regional cooperation.

In 1962-63, the foreign policy committee made a thorough study of conditions in Latin America and the program for their amelioration. Mr. George Blanksten, Associate Professor of Political Science at Northwestern University and a recognized authority on Latin America, spoke at the February membership meeting on the Alliance for Progress. addition there were three workshops at which members studied the geographical, political and economic background of Latin America and made an evaluation of the Alliance for Progress,

The Lake Forest League continues to support the general principles and aims of the Alliance. The attainment of its goals of improved economic conditions through self-help and external aid are of vital importance to the United States. While we should not be unduly discouraged by the apparent lack of progress todate, in the future the program should: (1) be presented to Latin Americans not as one of foreign assistance, but as a great program of national self-improvement; (2) place more emphasis on the internal reform to be accomplished by Latin American governments, and the necessity for Latin American capital being invested productively at home; (3) give more thought to the role of private investment and the development of conditions and policies which will attract rather than discourage it.

HUMAN RELATIONS

Last July, Mrs. Phillips, National President, sent a letter asking local Leagues to consider what they might do to be of service to their communities in the current "crisis in human relations." Since the League, nationally, has not had an agenda item in this field, and hence has no consensus, it has no position and can not take legislative action at this time.

Local Lesgues, however, have more leeway in the choice of methods of dealing with community problems: League members are trained to provide a forum for dispassionate discussion of issues; traditionally the League is a fact finding organization; its Voters Service program seeks to educate all citizens to assume political responsibility; it urges its members to take individual action consistent with their convictions. Also, local Leagues can more easily expand their program to meet changing conditions and respond to the needs of the community. In this respect a letter from Mrs. Levin, State President, urged Leagues can more mainty the procedures and criteria by which they adopt their program for study, consensus and

ince our League has no item in this field, and as the problem involves careful consideration of the League's value to the community, a conference of former presidents (Mrs. Frank P. Hixon, Mrs. George W. Blossom, Jr., Mrs. Francis Beidler, Mrs. Charles H. Brown, Mrs. Edwin W. Winter, Mrs. John C. Christie, Mrs. Granger Brown, Miss Julia Mae Hamilton) was called to suggest how the Lake Forest League might best proceed. It was suggested the

wisest approach would be to extend the services of the League to minority groups, as members, through Voters Service channels, to approach representatives of these groups to determine what problems exist and where.

To accomplish this end the Board, at its December meeting, decided to form an ad hoc committee to investigate the local situation on civil rights, study action taken in other communities, obtain reading material, and request from Rep. Robt. McClory the text of the proposed Civil Rights Bill. It would also consider whether there is a need to adopt such a local item, always guided by the basic League principles: 7] Legal protection of citizens in their right to vote; 8) A system of free public education which provides equal opportunity for all; 9) Protection of minority groups against discrimination; 13] Responsibility of government to share in the solution of social and economic problems which affect the general welfare. Meanwhile, as individuals, we can be made aware of a governmental situation contrary to these principles. A bill bottled up in committee, as is the Civil Rights Bill in the House Rules Committee (Chairman, Rep. Howard Smith, Virginia) is not democratic government.

VOTERS' SERVICE

YOUR VOTE MAKES A DIFFERENCE. In order to vote in the primary election on April 14, you must be registered by March 16. After that, and until October 5, you may register in order to vote in the general election on November 3.

You are qualified to register if you are an American citizen and will have lived in Illinois for one year, in Lake County for 90 days, in your precinct for 30 days, and will be 21 years of age

or older by election day.

You must register if: 1) you have never voted before; 2) you have changed your name (by marriage or court order) since you last voted-except that a change of address is the only requirement if you have moved within the county. The city election will be held on April 14, also. You do not need to be a registered voter in order to vote for city officials, but the voter requirements are the same as those for registration.

To register you must apply in person to the registrar in the Shields Township office at 777 N. Bank Lane or to the County Court House in Waukegan. The Township office is open from 9 to 12 Monday through Saturday, and from 1 to 4:30 Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday.

NEW CITIZENS' RECEPTION

On Thursday, March 12, our League was privileged to welcome 55 new citizens residing in Lake County on their naturalization day at the Court House in Waukegan. While other speakers stressed the importance of being an American, our spokesman, Mrs. George W. Oliver, emphasized the importance of using their newly-acquired right to vote-and making it an informed vote, offering the services of the League of Women Voters as a source of non-partisan information.

After the ceremony in the Court Room, the new citizens were escorted to the Registration Office by Mrs. Bina and Mrs. Bazeley, while Mrs. Beidler extended them a welcoming hand at the coffee table. A booklet, "Primer for Americans," was given out to all new citizens, and those living in towns where there are Leagues also received voting and governmental infortion pertinent to their locality.

The Voters' Service Committee felt this a very worth-while and interesting activity and recominends continued support of this program, which is administered by the Waukegan League. Present Budget

LWV TWENTY-SIXTH NATIONAL CONVENTION

Mrs. Gordon Adamson and Mrs. Eugene S. Richardson, Jr., were Lake Forrest's delegates, among 1, 200 over the nation, at the National Convention held April 20-24 in Pittsburgh. Mrs. Frank P. Hixon attended as a special guest. Illinois had a total of 112 delegates. Of these, as well as the national delegation as a whole, the majority were attending a national convention for the first time.

The Equality of Opportunity item was debated seriously, and the inclusion of housing was strongly urged. However, the National Board had suggested education and employment actionsely interrelated, and the first aspects to be studied. Southern Leagues urged that the title be changed to "Development of Human Resources" for smoother public relations. The National Board's recommendation was finally carried, with the amended title.

A study of Congressional Operations had strong support. Many delegates were aware that Congress did not always truly respond to the people, and that issues were often drastically delayed or diluted. This non-recommended item required 60% of the vote, but received only a majority.

The United Nations and Foreign Economic Policy items were retained for "high visibility" in the community, although many Leagues hesitated to adopt four Current Agenda items. The Water Resources item was suggested because of the great activity in the field, and it was voted as the fourth Current Agenda item.

A fillip was given on Thursday when President Johnson notified the Convention that he would like to attend Friday morning. Lady Jackson (Barbara Ward) had spoken dramatically at the banquet the night before.

LWV NATIONAL CURRENT AGENDA:

- Development of Human Resources: Evaluation of U.S. policies and programs to provide for all citizens equality of opportunity for education and employment.
- United Nations: Support of U.S. policies to strengthen the U.N. system and its ability to keep the peace.
- Foreign Economic Policy: Support of U.S. policies which promote world economic development, maintain a sound U.S. economy, and further international and regional cooperation.
- Water Resources: Support of national policies and procedures which promote comprehensive long-range planning for conservation and development of water resources.

CONTINUING RESPONSIBILITIES: Support of self-government for the District of Columbia; opposition to constitutional limitation on tax rates; and, opposition to limiting the treaty making powers of the Executive and Congress, were retained. The Convention also voted to retain the League's position on the Federal Loyalty-Security programs as a Continuing Responsibility.

Consensus Report

Mrs. William Frost, Chairman of the Welfare item on our agenda, after a general meeting and several workshops, has made her recommendations to State and to our membership with these highlights. As to the Child in Relation to the Court: The group favored a Juvenile Court System with basic guarantees to both child and parent, with emphase son rehabilitation for the child, and perhaps punitive measures for guilty parents; legal services for both parent and child; a State program for training of personnel to raise the efficiency, and later, salaries; a County program of probation services with State Aid; a Study of an adoption program for dependent children. With regard to the Child and its Relation to present protective services: A non-law enforcing agency should make the initial investigation; a report should be required by law from doctors, dentists and bospitals; the general public should be educated to report cases of the "battered" child. And finally, a study should be made of the Rights of Children who are left for years by their parents in institutions with little chance of returning to a decent home and no chance of being placed in another home.

- * Mrs. Robert Steamer will present a Summary of the League's position on our current State Continuing Responsibilities. They are as follows:
 - 1. To work for a Constitutional Convention.
 - Support of a broad revenue article including opposition to a prohibition of income tax and permitting classification of property; under the present revenue article support of: a corporation tax based on income; a broadening of the sales tax base without any increase in the rate; more uniform property assessment.
 - Continued interest in the implementation of the new judicial article.
 Election laws: clarify and improve procedures, establish a central
 - authority, require certification of judges, short ballot, protect permanent registration.

Civil liberties: opposition to negative loyalty oaths and textbook censorship; continued support of the Fair Employment Practices Law.

At this January Meeting we will be making recommendations for the state program for 1965-67. In determining these, we must also think of the kind of program structure the Lake Forest League would like to recommend. At present, the program is divided into Current Agenda items (CA*s), which are those which the State Convention chooses for study and concerted action, and Continuing Responsibilities (CR*s), which are items that the League has studied and reached a position on in the past and on which it may wish to continue to act.

A Committee of the State Board has been studying this program structure for the past year and now recommends that CA's and CR's be combined into a single list. The Committee feels that this would simplify program structure, eliminate confusing League terminology and permit study, consensus and action in new areas of old problems.

Under the proposed single list, all items would be voted as CA's and each League would suggest not only the items they want, but would define exactly the amount and kind of attention intended for each item. While some items would receive more concentrated attention than others, all would need to be studied some time during the year, - thus demanding more womanpower.

Please think about whether you prefer a single list or the old CA's and CR's, and be ready to express your views at the January meeting. Also look at the Lively Issues article in the Nov.-Dec. Illinois Voter for suggestions for new areas of study. (N. B. Please bring this Bulletin for reference on January 11).

The National Interim Council meeting May 4-7, with 111 delegates from 49 states voted (84 to 24) to add this item to our agenda.

Brooke Graves' "American State Government," This gives a very lucid discussion of the several ways of nominating candidates.

With fewer membership meetings we will sacrifice broad coverage of League program, but will seek greater involvement of all League members in study and consensus on the most pressing issues. Above all, and as always, we will seek excellence, so all of our precious and scant time will be spent on fruitful research and debate.

When faced with an executive crisis this year, we again decided to try to switch from prop to jet. Instead of one president we have three, or a triumvirate (Names top of title page). These three will replace, experimentally for this year, the former arrangement of a president and two vice-presidents.

As members of this jet-propelled society we hope ALL LEAGUE MEMBERS will streamline their activities, so they can telescope a 25th hour for the League into the 24, FOR IT IS ONLY THROUGH CITIZENS DEDICATED TO INFORMED PARTICIPATION IN GOVERNMENT THAT THIS SOCIETY CAN REMAIN FREE AND DEMOCRATIC.

It was demonstrated that the League always strives for an objective view of eissues in the public interest - the ideal of the democratic process. NATIONAL PROGRAM

December 1965

Following are the proposals for the 1966-68 National Program which the League of Women Voters of Lake Forest voted, at its meeting on November 22nd, to send to the National Board. Our recommendations will be considered, along with those of local and state leagues throughout the nation for final adoption at the convention in Denver in May.

CURRENT AGENDA

 DEVELOPMENT OF HUMAN RESOURCES: EVALUATION OF POLICIES AND PRO-GRAMS IN THE UNITED STATES TO PROVIDE FOR ALL PERSONS EQUALITY OF OPPORTUNITY FOR EDUCATION.

Since 1964 Leagues have been studying the opportunities for equal education and employment. The recommendation to reduce the scope of the item stems from the feeling of the committee through discussion at workshops that education is the foundation for greater equality of opportunity in other fields especially including employment. The group felt that emphasis on the programs to ensure this first basic step would give the Human Resources item a more manageable focus.

UNITED NATIONS: SUPPORT OF U.S. POLICIES WHICH STRENGTHEN THE UNITED NATIONS SYSTEM AND ITS ABILITY TO KEEP THE PEACE, INCLUDING GREATER PUBLIC RECOGNITION OF ITS AGENCIES WHICH BUILD THE PEACE.

This recommendation is an expansion of the UN item in the field of public relations and community action. In the public view there is so much emphasis on the United Nations' role in keeping the peace. There seems so little knowledge of the functions of the United Nations and its agencies which build peace through cooperation. The group felt that such expansion of the item was timely and one in the field of public education which the League is particularly well equipped to do.

3. STUDY OF THE EFFECTS OF WORLD POPULATION GROWTH LEADING TO AN EVENTUAL POSITION ON DESIRABLE METHODS OF ITS CONTROL.

There is an increasing awareness that efforts to raise the living standards in the less developed areas of the world are being seriously hampered by the population explosion. What is being done to meet this problem nationally or internationally? The subject will continue to be a "lively issue" to which, it was felt, the League should give some attention.

 EVALUATION OF REGIONAL ORGANIZATIONS FOR PEACE KEEPING AND PEACE BUILDING.

This would be a study to discover the nature, purpose and functions of organizations such as OAS, OAU, NATO, SEATO, etc., and how they can effectively relate to the work of the United Nations.

 SUPPORT OF NATIONAL POLICIES AND PROCEDURES WHICH PROMOTE COM-PREHENSIVE LONG-RANGE PLANNING FOR CONSERVATION OF NATURAL RE-SOURCES WITH EMPHASIS ON WATER RESOURCES.

It is recommended to retain our interest and support for sound planning to cor serve our water resources, but also to include in this item similar criteria for preservation of open space, parks, nature centers and other natural resources contributing to an attractive and healthful national environment.

 APPORTIONMENT OF STATE LEGISLATURES: EVALUATION OF THE BASIS OF REPRESENTATION WHICH SHALL GOVERN THE APPORTIONMENT OF STATE LEGISLATURES AS ESTABLISHED BY THE FEDERAL CONSTITUTION AND STAT-UTORY PROVISION.

Mrs. Beidler reported for her group that the majority felt that population should be the basis of apportionment. There was however a minority which was in favor of a constitutional amendment to permit state legislatures to follow a "little federal system." The question was whether agreement would be reached on the national level by convention time. If this were the case we would recommend that Legislative Apportionment become a Continuing Responsibility.

CONTINUING RESPONSIBILITIES

- District of Columbia: Support of self-government and representation in Congress for citizens of the District of Columbia.
- Loyalty-Security: Support of standardized procedures, "common sense"judgment, and greatest possible protection for the individual under the federal loyalty-security programs; opposition to extension of such programs to nonsensitive positions.
- Foreign Economic Policy: Support of U.S. policies which promote world economic development, maintain a sound U.S. economy, and further international and regional cooperation.

Almost two years ago the League undertook a study to understand the causes of and explore solutions to the problem of why many in our nation do not enjoy equal opportunities for education and employment. CITY BEAUTIFICATION (background)

In 1962 there was a proposal before the Plan Commission to amend our Zoning Ordinance to permit the building of apartments in the Service and Office Districts without the necessity of having them over a commercial floor. The proposal came at the request of a building firm to construct apartments at the northeast corner of Woodview Acres at the northern end of Western Avenue. Under our then Currenta Agenda item on zoning the League met with the builders and discussed the size and price of the units proposed. We were told that they met a pressing need for housing for city and school employees. We surveyed these sources and also the requests for apartments addressed to our realtors. We found virtually no demand for apartments of this size and price. We turned over our findings to the Plan Commission for whatever use they cared to make of it. Subsequently, after further study and discussion, we made a more formal statement to the Plan Commission requesting that they recommend no change in our present ordinance relating to apartments at this time. We suggested that a survey be made to determine the need for apartments and/or the kinds of apartments (size, price, location) in the light of the City's relation to surrounding communities and as a part of the whole metropolitan area.

The City Council voted not to amend the Ordinance at that time, and requested that the Plan Commission make a further study of the matter. This Commission is currently considering a proposal that the S-1 and O-1 districts of the Zoning Ordinance be amended to permit apartments.

The question of whether the League should take a position will be discussed at the January 17th Workshop.

INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS WORKSHOPS

The workshops on the 24th and 31st of January are designed to review and bring us up to date on various aspects of our foreign policy leading to the current world situation and the developments in regional and international cooperation, including the accomplishments of the 20th session of the United Nations. These discussions will lead up to a general membership meeting planned for February.

Next fall we, as citizens of Illinois, will have an opportunity to vote approval or disapproval of a proposed Revenue Article as an amendment to the state constitution. As many of you know, the Illinois tax structure has been under scrutiny by the Leagues in this state for many years. In 1960 the Leagues reached consensus to "support a new Revenue Article giving the legislature broad power to levy the taxes needed to provide an equitable and flexible tax structure." At that time our minimum requirements were:

a) opposition to any constitutional prohibition of a corporation or individual income tax; and b) support of classification of real and personal property.

Your Revenue Committee in three workshops (Feb. 21, 28 and Mar. 7) will try to bring us to a fresh, up-tc-date, consensus. We will consider the philosophy of taxation, the effectiveness of taxes and the efficiency of their administration; property taxes; sales and income taxes. In short, what constitutes an equitable and flexible tax structure? We will also discuss the provisions of the proposed amendment. The State Board needs to know whether to support, oppose, or take no position on the new Revenue Article. Please come and make vour views known.

APPORTIONMENT OF STATE LEGISLATURES

On January 12, 1966 the National Board released a statement of position on Apportionment of State Legislatures which reads, in part, as follows:

The memorandum covering the statement said that an exceptionally large number of Leagues had reported to the national office, and that the consensus in favor of apportioning both houses of state legislatures on population was solid and widespread. There was no indication of a rural-urban or geographic split within the League; rather, the pattern of reporting reflects a truly nationwide consensus. The report from the Illinois Board says that the National Statement is a very accurate reflection of the League opinion in Illinois. The consensus clearly represented the overwhelming number of Leagues and League members throughout the state. There was no regional split.

Your League was one of those reporting in favor of legislative apportionment on the basis of population and opposing a constitutional amendment. Now is the Time for Action, to write our Senators: Everett McK. Dirksen and Paul W. Douglas (Senate Office Building, Washington, 25, D. C.) and Congressman Robert McClory (House Office Building, Washington, 25, D. C.) to let them know the views of their constituents.

LOCAL PROGRAM

The time has rolled around again for us to consider the local governmental matters to which we wish to give our sustained attention in the year ahead (1966-67). Basically, the prestige of the League of Women Voters, locally or nationally, rests upon the service which each League provides to its community. A great part of this service consists of the local program which we adopt at each annual meeting. What items will give us most valuable experience in citizen action? What issues are most timely? The League is only the sum of its individual members. It is they who must do the planning as well as the performing. Your Board needs your ideas. Please call any Board member with your suggestions by February 14th.





Throughout the summer the Plan Commission of the City of Lake Forest will hold open meetings, on the fourth Monday of each month, to which the public is invited to hear and discuss certain programs under consideration by the Commission. Currently on the agenda is a proposal to engage a consultant firm: Barton-Aschman Associates; to make a survey of the roads and streets needs of the City. Of particular interest is a proposed analysis of the origin and destination of traffic through and around the city (north-south and east-west) to aid the Plan Commission to determine what new roads should be built or which should be widened. Such a survey will also help toward a study of what county or state funds might be available for any future projects. The firm will report its findings on about five successive occasions.

VOTOMATIC VOTING:

For the first time on June 14th the citizens of Lake County will be using IBM Votomatic Recorders instead of paper ballots. SUPPORT OF ZONING IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE LAKE FOREST CITY PLAN:

The League of Women Voters of Lake Forest urges the Plan Commission and the City Council to deny the petition of the developers of Elmwood Farm, in the southwest sector of the City of Lake Forest, to downgrade the zoning requirements from three-acre lots to one-and-a-half-acre lots.

During and since the adoption of the Official Plan of the City of Lake Forest by the City Council in 1955, the League of Women Voters has consistently supported its provisions. These provide that since part of this property includes one of our two major drainage channels, "it is not too desirable for residential development and the preservation of these elongated park areas would be of much future value to the city. (They) should be primarily maintained in their natural condition..." The Official Plan further recommends that: "Because of the liberal provisions made in the amended zoning it is important that a minimum number of changes be made in the future. One of the most effective means of preserving a community's character and in bringing about a sound type of development is the consistent maintenance of sound zoning requirements."

At the State Convention of the League in 1965 we voted support and improvement of welfare services to children and their families. Since that time we have worked for the modernization of the Juvenile Court Act and legislation requiring mandatory reporting of physical abuse to children. In the course of our study we have become aware that there is much more to be learned. What has been accomplished by the new Department of Children's and Family's Services? WHO PAYS FOR A CLEAN STREAM?

Federal grants-in-aid help local governments plan and install waste water collection and treatment systems. But what about industrial wastes? There are 7720 manufacturing establishments using an average of 160 billion gallons of water daily. Yet only 20 percent of this volume receives any treatment before disposal. No business executive champions polluted water, but waste disposal is far less simple than once it was. The time when industrial plants adjacent to a lake or stream could expect to use that waterway as a sewer is gone forever. Waste removal is now in competition with water supply, irrigation, navigation and recreation. To have enough water, reuse is essitial. New plants and old plants, one-mill local companies and multi-installation nation-wide companies, profitable operations and marginal operations, have these interests in common: each is in existence to make a profit; each must dispose of the waste from its industrial process. To the factory manager pollution abatement will improve the company image, but it will not increase the company earnings. Should the federal government offer financial incentives to encourage industries to reduce their water pollution?

The National Board wants our CONSENSUS on this question. If so, what types of incentive would be most effective? If not, what other inducements would motivate industry to assume its share of responsibility for the quality of our water resources?

BOARD RESIGNATION

It was with the deepest regret that your Board accepted the resignation of Mrs. Douglas Blossom as Program Chairman. The League urges its members to seek political effectiveness and to work in the party of their choice. Yet the League does not support or oppose any political party or candidate. To safeguard this policy requires that no Board member, during her term of office, engage in partisan political activity. Often an election provides the occasion for an individual to be most effective. The choice must be made on the basis of personal conviction. It does fulfill the purpose of the League.

The meetings on January 16th and 23rd will turn our attention to our local program item: Study of the financial needs and sources of revenue of the City of Lake Forest. As you will recall from the Mayor's talk to us at our Annual Meeting last April, the City Council has, for some time, been studying a program of capital improvements long needed to be undertaken by the city. Since then the Gouncil has approved an inventory to serve as a guide for projects to be initiated over the next five years. These include the replacement of bridges, the improvement of streets, construction of sidewalks and installation of sewers. A new police-fire building is needed as well as increased park facilities and parking lots. The Council has also been studying the means of financing these improvements. The city has no bonded indebtedness. In the past such programs have been financed through the general tax fund or by special assessment. The Council is now preparing to ask voter approval for a bond issue for these purposes through a referendum to be held in the spring.

For the convenience of as many of our members as possible, your local agenda committee is planning to present the background and hold discussion twice each day. So, pick your most convenient time to become informed about this issue so important to the future of our city.

NOTES ON CALENDAR

Because so many of our members are involved in the programs of other organizations, the League has sought to choose a day for its meetings least in conflict with these other groups. For many years this has been Mondays. Which Monday depends on holidays, speakers, and the amount of time required to cover the subject. Your Board aims for the second Monday of each month. STATE PROGRAM

It is now time for us to consider how the League can be most effective at the state government level. In 1965 we chose five areas for our attention. Your November Voter sums up the findines and suggests other areas of interest.

To take a look at what your local League has done: This year in Welfare we have studied the programs available in our county from the Department of Children and Family Services. We found a need for funds to attract more personnel. More counselling facilities are needed for disturbed children and their families, and we would like to see home-maker and day care service provided. Shall we urge the General Assembly to increase appropriations?

We studied and re-stated our criteria for a sound revenue article. We found the proposed amendment wanting and campaigned for its defeat. What of the other articles? What of a convention?

The State Board is now gathering consensus on whether we wish to see legislation for housing opportunity. Your League agreed that although many sectors of a community share a responsibility for equal housing opportunity, state legislation should be enacted. It should provide a commission for investigation, education and conciliation, with recourse to the courts only when the latter fails. The law should cover all segments of the housing market: lending institutions and home or apartment, Swners as well as developers and realtors. It should also empower cities to enact their own regulations.

Welfare, Constitutional Revision, Equal Housing, Elections Laws, continued Judicial Reform - shall we continue with these? Shall we emphasize some? Shall we add others? Remember, this is YOUR program. How much do you want to carry? Our proposals will be discussed at the <u>January 16th</u> meetings. Call any Board member with your suggestions.

LAKE FOREST LEAGUE'S PROPOSALS FOR NEW STATE PROGRAM

There was some division of opinion as to whether this league would recommend a single list of items or return to the double list. That is, separating the program into Current Agenda and Continuing Responsibilities. This was explained to the State Board. The following items were proposed

1. Work for a constitutional convention while making a thorough study of the constitutional revisions necessary for the improvement of the structure of government in Illinois.

Protection of the individual in his civil rights and liberties, including (1) equal housing opportunities; (2) equal employment opportunities; and (3) preservation of constitutional liberties.

 Study and evaluation of planning in Illinois (state, regional and local) and the State's role in planning.

4. Support of improved Illinois welfare services to children and their families.

5. Protection of the 1962 Judicial Article.

Improvement of election laws with emphasis on establishing a central election authority, required certification of election judges, further reduction of residence requirements, protection of permanent registration.

VOLUNTEERS NEEDED!!!

In an effort to implement locally the National League position on Development of Human Resources in education and employment, the DHR chairmen from five Lake County Leagues have been meeting, exchanging information and writing Senators Dirksen and Percy and Congressman McClory, urging them to expedite the funding and refunding of authorized federal programs for disadvantaged children and youth. Four of these five communities have little obvious poverty and League members and others who give time to worthy causes tend to do so in Chicago. Therefore, we have tried to learn about and focus on the needs in Lake County where there are 6, 970 families below the poverty line. (Would you believe 45 families in Lake Forest?)

The Lake County Community Action Project (CAP) with offices in Waukegan--under a most capable director, Mr. Andre Singleton--has successfully started several year-round Head Start programs, a Neighborhood Youth Corps, a legal service bureau, and hopes to organize a Vista Citizens Corps of local volunteers. Two Head Start programs will be conducted here in Lake Forest this summer at the Church of the Holy Spirit and at Grove School; hopefully they will be continued next fall and winter. Volunteers will be needed for the classroom, playground, lunchroom, office, field trips, swimming at Ferry Hall, etc.

So here is a challenge to us and to our teenage children to become involved locally, All Leagues are being urged by National to evaluate federal programs in our communities intelligent evaluation first requires involvement of our members at the grass roots level. FROM THE CONVENTION

The proposed state budget called for \$65,675 in local league support. When the pledges of the local leagues were tallied Wednesday morning, the total came to only \$62,120. The budget committee was then instructed to revise the budget. Thursday morning the revised budget was presented. It had been balanced by an increase in the Voters Handbook sales (estimated) and in the sales of other publications generally. And, a decrease in the disbursements for state and regional meetings by \$100 and the State League's support to National by \$225.

This the convention was apparently unwilling to do. Additional gifts were pledged from a number of local leagues. Your delegates decided to pledge an additional gift of \$100 from the Lake Forest League, subject to the approval of the Board. Your Board approved this action at its meeting on April 24th.

MARJORIE PEBWORTH MEMORIAL FUND

In memory of Mrs. Robert C. Pebworth, past president of the League of Women Voters of Illinois, and representative in the General Assembly elected in 1964 (blue ribbon) and again in 1966, who dued recently and suddenly, the State League is establishing a fund to continue a project which was close to her heart. She recognized the legislator's need for a reference such as the Illinois Voter's Handbook, and personally made copies available to her colleagues; a gesture much admired and appreciated. The State Board proposes that the Marjorie Pebworth Memorial Fund be used to supply all legislators with revised copies of the Handbook as they are published. TIME FOR ACTION

The Illinois General Assembly is now working almost five days a week in order to conclude the affairs of the state by the deadline, June 30th. Bills are being proposed, assigned to committee, out of committee, on the floor and off the floor at a fantastic rate. Leaguers must be prepared for TIMES FOR ACTION at a moment's notice. Your League has already taken Action in regard to SBs 155 & 383 and HB 488: in support of bills to implement Equal Housing Opportunities legislation (EHO); and HB 686: to urge a "do pass" vote to Representative George W. Lindberg (Grystal Lake) of the House Judiciary Committee, for this bill which provides for nonpartisan selection of judges. This means that your president has communicated with the proper legislator at the proper time and in the name of her League. (Only presidents may do this) When bills reach the floor of either house (they may be killed in committee) a Membership TIME FOR ACTION is called. This means that each member of the League is asked to write her legislators (Senator and/or Representative) (as an individual) to urge his support (or opposition) of a given bill.

These TIMES come hard and fast during May and June of odd numbered years. Your Board will try to devise a rapid and effective method of communication. In the meantime, BE PREPARED!

During the past year the League has been primarily concerned with the problem of water pollution: how to abate the ever increasing nuisance of waste disposal, its treatment and distribution. We have been reading much about the contamination of our own Lake Michigan and the question of the rights of communities to remove the water and distribute the wastee sleswhere. How do these considerations relate to the local area? What is pelaned?





NATIONAL PROGRAM

At the November 27th meeting your League will decide what it wishes to propose for the National Program. What new areas do you feel we should consider as Current Agenda? Do we wish to continue our present three? Have our past studies suggested more specific fields for emphasis?

Continuing Responsibilities are League positions and statements of agreement on issues which we have studied in the past and on which we may continue to take action. Readoption means reaffirmation of our stated position. Changing circumstances may make us wish to restudy or expand the area as a new item. Where do you stand? (See Year Book, p. 3)

APPORTIONMENT OF STATE LEGISLATURES.

Our national position was affirmed in 1966 as a result of our study based on decisions of the U. S. Supreme Court in the early 1960's. Many State Leagues have long been concerned with the problem locally. Recently resolutions have been introduced (in Congress and by the States) to amend the U. S. Constitution to allow one house to apportion on "other factors."

DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA

The League has been working for, equal voting rights for D. C. residents since 1924. The citizens of Washington have no part in choosing their school board, no control over local taxes, no voice in city affairs. Congress serves as their council and legislature, yet they do not vote for a representative. It will take an amendment to the constitution to provide such representation. Currently the League is supporting HJR. 396 to this effect.

LOYALTY-SECURITY

This item arose from concern during the war and the McCarthy era over the balance of individual liberty and national security. League action relates to the five loyalty-security programs and has been to "hold the line." Work has centered on preventing expansion of the scope and safeguarding the individual's rights.

TAX RATES

The League feels that a limitation on tax rates is a question to be handled by statute and not frozen into the constitution. Protests against rising government costs and taxes have led to proposals to repeal the 16th Amendment. Legislatures have passed resolutions for a convention to consider such an amendment. Under this CR state Leagues have been able to take action.

TREATY MAKING

The League has long supported many constructive efforts toward international organizations and treaties. Do such covenants interfere with domestic concerns? Should we alter our methods of conducting foreign policy, or change the balance of power between the Executive and Legislative branch?



Your COUNTY is showing again and, hopefully, it will shine brilliantly at the January unit meetings on "Study and evaluation of the structure and finances of Lake County government, with action as indicated." The word "evaluation" is the key to real interest; evaluation is up to you, the members; members of your committee will act as resources for your discussion; and eventually the League may reach agreement on where and what action is indicated.

Obviously this local study will be excellent preparation for the wider study envisaged in State Item IV, "Study of local governmental structure within Illinois" (scheduled to begin next year) to say nothing of State Item I, "Con-Con."

Now what the committee proposes for the unit meetings is to start with a question concerning executive power in the county structure. Resource people will attempt to answer this with a description of the duties and functions of the county and its eighteen townships. Many questions will come to mind on these problems. While this item is concerned specifically with Lake County government, not county government in general, committee members are prepared to discuss three alternatives to what we have here as they are being tested in other parts of the country. Questions and discussion should lead to description of the elected county officers (other than the Board of Supervisors) and particularly of one township officer - the township assessor.

At this point everyone takes a deep breath, puts on her water wings and together we plunge into the murky depths of county finance. Your committee will do its best to keep us all from drowning.



CONFERENCE ON POLLUTION OF LAKE MICHIGAN

You are urged to attend any or all sessions of the Four-State Federal Enforcement Conference involving the Federal government and the states of Illinois, Indiana, Wisconsin and Michigan. Water pollution control regulatory agencies of the four states and the Federal Water Pollution Control Administration will participate. Interested citizens will be invited to participate. The conference is expected to last three days.

The meeting will be opened by Secretary of Interior, STEWART L. UDALL, who will introduce the governors of the states, U.S. representatives, and others who wish to present statements.

The Lake Michigan Inter-League Group will be represented by MRS. DONALD CLUSEN, Water Resources Chairman, League of Women Voters of the United States who will present a statement on behalf of the group. Illinois and Michigan Leagues have been invited to participate.

This conference has been called by Secretary Udall at the request of Gov. Kerner of Illinois. The Leagues of Illinois and Michigan requested their governors to call for such a conference.

The area involved includes Lake Michigan and its entire tributary basin, involving approximately 67,900 square miles containing over 5.5 million people, approximately 310 municipal sewerage systems, and over 250 industries discharging to the basin's waterways. The conference aims to identify the occurrence and sources of pollution, adequacy of measures taken in pollution abatement and the causes of delays in the program. It will recommend remedial action and set a timetable for compliance,

WATER RESOURCES - REFERENDUM

STATEMENT FROM MRS. ROBERT J. STUART, PRESIDENT OF THE LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS OF THE UNITED STATES ON THE OCCASION OF THE DEATH OF DR, MARTIN LUTHER KING.

"ALL WHITE AMERICA STANDS GUILTY FOR WHAT HAPPENED TO DR. MARTIN LUTHER KING LAST NIGHT IN MEMPHIS. THE LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS SHARES THE FEELING OF OUTRACE AND FRUSTRATION THAT GRIPS THE NATION.

"WORD WILL NO LONGER DO. THE EFFORTS WE HAVE TAKEN SO FAR WILL NOT SUFFICE. NOW IS THE TIME FOR VICOROUS AND CONSTRUCTIVE ACTION BY THE CONGRESS, THE STATE LEGISLATURES, AND BY EVERY COMMUNITY TO SEE THAT NEGRO CITIZENS TAKE THEIR RIGHTFUL PLACE IN AMERICAN LIFF.

"EVERY INDIVIDUAL HAS A PART TO PLAY. CIVIL RIGHTS ISSUES ARE BASICALLY PERSONAL ISSUES; THEY CALL FOR PERSONAL EXPRESSIONS OF BELIEFS -- NOT ONLY TO LAW-MAKING BODIES ON EVERY LEVEL OF GOVERNMENT BUT IN ANSWER TO THE BICOTED IN OUR COMMUNITIES WHETHER THEY BE RELATIVES, NEIGHBORS, OF FRIENDS.

"IF EACH OF US TAKES ON THE SAME KIND OF PERSONAL COMMITMENT THAT CHARACTERIZED DR. KING'S LIFE, HIS GOALS CAN BE ACHIEVED. THEY MUST BE ACHIEVED."

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT:

The above statement was released to the press the day following Dr. King's assassination
Mrs. Stewart used it to preface her letter to every member, which she sent in care of
the local league president. She asked that we do our utmost to pass it on to you. I see
no better way than to give it to you in this bulletin,

"Dear Member,

"Like many of you, after hearing the dreadful news I found it hard to sleep. I kept asking myself what we could have done which might have helped avert this tragedy. And I thought of a man I met last week in Chicago. I had gone there for a press briefing session about our national convention. One of the reporters present was a pleasant, friendly man representing Ebony Magazine. We talked about many things -- the problems of the cities, employment, schools, housing, and what we could do about this myriad of problems.

"The reporter from Bhony listened for a while and then spoke up. He said, 'You know I belong to an integrated church here in Chicago and at the time of Selma, members of our church, black and white, went together to Alabama and marched. It was wonderful, and I think the whites among us had a feeling of real accomplishment as well as a feeling of 'standing up and being counted.' But you know it's a funny thing, back here in Chicago today, some of these very same people are not marching any more and they are not standing up and being counted very often either.'

"I, for one, took a good look at myself and asked, 'Do I speak up when I hear a homeowner who vows to sell if a Negro moves into his neighborhood? Do I protest the bigoted remark? Do I do all I can to persuade my middle class friends to change some of their attitudes -- even at the risk of offending them? Am I really doing everything I can personally to see that legislative goals are achieved? Do I practice everything I preach?

"The answer is, of course, No.

"But this morning I vowed that henceforth I shall do better. I have issued the above statement to the press here in Washington,

"I have called my Congressman and my two Senators and told them how I stand personally on several issues. I have made it very clear that in this case I am not speaking in the name of the League of Women Voters as a whole but for me, Julia Stuart. I am in Washington, D.C., so this was not difficult to do, but I hadn't done it earlier. Why?

"I believe in organized action, especially in the type of action taken by the League of Women Voters of the United States. But individual action and individual expression is necessary too.

"Soon I shall finish my term as President of the League of Women Voters of the United States. On my return to Spokane I intend to speak in my own community and take what action I can whenever, wherever, and under whatever circumstances present themselves. I hope that you will too."

This bulletin signals the beginning of a new League year. Our goals are numerous and important. They cannot be accomplished by your president and board of directors alone but only through total participation of the entire membership can we continue to build a strong League. The Con-Con campaign and the Illinois Water Bond Referendum are two enormous tasks that each individual leaguer must become involved in. True, you will be participating in voters service and community action projects for these, but just as important is your individual word of mouth communication with friends and neighbors. Membership and finance are two other areas of league activity which depend for their success on every member effort. We believe that the unit meetings were well received this past year and we hope to have them on a more regular basis. Again, we invite your participation in this most interesting phase of League -- the study and discussion groups which bring us to our consensus and positions on vital issues. This next year let's all ext together and but league across loud and clear in Lake Forest.

WATER HEARINGS: Representative Carl Klein, Chairman of the Water Pollution and Water Resources Commission of the Illinois Legislature is holding area hearings to determine local needs for funds from the one billion dollar water referendum to be voted on next November 5. Leagues and other organizations have been testifying at these hearings.

NATIONAL CONVENTION: Besides the two delegates, Mrs. Oblinger and Mrs. Kelley, Lake Forest will be represented by several workers serving at different times during the five day convention. Eight board members volunteered their services for floor duty. They will have the opportunity of sitting in on some of the daily sessions. We are allowed one visitor as well. Your delegates are delighted to have the privilege of representing you at National, and are well aware of the responsibility this entails, Program, although proposed, is by no means definite, and the prospects of lively debate are very good indeed. National will go to a single current agenda list this year with no by-law change anticipated immediately. It will work much the same way as Illinois did when it adopted a single list. On Monday evening there will be an Illinois reception to honor Mrs. Ezra Levin. Mrs. Levin has been nominated for treasurer on the National Board. On Tuesday evening, Miss Barbara Stuhler, Assistant Director of the World Affairs Center at the University of Minnesota will speak of her experiences on a trip to Russia in September 1967, when she and three other League members were the guests of the Soviet Women's Committee under the auspices of the Overseas Education Fund of the League of Women Voters. On Thursday evening, Mr. Whitney M. Young, Jr., Executive Director of the National Urban League will be the speaker at the Convention banquet. He will talk on the problems of the cities.

Space does not permit telling all the exciting highlights of this convention, but you are urged to watch the metropolitan papers for daily coverage of the events. Later, your delegates will try to bring you a comprehensive report on this wonderful experience of attending their first national League convention.

THE NATURAL RESOURCES DEVELOPMENT BOND ACT

All are concerned with the air and water problems which we face. These problems do not defy solution. We have the technology to slow down, and in some instances, to completely halt the pollution of air and water. Recommendations have been made to provide Illinois with clean streams and safe water supplies, water and open space for recreation plus freedom from destructive floods. But the lack of funds has made it impossible to put these recommendations into reality. A "Yee" vote for the NATURAL RESOURCES DEVELOPMENT BOND ACT which will be on the ballot will make it possible to plan for the future water needs of Illinois.

For us in the North Shore Sanitary District, that "YES VOTE" is really a selfish vote besides. We approved a \$35 million referendum to construct facilities to meet the Pure Water Quality Standards Act requirements by 1971....but matching state and federal funds must be obtained to implement the N.S.S.D. planning. A YES vote will give us the funds to make our local propram fully effective.

At the coming League meetings fact sheets and material will be available with more detailed information. Bumper stickers and lapel buttons will be distributed. Please use this material to carry the word to your non-league friends. Remember, your failure to vote on this issue, if you vote in the general election, counts as a NO vote. Both political parties and many organizations besides the League support this Act.



mination

We who are concerned with responsible citizenship in our nation have become aware of the imperative that we enable every single person in the United States to enter the mainstream of citizenry. Hence, our Leagues throughout the nation are focusing their attention and energy on the Human Resources item. One aspect of that item is the opportunity for every family to be able to select any home with any address on any street that will adequately house its members.

Our National Board would like to have direction from us so that they can press for legislation that will provide for such an opportunity. We shall give them such direction from our League by reaching a common agreement on the following items:

Criteria for programs and policies:

A. The housing market should operate free of restrictions based on race, color, religion, etc.

B. Government and the private sector should play a role.

Programs should include provisions to guarantee equal rights.

D. In enforcement, procedures should be clearly defined; mediation and redress should be available; funding should be adequate to insure enforcement; and evaluation should be encouraged.

Conclusions our State League has reached about advisability and effectiveness IT. of present fair housing legislation.

III. Problems we see in the implementation of fair housing laws.

It is recommended that our League make a survey of housing in our community. Your Resource Committee, composed of Mrs. Henry Haight, Mrs. Vincent Rauner,

Pierce, who has introduced a bill on the control of DDT, a representative of a major chemical company, and a member of management of Commonwealth Edison.

The meeting on March 24th (see calendar above) will present as discussion leaders league representatives from the North Shore Junior College Study group, Mrs. Herbert C. Loth, Jr., Mrs. Roland Murray, and Mrs. Sheldon Dorenfest. Five districts would be included in this projected school district, Highland Park-Deerfield, Lake Forest-Lake Bluff, Glenbrook, Evanston and New Trier Township. Mrs. Paul McCurry, Lake Forest League chairman, says that the time for evaluation and discussion is "now." "The referendum is in May and it is essential League consensus be reached well before that time."

PROGRESS REPORT ON THE WORK OF THE CONSTITUTIONAL STUDY COMMISSION

Meetings of the Constitution Study Commission of the State of Illinois have been held almost weekly since the election of November 5th. Because of the variety of opinions expressed on the elements of enabling legislation for the convention, the Commission has talked about possibly forwarding to the General Assembly alternatives rather than recommendations. However, several decisions have already been reached by vote. They are:

- 1) To use November 17, 1969, as a target date for the opening meeting of the convention.
- 2) To recommend that the election of convention delegates be nonpartisan.
- To recommend September 9, 1969, for the primary election and October 28, 1969, for the general election of delegates.
- To recommend compensation for delegates of \$1,500 per month to a maximum of eight months.
- 5) To recommend that the convention meet at Springfield in the House Chambers.

THE PEP CORPS

This stands for Political Education and Participation. This PEP CORPS was conceived by the State Board to enable local leagues to observe the 76th General Assembly of the State of Illinois. Tuesdays and Wednesdays of most weeks the Legislature is in session. Local leagues have been given assignments of the days they will observe, from January through June. Lake Forest will observe on April 8th and 9th. Rooms for league members have been arranged at the Leland Hotel for a minimum rate and kits will be obtainable at our league office, right across the street from the hotel. Briefing sessions will also take place before the groups begin their "observing." Any interested member is welcome to go. But accommodations are somewhat limited. Call Jan Shields, 234-1567, if you wish to take part in this valuable program.



- 2) Hear Mary Liz Carney's delightful "History of Lake Forest."
- 3) Have your say re the kind of "Facts for Foresters" we publish.
- 4) As a League member, are you an expert on Voting Requirements? 5) Hear Phyllis Callaway's report on property assessments and where your tax dollars go.

STATE CONVENTION

The 34th convention of the League of Women Voters of Illinois will be held at the Pere Marquette Hotel, Peoria, April 22/24, 1969. Lake Forest League delegates will be Mrs. Raymond F. Kelley, Jr. and Mrs. George Reilly. The business sessions of the convention will concentrate on adoption of a budget, a proposed By-Laws change, and adoption of a new State program.

Proposed State Program

- 1) Revision of the structure of Illinois government.
- 2) Study of local government in Illinois.
- 3) Protection of the individual in his civil rights and liberties.
- 4) Support of improved local, regional and statewide welfare services by Illinois state agencies serving children and their families.
- 5) Study of Election Laws and Procedures in Illinois.

As a result of a poll taken at the January Unit Meetings, the Lake Forest League submitted on first round an item on Natural Resources, and on Child Mental Health. On second round it is planned to re-submit the latter, recommending that it be included in the present state welfare item. At a recent meeting of North Shore presidents council, the consensus was that juvenile mental health would have a better opportunity of being adopted if it were made a part of our work regarding state agencies serving children and their families, rather than being submitted as a single item.

THE BLUE LINE ON LEAGUE ACTION IN THE LEGISLATURE

Debate on major issues such as revenue sources, open housing, department of youth correction, procedures for the constitutional convention is underway in Springfield. Hearings are being held in House and Senate committees. The League has already taken action to support bills establishing day care centers and to oppose an amendment to the Illinois Youth Commission Act whose emphasis would have been on minimum term served rather than on rehabilitation. League legislative action has supported the one-man, one-vote principle for Con-con. At this time there are other bills in committee on Constitutional Convention procedures, and election and payment of delegates.

CONSENSUS

The Lake Forest League's unit meetings centering on study and discussion of China reached the following agreement:

- We should have a more flexible approach toward the People's Republic of China; a more diverse selection of actions than our present "containment without isolation" should be employed by the U.S.
- Our specific policy changes should include:
 - Lifting the U.S. trade embargo on non-strategic items.
 - b. Continuation of our attempts to increase cultural exchanges with more publicity to foreign nations of our attempts in these areas and of the rebuffs from Communist China.
 - De facto recognition as we feel this is now implied.

No agreement between units was reached regarding representation in the U.N. As to whether or not the U.S. should take initiative in relaxing tensions, many Leaguers felt this question was poorly worded as the U.S. has already taken initiative in this area.

"LOGO"

The consensus of the Local Government Study is lengthy and important. Chairman, Mrs. Francis Beidler, has arranged for copies to be printed which will be distributed at future Leave meetings.

LOGO POSITION AND CONSENSUS

STATEMENT OF POSITION ON STRUCTURE AND FINANCING OF ILLINOIS SCHOOLS

The League of Women Voters of Illinois believes basic changes should be made in the structure and financing of Illinois Schools,

The League believes that a non-political State Board of Education should be established to develop policies and set standards for the whole state, to carry on research in problems of education and to formulate long range plans. Although various preferences were expressed, the League would be satisfied with any one of several ways of achieving such a State Board of Education.

The League believes a Superintendent of Public Instruction should be appointed. He should be responsible to the State Board of Education. This appointment should be non-political and based on professional qualifications.

The office of County Superintendent of Schools should be discontinued. A regional basis of organization, based on the optimum size for providing adequate service and supervision should be established. Any new administrative structure should be consistent with a responsible State Board of Education and an appointed Superintendent. The system of local school boards should be retained.

The League of Women Voters regards the present financing of schools as unsatisfactory. Disparities in educational expenditure which are caused by disparities in local taxable resources should be reduced. It recommends:

- 1) A vastly increased foundation level.
- 2) An improved system of distribution of state aid. Suggested changes in the state aid formula include: abolish flat grants, change average daily attendance to average daily enrollment, achieve more realistic equalization among school districts by the manner of state distribution. There is a strong agreement that funds to pay for these changes should be financed by a state income tax.
- 3) A rational realignment of school districts based on plans and incentives developed at the state level. The redistricting plans should work to eliminate tax havens, to smooth out disparities among neighboring communities, and to create student bodies large enough for optimum educational results. Financial impediments to consolidation such as non-uniform assessment practices, discriminatory or inadequate bonding power, and over-reliance on property tax should be removed.

The League believes special consideration should be given to solve special problems, particularly the problems of inner city schools and schools with large numbers of disadvantaged children. There is concern for the problems brought about by segregation in the schools. The League does not want legislation which might prohibit or penalize the local school district in embarking on plans for desegregation. The League recommends extra state funds to meet special problems.

TIME FOR ACTION

There is an urgent call for names of solicitors who might help in the 50th anniversal Chicago Metro area drive. This area is one of the key places in the United States for the raising of funds. There are at least 700 calls to be made on individuals, foundations and business firms. Surely among our members there are many women who can open doors and speak with poise and "clout" to these important contacts. Call the Metro Area Office, 641-6743 and offer to help.

LEGISLATIVE ACTION

WRITE AT ONCE TO YOUR STATE REPRESENTATIVES ABOUT LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS SUPPORT FOR HOUSE BILLS 410-13 CREATING A FAIR HOUSING ACT.

Both Mr. Kleine and Mr. Pierce have supported past legislation. Ask them again to lend their support. These bills are in the amending stage now. Your response to this call to action should be immediate. Use your own words and be sure to sign your name and address. The official League letters have already gone out.

ALL ABOUT CON-CON

Now that the bill setting up Illinois' Constitutional Convention has been signed into law, the following facts should be brought to your attention, because the main thrust of our League activity this fall will be in the area of constitutional revision. Refer to your "Voter," and keep up to date on all material pertaining to this most important effort.

The convention will meet on December 8, 1969 in the House chamber in the Capitol. After the opening session, the convention may meet wherever and whenever its members choose. There is no time limit, but since delegates will get paid for no more than eight months, that is probably as long as the session will run. A referendum on the proposed changes must be held within six months after the convention adjourns. Delegates themselves will set the exact date. The convention may recommend as many changes as it chooses. It may not come to agreement on any, or it may recommend an entirely new constitution.

There will be 116 delegates -- 2 elected from each of Illinois' 58 Senate districts. Primary elections will be held September 23 in all districts where more than four candidates file. The top four vote-getters will advance to the runoff. There will be no primary in districts where four or fewer candidates file. The general election will be held November 18. Voters will select two delegates from the four candidates on the ballot. Citizens running for the post of con-con delegate must have petitions bearing at least 1,000 signatures of registered voters. Petitions must be filed with the Secretary of State in Springfield between July 7 and 11. No voter can sign petitions for more that two candidates. Those who file first will get top position on the primary ballot -- or, if there is no primary, on the general election ballot. The primary and runoff elections will be non-partisan.

Delegates will be paid \$625 a month for up to eight months, plus \$75 a day for every working day, up to 100 days. The law passed by the Legislature will permit public officials to run (such as state legislators, mayors and county officials) but if elected, they will serve as delegates without pay.

The luncheon is \$4.20, which seems a bit steep, but you need not attend that in order to hear the agenda. The purpose of this exciting new innovation of getting leaguers together on a national scale, is to take a close look at our procedures and structures with a view towards changes that will make our organization more effective and, perhaps, more flexible. To paraphrase Mrs. Benson, from an address which she made to the NAACP in July, "League officers and boards need to be convinced with powerful arguments that change is vital, necessary, and in the interest of the League of Women Voters."

OCTOBER UNIT MEETINGS

We are calling our meetings this month, Con-ConII since this is the second phase of our fall study on Constitutional Revision. The discussions will focus on the State Program concerned with the Legislative and Executive Articles of the Illinois constitution; a new Revenue Article and measures to obtain an adequate and flexible tax structure, and the support of measures to further Judicial Reform. The pattern of the meetings will be the same as those on Local Government. Presentation and discussion in the morning, then a break for lunch and consensus in the afternoon. Mrs. William B. Johnson (Mary) is in charge of our Con-Con study.

The twenty-ninth Convention of the League of Women Voters of the United States will be held in Washington, D.C., May 4-8, 1970 at the Sheraton Park Hotel. Between now and December 4, the Bylaws deadline for first-round national program recommendations by State and Local Leagues, puts the responsibility on the individual member to express her views on the choice of a National Program on which she wishes to work during 1970-72. Your board wishes to reflect in its official recommendation, the considered thinking of the members. Therefore, we invite you to submit to your President, either verbal or written expressions of ideas for national program.

NOVEMBER GENERAL MEETING

The year of the 50th Anniversary celebration of the League is also the 50th anniversary of women's suffrage. For almost as many years, League members have worked to obtain for the disfranchised D. C. citizens their right to be represented. In 1961, D. C. citizens were granted a voice in selection of President and Vice-President, but representation in Congress is still denied.

The national Board is proposing a concerted program of action involving the memberships of the entire country. It will dramatize the political condition of U. S. citizens in Washington, where the 50th Anniversary convention will be held. It will be a gigantic gathering of signatures on petitions asking for congressional representation for D. C. citizens. Each League will be responsible for getting its petition to the convention. The mechanics are quite simple and I know you'll be hearing more about this great idea in future issues of your National Voter.

ELECTORAL COLLEGE MEETING

The morning program for the November 10 general meeting will be something new for us. It will feature a debate on the major issues of the Electoral College study. The participants will be Mrs. Donna Schiller, Illinois State Chairman on Electoral College, and Mrs. Eleanor Stanton, formerly Ohio State Chairman on Electoral College and now a Consultant to the Ohio State League. This debate will not only be stimulating, but will be informative and helpful to us in reaching consensus.

Some interesting statistics came up when your board attempted to fill in a questionnaire sent out by State for local league membership analysis. What made them interesting is to find out that our League is most atypical. The large majority of our members are over 50 years of age and roughly 5% are employed on part time basis outside the home. There are no members from minority groups, either racial, ethnic or religious, and only 5% are continuing education on a part time basis. Most members have had college experience and at least 50% have college degrees. As much as 95% are engaged in community and volunteer activities, but only 5% are on Governmental committees or Commissions. The answer was, "probably not" to the general question, "Does your League membership reflect your community make-up?" Think that one over!

LOGO CONSENSUS

Following our September Unit meetings on Con-Con I (Local Government Study), Mrs. Beidler, who was in charge of the study, prepared a detailed and excellent report. This has been sent to State, but those of you unable to attend the meetings should have at least a condensed report.

Since we are concerned with streamlining our Constitution, it was felt that local government powers such as: license rights, tax limitations, regulatory powers on business and professions, kinds of officers of local government, their powers and duties, should not be specifically set forth by the Constitution. These situations change radically with the needs of the times, and the Constitution soon becomes obsolete. It would be helpful to set up a State agency which would act in an advisory capacity to work with local governments.

The Constitution should give legislative powers to provide for County government. These powers should be statutory. Counties should be authorized by the Constitution to provide services: taxation, law enforcement, health, transportation, supervision of elections, efforts to eliminate pollution, and zoning of incorporated land. Provision should be made for some multi-county or regional officials. Constitution should provide the legislature authority to make such arrangements.

Townships should be eliminated. The need for this kind of local government is long past. As townships are now, they only represent a costly duplication of effort. Their functions could easily be assumed by the County or Municipality.

The County or the State which has created special districts should have definite control over the operation and power to dissolve them entirely, or to consolidate them with another unit of local government. The legislature should grant this control. The Constitution itself could be written so as to limit or eliminate the need for creating special districts. If the constitution were written so as to encourage counties and municipalities to cooperate, this would help reduce the need for so many special districts.

The state should exercise control over the formation of new municipalities. Efforts should be made to encourage the consolidation, annexation, or dissolution of the tiny municipalities which exist at present. The Constitutional provisions which now cause fragmentation of local governments should be eliminated. Powers given to municipalities should be statutory.

Metropolitan area problems have reached enormous proportions. Inter-county cooperation should be encouraged. Cities should be allowed to annex contiguous territory more easily than is now possible. Much more attention should be paid to the recommendations of the Northern Illinois Planning Commission and the Southwestern Illinois Metropolitan Area Planning Commission. Efforts could be made to turn more of these recommendations into actual laws. The legislature should have power to step in, and with a firm hand, help solve problems.

TIMES FOR ACTION

RE: Continuation of Programs Authorized under the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964
(H.R 513 and S. 1809)

Reasons for this time for action are failure to renew authorization for programs under the EOA. The very existence of antipoverty agencies is threatened. Congressmen need to be reminded that there is strong support in their jurisdictions for programs supported by EOA legislation. Unless Congress acts soon, sagging morale can result in irreversible damage to community action agencies across the country. The House leadership has hesitated to move this legislation out of committee for lack of assurance of support on the floor to get it passed. A strong show of support from you can shift the balance of power in Congress to assure passage of a 2 year renewal of OEO authorization without crippling amendments. WRITE TODAY!

RE: The Foreign Assistance Act of 1969 (H. R. 11792 and S. 2347)

NOW IS THE TIME FOR LETTERS FROM LEAGUES AND INTERESTED CITIZENS ON FOREIGN AID. The right moment has come for Leagues to communicate with their representatives expressing support of the development aid provisions of the foreign aid bill. In this transitional year for foreign aid, it is essential to stress the need for continuing effective and adequately funded programs of development assistance to the poor countries.



OLD FAITHFUL! Which is what describes our forthcoming Water Resources Units in January. This program item is a long time favorite. It has attracted great membership interest and has enjoyed sustained effort for many years, and not without a great deal of progress and success. Here's a quote from one Congressman who has led the drive for the billion dollar funding of the Clean Water Restoration Act. "Thanks a million for the splendid, untiring support we received from the League of Women Voters. Without the enthusiastic efforts and the active support of League members from throughout the country, we could not have come so close, and surely would not have managed to nearly triple, as we did, the budget request for funding of the Clean Water Restoration Act. "

Our consensus question will still be, "Do you think that the use of DDT and other persistent esticides should be restricted until such time as the scientific question of their effect on water quality has been conclusively resolved?"

Note the word "restricted," Already the Agricultural Dept. is proposing "bans," Many questions arise: Should we continue to offer these pesticides as part of our foreign aid unless they are clearly labeled? Restricted?
