Beautification of land between the Northwestern Railroad tracks and one of the main arteries into Lake Forest with flowering trees, shrubs and bulbs.

The Deerpath Garden Club desired to have a long range civic planting for their project. The land between the North-western Railroad tracks and Western Avenue, for a stretch of 5890 feet from Vine Avenue, south to Westleigh Road, was chosen after several consultations with the Lake Forest City officials. This main thoroughfare was chosen not only for enhancement, but to help make the community more aware of our Garden Club efforts.

The Club wished to plant the area with trees and shrubs that would blend in with the natural terrain of Lake Forest. One of the prime considerations was a planting that would help absorb the noise and pollution of cars and trains.

Funds were raised by the following activities:

- 1. Two Christmas House Walks with Boutiques* and refreshments.
- 2. Fall bulb sale.
- 3. Fashion show luncheon and Boutique.*
- 4. Two White Elephant sales.

The Lake Forest City Forester worked very closely with our civic project chairman in selecting material and recommending its placement. The Garden Club planted the bulbs and the city assumed the responsibility of planting the trees and shrubs.

When our founding president, Inez Dettenmeyer, passed away, her husband made a donation to our project. The club planted a red horse chestnut tree as a memorial to Inez.

The community had become aware of our efforts, when the Girl Scouts offered to do a Spring clean-up. The following page contains a list of our plantings and costs involved in this project.

Garden club tells accomplishments of past 10 years

The Deerpath Garden Club will be 10 years old Nov. 30.

That was the date 10 years ago when the late Mrs. Henry Dettenmayer stood up at a Newcomers Club luncheon in the Knollwood Country Club to ask if anyone was interested in forming a garden club.

Several women were, so Mrs. Dettenmayer organized the group, and became their first president. Of the original members, five from Lake Forest are still-active today, including club president, Mrs. Andrew M. Fosse; Mrs. Lewis G. Groebe, Mrs. Harold O. Schultz, Mrs. Joseph L. Serafine, and Mrs. Mervyn C. Taylor.

A club goal has been to beautify Lake Forest, and members have planted more than 12,000 bulbs, flowering trees, and shrubs along Western Av. from Illinois Rd. to Westleigh Rd. They have "adopted" this area and will continue to improve it.

Each summer the club sends a Lake Forest High School student to Northern or Southern Illinois University on a conservation scholarship.

They also make an annual donation to the Garden Room of the Lake Forest Library, arrange flowers at Lake Forest Hospital, and compete each year in the World Flower Show, sponsored by the Garden Club of Illinois.

They have an annual workshop and make Christmas wreaths for the Lake County Home in Libertyville. They sponsored a Christmas walk through Lake Forest homes four years ago, and will repeat their efforts on Dec. 3 this year with their "Symbols of Christmas" housewalk.




