Proposed Bylaws Changes

Rather than print the entire eight page document of the LWVLF/LB Bylaws, the following highlighted Bylaws changes are submitted to the membership for review prior to the Annual Meeting. While they are not the sum of all changes recommended by the Bylaws Committee (Joan Kaltsa, cfr.; T. Yakes and Melanie Rummel), they are considered by the Committee to represent the substantive changes for consideration. Copies of the entire Bylaws with changes are available in the Leavue mailton at Gortham.

Three sections included here reflect significant change.

- 1.) We submit a more relevant attempt to eliminate a yearly audit of the books by allowing for the audit of the Treasurer's books by annually or upon her leaving office after a two-year term.
- 2.) We currently do not have a fee for dues specific to two members residing in the same household. Most Leagues do; we are simply catching up here.
- 3.) There is extensive change to the Article IX on Program. Two changes are recommended.
  - That all program be voted on as a block if nobody moves to separate.
  - 2. Program is now categorized into those tems relevant to members from Lake Forest or Lake Bluff "governmental pirisdictions". With the program proposals this year, there is a third category program items relevant to all the membership. This addition reflects a need for change in the voting procedure, allowind for a majority vote of the entire membership.

We are also clarifying the voting procedures for the first two categories. The rules now reflect a possibility that was not intended when the bylaws were re-written as the Laegues merged: a majority vote by that part of the membership concerned with an item could be overridden by a simple majority vote of the rest of the membership being asked for concurrance. As recommended in these revisions, if no concurrance is to be given by the "non-governmental jurisdiction" members they that to be put to a vote of the general membership. A simple majority vote of the entire membership will be required for acceptance of the original program proposal. Also note changes in non-recommended items.

[CODE FOR REVISION: Italics - additions; ( ) - remove]

ARTICLE V - Officers

Section 5. The Treasurer.

[second paragraph of section]

The Treasurer shall present statements to the Board at its regular meetings and an Annual Report to the Annual Meeting. The books of the Treasurer shall be audited at the end of her term or biannually, whichever comes first. The audit and auditor is to be authorized by the Board. The audit report shall be published in the September bulletin of the year of the audit. (each year prior to the Annual Meeting.) (by an auditor appointed by the Board.)

ARTICLE VI - Financial Administration

Section 2. Dues.

When two or more members reside at the same address in a common household, their combined dues shall be equal to one and one half times the amount of dues for an individual.

## ARTICLE IX - Program

Section 1. Authorization. The governmental principles adopted by the National Convention, and supported by the Leagues as a whole, constitute the framework for the authorization (for) and the adoption of Local (Piprogram. No local program can be contrary to the principles and actions adopted by the National, State or Country Leagues.

Section 4. Action by the Annual Meeting. The Annual Meeting shall act upon the program, using the following procedures.

- a.) The Board (of Directors) shall consider all (the) recommendations for program submitted at least (sent in by voting members) two months prior to the Annual Meeting and shall formulate a proposed program.
- b.) The proposed program shall be sent to all members one month prior to the Annual Meeting.
- c.) Items proposed for study and for action by the Board at the Annual Meeting shall be divided into three
- categories: (in the proposed program presented to the Annual Meeting by the Board of Directors shall)
  (1) a local study/program item involving the governmental jurisdiction specific to residents of Lake Forest.
- (2) a local study/program item involving the governmental jurisdiction specific to residents of Lake Bluff and/or (3) a local study/program item based on the combined interests of the LWYLF/LB.

At the discretion of the President, and if no member moves to separate and/or divide any proposed timus(s) in the above three categories, the local program proposals can be voted on as a block. If the President decides, or a member moves to separate and/or divide, the item then requires the following action for adoption, depending on the category.

- d,) In the case of (1) and (2) above, (require for adoption), adoption shall require: (1) a majority vote of (voting) those members present, qualified and voting who reside within the local governmental jurisdiction the item concerns, followed by (concerned with the items.) (2) a concurrence vote consisting of a majority of the (Following shall be a majority vote of concurrence by the voting) members present, qualified and voting who reside in the governmental jurisdiction not (outside the government) concerned with the item(s). If concurrence cannot be reached, a majority vote of the entire membership present, qualified and voting will be necessary for acceptance of the proposed program item.
- e.) In the case of (3) above, adoption shall require a majority vote of those members present, qualified and voting.
- f.) (d) Recommendations for program submitted two morths prior to the Annual Meeting by voting members who reside in the local governmental jurisdiction concerned with the item(s) but not recommended by the Board may be considered and adopted by the Annual Meeting provided:
  - (1) (the Annual Meeting shall order consideration by) a majority vote of the (voting) members present, qualified and voting who reside in the local governmental jurisdiction(s) concerned must vote for consideration; and (i)
  - (2) the (Annual Meeting shall adopt the) item shall then require for adoption,
    - a.) ((by) a two-thirds majority vote of (the local voting) members present, qualified and voting who reside in the local governmental jurisdiction concerned and
    - b.) (a majority vote of) concurrence by a majority of (voting) members present, qualified and voting who reside in the local governmental jurisdiction not concerned with the item. If concurrence cannot be reached, a two-thirds vote of the entire membership present, qualified and voting will be necessary for acceptance of the non-recommended item.

## Updates on League Positions

## State and National

Several members met with the 59th District's new state representative, Torn Lachner, on March 13 to discuss the League's concerns and Tom's agenda for this legislative session. Leaguers in attendance included Judy Cottone, Beryl [Flom, Susan Garrett, Betsy Lassar and Diane Lloyd.

Topics discussed included state fiscal policy, welfare reform, implementation of the National Voter Registration Act in Illinois, campaign finance reform, term limits and good management issues in government. We enjoyed the opportunity to meet with Tom and look forward to working with him and with his new legislative aide (and League member) Ann Caroenter.

## Term Limits

The League opposes term limits because:

- Term limits interfere with the fundamental right of voters to elect their own representatives. The League believes that voters can be trusted to elect their representatives without government stepping in to arbitrarily regulate their choice.
- Term limits would weaken the legislative branch of government and strengthen an already powerful Presidency, upsetting the constitutional balance of powers.
- 3) Term limits ignore the need for experience in Congress, where complex public policy issues are decided. Term limits would result in increased reliance on congressional staff, lobbyists and other unelected "insiders." THE LEAGUE HAS BEEN SAYING FOR YEARS "WE ALREADY HAVE TERM LIMITS. THEY'RE CALLED ELECTIONS."

This bill was referred to the Agriculture Committee without public notice. Perhaps the democratic process would have been better served if an open and candid debate of the bill and its wide-ranging implications for responsible gun control in Illinois had occurred in committee. ## LWV of Lake County Position on Composting

While the above are preferred methods of handling yard waste, areas which require any more extensive composting should emphasize small, local, well-managed operations. Sites should be located as close to the source of material as possible, would eliminate long distance handling and reduce the possibility of pare-proise conditions developing in bagged grass.

Truck traffic is one of the problems associated with large-scale composting. Sites should be located near major road systems.

When vardwaste is based it should be covered in transit to prevent escaping materials from creating a traffic hazard.

Current regulations may not be adequate to handle the scale of state-mandated composting operations. In order to ensure a well-run site which could be considered a good neighbor, hours of operation should be regulated to mitigate the potential amonyance of noise and vibration from trucks and other coupment. Regulations should be in place to discovarge animal pests and to control blowing materials at the site. Odors must be mainized. The area should also be well-buffered and well away from any residence. In addition, no pare-scale composting should be established in or near conservation, preservation or recreational areas. In order to protect our water resources, distance from the water table, rivers, and permeable soils should be explained. Composition operations should not occur within the hundred-very flood plain and runoff must be controlled.

The Lague is concerned about the danger of possible pesticide and herbicide contamination of the compost and the spread of such contamination when the compost is used. Thus the Lague believes that the use of pesticides and herbicides should be regulated. FDA standards should be used initially until more definitive information on pesticide degradation is available. Commercial compost should not be used on food crops. Homeowners should minimize the use of pesticides and herbicides, and such treated material should be retained by the homeowner after use by means of mulching and leaving dispings on the laws. Property owners who like laudscapers should request that they leave grass clippings on lawns and handle yard maintenance in the safets manner possible. All such companies should discute themselves on proper disposal techniques and the laws. All public and private generators of yard wasto have the responsibility of keeping waste close to the point of origin; they must essume the cost for their decisions and be left eroponsible for any toxics used on their india. A local registry of substances used by companies and citizens would be a good way to determine what is being applied to lawns and trees in the community.

Government at all levels should be involved in setting standards and regulations to protect the environment. The Federal government should mandate that each state produce plans for recycling and the composting of yardwares, as well as provide education to ensure the success of these programs. State government should write regulations and set minimum standards. It is should issue site permits and inspect and review sites to assure compliance with its regulations. The Department of Energy and Natural Resources should provide support through oducation and funding grants. The State has minimal but underitable enforcement obligations, practically geaching, however, enforcement is best accomplished at the country or municipal level, where a shortened response time and greater concern can make for greater efficiency. The county should provide education and design programs as well as set more stringent regulations with strong and efficient enforcement. The Zoning Board of Appeals should hold public hearings and set such rules for Conditional Use Permits for compositions are reflect public opinion. Municipal governments must provide leadership by preserging and enforcing regulations that are consistent with the standards.

Financial responsibility should rest primarily with the individual to encourage source reduction: municipanties should also be involved to guard against illegal disposal.

Large-scale composting should be operated by a combination of public and private interests, and the sites used can be either publicly or privately owned. However, since forest preserves exist for the purposes of preservation and recreation, the League believes that the Lake County Proest Preserve District should have no role in Jarge-scale composting (1991 positions).



Alice Sievert. Treasurer, reports that the financial books have been audited by Ann Hollis.

The bank records and reimbursements of the League of Women Voters of Lake Forest-Lake Bluff as of March 9, 1995, were examined and found to be in agreement with the Treasurer's records and reports. The accounts payable were also audited and those transactions were found to be properly documented and records in good order.

75 Years

A Voice for Citizens: A Force for Change

## FEATS AND FACTS

The League of Women Voters is one of America's unique and venerable political institutions. Throughout our 75-year history, our members have helped shape American political life. This factsheet gathers together a few of the memorable hishelbehs likustrating what the League does and what we stand form.

The Founding: The League was founded in 1920 at the Chicago convention of the National American Woman Suffrage Association, six months prior to passage of the 19th Amendment granting women the right to vote.

"Winning the vote is only an opening wedge . . . but to learn to use it is a bigger task."

First legislative victory: Passage of the Sheppard-Towner Act in 1921, providing federal money for maternal and children's programs. This act offered proof that the League's grassroots lobbying and coalition-building were effective legislative tool.

Dully the lobby met, late in the afternoon of a hard day of work, and compared notes on the day and planned for the morrow. Dully they consulted as to how soon it would be safe to press for a vote, as to the best way of meeting the amoustion hot came from a belief that the states should not be halped in this work by the federal covernment.

Most recent legislative victory: The 1993 passage of the National Voter Registration Act, also known as "motor voter."

This bill will help enfranchise militions of Americans who have been shut out of the political process by making voter registration none uniform and accessible.

"When the barriers are broken down — and this legislation breaks them down — citizens will be able to assume their rightful place at the center of our nation's experiment in democratic government."

Most famous member: Eleanor Roosevelt, wife of President Franklin D. Roosevelt and active member of the New York League.

Hardest-won victory: Passage of the 19th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution — a 72-year struggle to obtain the right to vote for women. The amendment was ratified on August 26, 1920.

Let us be thankful we are voters today in this world of turnoil and unrest. There has not been a time in our generation when such opportunities have been presented to the voters, such need for wise judgement and final intelligent actions based on careful investigation and sobser thought."

Most courageous stand: In response to the abuses of President Truman's Loyalty Program, the League developed a program to educate critizens about their individual rights. In 1955 League president Percy Maxim Lee testified against Senator Joseph McCarthy's abuse of congressional investigative powers.

"I believe tolerance and respect for the opinions of others is being jeopardized by men and women whose instincts are worthily particle, but whose minds are apparently unwilling to accept the necessity for dissent within a democracy."

jobs. Later, the League's push for civil rights led to a parallel move vigorously for ratification of the amendment.

We will turn our frustration and anger over the denial of ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment into determined efforts to achieve ERA's goals through other means."

Most frequent misunderstanding about the League: That taking positions on political issues makes us partisan. The League is a nonpartisan of ganutation: we don't support parties or candidates. Nonpartisan does not mean nonpolitical, however. After studying and debating issues, the League develops consensus positions that we then actively work to support through grassroots lobbying.

"Is the [League] political? Certainly, but not partisan. Its members are as free as other women to join and vote with the party of their choice. They make no pledge otherwise in joining the League."

First League-sponsored televised presidential debate: 1976 debates between Jimmy Carter and Gerald Ford, for which the League wom an Emmy Award. These debates followed a tradition of providing voter information; in 1928 the League sponsored Weet the Candidates, 'the first national radio broadcast of a candidate forum.

How the League reaches its positions: A two-year process of study and consensus. At its biennial convention, the League selects issues to be studied. After conducting a nationwide study involving massive information gathering and public dialogue, the study committee develops a questionnaire. Each League then debates the issue to arrive at a consensus. This consensus is neither a simple majority nor unanimity, rather, it is the "sense of the group" as expressed through the exchange of ideas and opinions.

The League of Women Voters Education Fund: Established in 1957, the Education Fund is dedicated to increasing citizen understanding of major public policy issues and to promoting citizen involvement in government decision making. To further this mission, the Education Fund conducts research and produces publications on a variety of environmental, social, international and government issues.

Best slogaa: "Take Back the System." In 1992, with the voters' confidence and involvement in the electoral system at an all-time low, the League of Women Voters Education Fund launched its Take Back the System campaign in an effort to reverse thit rend.

"Our energy, experience and enthusiasm will be contagious. Our democracy will be stronger and better for the effort we make. It's our system. It was designed to work for us — and be responsive to us. It's time to take it back.

Most pervasive myth: There are no men in the League. In 1974, the League's bylaws were changed to allow men to join. Several men have since served as state League presidents.

Technological changes: In 1921, Carrie Chapman Catt used three quarts of ink in conducting her correspondence; in 1959, the League used 110 pounds of mimeograph ink; in 1994, League computer printers used 21 laser carridges — in addition, we are conducting more and more of our grassroots correspondence via the Internet. By 1996 we hope to have voter information on-line across the country.





## Update on ERA

At the state level, the Equal Rights Amendment, HJR 14 CA, was reintroduced with bi-partisan sponsorship in the Illinois House this past spring. There are five primary co-sponsors, led by Louis Lang (D-Skokle). It is currently in the House Executive Committee and was not heard this spring.

At the national level, Sonator Ted Kennedy (D-MA) has reintroduced the ERA in the Senate without a time limit for ratification. Rep. Rob Andrews (D-M) has introduced a resolution in the House stating that if three more states ratify ERA, Congress will take whatever action may be necessary to validate ratification.

# LWVIL 47th BIENNIAL CONVENTION SUMMARY

The 47th Biennial Convention of the League of Women Voters of Illinois was held June 3-4, 1995, at the Bismarck Hotel in Chicago, IL.

## Plenary Sessions

The LWVIL Budget for 1995-96 in the amount of \$135,185.00 was adopted. PMP for 1995-96 will be \$17.50; PMP for 1996-97 will be \$18.00.

Bylaws were amended to change the wording in four articles. Each would require that convention materials be mailed six weeks, instead of the current two-months, prior to the convention and council.

Program: The recommended program items and one not-recommended item were adopted. The delegates voted to retain the current positions with a concurrence on the proposed revision of the Criminal Justice position. The program for the 1995-97 biennium will include:

A Working Committee on State Tax and School Funding Reform

Education of members and the public; advocacy at the state level; work with state-wide coalitions; support local Leagues who choose to work actively on these issues.

An Action Focus on Breaking the Cycle of Violence: Promote efforts to prevent violence in all forms in the lives of children:

Education of members and the public; collaboration to bring abut changes in local communities; lobbying at federal, state and local levels.

A Task Force on Senior Care

the LWVIL office.

A) to develop a survey to be used by local Leagues to identify needs and strategies for living and care options for the elderly, and

B) to recommend what, if any, future activities LWVIL should undertake.

Two Will of Convention motions were passed, LWVIL will:

Support Cook County and Chicago Leagues' health care reform efforts by distributing periodic information to local Leagues;

Provide guidance and encouragement to local Leagues to speak to their legislators regarding the lack of reasoned discussion and public input in the legislative process during this past session.

<u>LWVIL Officers and Board Members and Nominating Committee</u> were elected unanimously. Delegates also voted to re-nominate LWVIL Past President Eleanor Revelle to the Board of Directors of the LWVUS.



- 1) The League believes that the legislative process must be open to the public and provide ample opportunities to evaluate and comment on legislative proposals, particularly during committee proceedings.
  - 2) "East track" legislation in which identified problems were impored for the sake of political expediency
  - 3) The League believes it is crucial to seek public and professional input and to proceed with measured deliberation on complex issues.
  - 4) Diminished input of individual legislators with the increasing control of party leadership.
  - 5) The League believes that in order for our system of government to be representative, responsive and accountable, the viewpoints of individual legislators must be sought and respected. --- reported by Susan Kessler

# KIDS' 1ST HEALTH FAIR CONTINUES TO GROW

Attendance at the Kids 1st Health Fair on August 2nd was obviously much greater, according to volunteers who have worked more than one year. The lines of people never stopped until mid-afternoon, but the breathing spell was short and the crowds returned after work. We have a more accurate account of the number of children attending this year. 1700 children arem with their parents/guardians and 2430 toys and backpacks/totes were distributed. The following comparisons are now available, with much more yet to come:



1993 490 families 312 lead tests 585 kids immunizations 371 dental screenings 1994 606 families 374 lead tests 681 kids immunizations 828 dental screenings

1995 706 families 483 lead tests 938 kids immunizations 1208 dental screenings

We tried having local outreach committees in targeted towns; all of them ran buses/vans into the Fair, but it did not increase the percent attendance from outlying areas. However, since the total attendance was up, the actual number of families from outlying areas was greater, to

Needless to say, virtually every book and most of the backpacks and toys were distributed to delighted kids. effort that local Leaguers put into collecting, sorting, and packing these is much appreciated. There were also lots of loyal Leaguers volunteering the day of the Fair. In fact, it was like old home week for some. It is these 600 volunteers that make the Fair so successful.— and we can't thanky our enough.

# Report on Knollwood Annexation Breakfast Mtg. 9/21/95

Fourteen highly molivated League members met al crack of dawn in or view the existing League position, which supports the annexation of Knortwood by Lake Bluff. This position was adopted by Lake Bluff. This position was adopted to the Lake Fortes League, and before a 1890's annexation attempt approved by Knothwood, but rejected by 3 votes in Lake Bluff.

Recently a group of Knollwood residents initiated a re-examination of annexation, and contacted the Village Board of Trustees. A Joint Task Force was set up, a consultant was hired and the report, "Knollwood Annexation Fiscal Impact Analysis", submitted in December 1994.

We reviewed this 50 page report. League members who had been involved with the previous amnexation attempt and with subsequent efforts by Knolwood to incorporate, provided insights into the issues involved, both currently and in the past. Members with expertise in assessing costs for municipal services, evaluated the consultant's cost

We found that the report failed to address the major advantages which annexation would provide to Lake Bluff residents, and failed to investigate the possibility that annexation costs could be cut by phasing in municipal services and possibly by delaying a fix denartment merger.

The principal benefits of annexation to Knollwood were listed as: a more rapid police response time and regular patrols, twice-weekly garbage pick-up, greater zoning control, Lake Bluff Library membership and improved water pressure for fire department needs.

However, the Isting of advantages to Lake Bluff residents failed to mention that 1) Lake Bluff children attending Park District pre-school classes and the Lake Bluff Children's Center in Knollwood's West School would also benefit from better profice response time and improved water pressure in case of fire; that 2) contiguous boundaries for Schools, Park and Village would allow for cost savings due to equipment sharing; and

that 3) zoning control by the Vifage over areas currently within the 18 shoot and park districts, would be of financial benefit to Lake Blut residents. Some Knollwood residents lear that ameasaion would bring higher property values and higher taxes and user fees. While tax rates for the Lake Bluff Elementary School and Park Districts and the LFLB High School District would not be changed by annexation, tax rates for municipal services would increase somewhat, if existing services are taken over and additional services providers. Lake Bluff, Alf present, services are provided by Lake County, Shield's Township, other traxing bodies, or are contracted for by individual homeowners.

A major initial funding shortfall is projected by the consultant, if Lake Bluff assumes responsibility for these services immediately after an annexation. This is due to the long lag between property tax collection in Lake County and distribution to municipalities. The Village is now investigating whether annexation can be followed by a gradual phase-in of Village services or an immediate transfer of tax revenues from governmental bodies which currently provide these services. Unless this can be done, the shortfalls in years 1 and 2 after annexation would be \$936.800 and \$211,500, respectively. Financing a bond issue @7% interest would add \$700,000 over the life of the bond. The shortfall would be much lower in years 3 through 19, and would become a surplus in year 20.

The outcome of any annexation referendum would most likely hinge on financial considerations. These would include the size and duration of the shortfall, how expenses would be apportioned between Knollwood and Lake Bluff residents, and whether residents of each area would have adequate assurance that they would not have to pay for near term infrastructure

Some votes may be cast on the basis of lears that annexation would change the character of a community, and some Knollwood residents are concerned that they might not have representation on the Village Board.

Hopefully some of these concerns were addressed at the October 18, 1995 informational meeting on Knollwood annexation, which was planned by Knollwood residents and the Village Board. Other League members from Lake Forest assisted at the meeting and are in charge of annexation petitions which are available for signature by Knotlwood property owners on the two Saturdays following the meeting.

Good news! Progress Illinois, the tax reform coalition chaired by the League, has received a \$20,000 grant to develop a tool (or model) to evaluate proposals that will impact tax and school funding proposals.

Earlier Progress had received a grant to investigate whether the state has a structural deflot in its General Funds. That research has been completed by a team of professors from the institute of Government and Public Affairs at the University of Illinois and a report will be issued this fall.

The initial research will demonstrate how the growth of the Funds revenue is unable to keep pace with the state's expenditures. The second piece will be valuable to help evaluate the effect of proposed programs or legislation on Illinois' revenue growth, local communities and taxopayers.



### FIELD REPRESENTATIVES (5:30 a.m. until poll closing)

Problem solvers for the County Clerk's Office who visit each polling place in their assigned area twice during the Election Day, once in the morning and once in the afternoon. They check to see that the polling place is set up and running property, check the booths for tampering, look for electioneering concerns and nawer any questions judges may have. After the rounds, they may be asked to return to spots where there are problems to relay the appropriate responses to the Clerk's Office.

### MID-POINT REPRESENTATIVES (6:30 p.m. to completion)

Teams of two to travel to the twelve ballot collection stations throughout Lake County to pick up the voted ballots and drive them to the County Building for tabulation The Lake County Clerk's Office is tooking for League members to serve on Election Day in many capacities. Earnings (ranging for \$35 to \$125) would go to the League of your choice. This is a good way to serve in a nonpanisan role, become more familiar with Election Day procedures and problems, and help the League at the same time.

# RECONCILIATION TEAMS (6:00 p.m. to completion)

These individuals help the election judges as needed after the polls close. They may assist with election judge paperwork and initial ballot counting.

### UNVOTED ABSENTEE REPRESENTATIVES (8:30 a.m. - 1:00 p.m.)

Three teams of two to go to the off-site voting locations (townships and municipal offices) to pick up the unvoted absentee balloting materials, unvoted ballots, voting machines, specimen booklets, etc.

### VOTED ABSENTEE REPRESENTATIVES (noon to 5:00 p.m.)

Groups of two to take the absentee ballots which come in the morning mail on Election Day and take them to the polling places

Election judges are partisan positions. League members in many communities serve as election judges.

### Route 53 Extension

A committee of four drove Rt. 53 to Rt. 120 and on to Richmond, It was noted that there is an enormous amount of development in the area and roads are overcrowded.

There is no relationship between the availability of good roads and the building of new housing. More roads seem to be desperately needed.

IMPACT OF BOADS ON THE ENVIRONMENT: Beryl Flom reported attending an environmental meeting in Libertyville. Studies show that roads affect vegetation for 400 feet on each side.

As to wetlands, the kind of wetland is what is important; wetlands cannot be generally categorized. The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, the Army Corps of Engineers, the EPA and the Federal Highway Department have to agree on environmental issues. The Federal Highway Department makes the final decision.

Should we as a league decide to reject the LWVIS's concept we may recommend an alternative program. Our response, along with that of every other league from across the country, will be submitted to the delegates for debate and possible adoption at the 1996 convention in June.

Details of this program proposal and its ramifications follow.

# Questions and Answers About Program Planning 1996-98

- Q. What will happen to League work on issues at the national level if the Initiative to Renew Democracy is adouted?
- A. The LWYUS will give high priority to work on issues addressed by our Government positions, taking a strong leadership role in promoting legislation that will further the initiative, such as campaign finance reform. This will include work at the national level and where appropriate, at the state and local levels.

Rebuilding citizens' confidence in government and their role in the governing process is an essential first step in making real progress on issues addressed by League positions in other program areas. We must help citizens rediscover what binds us together as a nation if we are to succeed in finding shared solutions to the many complex problems that confront our communities todds.

- Q. How will the initiative affect our League's work on state and local issues?
- A. Leagues may continue to adopt issues for state and local study and action at their conventions and annual meetings. They may also continue to make use of national positions in their work on state and local issues. By reaffirming existing national positions in Government, International Relations, Natural Resources and Social Policy, convention delegates will provide the basis for such work.
- Q. Will adopting the initiative prevent the League from responding to changed circumstances?
- A. No. The League must continue to retain the flexibility to take action in any area if the national political outlook changes. Furthermore, the policy for state and local League action on national issues will remain the same. After consultation with the LWVUS, Leagues may contact their own members of Congress on any issue, providing the action is consistent with League positions and does not conflict with other advocave refines and confict with other advocave refines and configuration.
- Q. Can our League recommend an issue for emphasis in addition to the initiative?
- A. The national board believes that the initiative, to be effective, must be the sole focus for the national level of the organization. Adopting an issue for emphasis in addition to the initiative would signal "business as usual" for the League at a moment when the organization needs to concentrate its message and resources on a single common goal.
- Q. How should our League go about recommending a study or issue for emphasis?
- A. Your League may recommend an alternative to the initiative, such as a study or an issue for emphasis, for the 1996-98 benium. Describe your proposal in detail on page two of the Program Planning Report Form. Indicate what the problem is that needs to be addressed, how the League's involvement can help resolve the issue, and what specific activities the League's involvement can help resolve the issue, and what specific activities the League should undertake to address the issue. If you are proposing a study, describe the intended scope.

# Questions and Answers About Program Planning 1996-98

- Q. Why is the national board proposing a focus at the beginning of the program planning process rather than waiting to hear from the grassroots?
- A. During the last few months, we have heard from an unusually large number of members of the League and the public, asking the League to do something about the atmosphere of distrust and hostility that increasingly dominates the public debate in our country, no matter which party is in power. Many longine League members likened the current situation to the crisis America faced in the 1950s when the League initiated its "Freedom Aemods".

These messages encouraged us to develop a concept for a League campaign to renew democracy as the focus for the organization's advocacy and education work during the 1996-98 binnium. We presented this concept to League leaders attending Council '95 in June, Their enthusiastic response helped us decide to recommend the campaign to all Leagues for goodiferation during the noneram balantine process.

The final decision on the program focus for the coming biennium, however, rests with the grassroots membership. The response from local and state Leagues will determine whether the program that is submitted to convention delegates in June includes some version of the camazin to renew democracy outlined here.

- O. What was the Freedom Agenda?
- A. The Freedom Agenda project was the League's response to the erosion of the democratic process threatened by Senator Joseph McCarply's attacks on rotivil liberties during the 1950s. The League published six pamphlets written by acknowledged scholars that were estigned to build public understanding of the Bill of Rights. Leagues across the country used these materials as the basis for a series of unprecedented community discussions across the country.
- O. Does the Initiative to Renew Democracy imply a major restructuring of the League?
- A. No. The unparalleled challenges now facing our country seem to demand an extraordinary response from the League. Dedicating our 1996-98 biennium to the task of renewing democracy could be that response. It does not alter the basic nature of the League as a multi-issue organization that both encourages citizen participation and influences rubblic policy.
- Q. How will the national board use the information in the report forms?
- A. The board will look first of all as whether there is strong support for the initiative, from Leagues of all sizes and from all parts of the country. If that is the case, the board will develop goals and a blueprint for the campaign based on the strategies and activities that Leagues suggest on their report forms. The results of League surveys of community leaders also will be an important source of ideas. The board would then submit the campaign as the proposed program for the 1996-98 blennium and plan convention strategy and training sessions to help members implement the initiative. If the report forms indicate stronger support for an alternative to the initiative, the board would develop a proposed program based on those recommendations.

# Rebuilding Citizen Confidence in Government A Challenge Unique to the League of Women Voters

"What is the greatest challenge now facing our nation and our community? What role will the League play in addressing this challenge?"

These are among the questions that we will be discussing at our upcoming program planning meeting as we decide what we think should be the focus for the League nationwide during the 1996-98 biennium.

Lending urgency to our discussion is the growing evideace that our democratic system is in crisis. Frustration with government is mounting, and many citizens seem to have lost sight of their role in the governing process. Excessive partisanship dominates public policy debate, and extremist rethoric endangers our search for the common good—no matter which party is in power.

A Proposal for Our Consideration In response to this challenge, the LWVUS board is taking the unprecedented step of proposing that an Initiative to Renew Democracy be the sole focus for the League's national program for the next two years.

The board believes that the League is uniquely qualified and trusted to help rebuild our political and civic infrastructure. And only by restoring citizens' faith in government can we make real progress on issues addressed by League positions on the environment, social policy and international relations.

The Initiative to Renew Democracy would include both legislative work simed at restoring confidence in the political process and educational projects designed to engage more citizens in civic life. Possible activities might be:

- ★ Advocacy campaigns for legislation to strengthen democracy and the voice of citizens in shaping public policy, such as campaign finance reform
- \* Public journalism projects that would link Leagues with media partners interested in

providing citizen-oriented news coverage to

 Civic education ventures that would create opportunities for citizens to come together in new ways to explore public problems and develon effective problem-solving skills.

What Will Be Our Recommendation? The LWVIJS board is looking for our input.

- \* What do we think our community and our country need from the League right now?
- \* Do we believe that a campaign to renew democracy is the best way for the League to pursue its mission in the coming two years?
- If we agree that such a campaign should be the League's nationwide focus, what kinds of activities do we think would be most effective at strengthening democracy in our community and in the nation.

We hope you will join us for this important discussion. Your ideas are needed!

### Concurrence at Convention

Convention '94 passed a motion asking the LWVUS board to develop a "standard concurrence process that ensures the same high level and standard of informed member agreement that the League, in list wisdom, has required of consensus." In response to that request, the national board adopted the following guidelines in April 1995.

### Guidelines for Concurrence at Convention

These guidelines supplement the program adoption process a detailed in the LMVUS bylaws. Thus, any state of local League that wishes to propose an item for concurrence on the floor of convention must begin by submitting its recommendation to the national board at least three months before convention, as part of the program-planning process. This will ensure that the item is eligible for consideration by the convention in the event that it is not included in the proposed program formulated by the national board.

#### Notice

Any League that plans to propose the adoption or amendment of a national League position by concurrence on the floor of convention shall give notice to all Leagues of its intent to do so at least six weeks before convention.

Rationale: Advance notice of major items of business to come before the convention gives business to come before the convention gives delegates an important opportunity to discuss these items with the rest of their membership, helps them come to convention "informed but on instructed," and promotes good decision making. The six-week time frame coincides with the notice requirement for proposed with the notice requirement for proposed decision in the LWVUS bylaws.

### Background Information

Any League that plans to propose the adoption or amendment of a national League position by concurrence on the floor of convention shall send background information, including pros and cons on the issue and an explanation of the

rationale for using this form of member agreement, to all Leagues at least six weeks before convention.

Rationale: An essential aspect of any member agreement process in the League is that members have an opportunity to become informed about all sides of the issue. The preconvention distribution of objective, balanced background material enables delegages, in consultation with others in their League, to make an informed decision, provides the membership with a common base of knowledge, and lays the groundwork for effective advocation.

# Super Majority Vote A two-thirds vote is required to amend or adopt a national League position by concurrence on the floor of convention.

Rationale: In determining whether a position has been reached during a conventional study involving grassroots member participation, the national board looks for substantial member agreement rather than a simple majority. A similar level of member agreement should be required of a position established by concurrence on the floor of convention, a process that directly involves only a fraction of the total membership. The two-thirds vote requirement corresponds to the super majority required to adopt and suspend the rules of convention, to amend the bylaws and to adopt not-recommended action motions.

Note that the two-thirds usper majority refers, only to the vote required to amend or adapt a national Lergue position by concurrence. A simple majority vote would continue to be required to gain convention consideration of any not-recommended program time, including any state or local League concurrence proposal. Note also that, should the national board whis to propose adoption or amendment of a national position by concurrence are convention, the same two-thirds vote requirement would apply.]



Why: The League has long worked for the repeal of the Retail Rate Law and is pleased to report that on January 11, 1996, HB 1523 was passed by both the Illinois House and Senate. It is now awaiting Governor Edgar's signature. However, incinerator lobbyists and some aides to the governor are urging Governor. Edgar to use his amendatory veto to continue the retail rate subsidy for incinerator projects where "investors have put up money started building or received some level of approval for their projects." The League opposes special exemptions and believes HB 1523 should be signed with no changes.

Background: The Retail Rate Law was passed by the Illinois General Assembly in 1988 to promote "wasteto-energy" technology as an alternative to landfills by subsidizing the sale of electrical power generated by incinerators. As a result of such subsidies, incinerator projects that would otherwise not be economically viable are very lucrative. Illinois communities are currently faced with over 20 new incinerator proposals from out-of-state companies. These could cost Illinois taxpayers \$10 billion over the next twenty years.

In addition to the financial freat, the Refail Rate Law poses a health threat. Incinerators spew toxic chemicals into the air, such as dioxin and furans which have been linked to cancer, birth defects, and reproductive, developmental and neurological damage. The ash left over from the incineration process must be handled as hazardous waste.

Also threatened are the "reduce, reuse, recycle" components of the waste management bierarchy. because the Retail Rate Law promotes incineration at the expense of competing waste reduction and recycling methods which do not receive the same subsidies. Success with waste reduction and recycling is reducing our waste stream and the need for additional landfill space.



#### Illinois Students Vote

StudentlParent Mock Election, to increase students' political awareness and to encourage parents to vote on November 5th. The students will hold their "mock election" one week earlier, on October 30th.

Activities are focused on future voters who will make up a new generation of voting adults within a few years. Students in grades K-12 and their parents are eligible to participate, involving students in a hand-son project like the Mook Election is a vautable teaching tool to increase understanding of the election process. Parents who, along with their children, get excited about the issues and candidates are more likely to vote.

The process is simple. Interested schools register to participate in the program and receive curriculum

of issues and a variety of activities designed to learn about the electoral process lead up to Mock Election Day, October 30. Students and parents cast their votes and await the results broadcast from State and National Election Central Headquarters. CNN will broadcast the national results.

So far, Lake Forest High School and District 65 schools have indicated interest in the project. Over the summer plans will be made to make the election a reality for the students of our community.

## President's Message

Dear League Members

Our League has clearly demonstrated its strength and vitality, both on the national level and on the local community level. In June, Judy Grisamore and prepsented our League at the League of Women Votes of the United States and National Convention held in Chicago, (See page 6 for a summany). The convention established direction for the League for the real two years, Aller much debate, we as delegates voted to support the broad theme, "Making Democracy Work".

Making Democracy Work has specific and limely meaning for our League, Initially the national thame was to be "Initiative to Beneve Democracy". When the delegates decided they didn't like his wording, Judy and I proposed Waking Democracy Work. It was one of three final themes and delegates voted to accept it as the new theme to characterize the national program.

The program, Making Democracy Work has already been "put to work" at a local level. Recently the Leope was asked to assist the Village of Luke Bult in collecting 300 signatures of Luke Bult registered voters. These signatures would ensure that the Knollwood annexation issue would be placed on the balot as an advisory referendrum November 5th. By adhering to the democracity process, those who are either for or against annexing Knollwood into Lake Bult will have an opportunity to cast a balot and vide on this issue.

Since 1982, the League has taken a position in support of the annexation of Knoliwood into Lake Bluff. We have continued to endorse that position over the years, based on zoning issues and a sharing of schools and parks by both communities.

However, as a board we wanted to be updated. We invited John Kaltsas to provide background information at a special meeting. After a review of the annexation history, and discussion on the current for de the League, we agreed we would continue to support annexation, based on reasons for establishing our original position in 1992. We have yet to determine whether the financial impact estimates or details of the special service district plan should influence our future support of annexation.

Each League member was sent an update on Knollwood annoxution which laided the slopes well the biding. We will hold an informationing meeting in October and call an membership meeting to assess our annoxation position. The date for this membership meeting oils sees so on as the date for the informational meeting has been ostablished. We welcome all support and assistance. If you are interested, please give me a call.

As you can see, our program schedule is full. Candidate forums have been agreed upon, and as an organization we are intent on reaching out in ways that will benefit our communities, always striving to make democracy work! #### Illinois Students Vote Mock Election October 30, 1996

As of mat-August 12:00 schools have registered to participate in the *Titinos Students Vede* Student Mock Election. These schools will be receiving two resource guides, "How to 0.6 Tides" from Magazine, to assist cleasmont teachers with materials and teaching adentity suggestions related to the 1996 General Election. The LYWIT, will be sending packets of teaching materials developed for participating fillinois schools to further assist teachers.

On October 30 such school will be responsible for calling or training the results of this school's election vide to a central election site. Those traits will be forwarded to CNN which will report results by 700 pm. EST. Local Leagues are such to serve as facilitators for participating schools in terms providing resources, assisting with the actual mock election, and providing incentives for children to more fully participate in the demonsible process.

We are finalizing our local plans and will be announaging all schools in our area to participate in a mock election. (There are others being offered. The advantage to this one is there is no cost to the school to participate in a rationwide vote.) Lake Forest High School, Lake Bluff Central Elementary, Lake Bluff Middle School, St. Mary's, and Lake Forest Country Day School have indicated interest in this activity.

If you are the parent of a sohool age child, please encourage your school to incluse this activity in the school's curriculum. We will be sharing our plans at a Brown Bag into-Session at Gotton on September 18 at 11:30 a.m. Our primary locus will be to facilitate the actual vote on October 50th and will need mentors in the schools. The Lake County Clerk's office is seeking approximately 250 individuals to work at the Tuesday, November 5, 1996 General Primary Section. According to Lake County Clerk Willard R. Helander vote: tumout for the presidential election is historically very high and a very large team to administer the many election day duties is needed.

If you can do any of these jobs, contact the County Clerk's office at 360-6827. Please have your name, address, telephone number, and social security number available and tell them you are representing the Lake Forest Lake Bull League.

For those positions where individuals must provide their own transportation, mileage will be reinbursed at 30 cents per mile. The County Clerk's office will train election day workers in mild September. Positions available are:

Field Representatives with polling places in assigned areas to ensure that each is set up and functioning properly, check volling booths for lampering, address electionering concerns, answer questions from election judges and make repairs to volling equipment. Field Representatives provide their own transportation. Hours: 5:30 a.m. to approximately 8:00 a.m.

Unvoted Absentee Representatives pick up unvoted absentee ballot materials at off-site voting locations and return them to the County Clerk's office. The Clerk's office provides a mini-van. Hours: 8:30 a.m. to early-afternoon.

<u>Voted Absentee Representatives</u> deliver voted absentee ballots to the polling places. Representatives provide their own transportation. Hours, 12:00 p.m. to approximately 5:00 p.m.

Mid-Point Representatives pick up voted ballots at collection stations throughout Lake County and deliver them to the County building. The Clerk's office provides a van. Hours: 6:00 p.m. to approximately 10:00 p.m.

Collection Station Workers verify that all election materials have been returned, confirm that reconciliation is complete. Iransfer and seal the good voted ballots for tabulation at the County Building. Hours: 7:00 p.m. to approximately 10:00 p.m.

<u>Reconciliation Representatives</u> help election judges with "after the poll's close" reconciliation. Representatives provide their own transportation. Hours: 5:00 p.m. to approximately 10:00 p.m.

Election Results Workers answer telephones and provide election results to the public, Hours: 7:00 p.m. to approximately 1:00 a.m.

On the second day of Convention '96, LWUS President Becky Cain told those assembled, "Right now, this country needs what we have to offer: concern for the public interest, grassroots membership, expertise in citizen involvement. Are we ready to make the commitment?"

On the convention's last day, after having been reducted to her third term as president, Cain returned to the provocative theme. "We have everything we need to transform the political landscape by making government more responsive and more relevant." she said.

She repeated the fitany of the League's strengths. "We are a true public interest organization. Our agenda is the common good. We're in it because we care about the democratic process. We have 75

years of experience in making that process work. But we have something else. Something very precious to the women and men in this room. We have faith in the system. We know that it can still work. We've seen it work. We've made it work."

"Ours is not a neive or blood faith." Cain continued. "We are sware - paintully aware - of all the problems, faults aware - of all the problems, faults and meximings that pleague or system of the problems o

#### PROGRAM

The convention adopted 1989-89 national program for advocacy and education culminating a year-long process that involved fundred of League members. This year, the process was driven by the growing mode of cynicism about government and about citizens' ability to help shape the country's titue. The LHWUS board decided to start off the program planning process by starting with members a process for a concented and comprehensive campaging to strengther themsive campaging to strengther and a shape of the strengther than the strength of themsive campaging the strength of the strength

participated in the program planning process supported the proposed issue for Emphasis: "A comprehensive advocacy and education campaign to make government more responsive to citizens and to build citizen participation and confidence in government," with the working title, Initiative to Penew Democracy. Leagues' responses helped the proposed campaign take shape.

The Issue for Emphasis was proposed as a real departure from League "business as usual." A concerted focus on the Leagues" Core issues" was called for as necessary to ensure an effective campaign. While all current positions would be maintained and while the legislity to respond to other potential action needs would remain, the local and state Leagues participating in the program

planning process supported a two-year emphasis on the League's basic mission: ensuring citizen participation in government.

The convention defeated three notrecommended Items' that illustrated the debate:

- "Adopt Building Sustainable Communities as the goal of our advocacy efforts, with emphasis on health care, early intervention for children at risk, crisis in the community, which includes environmental concerns and opening government to citizens."
- \*The LWVUS should not abandon the 1994-96 Issues for Emphasis but should continue to emphasize in 1996-98 the same substantive and interconnected issues: Health Care, Early Intervention for Children at Risk, Crisis in the Community, and Opening Government to Citizens."
- \* "Adopt a restudy of the role, structure and financing of the United Nations."

Delegates voted their support for adoption of the proposed Issue for Emphasis, renamed "Making Democracy Work."

The convention readopted all current LWUS positions in Government, International Relations, Natural Resources and Social Policy, with no changes.

The LWVUS will publish a new edition of Impact on Issues for the new biennium in fall 1998. The 1996-98 edition will include updates on action taken under League positions during the past two years.



#### Local Update: Knollwood Annexation

Informational Meeting Held on October 23 at Lake Bluff Middle School on October 23, the League held a public forum at the Lake Bluff Middle School on the proposed annexation of the Notiwood into Lake Bluff. The meeting began at 730 pt. and last 3-1/2 hours - the final question was asked at 11:00 p.m.! The meeting was cablecast like, gavel to gavel, and will be broadcast on Cable Channel 19 on Fridays at 830 pt.m.; Saudrudays, 1030 at m., and Sundays, 1030 at m.

The Lesgue's goal was of offer an objective forum, a forum that would allow those officials with different views to weigh in on the proposed annextanion of Knollwood into Late Bluff. Officials answering questions included representatives from the Lake Courtly Board, Lake Bluff Park Board, Lake Bluff Pan Commission, School District 65. Shields Township and the Villago of Lake Bluff.

Here is how the League put this program together. Nineteen questions were compiled by a committee of thirteen League members. We identified key concerns relating to americation, decided on appropriate questions to address those concerns, and several drafts later, included our questions as welf as program logistics. At the meeting, League questions were asked to officials until 900 p.m. We allowed for an intermission and resumed the program with questions from members of the audericane until 11:00 p.m. Over 50 questions were submitted before the program began, and we collected approximately 300 questions in all Our question screeners, Diane Lloyd, Beth Kress and Flains Salvron did an exceptional ob dividing the questions risk precific categories.

We are confident that the forum addressed all the most significant questions surround annexation. Each official body that responded to questions did an excellent job. We believe it is fair to say that those who attended the forum (approximately 300), or those who leved it on cable, were pleased with the results.

A special thanks goes to Melanie Rummel who moderated the first meeting on the Knotlwood annexation and agreed to moderate the forum on Cotober 23d. She proved to be a perfect moderator. Additional thanks to Lorraine Bach, Per Hording, Eleanor Knight, Cail Lysko and Mary Lane Matthews for their work as timers, ushers overall program coordination.

Many League members worked to ensure the success of the program. They include Phyllis Albrecht, Christa Donnelly, Linda Hinde, Susan Garrett, Carol Russ Gilbert, Nancy, Hansen, Joan Kaltsas, Liese Kant, Cindy Morehead, Jan Schnobrich and Alice Siever.

The League should be proud of our efforts to inform the voters on this issue. Residents of both Knollwood and Lake Bluff expressed appreciation for being able to receive the facts in a neutral and comprehensive manner.

#### ILLINOIS STUDENTS VOTE MOCK ELECTION

In the next issue of League Lines that results of the Illinois Students Vote Mock Election on October 30 will be reported.  Do you believe campaign finance reform is needed? If so, what do you believe are the necessary elements in effective campaign finance reform legislation?

Campaign finance reform is desperately ted to end special interest mation of the political process and restore popular faith in our government. While campaigns have grown far too expensive and focused on paid advertising, legislation aimed at restricting contributions has failed to blunt the power of large contributors to influence elections and legislation. Too often the very scale of largesse heaped upon incumbents forecloses the sort of challenge which would force public scrutiny of a candidate's record and fundraising. I would focus reforms on ensuring that every federal election offers voters a credible alternative through public financing for candidates who agree to strict spending and fundraising limits. Atternatively, I would endorse a ten dollar refundable tax credit for campaign contributions to ensure that average Americans have an impact on elections proportionale to their numbers not their wealth of political clout.

2. What should the federal government's role be in promoting the economic security of merican families?

Whether we wish it or not, the federal government plays a profound role in determining the economic experience of all Americans. Unfortunately, this role is often misunderstood, or worse, misstated for

political gain. Even Republican Presidential condidate Bibb Dole complains that the current strength of the corrown year. Bide for familiar let broadly shared prospenty, that "the rich processing the prospent of the same discount work harder and harder for less." Most Americans feel overtaxed - and they should, 44% of personal income taxes in 1996 go just to pay interest on the federal debt. If not for the "supply side" tax cuts of the '80's, that money would be available to support education, provide health care, or lower taxes. And by competing for capital, that huge debt raises interest rates, imposing a stealth tax on all Americans who horrow to buy a house, a car, or a college education or carry credit card balances, and on businesses that borrow to invest and build the economy. In 1993, President Clinton courageously delayed middle class tax cuts to ensure credible delicit reduction. The result has been 4 years of declining deficits, improved economic growth, and falling interest rates. Many homeowners saved thousands by refinancing their mortgages. The Republican plan threatens to reverse this progress, with

unspecified spending cuts, supply-side "dynamic scoring" and economic wishful thinking, it is a credit card offer the American people cannot afford.

The Republicans often criticize Washington for taking on responsibilities better left to the people. The Federal Reserve's policy of controlling Inflation by limiting economic growth and maintaining stack in labor markets has had profoundly negative consequences for the American economy and society. Wage-earners fail to share in productivity gains, and many Americans are simply left out of the economy altogether. What can we do? First we must continue and build upon President Clinton's success in reducing the deficit. It is simply un-American to indenture America's children in perpetuity because we are unwilling to deal honestly with taxes and entitlements. We must carefully target tax relief to the overburdened middle class, to encourage real investment in education and capital that increases productivity and prevent rising wages from vanishing in a

self-defeating inflationary spiral. As President Clinton has proved, it is possible to reduce the deficit imorove the economy and, recent ly, even increase wages - all without accelerating inflation. It requires leadership, commitment, and a firm grasp of economic reality

3. There is currently a ban on the manufac ture and sale of assault weapons, such as UZIs and AK-47s. What is your position on proposals to repeal the ban?

4. The federal government now provides health care coverage for the elderly and the poor, including millions of poor children, through Medicare and Medicald, Should these programs be cut back, should they be retained at current lovels or should the federal government's role be expanded to ensure that all Americans have health insurance?

America has the greatest system of health care delivery in the world, but our system of financing health care, based on private insurance underwriting is expensive, wasteful, and fails to adequately protect even those Americans who have private insurance. Too often, and for too many, private insurance is like the child's game Survivor where every change in employment or insurance status offers insurers a chance to drop those who truly need insurance, leaving only a few healthy individuals paying too high premiums. Medicare and Medicaid have been overburdened with the discards of the private system and their growing costs threaten to balloon the federal budget. And the future will be worse. Genetic screening, which should offer insight into the mechanism of disease and warning for early detection. instead threatens patients with exile from the private insurance system, should they possess "markers" for some disorder. The recently passed Kennedy- Kassebaum legislation which quarantees portability for those currently insured is a first step, but it leaves many pitfalls remaining. It is time the federal government took steps to insure that all Americans have access to quality affordable health care

Should the federal government continue to set regulations to protect the environment and public health?

Ves, just as a consensus was building in the country that recognizes that environmental protections provide cost effective means of controlling floods processing wastewater, conserving soil and water, supporting recreation. controlling disease, and generally improving the quality of life for all Americans, the Republican takeover of Congress has put all of this progress in leopardy. I do not believe the American neonle are ready to abandon decades of bipartisan efforts to clean up our air and water, and to preserve our natural heritage for our children and grandchildren lust to appease the big polluters, developers and resource exploiters who have been allowed to draft legislation for the Republican leaders. And I do not believe that the American people are willing to accept relaxation of public health standards that leave them wondering whether their drinking water and food supply are sale for their children. I will work tirelessly to ensure that we preserve and protect our natural resources for future generations.

#### Responses of John E. Porter - Republican

1. Do you believe campaign finance reform is needed? If so, what do you believe are the necessary elements in effective campaign finance reform legislation?

The big money poured into political campaigns has turned them into big business -- professional marketers determine a candidate's stance on the issues based on their evaluation of what will "sell" and then use negative advertising to destroy their opponent through personal attacks and misleading claims. This leaves voters feeling that no candidate is honest or deserving of support.

The solution is legislation to encourage low campaign spending limits, local involvement, volunteer participation and attention to the Issues. I have infroduced H.R. 3912 to impose a spending limit of \$300,000 on House elections, If a candidate exceeds that

fimit, their opponent receives compensating support (the Supreme Court has held mandatory limits unconstitutional). My bill would halve the current fimit on Political Action Committee (PAC) contributions while doubling the firmit on individual contributions. I would require that two-thirds of a candidate's funds come from individual donors with no more than 20% of such funds coming from donors living outside the congressional district. My bill would reduce the overwhelming money being poured into campaigns, decrease the influence of PACs, increase the role of individuals from the district and promote candidates responsive to local concerns.

2. What should the federal government's role be in promoting the economic security of American families?

The federal government must create a prosperous economic climate for families by balancing the budget. A balanced

budget means lower long and short term interest rates, reduced inflationary pressures, greater availability of capital for productive use, and an end to annual increases in the national debt and debt service costs (already over \$200 billion annually). For families, this means lower priced goods, reduced interest costs for homes automobiles and student loans and improved employment opportunities.

Deficit reduction is and has been my highest priority. Independent organizations such as Citizens Against Government Waste, the National Taxpavers Union Watchdoos of the Treasury, Inc., the Concord Coalition, the U.S. Chamber of Congress and Citizens for a Sound Economy have repeatedly recognized me for my efforts along these lines. In its report entitled "Tough Choices: Who Made Them and Who Didn't "the Concord Coalition ranked me in the 92nd percentile in Congress for my deficit reduction efforts in 1994. The National Taxpayers Union analysis for 1995 shows

that I ranked near the top for my votes to control spending.

 There is currently a ban on the manufacture and sale of assault weapons, such as UZIs and AK-47s. What is your position on proposals to repeal the ban?

I consistently support legislation to place tough restrictions on the easy availability of handguns and to ban weapons that have no recreational or sporting purpose.

I strongly supported enactment of the Assault Weapons Ban in 1994. I led a bipartisan team that worked on the House floor during the weeks preceding the vote to identify and hold support for the proposal. I oppose repealing this law.

l also strongly supported the Brady Bill requiring the Attorney General to establish a background check system to event sales of handguns to convicted froms, fuglitives, individuals with histories of serious mental illness and drug addicts. I also worked hard to enact this law and oppose efforts to weaken it.

4. The federal government now provides health care coverage for the elderly and the poor, including millions of poor children, through Medicare and Medicaid. Should these programs be cut back, should they be retained at current levels or should the federal government's robe be expanded to ensure that all Americans have health insurgnee?

Our health care system has the best technology, personnel, innovation and research. Nevertheless, many are

Lam committed to preserving Medicare and ensuring that seniors receive high quality services at an affordable cost. The fund that news hospital benefits will be bankrupt by 2001 and Medicare must be reformed to prevent this. Preserving choice is central to Medicare reform. Under legislation | support seniors could stay under the current Medicare program and pay the Part B premium at the same (31.5%) percentage, or they could elect one of four fully prepaid programs such as managed care organizations (HMOS). preferred provider organizations (PPOS). networks set up by doctors and hospitals. or medical savings accounts. They could not be denied entry into any program and could change programs when desired. On November 13th, Virginia Fiester-Frederick, former State Representative and Grace Mary Stern, former State Senator joined together in a candid and humorous discussion, "Conversations Across the Aisle: The General Assembly Then & Now". They talked, among other things, about their roles as "Temale" legislatures paying the way in a male dominated government.

Virginia recalled the high emotions during the attempted passage of the ERA amendment, saying that "women lay prostrate on 'the Well' of the State Capitol Building" in protest and support, while "a very fat man walked across the women". When the June 30th deadline was upon them, the women legislators gathered at the Well singing "We Shall Overcome". The then Speaker gaveled continuously, demanding loudly, "Business as usuall". Finally, the ultra-conservatives began singing "God Bless America", drowning the women out. After all, there were far fewer women than men.

On the treatment of female members by male members in the State Senate, Grace Mary recalled that none of the men would dare help a woman. Some would explain what was going on, but no more. They (the men) "treated her like the plaque" and not even the Democratic men would inin the women for dinner or a movie"

Both Virginia and Grace Mary did soree that presence of women has forced a change in lifestyles in Springfield. Other topics discussed were campaign finance reform. the speaker's role and power, and significant contributions of which the two women felt proud

The program was closed with a spirited and very entertaining performance by the Grace Mary Stern Chorus. Their final song, written especially for the League and this program, was sung by all to the tune of "Oh. Beautiful for Spacious Skies". We wanted to share the verse with you:



#### Part 2: CONSIDERATION OF NEW ITEMS

In addition to reviewing current positions, the process of program planning involves deciding where the League should focus its resources for the next biennium.

The options regarding new items include recommendations to:

"adopt an action focus, which can combine citizen education and advocacy using an existing position from either the state or national level (See the discussion in the box below distinguishing between an action focus and a legislative priority.)

None of the three current action items will automatically continue. If a local League is interested in any of them being extended to the 1997-99-biennium, it should be recommended on the report form.

In evaluating a new study idea or proposed action focus, consider the following key questions:

- Is there strong and broad member interest in the issue?
- \* Is your League willing and able to work on the issue?
- " to the issue state-wide?
- \* Will liming and political realities permit effective League action?
- \* Is League involvement likely to make an impact?
- " Is there an existing state or national position which can be used as the basis for action? (If yes, an action focus is needed; if no, a new study is needed.)

#### ACTION FOCUS OR LEGISLATIVE PRIORITY: WHAT'S THE DISTINCTION?

An action focus is a program item adopted by delegates at convention which involves a partnership between the state and local Leagues, working together over a two year period in a concerted effort to further a League goal. LWIL provides informational material and training to help local Leagues engage in effective action in their communities. While LWVIL engages in complementary activities at the state level, legislative priorities are established yearly by the LWNL Legislative Committee before the annual spring session of the Illinois legislature. Local Leagues are notified of the priorities after they are approved by the state board. The priorities reflect both the interests of the League and the prevailing political climate and serve to direct the efforts of the League lobbylist. Time for Actions, which enauge the local Leagues in lobbyling on specific legislation, are generally reserved for legues of the highest priority.

#### Fort Sheridan Update

In the Friday, December 20, 1996, edition of the <u>Chicago Tribune</u> the decision by the Fort Sheridan Restoration Advisory Board regarding repair of Landfils 6 8 7 was reported. This report is laken from that article (MetroLake Section, page 1) and a letter sent by LWV-LFLB to Colleen Reilly, BRAC Environmental Coordinator.

Following lengthy discussion, the 17-member advisory board decided not to oppose the cleanup plan proposed by the Department of the Army. The plan calls for the repair of the two leaking landfills instead of digging up the garbage and dumping it somewhere else.

Our league was concerned with the short notice given for this meeting to discuss a lengthy document containing comments by the community and technical responses by the Army. Several questions concerning the technical aspects of the propose drepair were faved to Colleen Reilly, BRAC Environmental Coordinator who was to address these issues at the meeting.

Under federal law, the Army must search for and remove any toxins lefts on the base. No property can be transferred to new owners until the land is declared clean by the U.S. and illinois Environmental Protection Agencies. Both of these agencies have endorsed the repair plan for Landfulls 6 and 7 which are known to be leaking into the air and the water of Lake Michigan.

The cleanup plan includes rerouting the storm drain, constructing a gas collection system, and installing a new, state-of-the-art cap made of impervious materials that will keep out rainwater.

The landills were used during the 1940s and again in the 1970s when the Army dumped its garbage into what was then Weil Ravine. Army officials say the contents are thought to be largely household waste and construction debris. Concern by local officials and environmental groups focuses on the fact that the content of the fandfill is unknown. Peter Koukos, Highland Park city councilman asked, "Who is going to build anything next to a landfill that will be worth anything... when we don't even know what is in thereo?"

The landfills are know to be emitting toxic gases and leaking chemical-tainted liquids into the take via a storm drain that runs underneath the dump area. A cap that was placed atop the fill about 1980 has failed, allowing rainwater to enter and wash out chemicals into surrounding ground water and soil.

The Army considered excavating the landfills but gave up the idea as too costly (estimates ranged from \$37.6 million to \$711.7 million) and too risky, because partially decomposed garbage is considered hazardous. Once Army officials sign off on the repair plan, work can begin this spring. It will be three years before the new cap can be installed. Relity stressed that if at any time capping appears to be inadequate, the Army will book for another remedy.

#### MAKING DEMOCRACY WORK

#### Review of Role of Township Government Program

The bitter cold certainly did not keep people away from hearing a panel of four township supervisors answer questions on township government in Lake Forest and Lake Bluff. Supervisors who participated were Marilyn Crain (West Desribelf) Chaptes [Stroprad] (Shields) Blooth Moroney (Desribelf) (Bluff) Peterson (Vernon).

The program, organized and expertly moderated by League Program Chair Elaine Slayton, included discussion of township structure, budget and special assistance. Each supervisor answered fifteen to wenty questions prepared by a League committee. In addition, the supervisors responded to several written questions submitted by members of the audience. The program was highly informative, and in fact, it may be the first program of its kind, featuring our elected township supervisors answering tough questions on the role of township outpergrament.

### Discussion on Lake Forest Representation Update

On January 16th, Susan Garrett presented information to members of the Lake Forest City Council to encourage them to consider benefits and issues associated with the number of aldermen, number of wards and possible redefinition of ward boundaries in Lake Forest.

The information and subsequent comments centered on 1990 Census information and recent population growth and population shifts in Lake Forest. Because of rapid and steady growth, the League asked the Council to consider its alternatives to ensure that the City continues to provide for proportionate representation within and among wards. The League recommended that the City Council:

1) form a committee to address population growth and its effect on government in Lake Forest; and

2) commission an estimate of population in each ward; and

 consider pros and cons of expanding the number of aldermen and/or adjusting boundaries and number of wards.

The City Council asked the City staff to follow with an updated estimate of current population in each ward by April 3001. This is a positive and appropriate first step for the City and its residents. It will likely lead to the productive dialogue we encourage. The League is proud to have played its role by encouraging the discussion and debate.

#### Consolidated Election Day - Tuesday, April 1, 1997

The Consolidated Election will be held on Tuesday, April 1, 1997. At issue are four positions on the Shields County Board of Trustees, three positions on the Lake Bluff Village Board, four positions on the Lake Bluff Park District Board and a Park District Referendum in Lake Bluff.

Lese Karn (LWV-LFLB Publicity chair) has provided the following information to local newspapers to inform the public. Because for many of us this day falls in the middle of the school spring break, you need to make special arrangements to cast your vole. Please remind your friends and neighbors who you know might be out of town during this election that they, too, may need to file applications for absentee voting and to vote before leavying town.



#### VOTER REGISTRATION DEADLINE

The voter registration deadline for this election is March 3. Voter registration service is available at the County Clerk's Office in Waukegan, the Shieds Township Supervisor's Office during regular business hours, and the Lake Bluff Library during weekday and weekend hours.

#### APPLICATION FOR ABSENTEE BALLOTS.

Beginning February 20, amplications for assentee bailots can be obtained from the County Clark's Office (360-6828). Applications also can be picked-up at the Township Supervisor's office and from either the Lake Forest or Lake Bluff municipal offices. The deadline for the County Clark's receipt of applications for absentee bailots is March 27. Completed mail-in bailots must be received on or before March 31.

Off-site absentee voting begins on March 10 and concludes on March 31. Voters must complete an application and cast their ballots, in-person, at the County Clerk's Office or one of the aforementioned offices during regular business hours

#### SPECIAL SERVICES AVAILABLE:

Students, snow birds and permanently disabled woters can receive absentee ballots automaticatly on a regular basis by registering with the County Clerk. Municipal and township offices have the necessary forms to be completed by voters in need of this service. Please contact the County Clerk's Office for additional information about these programs

#### LAKE BLUFF PARK DISTRICT REFERENDUM:

Questions concerning the Lake Bluff Park District Referendum are likely to be answered during the forums to be conducted by the LWV-LF/LB (see front page). The referendum is stated to read as follows when it appears on the April 1 ballot in Lake Bluff:

"Shall bonds of the Lake Bluff Park District, Lake County, Illinois, to the amount of Five Million Nine Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$5,900,000) be issued for the purpose of constructing and equipping a community center and for payment of the expenses thereto?"

This agenda is intended to be flexible to respond to League interest and developments in the legislative arena. It will depend available League volunteer and lobbyist time, legislative expertise and financial resources.

#### Campaian Finance Update

One of the aspects of Making Democracy Work is addressing the campaign financing issue. Here is an update of what is currently allowed when making donations to a political party.

There are limits on how much money an individual, business, PAC and political party can contribute to a campaign for a federal office.

Individuals can contribute up to \$1,000 to each federal candidate per election cycle, up to \$20,000 to each national party per calendar year, up to \$5,000 to each federally registered PAC per calendar year, and no more that \$25,000 per calendar year in total to federal election campaigns.

A federally registered PAC may contribute up to \$5,000 to each federal candidate per election, up to \$15,000 to each rational party per calendar year, and up to \$5,000 to each federally registered PAC per calendar year. There is no limited on the total amount of money that PACs can contribute and no limit on the amount of money an individual candidate can raise from PACs.

National political parties may contribute up to \$5,000 to each candidate for the U.S. House and up to \$17,500 to each candidate for the U.S. Senate per election. State political parties may contribute up to \$5,000 to each federal candidate per election. They can contribute up to \$5,000 to each federally registered PAC.

## MONEY + POLITICS People Change the Equation

The LWVIL is participating in the national Leagues' "Money + Politics" project with citizen's assemblies in Congressional Districts 1-10. We have recently learned that there is a possibility to expand the project to additional districts in Illinois.

The state League's project, funded by the Joyce Foundation, to assess the leasibility of establishing a coalition for compagin finance reform is off and running. In-depth personal interviews are being conducted with leaders in the not-for-profit, business, labor, and political areas to learn their opinions on this subject.

In addition, leaders of other coalitions here and elsewhere in the United States are being interviewed to learn what works and what doesn't in forming and maintaining a coalition. Since the report to the Joyce Foundation is due by the middle of March, we will be able to give you the results shortly.

The League acts on legislation through the efforts of its lobbyist, the program specialists of the LWVIL Legislative Committee, and League members throughout the state.

The LWVIL lobbyist is based in Springfield and concentrates on issues of highest priority.

Program specialists review and make recommendations on proposed legislation, and prepare and sometimes deliver testimony.

Action alerts may be sent to local Leagues and individual LWVIL Grassroots Advocates to lobby legislators on key issues.

# **LWVUS** Legislative Priorities

As the 105th convened, the LWVUS board adopted the following legislative priorities for 1997.

Level One

The League will be proactive on both Level One and Level Two issues in Congress, including lobbying and grassroots action. Action Alerts will be sent to Leagues on both Level One and Level Two issues as appropriate LWVUS media work will focus primarilyon Level One issues.

### LWVUS Campaign Finance Reform Strategy by Becky Cain, President and Eleanor Revelle, Program Chair, LWVUS

LWVUS has been working actively to develop fresh approaches to campaign finance reform in order to break the partisan logiam on Capitol Hill. Together with Norm Orestein of the American Enterprise Institute, Tom Mann at the Brookings Institution and a group of other academics, the League has endorsed the principles of a consensus approach that focuses on closing the worst of the loopholes in existing law and strengthening the Federal Election Commission.

In addition to this short-term. consensus approach, we are continuing to work for long-term solutions, particularly public financing, to the problems of campaign finance. Legislation will soon be introduced in Congress to provide for public financing. While such legislation likely will not pass this Congress, we will endorse it and work for it over the long-term.

Some reform groups, Common Cause in particular, will be pushing for enactment of the McCain-Feingold bill in this Congress. The League does not

support this legislation and we believe that concentrating on it is a political mistake. Substantively, the bill bans PACs while failing to provide additional limits on large contributions from individuals. It undermines disciosure and is clearly unconstitutional. Other groups who do not favor the bill include Citizen Action, the PIRGs, and others who have focused on public financing.

Politically, we believe that concentrating on McCain-Feingold is a mistake because its key provision. spending limits for congressional candidates, is the element that ensures that opponents in the Senate can successfully filibuster against reform. If a spending limits bill is seen as the definition of reform. reform efforts will fail. The League believes a more flexible approach is needed, and that the rapid expansion of the soft money, independent expenditure, and issue advocacy loopholes means that we must focus first on closing the loopholes in existing law. While the Shavs Meahan bill is characterized as the House companion to the McCain-Feingold bill, it doesn't

contain the worst flaws of the McCain-Feingold, and spending limits do not pose such a significant threat to the success in the House

You may be approached to work in favor of the McCain-Feingold bill, by writing letters, participating in a petition drive or through other efforts. Please do not do so, since the League believes the bill is fundamentally flawed. Instead. please contact your representatives in the Senate and the House and tell them that legislation is needed to close the soft money, independent expenditure and issue advocacy loopholes. While McCain -Feingold does contain some of these elements, it is burdened by the significant flaws. The Shavs-Mechan bill in the House is one approach, a good starting point, closing these loopholes. Remind your elected representatives that members of both political parties must work together to gain meaningful reform legislation in this Congress. For the long-term, the League strongly supports public financing of congressional elections.

# Addressing Campaign Finance Reform in Illinois

Executive Summary - LWVIL Education Fund - 3/18/97

The League of Women Voters of Illinoise Education Fund conducted an eight-week study exploring the feasibility of building a coalition to lead educational outreach on the caregoing finance reform issue at the state level in Illinois. The principle good of this project was to determine and recomment the most effective organizational model for promoting debeta entitle into an object of this issue among policy makers, community leaders, the media and the public on an ongoing basis.

To better understand the climate for campaign finance reform in Illinois, the League conducted a qualitative research study. Ninety civic leaders were interviewed for this project, either in person. over the telephone or by mail, to gauge their knowledge and interest in campaign. finance reform. The League's research. overwhelmingly indicated displeasure with the existing system. There was an almost universal impression that the system was inequitable, atthough most respondents revealed that they had only limited knowledge of campaign finance practices in Illinois and had no prescription for improving the system.

Regardless of the level of familiarity with Illinois campaign finance regulations and practices respondents rarely expressed outrage at the system. To be sure, there was distaste and cynicism, but in large part, the current system with all its limitations is the one that they understand and have learned to operate. In fact, a majority of advocacy groups resisted accepting the premise that campaign finance practices have either an impact on their work or merit consideration as an issue for organizational support. Almost slavish adherence to strategic plans mission statements and organizational action emphases initially poses a jorreidable barrier for the nonprofit groups to consider campaign finance reform. Yet, time and again, it took very little additional exploration of campaign finance practices for respondents to begin seeing linkages to their work and their organizational effectiveness. Some respondents were intriqued by the possibility of shaping reform, but most expressed fears of "unilateral disarmament "

respondents focused on the average volen's lack of awareness. Campaign finance abuses are most easily understood in clear-cut, adversarial win-lose situations, yet flower occur relatively rarely instead, influence buying is a fong-term investment. Citizens need to understand that the cool of more tolweys or a longly unegodated gaming industry may be a smaller funding pie for education and social services.

in summary respondents identified the following key elements for a successful reform effort on compaign lineage proctices: Strong meaningfut leadership - for example former Senator Simon's continued involvement with this issue is ceen as a critical alament: mainstream coalition - a broad-based coalition where the average citizen can see his or her interests reflected: structure and support necessary to heto the existing players develop into an independent coalition: grassroots mobilization - organizing district-centered citizen feedback: education - to illuminate linkages and significance of the issue: media particination - to ratchet up the pace of reform respondents repeatedly focused on the necessity of a media strategy to sidesten the difficulties of working through a coalition

Based on the research, the League believes that there is not yet a sufficient organizational base from which to build a campaign finance reform coalition. In that will impact fillnois' entenched positical power structure. Instact, if will be necessary to structure, instact, if will be necessary to first strengthen relationships and alliances before forging an effective network of diverse special interests. Such a strategy will allow these advocates to belance their commitment to their organizational self-interests with better policy decision-making to deal with a politically charged issue tike campaign finance reform.

Despite the obvious difficulties in moving forward on this issue, Illinois enjoys several advantages. First, the campaign finance issue has been well-researched in litinois and a wealth of excellent educational materials ranging from videotapes to reports have been produced. Second, and most importantly, several groups that have aready staked out common ground by linking informally, provide an good basis for the formation of a citizen education network. This group, while not yet strong or ochesive nought to form an independent coalition, provides the basis for a citizen education network on this issue. Group members have con-nections to an array of constituencies and its wait situated to educate and involve other groups in the campaign finance issue.

The League's recommended strategy depends on implementation of a variety of educational approaches targeted to addressing the specific needs and concerns of individual interest bloce The citizen education naturality member groups will work individually and collectively utilizing their respective etrandhe and talents to bring other organizations into the process. As these groups come to a common understanding of the need for campaign finance regulation in Itlinois, a purpose statement and broad goals will become the basis for ongoing work and a more cobesive cruanizational structure.

A multi-stage plan for organizing on the campaign finance issue is proposed. In phase one, the project's initial organizational structure would resemble the spokes of a wheel, with the League and other citizen education arouns at the bub and individual special interest networks represented by the spokes. Where advocacy networks already exist. the League will offer support by providing speakers, discussion guides, the recently produced videotype on campaign finance reform in Illinois and other educational materials geared to increasing awareness and understanding of the role campaign dollars play in Springfield policy making. Additional activities may include focus groups, a media campaign, in-district activities with constituents and elected officials. campaign and reporting analysis, and canvassing.

Where there is no central network or coalition dedicated to advancing a particular interest, the League and/or partner groups from the otize one ducation network will fabilitate appropriate opportunities for representatives to meet and discuss how campaign finance affects their own agenta. Surveys and interviews will not only provide feedback to the project, but also will enourage

advocates to assess for themselves the direct and indirect inpect of campaign contributions on their agenda. This process will reinforce the finkages that exist between each organization's mission and the broader campaign linance reform issue. The goal of the initial phase of the project vocal be to increase awareness of the need for better campaigns and more constitutive policy

in the second phase of the project, the individual networks would be encounted to form linkages and partnerships geared to form linkages and partnerships geared in influence campaign finance issues. Phase 2 would culminate in a campaign finance reform "summit" where interest groups could share their views on political fundationity, its effects on campaign and the resulting power system in Symightful. This information exchange would be the besits for a consensus or troug principles and arrows.

Beginning in phase one, a blue-ribbon advisory committee composed of individuals with solid commitment to campaign finance reform will provide practical insights and objectivity to the citizen education network groups as they conduct the educational outreach and grassroots activities that serve to move the project topward. In some cases these individuals may assist in network outreach and recruitment as various interest groups coalesce around the issue. Advisory group leadership will also facilitate participation in the process by helping the interest blocs to coalesce around the issue of campaign finance reform. The larger network's initial shape and credibility will largely stem from its advisory group.

The planning and development of a statewide "Campaign Finance Reform Summit" is recommended as the culmination of the officer advention network's recruiting and organizing strategy and the launching of an activist coalition. Organizing this conference would provide the group with focus and numose, while they are formalizing their identity and structure. This forum would provide an opportunity to involve key civic and governmental leaders in the discourse on campaign finance. This summit provides an opportunity to not only keen this issue in the public eve, but also to elevate it as an election '99 issue. This high-nmfile statewide cummit meeting will provide an opportunity for consensus building and action planning on the campaign finance issue. Slated for spring-1998, participants will consider the effectiveness of legislative solutions to date and attempt to refocus and broaden discussion on this issue. The outcome of this summit will set the outreach and advocacy agenda for the campaign finance task force for the coming year

The citizen's education network would benefit greatly from the expertise and resources of a campaign finance analyst. An ongoing contractual relationship with such a specialist will ensure that existing research is maintained, built upon and used to maximum advantage. Having access to this level of technical expertise will allow the citizen education network to produce credible, analytic materials and be viewed as a resource from the outset Taking time out for review of the issues and concerns raised by the public and policy makers assures accuracy and credibility, as well as builds consensus. A relationship with a researcher and analyst will provide the group with a source of allow analysis early fundralsing and expenditure data for the 1998 Illinois elections.

Early consideration should also be given to message definition and development. It is critically important to stop fueling the public's cynicism and disconnect on this issue. Interest groups and the public both should be approached with a message that implies that campaign finance is an

Despite difficulties that may be inherent in organizing around this issue in Illinois, the League recognizes that the civic health of litinois is in no small part dependent upon improving campregia finance practices and elevalting public trust and confidence in the system. This issue is simply too important to set asside until the organizing climate improves. The League recommends that overy effort be made to calitate the organizing process and support efforts that promote public understanding and action on this issue.

# 1997 Annual Meeting

Officers were elected and programs for 1997-98 were selected at the Annual Meeting on May 14.

Susan Garrett remains president of the League. Vice Presidents are Peg Heldring and Mary Claire Briggs. Mary Jane Wolter has accepted the position of secretary and Ann Hollis remains as treasurer. (The directors are listed to the left).

Program items selected by the League may involve study and review of past positions, study and formation of new positions, and/or action on existing positions. The League maintains four positions with regard to Lake Bluff, supporting a comprehensive plan, conservation of natural resources, monitoring of land use west of West Terrace and the coordination of nominating systems within the village.

In Lake Forest the League supports improved preschool programs, the development of additional recreation programs and facilities, adherence to state and federal policies to reduce and recycle solid waste on a regional basis and the adoption of a number of operating policies by the Lake Forest Caucus.

The board wishes to make residents aware of their decision to provide candidate forums for uncontested elections, excluding township supervisor, state representative and state senate races.

The League will continue to provide candidate forums for contested municipal, school board and park board elections, informational forums on proposed local referendum and round table discussions and local issues.

In May the League called for a comprehensive Lake Forest census and the City Council voted to conduct such a census to gain a better understanding of population trends. During the coming year the League plans to maintain its interest in the impact of growth on Lake Forest, Lake Bluff and Knollwood.

### Letter from the President



Dear Members.

After the Knollwood annexation debate, some citizens from each side of the issue expressed concern regarding the behaviors and comments at the annexation meetings and forums. Because of the Knollwood annexation debate as well as many other issues, the debate has now moved on to the implementation of a code of conduct for civil discourse in both Lake Bluff and Lake Forest. The code would provide guidelines for local officials and citizens to deal with one another and promote civil discourse. A "round table" discussion group has been formed, comprised of city officials from both communities.

I was invited to represent the League last spring at one of the discussions. My response to a code of conduct then included letting the citizenry play a role in developing such a code, if, in fact, a code will be established and the citizens will not have had an opportunity to participate in the authoring of it. Without their participation there will be no investment, and therefore little support.

However, the larger question may be, is a code of conduct necessary? City officials say that the main reason for establishing a code is that our elected and appointed officials (all of which are volunteers) are sometimes treated in a disrespectful and uncivilized manner. The Lake Forester, June 12th issue, published an arricle, "Officials want a more civil discourse." From that article I have listed the reasons, as stated by some members of the Roundrable, as to the rationale for supporting a proposed code of conduct:

"Some residents bring up the same issues week after week - that itself is not appropriate behavior."

The code of conduct "takes the personal element out of issues."

"Some of the comments and assertions that have been directed at public officials have been out of line. This [code of conduct] is a chance to reinforce positive attitudes, influence how people react."

You may or may not agree with these comments, or my opinion. Yet your opinions are important. I want you to share your thoughts and help to determine how the League can make a contribution tofbis issue. Your input will provide a basis for a guideline under the League umbrella. We will move forward with consensus, not individual names. Fax your comments to me at 295-4515, or call me at 295-401. I want to be sure that the League takes advantage of the opportunity to weigh in on this issue. Most importantly we want to ensure that citizen input, which is essential to the democratic process, is included in the discussion.

### \*LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Plans are underway by the Lake Bluff Park District to bring a referendum to issue \$5.9 million in bonds for a community center to Lake Bluff and Knollwood voters in November. A similar referendum was narrowly defeated in April.

The League of Women Voters of Lake Forest - Lake Bluff does not now hold a position on this referendum nor does the League intend to take a stand on the merits of a community center. Assuming that the referendum will be on the ballot in November, the League will provide a public forum for debate on the issue prior to the election.

In the interim, we have asked the Park District commissioners and general managet to provide opportunities for citizen input and for information dissemination through all available channels, including a well-publicized midsummer district wide planning meeting, cablecasts, the local press, direct mailings, neighborhood coffees and any other means available to give voters the broad fact base necessary for an informed vote. Full and accurate disclosure about site plans, traffic, potential uses, costs for the Center and property tax increases is essential for an informed electorate.

On the other hand, we urge citizens to contribute to the planning process by seeking information, asking questions, attending meetings, and voicing opinions before final plans are formalized. It is through broad-based citizen involvement that public needs will be met.

The League of Women Voters is a nonpartisan organization whose purpose is to encourage informed citizen participation in government. The League educates citizens about public issues, observes governing bodies, and provides information to voters.

To Lake Forest City Officials

The League of Women Voters of Lake Forest and Lake Bluff is interested in the population growth and demographic trends in Lake Forest because we believe that the City has likely grown at a rapid rate and that the future and final development of Lake Forest can be best served by a complete set of facts profiling the community. Relevant facts can best be obtained through a comprehensive special census.

The League is supportive of the City's recommendation to initiate a special census. We understand that the City is considering whether or not to conduct a comprehensive census (covering the entire population of Lake Forest) or a partial census (covering assumed high-growth tracts of Lake Forest) and will discuss these alternatives at the May 15th City Council meeting. Even though the cost is lower for a partial census (\$45,000 vs. \$85,000), we suggest the City go forward with a comprehensive census for the following reasons:

- A comprehensive census will provide an accurate count of the entire population of Lake Forest, while
  the partial census will only provide data on specific areas of the City which may or may not be where
  growth has taken place.
- A comprehensive census will provide demographic data on our entire community population enabling City and School officials to plan confidently for school/student classroom needs. This is especially important now as School Districts 67 and 115 plan the use of West Campus and consider the possibility of building additional classrooms or a new school and as preschool needs are being reviewed.
- A comprehensive census will point out local population shifts. These facts will be extremely useful
  when evaluating the viability of proposed business distorted as well as possible locations for new schools
  or public parks; assessing the number of new families with young children; and determining potential
  needs for affordable housing in our community.

While the cost associated with a partial census will certainly be lower, the benefits of a comprehensive census will provide information that will greatly assist in making the critical long-term decisions that will affect the community for decades. As Lake Forest prepares to develop the last available parcels of land, we cannot afford to make decisions based on flawed assumptions.

We also understand that the up front costs for conducting a comprehensive census will be paid back in the first year. The City will immediately generate additional tax revenue from the state that will more than offset the initial cost. In subsequent years the City will generate approximately \$150,000 in added revenue per year for the comprehensive census wersus \$72,000 for a partial census.

The League strongly urges the City to go forward with a comprehensive special census.

LWVIL believes that the federal government should bear primary responsibility for financing programs designed to meet the basic needs of individuals and families. LWVIL supports secondary state funding for income assistance and supportive services requires: the recruitment, retention and training of sufficient numbers of qualified personnel; clear guidelines for responsibility; adequate information systems; and program evaluation.

Development Impact Fees: Support for state legislation that addresses development fees for capital improvements

LWVIL supports legislation at the state level regarding development impact fees. It is appropriate for such legislation to address fees for capital expenditures for schools, libraries, parks/open space, transportation, utilities, and emergency services. Such legislation should be enabling only, not directive. Only municipalities and counties should have authority to assess development impact fees, and state guidelines should be adaptable to home rule and non-home rule communities. The test for validity of impact fees in Illinois should be "rational nexus" and not "specifically and uniquely attributable." Enabling legislation should strive to effect some standardization of impact fee programs statewide, with flexibility for each to be designed to meet local needs.

Lake County and DeKalb County each were presented with Making a Difference awards for their Kid's First Health Fairs. Lake County initiated the first in 1993. Both Leagues worked with local health departments. medical and dental personnel, social service agencies, local businesses and media to set up screenings. School supplies were also dispensed for children entering grade school.

Homages were paid to Grace Mary Stern (LWVFIP). whose award for public service was accepted by Betsy Lassar, who delivered a gently rustling rendition of Grace Mary's Congressional rhapsody; to the law firm of Meites, Frackman and Burgen which had successfully represented the League pro bono in the Motor Voter litigation against the State; and to Carol Teitan and Mardelle Grundlach. Nancy Kaszak, a past Illinois State Representative delivered a moving and bittersweet speech on her career, her tenure as Representative (1992-1996), and her unsuccessful run Congress.

Other Convention highlights: sharing Holiday Inn's sluggish elevators with Lions' Conventioneers, walking along Peoria's renovated river front, and seeing there the Louie-Louie fest and Harley Davidson motorcycle brigade, tasting Peoria's home brewed raspberry beer. and driving home with fellow Leaguers and discussing local League issues, recipes, vacations, families...in the words of Julie Andrews ... "getting to know you, getting to know all about you...'



# MAKING DEMOCRACY WORK: CODE OF CONDUCT

### Members Respond to Code of Conduct

In the most recent issue of *League Lines* members were asked to give their opinion on a code for civil discourse in Lake Forest and Lake Bluff. Several responses come in, some of which we have listed. Overall, most of those who responded did not see a need for a code, and would prefer that one not be adopted. Some, however, indicated that there needs to be a less contentious environment for disagreement, both for residents and city officials. Here are some of the comments to dote:

"I'm opposed to a code on the basis of principle. It is just one more barrier between citizens and elected officials"

"Why not uphold the First Amendment and adopt Robert's Rules of Order instead?"

"There definitely needs to be a more congenial way to express differences of opinion. As long as it does not infringe on a person's right to free speech, a code may be a good idea."

"There are far too many pressing issues such as population growth, academic improvement in our schools and astruct use of trappayer's money that beg to be resolved, Let's not get distracted by a taxpayer code of ethics. Let the elected officials create their own code of ethics and strick by it"

"Why should we have laws to make people more civil?"

"Having a civil discourse can only be positive. As long as people don't feel restricted and intimidated by a code, I think it is a good idea."

"We shouldn't be writing codes for a very small minority that affect the majority."

"The phrase, 'Go away...the Mighty Oz has spoken!' should never come to the mind of a resident addressing a public body in our communities."

### CITY OF LAKE FOREST SPECIAL CENSUS

### League Members Needed!

In May of this year the City council authorized the U.S. Department of Commerce to conduct a special census. Given the significant population increase since the 1990 census, Lake Forest's municipal share of states increased populations.

The City has entered into a contract with the Census Bureau and is waiting for confirmation on when the project will begin. The actual census will take 3 to 4 weeks to complete and should take place towards the end of this year.

Your help is needed! The City must recruit census tokers to go door to door to collect information about each member of the household. The hours are flexible (between 6 and 8 hours a day), and census takers can earn \$8.00 an hour. These individuals will wear official Census Bureau identification tags so that they can be easily recognized.

# LWVIL-ACTION: CAMPAIGN FINANCE REFORM

Illinois remains among the minority of states with no limits on contributions, no restrictions on who may contribute, and no limits on what candidates do with the contributions which they receive. Up bills relating to compaign finance, lobbying and ethics were introduced in the spring session of the Genera Assembly only one bill (HB729) passed both houses and was sent to the governor for his signature. This bill makes campaign finance reports more accessible and allows the reports to be reviewed ananymously. If the governor signs this bill it will be minimal but important reform.

All Illinois Leagues are fortunate to have available the excellent materials produced by the Illinois Campaign Task Force, a project of ILLINOIS ISSUES and the Institute of Public Affairs at the University of Illinois Springfield. The Task Force analyzed campaign expenditures in legislative and statewide races in the 1994 election cycle. Among the important findings are the results of a scientific pall which reveals great concern on the part of Illinois residents about campaign finance issues. The findings also reveal the cost of Illinois elections is growing, that special interest and corporations are major compaign contributors, and that gambling interests is one of the fastest growing special interest contributors. The publications of the Task Force include separate reports for each of four regions in the state as well as a final report which includes recommendations for reform.


# MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

### Census Update

The city of Lake Forest is in the process of planning the census which the City Council authorized in May. The dates of the census are still being negatiated with the Census Bureau and it seems likely that the census will take place within the last couple months of this year.

The actual census will take about three to four weeks to complete. The City is looking for a pool of about 120 candidates from which to select obout 40 census takers. ### IWV IF/IB PROGRAMS

Legislative Update Luncheon a Success

State Senator Terry Link and State Representative Corrine G. Wood spoke to a full house at the September 18th Legislative Luncheon in Southgate Cafe's Woods Room. Each representative gave his or her recep of the Spring Session in Springfield, along with their predictions and hopes for the upcoming Veto Session. Their remarks were followed by open questions from luncheon guests, who included League members, community

Terry Link said that he was disappointed that a bill to deregulate electrical companies in Illinois which he considers a "hot issue", didn't get heard until close to adjournment. It ended up in the Rules Committee in the Senate, also known as the "graveyard". He predicted that this important issue will come up in the Veta Session, and in the future. He also discussed Campaign Finance Reform as a very important issue, saying that we "need true Compaign Finance Reform" and that what was presented in Springfield did not qualify. He talked specifically about how the meaning of "compaign related funds" is stretched by many to include, for example, country club memberships. Terry is particularly proud that, as a minority Democrat in the Senate, he cosponsored the "Domestic Violence Bill" which was signed into law. The bill allows for evidence of prior domestic violence of fenses to be admitted into current trials against of fenders.

Corrine Wood is optimistic that Education Funding Reform will be brought up again, despite the fact that it was feetated in the Senate in the spring. She said that most legislators diagree on certain key issues, including a minimum foundation level and real academic reforms, but that the problem was in addressing the funding agas which would result in the proposed changes to taxation and funding. She was also happy to amounce that Congress dia oper on a balanced budget, which included \$330 million in additional funds for elementary and secondary education, with no additional taxes. She talked about the importance of Welfare Reform and the need to provide, among other things, reliable and affordable child care for mothers returning to the work force. As a member of the "Committee of Women Legislators", she helped secure on additional \$100 million to this sent. In addition, sente Bill \$950, which Corrine sponsored and which was signed into law, provides for a graduated drivers license to ensure that teens have more practice time behind the wheel before getting their licenses. It also calls for stricter penalities for traffic violations

When asked by a member of the audience about their experiences as freshmen legislators, Terry Link commented on the differences between downstate and his district. He related a furny story in which another member of the Agricultural Committee mistakenly thought Comway Farms in Lake Forest was an actual form. Cornine Wood talked about her first time pushing the voting buttons on her desk, and how she felt the honor and importance of the responsibility.

League members and guests thought the program was informative and worthwhile.

Dear Members:

High School District 115 has experienced only a few contested elections in its history. As we know, this most recent race was contested (six candidates running for four positions), and two important issues became a focus for discussion and debte. First, that some of the candidates embrace different philosophies and direction for the future of District 115, and second, community representation (for the high school district) is a concernt os one voters and some candidates.

Personally, I find the debate of these issues to be extremely helpful and healthy. Never before have we, as a combined community, had to come to grips with such a significant and complex issue via an election. We were asked as voters to evaluate candidates based on their educational perspective and qualifications. In addition, some asked us to take into consideration a candidate's personal commitment to a particular community within the District.

The election law requires the election (of board members) to be "at large". This means that board members are not representing subdivided constituencies within the communities. Perhaps more importantly, election of board members "at large" implies a commitment by those elected to represent all the citizens of the District, without bias.

However, as we know, the tradition of "equal representation" on the District 115 board has been in place for decades. In the past, a "gentlemen's agreement" allowed four board members to be elected from Loke Forest, two members from Lake Bluff and one member from Knollwood. Voters, for the first time on November 4th, had an opportunity to vote for the candidates of their choice for School District 115, no matter where the candidate might reside. Understandably, for some voters, representation of a particular community weighed heavily, and for others it did not.

Democracy and elections go hand-in-hand. Through these kind of debates and discussions, it is likely that the overall interests of District 115 will be better served; and the voters will certainly be much better informed.

# REVIEW OF NOMINATING PROCEDURES REVEALS INCONSISTENCIES

Potential candidates for local offices have no clearcut avenue of information on nominating procedures, according to a review of these procedures by a committee of Lake Forest-Lake Bluff League members conducted between May 1995 and April 1997. The committee's survey revealed inconsistencies in election materials disseminated to municipal election officials throughout the state as well as to potential candidates seeking information to run for local office.

Interviews with 12 municipal, school, and park district officials in seven communities (multiple interviews were held in three communities), conducted by committee members, indicated that not all election jurisdictions distribute the same information. Interviews with the Illinois State Board of Flections Technical Adviser and with the Lake County Clerk and Elections Administrator give some insight into how

and why the discrepancies arise.

The State Board of Elections sends one copy of the Election Officials Hands book, the Candidate's Guide, and the Election and Campaign Finance Calendar to each County Clerk in the state. These manuals are comprehensive guides. including samples of all forms. for county election administrators as well as local election officials and potential candidates. The guides are also sent to a limited number of selected municipalities.

In general, municipalities must rely on the County Clerk to send copies or partial copies of the

manuals to them If County Clerks opt not to distribute copies, municipal officials must take the initiative in calling the State Board of Elections for manuals. Municipalities do not receive the Election and Campaign Finance

ity. The packet includes copies of necessary forms for candidates along with a cover sheet of instructions. Neither the Election Officials Handbook or the Candidate's Guide is photocopied or distributed in its entirety.

Municipalities then must take the responsibility. if they choose, to make photocopies of forms and instructions in the County's courtesy packets for distribution to potential candidates on request. Some choose not to distribute information; some photocopy only portions of the nacket: others send potential candidates to the County Clerk's office for forms.

The Lake County Clerk's office, however, discourages potential candidates from picking up forms there. The stated reason is that candidates must return their petitions and other forms to their own municipalities for official filing. Should a candidate mistakenly try to file at

### The Committee's Recommendations:

- 1. The State Board of Elections should be required to distribute the Election Officials Handbook, the Candidate's Guide, and the Flection and Campaign Finance Calendar to all local election officials as well as to all County Clerks as regularly as needed to ensure timely and accurate information for all.
- 2. Information distribution channels should be increased. County Clerks should be required to place additional news briefs in local newspapers at least once per month for three months prior to the filing date for new candidates. (These should be in addition to the current legal notice requirements.) Information should include details of upcoming elections and where to obtain candidate forms. This information should also be provided in news release format to local papers, cable television stations, and any other local media. The State Board of Elections should set up a hotline phone number, as early as necessary prior to filing dates, for potential candidate information and answers to questions. This number should be widely publicized throughout the state. Providing all of this information -- and perhaps more -- via the Internet will give the public increased statewide access to election information

The County's role legally is to "administer elections", (Pursuant to the Consolidated Flextion I aw which took effect in 1981, the Clerk adminisrers all elections within the county. Prior to this municipalities administered their own elections )

Often, the County Clerk's office refers callers to local municipal clerks for information: municipal clerks may or may not be willing to provide such information sometimes referring to the callers back to the County Clerk This results in a "run-around" which is often confusing and frustrating for potential candidates and a common cause for concern among committee members

Training for local elections officials in generally provided by the County Clerk's office: the Lake County Clerk also attends municipal clerks' meetings to conduct training. In 1996, more in-depth training was also offered by the State Board of Elections. This training covers all aspects of the election, not just nominating produres. The snag in the system, however, is that training are probably rarely read by the general public. Prior to elections the Lake County Clerk also voluntarily produces a Voter Information Guide which is distributed as newspaner inserts to a circulation of 190,000.

In perusing the Candidate's Guide handbook committee members observed that many forms were unclear almost unreadable and therefore unsuitable for copying. Since this handbook serves as the master copy for County Clerks and many local elections officials, the forms ultimately in the hands of potential candidates could be unusable. Committee members also noted that no phone number for the State Board of Elections is listed on or in the guide, should a candidate wish to call for information or with questions.

The League committee has made several recommendations (see inset) which can lead to consistency quality of information disseminated on nominating procedures as well as other election policies and practices. The League board has accepted these recommendations and voted to report both findings and recommendations

- 3. Formal training should be offered regularly every two years, possibly as a collaborative effort between the State Board of Elecrions and County Clerks. All local election officials should be required to attend.
- 4. A standard, step-by-step, user-friendly instruction sheet should be prepared for use throughout the state by the State Election Board with the concurrence of county and municipal clerks and defined responsibilities of each for dissemination of nominating procedure information to potential candidates. The information should include a section on common mistakes made by candidates, with suggestions to correct or avoid such errors.
- 5. The Election Officials Handbook and the Candidate's Guide should be made available to all public libraries.
- 6. The Election and Campaign Finance Calendar should be sent statewide to local newspapers and public libraries.
- 7. Public forums throughout the state, perhaps co-hosted by County Clerks and Leagues of Women Voters, can be formulated on "How to Become a Candidate."

While the League and committee focus has been on the nominating procedures, providing overall election information to a broader base is a supplemental benefit.

Keep in mind that these recommendations have been drafted based on the need for information. the need for coual access to information. and the importance of all sources having and disseminating the same information. No discussions have been held with state, county, or

local officials on the budget required for implementation or on funding sources. There is still work to be done, but the League will soon be taking the first step by letting officials and representatives know of the need for consistent, accurate, timely, readable information and its distri-

bution channels.

Required by law to publish legal notices with information about upcoming elections, Lake County places these paid notices in Lakeland, Pioneer Press, Daily Herald, News-Sun, Labor News, and Zion-Benton News. These official notices appear among other legal ads and

### CIVILITY AND PUBLIC DISCOURSE

Eugene Hotehkiss, President Emeritus, Lake Forest College and Chair of The Lake Forest/Lake Bluff Table spoke about Civility and Public Discourse at the Fall Members and Prospective Members Lamcheon in October. He provided the following background of The Round Table and a Discussion Paper on Civility and Public Discourse.

### Discussion Paper on Civility and Public Discourse:

As the communities of Lake Forest and Lake Bluff inevitably change, as housing consumes our open spaces and automobiles clutter our streets and the pace of our lives quickens, it is appropriate to seek out and renew the spirit which created and sustained these communities in their early years. We seek this renewal of spirit not for refuge but for guidance, recognizing that the past can never be recaptured and that the future is ever evolving.

In the special spirit of early Lake Forest and Lake Bluff we can find guidance even today as our communities to monoity to the century shade. It encourages the educational and religious institutions more actively to participate in community life, and their students and parishioners to become participants in community affairs. The founders created communities which valued natural beauty, education and religion, not as dogma but to aid their quest for a fuller life through greater understanding and spiritual growth. They encouraged the spirit of community, not through conformity but through discussion and respect for diversity. And as advocates themselves of renewal, they accepted dissent not with acrimony but as a valued component of an inclusive and balanced community spirit.

We view the past not as an anchor, but as a beacon to shine light on our tomorrow

In beginning the process of shining tomorrow's light we, as individuals who are also community leaders, choose from a number of values in the past to revisit the importance of civility in public discourse. We do so to explore its application to the institutions that serve our publics and to define the ways that we can exhibit civil behavior.

Public bodies or community organizations at by making decisions that affect the public by developing policies and promulgating rules. We believe that the public discourse which precedes such action is best served in a climate of civility. We recognize that we cannot legislate civil discourse in others, but we can practice it to unserleves and with others. We can seek to resolve conflicts first through civil discourse, without legal or legislative intervention. We can cesse to act in the face of incivility, rudeness, name-calling, personalized issues, evehal atracks and the like.

We choose to practice civility in public discourse and by living the values of honesty, respect, and responsibility, and we view the revisiting of civility as a first step in reclaiming our historic community values.

### LOCAL ISSUES AND NEWS

#### SPECIAL CENSUS LIDITATE

The special census, which the League of Women Voters suggested to the City, was taken in Lake Forest in the last two months of 1997. The trained enumerators overcame difficult time constraints and endured wet, cold weather, but executed their task in addigent manner. Receiving 38 an hour for their work, they quickly realized that no amount of money could compensate, but that the census was important for the community. With the task complete the US Census Bureau has an accounting of every person in Late Fuerer.

Robert Kiely, Jr., the City Manager, wrote a letter to the League, thanking us for encouraging field (City to undertake the task. The special census shows an increase in population from 17,836 to 18,817, resulting in about \$100,000 per year in new revenue for the community. Even after deducing the cost of the special census, the city expects to realize between \$250,000 and \$50,000 in new greense.

Beth Kress, our League's community liaison with the City, participated in the special census as an enumerator. She collected many interesting and heartwarming stories as she traversed the community and met local residents. Rumor has it that Beth may share some of these stories at the Annual Meeting in May. Thank you Beth and everyone who made the special census a reality.

### FUND-RAISING UPDATE

### Think Illinois' campaign finance system doesn't affect you?

High utility Rates: During the past years debate over utility deregulation, Commonwealth Edison and Illinois Power gave more than half a million dollars to state lawmakers, helping them broker a deal that will lock Illinois consumers into the highest utility rates in the Midwest for another eight years.

Hidden Cable TV Costs: Last year the cable television industry tried to slip through legislation that would allow them to charge customers up to \$5 for every late payment. To grease the wheels, the cable industry gave \$388,095 to state legislators between January 1995 through July 1, 1997. The bill passed the House and only after much press coverage and public outery was the bill rejected in the Senate.

Costs of Tobacco: In 1996 the tobacco industry gave \$188 855 to Illinois legislative leaders. These contributions helped kill bills on smoking prevention, such as efforts to restrict the free distribution of tobacco products, and efforts to allow local governments to restrict sales of tohacco products near schools. Tobaccorelated Medicaid costs in Illinois were an estimated \$345.5 million in 1997

The Voters' Guide contains information obtained from candidates in the uncontested election for aldermen and mayor of the City of Lake Forest.

The League of Women Voters is a nonpartisan political organization whose purpose is to encourage intormed citizen participation in government. The League helps to educate citizens about public issues, observas overning bobelies and provides information for the voters at election time. Membership is open to all control of voting age.

Voters in the City of Lake Forest will be asked to vote for candidates for the following offices on March 17: Mayor, City Supervisor, City Treasurer, City Marshall & Collector, and Aldermen for each of the four warshall & as well as County Board positions. The positions of City Supervisor, City Treasurer, and City Marshall & Collector are signatory positions only, as the functions originally performed by these elected officials are now generally performed by the staff of the City of Lake Forest. Only those running for the positions of Mayor and Alderman were invited to participate.

Responses from three death enter the response from the enter received. Mayor Cornelius Waud, who is the incumbent unming for Mayor, and Henry (Harry) Cornelius Waud, who is the Ward, were out of form during for Mayor of the month of Henry and chose not no participate in the Voters' Guide. The Voters' Guide contains the viewpoint of the three candidates who responded.

### CANDIDATE FOR ALDERMAN 1ST WARD. A TWO-YEAR TERM

Candidate's Name Samuel J. (Jerry) Henry 771 Barberry Lane Lake Forest, IL.

Occupation: Retired partner, Chapman & Cutler, Chicago

Background: B.A. Yale University 1958; L.L.B. University of Virginia 1961; Retired partner Chapman & Cutler, Chicago; Incumbent, 1st Ward, Chairman of the Finance Committee

The pace of growth in Lake Forest is impacting the capacity of the public schools. What impact fees are in place now and should they be increased? Impact fees at the current rate appear to have provided a fair contribute tion to the reserves set aside for future expansion of our schools. I do not see a compelling reason to increase fees at this time.

- II. Parking capacity at Lake Forest High School is going to continue to be a problem, due to increases in the number of students. What long range suggestions do you have? There should be a plan providing for a reasonable increase over time in the number of parking spaces at the high school without giving up substantial green space or the tennis courts. Since demand would still exceed supply, the school administration. the faculty and the students must come up with a fair method of allocating spaces. School bus service is apparently under-utilized and should be made more attractive to the students. Perhaps shuttle service from the school to a remote parking lot would provide some relief. However, parking for students at the high school should continue to be a privilege and not a right.
- III. Each new development attempted by the City of Lake Forest (such as the expansion of Gorton, the move of municipal services to the Fort Sheridan area and the proposal to build a Senior Center at the Grove School) is meeting with resistance from neighbors. Please comment on the conflicts arising in these disputes. It is the responsibility of each Aiderman to look beyond personal and sectional prejudices and to make decisions based upon the best interests of the community as a whole after giving all interested parties an opportunity to be heard. The rights of property owners should always be respected, but the inconvenience of a small minority should not stand in the way of an important public benefit. The expansion of Gorton Community Center was approved, after extensive public hearings and discussions with neighbors, upon findings that neighborhood property values would not be substantially diminished and that no overall reduction in the use and enjoyment of those properties would result. It is my hope that any decisions with respect to the Ft. Sheridan and Grove School properties will be made in a similar manner.
- IV. The Teska Study examined the possibility of a variety of types of development throughout the city, including bed and breakfast uses in East Lake Forest, a hotel in the Conway Farms area and expansion of retail development on the west side of Lake Forest. Please comment on the possibility of these zoning changes. All reasonable requests for commercial zoning or for zoning variations for new business ventures should be given a fair hearing by the City Council, but should be judged on the merits of the specific project being proposed. The City should work closely with the Chamber of Commerce to attract desirable businesses to existing commercial districts.
- V. Some residents have been concerned about the demolitions and infills occurring throughout Lake Forest (in areas such as South Park, West Park, and near the High School). Do you feel zoning and building codes should be altered to preserve the original scope of development in these area? One of the most important projects before the City Council and the various boards is a careful review of the zoning and building codes, with an eye to more effectively preserving the character of our residential neighborhoods. The trend to larger structures on smaller lots is troubling to me. And it is evident that our rules relating to architecture review and to demolition of existing houses are not working as they should. I hope that by the end of this year, the Council will enact amendments to our ordinances that will set forth building standards that are fairer. clearer and more restrictive than today's guidelines.

### CANDIDATE FOR ALDERMAN 2nd WARD, A TWO-YEAR TERM

Background: I have lived in Lake Forest for over 25 years. My civic involvement has included the APT of both Districts 67 and 115, the United Way of Lake Forest/Lake Bluff, Friends of Gorfon, the Public Facilities Advisory Committee of the City of Lake Forest, and Lake Forest Hospital. I was previously a candidate for Second Ward Adderman in

- In the pace of growth in Lake Forest is impacting the capacity of the public schools. What impact fees are in place now and should they be increased? There are currently in place significant impact fees benefiting many organizations that are affected by the growth in Lake Forest, in addition to the schools. Other taxing bodies (such as the County) may also be considering levying additional fees. I do think that fees should be maintained, and increased as appropriate, particularly in corporate developments. Other methods of support for the schools, such as continued user fees, endowments, impact fees for infill building, user fees for demotificant, can use to investigated, as well.
- II. Parking capacity at Lake Forest High School is going to continue to be a problem, due to increases in the number of students. What long range suggestions do you have? Since the city has no jurisdiction over District 11 5, suggestions from the city alone are inappropriate. Rather, as the recent traffic modifications have shown, a partnership of students, administrators, neighbors and the city should continue to implement stratumber and the increased mobility necessitated by West Campus activities, must be factored into that planning. Remote parking (across McKinkey), and eventually land use will need to be addressed. Incremental, collaborative, flexible solutions will also prevent a locked-in resolution that may not be appropriate should enrollment diminish.
- III. Each new development attempted by the City of Lake Forest (such as the expansion of Gorton, the move of municipal services to the Fort Sheridan near and the proposal to build a Service Central the Grove School) is meeting with resistance from neighbors. Please comment on the conflicts arising in these disputes. As space to grow diminishes, and we begin to encroach on each other, we need to find a way to become better neighbors—working together as a stronger community rather than 16,000 individuals, representing personal and sectional interests. Value must be given to needs, desires and opinions of both individuals and the city, who should speak for the greater whole. Better outreach, education and sound reasoning must be disseminated by the city to all its citizens on projects to be undertaken. We must all be accountable for listening, understanding, and respecting the opinions of the parties involved in such development.
- IV. The Teska Study examined the possibility of a variety of types of development throughout the city, including bed and breakfast uses in East Lake Forest, a hotel in the Conway Farms area and expansion of retail development on the west side of Lake Forest. Please comment. Any zoning changes must be looked at very carefully and would need to be consistent with the long range plans for the whole community, or at least the broader area being considered. Development would take the willing participation of not only citizens but merchants in any areas being considered. Zoning codes strive to maintain the character of the community in a cohesive manner and changing them would need to meet with favorable environmental, economical and personal long term benefits for the community as a whole.
- V. Some residents have been concerned about the demolitions and infills occurring throughout Lake Forest (in areas such as South Park, West Park, and near the High School). Do you feel zoning and building codes should be altered to preserve the original scope of development in these area? While we would aspire to maintain the character and emotional heritage of our community, our desires don't always match what we are legally able to do. We can exert our influence to the best of our ability, but Individual rights must be respected, as well. Infill should fit within the context of the neighborhood and be an attempt to improve the housing, as well as the overall look and feel of the area. Zoning and building codes should have controls in place to effectively manage that outcome.

### CANDIDATE FOR ALDERMAN 4th WARD, A TWO-YEAR TERM

Background: My family and I have lived in Lake Forest for the past 19 years. I have

served on the Zoning Board of Appeals and The Planning Commission together with 4 1/2

vears as Alderman of the 4th Ward.

- The pace of growth in Lake Forest is impacting the capacity of the public schools. What impact fees are in place now and should they be increased? Currently there are several impact fees and, when added all together, amount to \$18,100. Each contribute to the schools, library and city infrastructure for each new mome built. The City Council during its budget preparation each fiscal year, reviews these various impact fees and in some specific cases will raise a fee or fees as necessary. This annual review is necessary because many economic factors are equated to these fees.
- II. Parking capacity at Lake Forest High School is going to continue to be a problem, due to increases in the number of students. What long range suggestions do you have? I agree with the premise that the parking capacity at the high school continues to be a problem, has been a problem in the past and will always be a problem. My suggestions long range are consistent with the "Transportation Committee" authorized by the Board of District 115 which comprises of several experienced individuals, including members of the Police Department. The committee has recommended variety of improvements broken down into several phases, The recommendations include: additional parking assignes, hours of parking, assignment of spaces, reconfiguring certain local streets so as to move traffic more efficiently and other well thought out recommendations. Until the high school enrollment reverses itself and declines substantially, I believe the capacity problem will always be present. However, the transportation committee has certainly shed constructive light on the problems.
- III. Each new development attempted by the City of Lake Forest (such as the expansion of Gorton, the move of municipal services to the Ford Sheridan area and the proposal to build a Senior Center at the Grove School) is meeting with resistance from neighbors. Please comment on the conflicts arising in these disputes. I believe it is safe to say that human nature resists change to some degree. When a material development occur in any given neighborhood, you will generally receive concerns of some of the neighbors. Their concerns are real and must be taken seriously. My initial requirement of a new development is: a) does not change the character of the neighborhood and b) it is in compliance with the underlying zoning and/or The Comprehensive Plan. The expansion of Gorton is consistent; The Grove School would be consistent if the property is used for a community park; The municipal Service Center at Fort Sheridan requires a more detailed effort to remain at Laurel Avenue.
- IV. The Teska Study examined the possibility of a variety of types of development throughout the city, including bed and breakfast uses in East Lake Forest, a hotel in the Conway Farms area and expansion of retail development on the west side of Lake Forest. Please comment. The Teska study was very well done. In particular, the study reinforced the excellence of our Comprehensive Plan. With respect to hotels and bed and breakfast inns, the city has already specified a hotel in a specific location at Conway Farms and we are now considering whether bed and breakfast inns are in the best interest of Lake Forest. Any expansion of our business districts should and will be considered by the Community Planning Dept. and the Plan Commission. Overall, the Teska Study brought new ideas to Lake Forest and new ideas are always welcomes.
- V. Some residents have been concerned about the demolitions and infilis occurring throughout Lake Forest (in areas such as South Park, West Park, and near the High School). Do you feel zoning and building codes should be altered to preserve the original scope of development in these area? Demolition and infili has been a concern in take Forest for many years. I believe our codes have been tightened as much as legally possible. Owners' property rights are very apparent in the courts and it is difficult to slow down the demolition process more than what our city has provided, that is, a two year waiting period in certain allowable cases. The city always encourages remodeling as to demolition. However, in may case, swe cannot ultimately prevent the infill. One of the contributing factors for infill is the cost of land in Lake Forest. An average lot is so expensive, one feels compelled to build a large home to justify the value of the Lot.

### CAMPAIGN FINANCING IN ILLINOIS:

### Answers to Some Commonly Asked Questions

Is there a limit on how much money an individual, business, PAC or other interest group can contribute to a campaign for public office in the Illinois legislature?

No. Although there are limits on how much money can be contributed to candidates running in federal elections, and most states ser at least some limits on how much money individuals or interest groups can contribute to campaigns for state offices, Illinois has ao liants on how much an individual, business, PAC, or other linterest group can contribute to a campaign for public office. In a study by Illinois Common Cause, Illinois ranked last among the 50 states in terms of the stringency of its campaign finance laws.

### Are there restrictions in Illinois on who can contribute to a campaign?

No. In Illinois, any individual, business, or interest group contribute an undimited amount of money or in-tind goods services to any campaign for a legislative or statewide office. Additionally, there are no restriction on candidates for public office in Illinois raising money and then transferring it to another candidate's campaign. In fact, a legislative leader's financial support of a candidate's campaign in Illinois is often key in determining whether a candidate wiss or loses an election, particularly if the candidate is not an incumbent. In election districts where there is significant competition for a legislative leader is fighting for control of their chambers provide most of the campaign funding, not the candidates themselves.

### Are there limits on how much money a candidate for public office in Illinois can spend during a campaign?

No. Although the U.S. Supreme Court ruled in Buckley v. Valeo (1974) hit the amount of money a candidate can spend on a campaign may not be limited by law, some states (e.g. Maine, Wisconsin, New Jersey) offer candidates incentives in the form of public campaign financing if they adhere to voluntary campaign spending limits. A stimilar system exists for U.S. Presidential candidates. There is no provision of public funds for candidates who adhere to voluntary campaign spending limits in Illinois.

#### Are there restrictions in Illinois on what campaign funds can be used for?

No. Illinois law is silent on what constitutes a proper or improper expenditure of campaign funds. In many cases, an expenditure may be legal but questionable from the perspective of good judgement and ethics. Some of the ways campaign funds were spent during the 1994 election cycle included country club dues, out-of-state travel, no-interest personal loans, parking tickets, tickets to professional sports events, and funeral expenses.

#### Are there any rules governing what an elected official in Illinois can do with campaign funds if he or she leaves office?

No. The lack of a requirement that former elected officials close ut their political committee and distribute any remaining funds is a major loophole in Illinois campaign finance law. Some elected officials have retired from political office with large balances in their campaign funds and have continued by septical continued from their continu

#### Are candidates in Illinois required to disclose the campaign contributions that they receive? Are contributors to campaigns required to disclose their contributions?

Ves to both questions. Candidates who raise or spend more than \$1,000 and groups that raise or spend more than \$1,000 and required to form a political committee and file reports with the Illinois State Board of Elections. Reports of political committees must identify by name and address any contributor who gave more than \$150 in any reporting period and the amount of the contribution. Contributions of less than \$150 must be reported as part of an aggregate total, but the names of these contributions of one than \$150 must be reported.

### Are campaign finance records open to the public for anyone to see?

Yes. Any member of the public can see the campaign finance reports of local, state, and federal political committees. State campaign finance records are on file at the Office of the Illinois State Board of Elections in Springfield (217) 782-1536 or in Chicago at the James R. Thompson Center (213) El H-6440. Federal election committee reports for offices such as U.S. Congress are on file at the Federal Election Commission in Washington, D.C., with copies submitteed to the State Board of Elections, in Springfield. A range of receillent campaign finance information is now available via the Internet. (See web sight on previous page) In addition, the legislature approved a bill in 1997 to place campaign finance information on the Internet—horefully this information will appear by the end of 1998.

### LOBBYING 101

### HOW DO I GET MY **MESSAGE ACROSS?**

You may contact your legislators by personal visits. writing faxing, e-mailing and telephoning. All means are effective. You do not have to travel to Springfield or Washington, or even call long distance. Legislators have offices in their home districts

Decide how best to communicate your message. If you have a lot of information to share, a written communication may be most effective. If time is of the essence. a phone call may be the most practical. (See the phone example below.)

A first contact with a legislator or staff member can be the beginning of an ongoing, productive relationship. Thank you notes when your legislator takes the action you requested, or just takes the time to meet or discuss an issue with you, help to build a relationship. Even if you disagree with your legislator on one issue, you may be able to work together on another.

### State of Illinois Lobbying Resources

#### To Obtain a Copy of a Bill:

Bills as introduced are available in the bill room of the house of origin. Once a bill passes the house of origin, it is retyped to include all of the amendments which were adopted. The retyped copy is the "engrossed" bill and is available in the bill room of the second house. Conies of bills, specified by house of origin and number, may be requested in person or by phone.

### An Urgent Call to Action on Campaign Finance Reform

Congressional leaders in both the House and the Senate have promised to bring cumpaign finance reform legislation to their suspective Boots before or during March 1998. At this point, grassroots advonces; in essential in enhering real reform. It is vital that our members of Congress be bombarded with our message in favor of incremental, bipartisan campaign finance reform legislation that closes the soft money and sham issue advocacy loophold.

Once campaign finance reform legislation bits the Senate floor early this spring, opponents will do everything in their power to defeat it. The first attempt will be a motion to table (ii) the legislation. Our senators need grassroots pressure urging them to yote against any motion to table. If the motion to table is defeated, opponents will offer "poison pill" or killer amendments. These amendments will attempt to tup the careful balance of the bill, forcing usual advocates to vote against final passage. Again, our senators need grassroots pressure urging them to vote against any "pisons pill" or killer amendments. Finally, a cloture vote will be called. Sixty votes are need to invoke cloture to end debate and move on to straight up or down vote. Please ask our senators to vote for cloture.

• Please call and write Seastor Dick Durbin, Seastor Carol Moseley-Braun, and Congressman John Porter. Now, this March, it is imperative that they hear from as many constituents as possible on this issue. Since the LWVUS president will be contacting members of Congress in the name of the League, please call and write as concerned individuals. Make it crystal clear to our members of Congress that their constituents care deeply about campaign finance reform and expect them to work hard bothing about real change. Ask our senators to vote against a meiton to table behanced, bipartises legislation and against any bilder amendments. Finally, urge them to work for cledure. Ask your representative in the House to support incremental camping finance legislation that closes the soft money and sham issue advocacy loopholes.

### Act Now to Prevent Undermining of Successful "Motor Voter" Law

Some members of Congress are attempting to pass new legislation that would undermine, and in some cases effectively kill, the National Voter Registration Act, known as the "motor voter" law.

Motor voter has been a tremendous success. Today, more citizens are registered to vote than ever before. The Federal Election Commission reports that 1996 saw the highest percentage, nearly 73 percent, of the voting age population registered to vote since reliable records were first available in 1990.

Election workers Char Kreuz and Mary Jane Wolter for spending a good part of St Patrick's Day working the election and donating their checks to the League


Diane Lloyd for moderating the candidates' forum in Waukegan and to the LWV Waukegan-Zion area for providing the tape for cablecast on our local station.

### CAMPAIGN FINANCE REFORM: Questions and Answers on Soft Money

To understand the issues involved with campaign financing, LWVUS has answered some questions about soft money. Next month we will feature questions and answers about Sham Issue Ads.

A: Soft money contributions are unlimited donations to the political parties from corporations, labor unions and wealthy individuals. There are no limits on the amount of soft money an individual, corporation or union can give to the parties. Six-figure soft money contributions are now entirely commonplace. In theory, soft money is to be used for "party-building" activities such as voter registration and get-out-the-vote drives. In reality, soft money is increasingly used to pay for a

figure nearly doubled to \$83 million: and in the 1995-96 cycle, soft money contributions tripled to an astounding \$262 million Initial FEC reports for the next election cycle indicate that this trend is continuing unabated

- Doesn't the Constitution prohibit the Congress from banning soft money?
  - No. There is absolutely no constitutional barrier preventing Congress from closing the soft money loophole. In Buckley V. Valeo, the Supreme

And in the first six months. of 1997 alone, tobacco companies numned an additional \$2 million dollars into Republican, and to a lesser degree, Democratic party coffers. Not surprisingly, these donations coincided with a push by tobacco companies for congressional approval of a settlement that could shield them from smokers' lawsuits, potentially saving them billions of dollars

- A: No. The soft money loophole was opened by a 1978 Federal Election Commission (FEC) ruling designed to strengthen political parties by allowing them to use unrestricted funds for activities like voter registration drives and get-out-the-vote efforts. Soft money was used primarily for this purpose throughout most of the 1980s, but by the 1992 election cycle, clever attorneys for the parties determined they could use soft money to pay for massive amounts of television attack ads while remaining within the letter, if not the spirit, of the law.
- appearance and reality of corruption, an interest that justifies restricting large campaign contributions in federal elections. Raising constitutional questions about banning soft money is simply a red herring, a way for politicians to preserve the soft money system without publicly defending six-figure contributions. Fortunately, the Court in Buckley clearly rejected the notion that limits on campaign contributions violate the First Amendment

- A: Over the last three presidential election cycles, combined party soft money receipts have grown exponentially. In the 1988 election cycle, the parties raised a combined \$45 million in soft money: in the 1992 cycle, that
- Who gives soft money donations?
  - During the 1995-96 election cycle, corporations were the single biggest source of soft money donations for both Democrats and Republicans Labor unions were also big soft money givers, almost exclusively to Democrats.

Tobacco industry giant Philip Morris was the single largest soft money tively undermined the system of partial public financing of presidential campaigns that was set up in the wake of the Watergate scandal. During the 1996 election, both President Clinton and Senator Dole directly participated in the raising of enormous amounts of soft money for their respective parties. The parties subsequently used this money to pay for a harrage of sham issue advocacy television advertisements that allowed the Clinton and Dole campaigns to ignore spending limits they had agreed to in exchange for public fi-

nancing of their campaigns.

Unless the soft money loophole is closed, it will be a simple matter for candidates to evade the spending limits associated with public financing of presidential campaigns.



WHAT'S THE PROBLEM?

As of December 1997, the United States still had not paid its accumulated debt (the arrears), a treaty obligation, to the United Nations. The bipartisen Helms-Biden agreement on payment of the arrears was defeated because its passage was linked to legislation that restricted U.S. aid to international planning programs. These two process of legislation need to be separated

In early 1997, the new Secretary-Ceneral of the United Nations, Koff Annan came to Weshington, DC to address the subject of the \$1.45 billion in old and current U.S. debts to the UN regular budget and to peacekeeping operations. Linked to these payments, the U.S. has called for massive UN reform. In March and July of 1997 Annan revealed as et of budgetary, management and structural reforms. Annan's plan redlects U.S. proposals as well diverse views of the UN 185 member states.

#### Background

Reform has been happening at the Unide Minions. In 1986 the General Assembly (GA) introduced consensus-based budgeding: member states would reach consensus (or unaimous agreement) at each step of the budget process. By the early 1990s, most UN specialized agencies also adopted consensus-based budgeting, Cutbacks in staff; reducing the top-heavy management structure of the Secretariat and the number of UN mentings also were part of the proposed reforms.

In 1988, the Reagan administration called for the payment of arrears under the Kassebaum amendment to the State Department authorization bill. It called for withholding 20 percent of assessed U.S. contributions to the UN unless the GA adopted a system of "weighted voting" on the budget, giving greater say to the largest contributors. This bill has been modified over the past decade.

From 1987-1995, the program budgets approved by the GA were zero-growth budgets. The UN's first negative-nominal growth budget (which means that the Secretariat's budget would have to absorb all inflationary increases and exchange rate fluctuations) was adopted in 1996-97 through U.S. efforts, working with other major contributors.

#### UN Reform 1997

In 1997 the authorized Secretariat posts in the budget were just over 10,000, though it was operating with at staff of about 8,500. In 1995, an Efficiency Board was established to help UN managers improve performance and save money Under-Secretary-General Joseph Connor, an American, has directed these efforts. Rigorous performance evaluations have been adopted. with some 20 percent implemented; the length and number of documents produced by the UN has been reduced by 14 percent and more routine services have been outsourced. By summer 1997, UN managers had undertaken some 550 efficiency projects and completed 205. Kofi Annan has replaced the Efficiency Board with a "Management Reform Group," which will institute further reforms throughout the UN organization. He also has drafted a new de of conduct for UN staff, emphasizing commitment to excellence, accountability for performance and financial disclosure by senior officials

#### Structural Reform

Four principal areas have been identified by the Secretary-Ceneral humanisarian fairs, development operations, economic and social affairs, and peace and security, with human rights as an issue that affects them all. Reform proposals in these area include the establishment of UN House; in consultation with the government of each country where such a house would be involved in the integration of these programs to confident the different agencies and funds, particularly for development assistance "at the country level."

#### Security Council

Proposals for enlarging the Security Council would necessitate amending the UN Charter. Two-thirds of the GA members present and voting would have to agree on such an amendment, and two-thirds of

the member state parliaments would have to ratify it. The U.S. supports permanent seats for Germany and Japan and three developing countries but has no position on whether newcomers should be given the veto. On November 11, the GA conditionally approved 29 reform actions outlined. The U.S. role is crucial to change. The failure of the U.S. to pay its debts weakens the ability of the UN to adopt reforms and also undermines U.S. ability to build support for its positions. Congress will return to the UN funding issue in 1998. League members should continue to inform their legislators about the facts of UN reform, to support a rationale for payment of our debts

#### Human Rights

December 10, 1997 marked the beginning of the 50th anniversary year of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights. On that occasion, the Secretary-General declared: 'The growth in support for the Declaration of Human Rights over the past fifty years has given it new life and reaffirmed its universality. The basic principles ... have been incorporated into national laws of countries from all cultural traditions... In every part of the world, the United Nations is engaged in securing the basic conditions for human existence: peace, development, a safe environment, food, adequate shelter, enhanced opportunities. The first UN conference on human rights called for the elimination of all forms of discrimination against women, the indivisibility of all human rights and fundamental freedom....the full realization of civit and political rights was not possible without the enjoyment of economic, social and cultural rights."

Watch for the many opportunities this year to celebrate human rights and educate our communities about how the UN works to promote these rights.

Lastly, the League of Women Voters of the United States has just been given consultative status at the UN and accredited to the Economic and Social Council (ECO/ SOC.) With this new status, the League will be able to participate in a more proactive way.

### LWVUS - CAMPAIGN FINANCE REFORM QUESTIO ON SI ISSUE

O. What are sham issue ads?

A: Sham issue ads are paid political advertisements that target individual candidates and are designed to influence the outcome of elections, but avoid important requirements of the Federal Election Campaign Act because of a loophole in the law.

Under a very narrow interpretation of current law, many groups have discovered they can run ads that are clearly designed to influence the outcome of elections without ringering disclosure requirements, contribution limits and source prohibitions associated with campaign ads. This is done by simply avoidation as contribution of the property of the contribution of the property of the contribution of defeat of a candidate such as "vote for." "vote against, "'elect," or "defeat." In addition to the clear record of abuse of this loophole that was established in the last election or defeat or that these handling of phrases (fanown as the "magic words") don't exhaust the capacity of the English language to advocate the election or defeat of a candidate. Nevertheless, Congress has thus far refused to step in to clarify the law.

#### O: Does the League oppose bona fide issue advocacy?

A: No! We strongly support true issue advocacy and engage in it ourselves. But opponents of reform exploit the sham issue advocacy loophole to use undisclosed, unlimited funds to buy elections. Reformers are simply trying to draw a distinct line be-

tween money spent on true issue advocacy on the one hand, and money spent on electioneering to influence the outcome of elections on the other.

O: What's wrong with sham issue advocacy?

X. Ulafinited, undisclosed money is overwhelming the election by system. By running ads immediately preceding an election that savage a candidate's opponent, special interests can provide something of great value to the candidate they support, while avoiding disclosure requirements and contribution limits. They know it is developing into one of the best ways to get point of their own campaigns. Jufless the sham issue ad loophole is closed, outcomes of clections will more and more be determined by the irresponsible actions of outsides, undettered by the need to represent the interests of the citizens of a state or district. Finally, money is being directed by political operatives to outside groups to avoid contribution limits and disclosure. These groups then claim their rights would be subverted by reform. It is nothing less that a ophisticated form of more) quandering.

Q: Can you show me an example of a sham issue ad?

A: The following is the text of a broadcast ad that ran in late October 1996 in Arkaness, attacking Serante candidate Winston Bryant. The sponsors of this ad bought more than \$300,000 worth of broadcast time just days before the election. Because of the sham issue ad loophole, it was not considered a campaign ad-Announcer: Senate candidate Winston Bryand's budget as Attracting Companies of the Companies of the Companies of the funded junkets to the Virgin Islands, Alaska and Arizona. And spent about \$100,000 on new furniture. Unfortunately, as the state's top law enforcement official, he's never opposed the parole of any convicted criminal, even rapists and murderers. And almost 4,000 Arkansas prisoners have been sent back to prison for crimes committed while they were out on parole. Winston Bryant: Government waste, political junkets, 3oft on criminal

Q: Who paid for this ad?

A: Because this loophole allows sponsors to avoid disclosure, we don't know who paid for it. Under current law, it could have been paid for by a corporation, labor union, ideological organization or group of wealthy individuals, any of whom might have lucrative business before the Senate.

Q: Wooldn't closing the sham issue advocacy loophole violate First Amendment rights by preventing groups from running any ads that mention a candidate before an election?

A: No. The sham issue advocacy loophole can be closed in a constitutional flation. Reform advocates have suggested a change in current law to close the sham issue advocacy loophole. It states that any pad broadcast communication with the general public within 60 days of the general election and when Congress is not in session that uses a federal candidate's name or likeness would be considered a campaign ada, and would be covered by rules pertaining to campaign ads. In other words, add that mention a candidate 60 days before a general election could not be financed with corporate funds or union dues, but could use publicly-disclosed donations subject to reasonable contribution limits. No group, at any time, would be prohibited from running any advertisement, regulates of its contribusion limits.

This change is known as the bright line test because it draws a spent on true issue ads and money that can be spent on true issue ads and money that can be spent on electioneering. It would simply let voters know who is paying to influence their elections, and help to ensure that wealthy special interests aren't buying elections.

It is constitutional for several reasons. In Buckley V. Valeo, the Supreme Court held that the government has a compelling interest in combating the appearance or reality of corruption, an interest that justifies restricting large campaign contributions in federal elections. In the last election cycle, a clear record of abuse was established in terms of the sham issue ad loophole being used to funnel huge amounts of money into ad campaigns designed to change the outcome of federal elections. Significantly, the bright line test simply places limits (for which there are longstanding precedents) on the type of money that can be used to pay for certain ads, not on the content of ads. Finally, because it draws a bright, unambiguous line between money that can be snent on true issue ads and money spent on electioneering, it is not open to the charge that it is so vague as to chill speech by leaving questions in the minds of ad practitioners about what is and is not permissible

O: Is sham issue advocacy related to soft money?

A: Yes. Banning soft money without addressing sham issue advocacy may make the system worse by channeling big money from disclosed party soft money into undisclosed sham issue advocacy.

### FROM THE NATIONAL CONVENTION... an open letter from the deligates



It seems our journal should open with a gloriously optimistic departure from O'Hare to San Diego, but... suffice to say it took a whole roll of lifesavers! Dawn the next day revealed a whole new world: A beautiful Victorian hotel on

a wide Pacific beach... and Convention '98. Though the sand beckoned we attended events from 7am 'hi 11 par land addition to the Plenary Sessions scheduled for the convention floor, there were caucuses, workshops, and fascinating speakers. Even the dash for lunch gave a chance for some well-considered conversation, because delegates can be identified by their badges at all times. A networking dream come true! We improved our vocabulary. We heard about PMPs (per-member payments from local Leagues to National). McMs (money and members), and learned a new definition of politics (poli means many, and ties are blood sucking parasites)!

The Plenary Sessions are where all delegates come together to conduct business. A total of 15 hours over four days was scheduled. A long time to sit, and yet not long enough for many delegates. The business of selecting an issue for emphasis unfolded gradually over three days. On the first day the convention rules and order of business are adopted, and "notice of intent" to speak about items is given. On the second day there are "motions and questions for clarification" on issues and positions. On the third day "discussion" occurs. This means debate! The six plenary hall microphones were marked as "pro" and "con", and were recognized alternately by LWVUS President Becky Cain. Even with this balanced presentation, it's easy to see how many speakers line up on each side, and it's easy to hear exasperated sighs and murmurs of approval. And 1000plus delegates can murmur loudly!

The caucuses, networking sessions, and question and answer workshops are smaller groups of delegates, and occurred continually throughout our four days in San Diego. The Q&A's are informal meetings with the National Board and staff. The networking sessions are delegate meetings to share concerns and successes. And the caucuses to share concerns and successes. And the caucuses to be firmized Caucuses were generally sponsored by local Leagues to lobby ideas to delegates, and to plan floor strategies designed to gain maximum exposure. For those who planned to speak pro and co no the third day the caucuses were essential brainstorming sessions. The topics (proportional representation, making democracy work, furg. policy,

electric industry restructuring. United Nations restudy, sustainable communities, gau violence prevention, democracy in DC, to list just some...) discussed in caaucus esssions exemplify the League's grassroots structure. They provide a vehicle for Locals to set National priorities. All of these issues were presented in some form on the convention floor, perhaps as a motion to restudy an issue, perhaps as a proposed issue for emphasis, action, or simply for publicity value.

In addition to formally readopting the current LWVUS positions three additional issues met success on the third day of plenary, "Making Democracy Work" was again approved as an Issue for Emphasis, with the focus on "Seeking Change" in the area of civic participation. Also approved was full voting Congressional Representation for the District of Columbia. Throughout the Convention the DC delegates were sashes proclaiming "DC: The Last Colony". Though defeated, the motion to adopt "Sustainable Communities" as an Issue for Emphasis inspired lengthy debate. National profiled this motion as "environmental protection", but the Leagues supporting this motion don't see themselves as 'tee-huggers"! Instead, they describe themselves as concerned with social justice, and the equitable distribution of finite resources. One of their many campaign slogans was "Sustainability Basic to Life and League". Currently 101 local Leagues are studying sustainability, about one in ten.

Debate about sustainable communities also brought us back to a discussion of M&Ms - money and members. One delegate stated that MDW (Making Democracy Work) was just too darned uninspiring. Her local has adopted "Taking the System Back" as their action slogan. Some delegates emphatically stated that the only true business of the League should be voter registration and voter participation. Other delegates bemoaned this focus as too narrow, plainly stating that M&Ms follow naturally when local Leagues choose to involve themselves in advocacy. Declining membership in the League was an issue both on and off the plenary floor. Most of our fellow delegates were Presidents of their local League, and definitely senior citizens. We were asked many times how to attract younger members. And it was wonderful to be called "so young" over and over again! Did we mention the beach? To be "at convention" is a full time job. Even so, we managed a few con-

templative sandy strolls. And attended events in beach wear upon occasion. All in all it was an unforgettable experience. Thank you for letting us represent you!



### LWV LF.LB ANNUAL MEETING UPDATE

At the Annual Meeting in May, after enjoying dining and fraternizing, we got down to business.

- · We adopted a new budget (which is available upon request).
- We voted in new officers and directors (see page 2 for the complete list of officers and directors).
- . We voted to maintain our current local positions and our current bylaws.
- · We approved a new study.
- We will undertake a study of the duties and responsibilities of Shields Township Government.

  The main focus of the study is not limited to but will include:
- Definition of duties and responsibilities of Shields Township.
- Revenues and expenditures of services performed by Shields Township.
- Relationship of services performed by Shields Township with those of the municipalities of Lake Forest and Lake Bluff, and the County of Lake.
- We approved a consensus process to address Affordable Senior Housing.
  - Concerning the issue of Áffordable Senior Housing, we will develop a consensus process based on prior League presentations and discussions and to present this to the membership in the fall of 1998. If the process yields approval, this will allow the League to go on public record as favoring affordable senior housing.

The annual meeting is over, but the work is just beginning. You will be hearing more about the study and the consensus process as our fiscal year gets underway!

#### LWVLC TRANSPORTATION AND LAND USE POSITION -modified Spring 1988

The League of Women Voters of Lake County supports a comprehensive plan for Lake County providing a balance for orderly growth and transportation needs while protecting the environment, conserving natural resources and preserving our natural heritage. Intergovernmental cooperation is necessary to implement the plan.

Decisions on planning and land use must be based on the sustainability of our natural resources balanced with the long term needs of the community. Since land and other natural resources are finite, conservation, stewardship and long term planning should be shared by all levels of government and planning entities.

We support the acquisition of additional open space by the: Lake County Forest Preserve District as well as maintenance of existing preserves to protect the unique ecology.

Current, unbiased, quality research should be made available to the public and decision making bodies. The public must be fully informed from the beginning and throughout the planning process. Intergovernmental and interagency cooperation must include public involvement so munual understanding can be achieved and the resulting plans will be beneficial to all. The League urges the formation of a citizen's advisory group consisting of representatives from public, private, environmental and business interests to work together to assess county and regional long term needs.

The League of Women Voters of Lake County believes transportation systems should support viable business centers and reduce suburban spraw! It is the responsibility of regional government and planting agencies to work with all municipalities within its region. When studies of the plans establish a need and legitimacy, the affected government entities in cooperation with the enabling legislative authority should have the responsibility to widen, add and improve arterial roads, collector roads, railways and waterways. Impacts on citizens, roads, business and residential sectors, schools, affected property owns, taxpayers, natural resources and the environment must be considered and made public before any plans are adopted. Projects must show cost to each level of government. Alternatives to any proposed plan, including "ne-build" options, should be fully explored.

High priority should be given to transportation alternatives that mitigate road gridlock. To increase the use of public transportation, we encourage convenient routes, reasonable train and but fares with the construction of convenient commuter parking. In addition, we endorse the continued use of substidized bus and tasi services for seniors and people with disabilities, and incentives to employer and employee to improve niter participation.

We further support creative, well-planned mixed-use develop ment along existing transportation corridors to reduce travel distances

# SHARE THE SPIRIT

#### HIGHLIGHTS OF THIS SUMMARY

- Convention '98 elected a new president, officers and board of directors for the LwVVUS. President
  Carolyn Jefferson-lenkins of Colorado told participants: "My vision for the League of the 21 st
  century is about making necessary transitions, about bringing us to the verge of greatness, about
  taking the next steps to fulfill the promise of our great organization." The convention also elected a
  Nominating Committee for the 1998-2000 biennium. At end of the four-day convention, the
  League's grassroots leaders from across the country paid tribute and bid farewell to 1992-98
  LWVUS President Becky Cain and other retiring members of the board.
- The convention voted to continue the League's Making Democracy Work campaign as the 1998-2000 Issue for Emphasis, after adding full congressional voting representation for the District of Columbia as a component. Delegates also adopted all current Government, International Relations, Natural Resources and Social Policy positions. The convention adopted a concurrence to add support for regulating firearms for consumer safety to the League's Gun Control position.
- The convention adopted the FY 1998-99 LWVUS budget with no amendments. Delegates approved a Per-Member Payment (PMP) of \$19 for FY 1998-99 and \$21 for FY 1999-2000.
- Bylaw amendments were adopted to allow for the use of communication vehicles other than mail for notification to LWVUS board members of meetings and to enable Inter-League Organizations (ILOs) to participate fully in the LWVUS program planning process.
- Participants spent an afternoon "Creating the Future" through Dialogue Sessions on the LWVUS
  Future Plan and an array of workshops focused on implementing the League's Diversity Plan.
- Convention speakers Bill Lann Lee, Anita Perez Ferguson and Freda Lewis-Hall contributed valuable
  perspectives and insights, accepting the convention's invitation to "share the spirit."


Constitution Center, they found: 600 teenagers between the es of 13 and 17 euroyed: 41% could name the three branches of government, but 59% could name the Three Stooges; 75% could name the City that Bart Simpson lives in (Springfield), but only 12% knew where Abraham Lincoln lived; 95% could name the actor who played the Fresh Prince of 86 Air but only 2% could name the chief justice of the United States. We'll share our findings with you.

Plane are underway to hold a public dialogue on the future of Medicare with citizens in our community. This program is part of a project sponsored by the League of Women Voters Education Fund and the Henry J. Kaiser Family Foundation which seeks to enable a public voice to be heard on the issue of Medicare reform by the National Bipartisan Commission on the Future of Medicare. This commission has been appointed by President Clinton and Congress to make recommendations on whether and how to change Medicare This forum will not be an overview of the Medicare program or give details about how it works; rather we will focus on possible Medicare reforms and provide questions for citizens to consider about each reform option. At the end of the meeting a questionnaire will be completed by the group and the results will be included with research findings from focus groups and a nationwide survey to represent a public voice on Medicare reform. Details will be sent to you either in the next neweletter or by special mailing.

At the 1988 annual meeting, League members voted unanimously to develop a consensus procedure without a formal study in the fall of 1980 on the issue of affordable senior housing in the Lake Forest and Lake Bluff. We will conduct this process in the next couple months. Watch your mail for information on this, too.

In December our League will be co-sponsoring a Community Information Forum with City of Lake Forest regarding Home Rule. The date has been moved back to Wednesday, December 2 at Deerpath Elementary School in the Baggett Room, 7:00-9:00 p.m. Background information on home rule will be in the next newsletter.

Please remember and remind friends and neighbors to vote on November 3.



Any community with a population of at least 25,000 automatically has home rule status. In a community with fewer than 25,000 people, home rule is established only by referendum. In such a community, state and county powers usually dominate. Lake Forest's current population is about 18,600, and the City would have to go to referendum in order to establish home

Home Rule is a form of local governance. By having home rule status, residents bring more authority to local government officials. This enables local governments to tailor local solutions to local

concerns. With home rule status, a community has greater flexibility in controlling its finances, passing and implementing local ordinances, and adjusting local rule to be appropriate with community needs and desires.

Take advantage of this opportunity to join your voice with thousands across the country on a very important issue.

At the local level, a panel, discussing home rule considerations for Lake Forest, co-sponsored with the City of Lake Forest will be presented on December 2nd. Come hear what home rule is and its implications for citizens and the municipal government. This program will be cablecast on Channel 19.

For fun...the holiday luncheon will be held on December 10th at Sr. James Lutheran Church on Waukegan Road. # Home Rule (continued from page 1)

To help educate the community on home rule and to present the different viewpoints that have become evident in other Illinois communities that have been explored on this subject, the following panel will be presented:

- Dr. James M. Banovetz, Northern Illinois University, Professor and Director of Public Administration
- Dr. Richard F. Dve, Lake Forest College, Ernest A. Johnson Professor of Economics
- Mr. Victor Fillippini, Municipal Attorney, Burke, Weaver & Prell, Chicago
- Dr. Michael T. Peddle, Northern Illinois University, Professor of Public Finance and Public Administration
  Mr. Robert Franz, Village Manager of the Village of Deerfield, Illinois

Their discussion will include an overview of home rule, impact on citizens, legal aspects, public finance, municipal implications and specific examples from a home rule community (Deerfield, which has had home rule since 1976).

As of 1996, 70% of Illinois residents live under home rule status. Among Illinois communities having home rule, approximately 55% were through voter referendum. Lake County communities operating under home rule include Deerfield, Highland Park, Lincolnshire, North Chicago, Park City, Waukegan. Other area communities having home rule include Evanston, Glenview, Northbrook, Skokie, South Barrington and Wilmette. Citizens in Lake Zurich (IL) and Zion (IL) were asked to vote on referenda for home rule in their communities in the past election on November 3, 1998. The proposals in both communities were defeated.

#### Basics of Home Rule:

- Provided for in 1970 Illinois Constitution Permits broad powers unless preempted by State statutes.
- · Most powers are for local regulation.
- · Cannot supersede state regulations, can supersede county regulation.
- . Cannot impact motor vehicle code, licensing, or state road use
- Permits up to 2% additional local sales tax, in 1/4% increments, not on food & drugs
- Permits added business fees, providing they are for regulation & not revenue
- . Removes restrictions on hotel & entertainment taxes
- . Provides no new controls outside the city or adjacent to it.
- · Does not permit establishing fees for other taxing bodies (schools & libraries)
- · Does not permit outlawing existing businesses or uses.

#### langue of Women Voters of Lake Forest/Lake Bluff NONPARTISAN POLITICAL POLICY

Statement of Policy

The purpose of the League of Women Voters is to promote political responsibility through informed and active participation of citizens in government, and to influence public policy through education and advocacy. The League is a nonpartisan political organization nonpartisan in that it never supports or opposes any candidate or political party; political in that it does act on those governmental issues selected by its members and on which a position has been reached through study and member agreement.

#### II. Rationale

The League of Women Voters must be nonpurtisan so that:

its position on an issue can be readily accepted as unbiased and independent;

it will not be obligated to any political party or faction:

- . it can seek solutions in the nublic interest on the basis of fresh inquiry and objective study.
- · its voter service work will have wide public acceptance and trust;
- League membership will appeal to individuals of varying political views.

#### III. Guidelines for the General Membership

The League believes that participation in the activities of our political parties is an essential ingredient of citizen responsibility, and urges its members to work in the party of their choice. Accordingly, all members, other than the President, Voter Service Chair and Voter Registration Chair are encouraged to participate in any political party or governmental activity, provided that they act as individuals and not in the name of the League. When a League member is acting in the name of the League, that member shall refrain from any partisan display or action of party affidiation or politics.

#### 1V. Guidelines for Board Members

A. Public Office, Boards, Commissions, Committees

The President, Voter Service and Voter Registration Chair shall not run for or hold an elected public office nor accept appointment to a public board, commission or committee. When a board member decides to run for, to hold or to accept a public office, that member must notify the board. If a conflict between the official position of the League should arise prior to or during the term of office, the League Board shall review the conflict and decide upon a course of action which shall be in the best interest of the League. This review may consider the visibility and duration of the activity, the sensitivity of the member's League role, the extent to which the member is publicly identified with the League and an assessment of the community climate.

#### B. Support of Candidates for Public Office

Individual Board Members may support candidates of their choice, as long as they do so as individuals and not in the name of the League, However, because of the nature of their positions, the President, Voter Service Chair and Voter Registration Chair may not publicly support any candidate, such as signing endorsement statements intended for publication, or sponsoring special functions for the candidate.

#### C Public Issues

Board members are free on their own behalf to sign petitions or otherwise speak publicly for or against an issue. The President may scenk in conflict with a League position, even as an individual. However, during the study of an issue and before a League position has been reached, all members speaking in the name of the League should refrain from making any public statements for or against the issue. After the League position has been reached, the President or a designated representative may speak or testify publicly at meetings or hearings only in agreement with the League position, and not in disagreement with it. No petitions may be circulated during any League meetings petitions are in support of League positions. The President has the responsibility of assuring that any other petitions are not presented as having League support.

#### D. Employment

The board shall evaluate and resolve any questions of conflicts of interest arising from a board member's employment,

If a Board Member chooses to engage in political activity beyond the extent deemed to be in the best interest of the League, the board may ask for that member's resignation.

Honoraria received by board members shall accrue to the LWV-LF/LB or the LWV- LF/LB Education Fund.

#### V. Interpretation

The League has an obligation to be sensitive to any possibility of community perception of League bias or League candidate support. In situations not specifically covered in this policy statement, each member should use discretion, keeping in mind the reasons for and the spirit of the League's nonpartisan character. The ultimate responsibility for the interpretation of this policy rests with the Board of Directors.

#### VI. Annual Review of Nonpartisan Political Policy

A Nonpartisan Political Policy Committee, appointed by the President, shall be responsible for the annual review of this policy.



The Medicare Reform forum presented at Lake Forest Place in November was very well received. About forty persons attended and participated in a nationwide consensus gathering effort spearheaded by the LWYUS. To our delight we were asked to make an encore presentation at the Senior Center at Gorton on January 21, if you were not able to attend our first session, consider coming out for this repeat performance.

We are still planning the logistics of the legislative interview with State Senator Terry Link and State Representative Susan Garrett. This is an opportunity for the League to present to our state representatives issues of importance at the state level and hopefully we'll hear their priorities and concerns for the upcoming legislative session.

This is the year we have the opportunity to give recommendations regarding how we would like the State League to use its resources for influencing public policy in Illinois. The first step in the State Program Planning Process is for each individual league to review existing positions and to make recommendations to retain, restudy (or update) or drop a position. We are also asked to consider new items including four ideas submitted by other leagues (Charter Schools Study/Barrington LWV: Charter Schools Study/ Wheaton LWV; Large Livestock Facilities Concurrence/ Jackson County LWV; and Proportional Representation Study/Chicago LWV). Arrangements have been made with Gocky's Roadside Lodge (176 and Waukegan Road in Lake Bluff) for us to meet, eat and come to resolution. This is for all League members to voice their priorities. Please set aside this date and share your thoughts with us.

Finally, many thanks to those who helped with programs this past fall: to Carol Gilbert for her assistance on the Medicare Reform presentation; to Phyllis Albrecht and Alice Flaherty for their participation moderating and videotaping the Home Rule Panel Discussion; and to Mary Jane Wolter and Elaine Slayton for their efforts making our holiday luncheon very special.

### NEWS FROM THE LAKE COUNTY LEAGUE

County Board Representative Carol Spielman and Jan Gellimore from the Forest Preserve District spoke on the upcoming April 13, 1999 Referendum, at our November forum. Citizenes will be asked to support a \$55 million referendum for lead acquisition, restoration and improvements. The need for balanced growth of development and forest Preserve lands was stressed.

Passage of the referendum would enable further preservation and restoration of wildlife labilities, wetlands, takes and rivers, orests and printies, trail and genomy corridors; and large refuges. It would also provide and protect flood control, outdoor excretion, and cleaner air and water. Creation and improvement of trails as well as public access to lakes and rivers would be included also.

This is an ideal time to invest in the future while land is still available and interest rates are at record lows according to our peaces. The cost to homeowners would be roughly \$9.15 pc;\$100,000 of a home's market value. Friends of the Forest Preserve is spearlieading formation of a coalition of referendum supporters which the LWVLC will Join.

Our next forum is January 13, 1999, at noon, with a panel on Violence and Women.

#### GOVERNMENT

#### CONSTITUTIONAL IMPLEMENTATION AND AMENDMENTS

Support for League positions to implement, amend and uphold the 1970 Illinois Constitution.

#### Recent League Activity

The League supported a proposed constitutional amendment to add two citizens, selected by the governor, as members of the Illinois Courts Commission. The proposal was approved by the voters on November 3, 1998.

#### Outlook

Suggestions to combine the offices of the state comptroller and state treasurer and to eliminate the office of lleutenant governor are still being discussed. If the League wishes to act on these proposals, a review and possible restudy of the issues will be necessary. Merit selection of judges is another issue which might be raised in the General Assembly's next session. A constitutional amendment to change the state's procedures for remapping legislative districts could result from work of the resetablished lillinois Redistrictino Commission (see State Redistrictino).

#### II. COUNTY GOVERNMENT STRUCTURE

Support for expanded citizen initiative powers to address county government structure and support for changes in the Illinois County Executive Act.

Recent League Activity: None

#### III. CRIMINAL JUSTICE

Support for improved criminal justice procedures and alternatives to incarceration.

#### Recent League Activity

The League worked successfully to retain penalties for carrying a gun and to prohibit sexual activities between staff and offenders under their control. The League reviewed proposals offered by the Prison Management Reform Committee and offered recommendations for a more balanced approach to criminal justice.

The League works with such organizations as Restorative Justice Illinois and the Illinois Probation and Court Services Association. In order to gain information, the League attends symposia and observes meetings of the Illinois Criminal Justice Information Authority. Each year the League takes part in Criminal Justice Awareness Day in Springfield.

#### Outlook

Two public policy issues merit thoughtful discussion: a review of the criminal code and the cost of prisons. Costs have been masked somewhat by a healthy economy. The League expects an increased interest in female offenders as their numbers continue to grow.

#### IV.

Support for improved election laws and procedures and opposition to term limits for members of the Illinois General Assembly.

#### Recent League Activity

Our election laws activity reflects both national and state positions.

At the 1997 state convention delegates directed the state board to conduct a program review of the LWVIL's election laws position, including consideration of proportional representation. A state committee undertook this review. The summer 1998 edition of the Illinois Voter carried a report giving background information about proportional representation and recommending the creation of a task force to examine the issue. Member response was low and a task force was not formed. The results of the position review will be submitted to the 1999 convention.

Illinois is implementing the National Voter Registration Act (NVRA, or Motor Voter) under rules and regulations prepared by the State Board of Elections. LWVIL submitted comments when the rules were proposed. Incorporating NVRA's requirements into Illinois' election code is a priority for LWVIL: however, introduced legislation did not pass out of committee. LWVIL joined in LWVUS' action to oppose Congressional efforts to weaken NVRA.

In May 1998, the League filed an amicus curiae brief in a suit before the Appellate Court. The brief supported the contention that the adoption of legislation which eliminated straight party voting had not met the constitutional requirements for passage. Both the Appellate and the Supreme Courts upheld the lower court's decision and the law stands.

The League continued to observe meetings of the State Board of Elections and expressed its support for a computerized statewide voter registration system when the board undertook a needs assessment for such a system in 1997. The State Board of Elections created a study group to develop a conceptual design for a system. A League member was appointed to the study group which filed its report in September 1998.

#### Outlook

NVRA: NVRA will continue to be an issue with an ongoing need to protect it at the national level. Illinois needs to amend the election code to include NVRA's requirements. Uneven compliance of NVRA's provisions by various state agencies and local election authorities is a concern.

Computerized statewide voter registration system: The promising possibility of creating this system offers the League an opportunity to affect an important change in election procedures.

Illinois election codes: A codification of Illinois' patchwork election laws is needed. Primary Date: Proposals to change the primary date are likely to be introduced in the General Assembly.

#### ٧. GUN CONTROL

Support for handoun and assault weapon control.

#### Recent League Activity

The League's action in the gun control arena has been low during the biennium, reflecting the relative quiet in the gun control debate at the state legislative level. The League continues its commitment to responsible and effective cun control measures.

#### Outlook

ce introduced. The League will continue to take an active role in education and tobbying efforts.

#### VI. SCHOOLS

Support for a public school system that is equitable both in quality for the student and financing for the taxpayer.

#### Recent League Activity

In February 1997 the League provided testimony to the Illinois House, which had been convened as a Committee of the Whole to consider school funding reform. The testimony addressed the need to increase the percentage of school funding from the state, the suitability of the income tax as the source of additional state revenue, and increasing the personal exemption to enhance fairness and revenue growth. In March of 1997 the League supported Governor Edgar's unsuccessful call for an increase in the income tax to provide additional funds for education. The League also participated in the development of Education Reform in '97: Opportunity for Action, a widely distributed newspaper supplement published by the Chicago Community Trust in April. 1997.

In fall of 1997, a proposal providing an additional \$4.85 million for education through a combination of tax increases on cigarettes, telephone calls and river boat gambling was introduced. In response, the League lobbied for an income tax increase as a preferable source of revenue. The measure was defeated in the regular veto session, but passed in a special session in December and included a \$1.4 billion dollar capital improvement program. The League remained neutral on the bill. While it provided significant new dollars for education, the League believed that it failed to achieve two essential goals: to provide stable and adequate revenue over time and to avoid a disproportionate tax burden on poor and middle-income households.

The League opposed an income tax credit for certain public and private K-12 education expenses. The bill passed in the 1997 spring session but was subsequently vetoed by the Governor.

The statewide Coalition for Educational Rights, which the League chaired for several years, dissolved at the end of 1997.

#### Outlook

Dri

Major school funding reform initiatives are not expected in the next two years. The legislature will likely be satisfied with yearly increases in education appropriations which should be supported by anticipated state revenue growth. It is likely that measures providing vouchers and/or income tax credits for private education will be introduced in the legislature. Governor-elect Ryan supports an income tax credit.

#### VII. STATE FISCAL POLICIES

Support for a diversified revenue system which principally relies on a combination of broadbased taxes and user fees, is equitable, progressive, stable, responsive and simple.

#### Recent League Activity

The League advocated for progressive tax reform in the context of the school funding debate in the 1997 legislative session, supporting the Governor's failed call to increase the income tax and attempting unsuccessfully to insert an increase in the personal exemption in the revenue package. (See Schools.)

During the past year, the League participated in the Tax Policy Working Group, a group of civic a community-based organizations convened by the Woods Fund to share information and develop stateleis for advancing progressive tax reform as a political issue.

Although the need is as strong as ever, achieving progressive tax reform in Illinois remains an elusive goal. Barring a catastrophic decline in the economy, however, there are unlikely to be opportunities to advance progressive tax reform initiatives during the 91st General Assembly

#### VIII STATE REDISTRICTING

Support for a redistricting process which is timely, orderly and meets the basic criteria relating to population, compactness and contiguity and the requirements of the 1965 U.S. Voting Rights Act and subsequent amendments.

#### Recent League Activity/Outlook

This position was adopted by a concurrence of delegates at the 1993 LWVII. Convention and readopted at subsequent conventions. It will enable the League to comment on the proposed maps at the next redistricting of state legislative districts in the year 2001.

Two factors influenced the League's decision to develop a state redistricting position. One was the failure of the current redistricting method to produce acceptable maps in a timely manner. The second was the creation of a bipartisan Redistricting Process Review Commission to consider reforms in Illinois' procedures for remapping legislative districts.

This Commission was created in March 1992 and reconvened in the summer of 1998 by Secretary of State George Ryan. The League is an active participant in the Commission, represented by President Jan Flapan. It is expected that the Commission will make recommendations in the Spring of 1999. We anticipate education and lobbying activity after the Commission's proposals are released.

#### NATURAL RESOURCES

#### IX. LAND USE

Support for a state land use policy that addresses the problem of conflicting uses for the land resources of Illinois

#### Recent League Activity

This position has been the basis for local League action on a variety of issues, including landfill siting, provisions for orderly growth, adequate low income housing, the preservation of open space, and, recently, the environmental impact of transhopting (LWV Naperville.)

o only League adopted a study on the development and regulation of large scale livestock facilities (hno mega-farms). A number of these mega-farms have or are now planning to set up facilities in Illinois

#### Outlook

The Jackson County League will continue to monitor large scale livestock facilities and regulation legislation and will ask for adoption of their local position by concurrence at the 1999 LWVIL Convention.

#### X. PESTICIDES

Support for reduction in pesticide use and the promotion of non-toxic alternatives.

#### Recent League Activity

The League continued to participate with 27 local and regional health, advocacy and environmental groups in the "Yards for Nature Campaign". This campaign, organized by the Safer Pest Control Project, provides lawn owners with a cost-efficient, effective alternative to potentially harmful pesticides. The League participated in a Task Force on Pesticides and Children's Health, also organized by the Safer Pest Control Project.

#### Outlook

The Loague will continue to work with the Illinois Pesticide Network and Safer Pest Control Project and participate in education programs encouraging reduction in pesticide exposure and use of non-toxic alternatives. Emphasis will be placed on reducing children's exposure to pesticides in school.

#### SOCIAL POLICY

#### XI. CHILDREN'S SERVICES

Support for improved state and local services by Illinois state agencies serving children and their families.

#### Recent League Activity

As a priority item, Children's Services was featured at two Legislative Briefings and all activities were coordinated with the Breaking the Cycle of Violence in the Lives of Children Action Focus. The League successfully advocated for measures and funding for Early Start programs: day care, family preservation/support, Healthy Families Illinois and health coverage for uninsured children.

Passage of the Juvenile Justice Reform Provisions of 1998 marked a major change in how delinquents are handled. The League worked with coalitions, legislators and staff, the Black Caucus and the Governor's Office to delay enactment until the impact and costs were more fully understood. Initial funding is promising.

LWVIL is represented on several advisory committees to the Department of Children and Family Services and the Department of Human Services. The League expands its influence by working with such organizations as the Alliance for Family Based Services, Illinois Steering Committee for Family Based Services, Healthy Families Illinois Work Group, bar associations and by attending state and national conferences. The League contacted selected members of the Illinois Congressional delegation in an attempt to retain the core requirements of the Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Act, including prevention funding and limits on juvenile transfers to adult court.

National and state trends toward harsher responses may make ne are spent on Early prevention dollars are especially vulnerable. The League Start and juvenile justice reform and will encourage communities to become involved. The League will join with others in celebrating the 100th anniversary of the juvenile court.

#### XII. INCOME ASSISTANCE

Support for improved public aid services.

#### Recent League Activity

League activity in this area reflects both national and state positions.

While the League has opposed the federal welfare legislation which ends federal entitlements of income support to all low income families and families who meet eligibility criteria and shifts major responsibility to the states, we continue to work for meeting needs through state resources and available, reduced federal funds. Federally imposed time limits on welfare benefits heighten the urgency of quality supportive services, such as affordable, quality childcare; transportation; stable housing; job creation; and employment that pays a livable wage, leading to economic self-sufficiency.

League works in partnership with social policy entities and the Work. Welfare and Families coalition for a broad voice in social policy issues. The League continues to be represented on committees established to improve conditions for low-income families and individuals, including the Welfare to Work Group of the Governor's Commission on the Status of Women in Illinois.

#### Outlook

The LWVIL will continue to vigorously monitor legislative and administrative activity and provide input and comments on the critical issues affecting low income families, particularly the working poor and those facing time limits on their assistance.

#### XIII. MARITAL LAW

Support for laws which recognize marriage as an economic partnership and for a divorce process which is fair and equitable to all parties with regard to property division, maintenance. custody and child support.

Recent League Activity: None

#### XIV. MENTAL HEALTH

Support for comprehensive and coordinated services for mentally ill adults and children in both state facilities and community-based programs.

#### Recent League Activity

The League worked with several coalitions to ensure rights of persons with mental illnesses by continued support to pass legislation calling for insurance coverage equal to coverage for other illnesses; testified regarding housing needs and protections under the Fair Housing Amendments of 1988; and worked to enforce standards preventing abuse and neglect in institutions. Additionally, the League worked to protect patient rights in two areas: managed care delivery of community services and voting rights.

#### Outlook

#### ACTION ITEMS

Making Democracy Work, with an emphasis on Campaign Finance Reform Promote efforts to create healthier communities through strengthening citizen participation in government, with an emphasis on reforming campaign finance.

The 1997 Convention confirmed the LWVIL's commitment to strengthen the democratic process by engaging more clitzens in the work of shaping better communities. The "Making Democracy Work" campaign seeks to counter Americans' growing cyncism about politics and government and build their confidence in the process of bringing about change. Change is sought in five areas: increased voter participation, reformed campaign finance practices, expanded civic education and knowledge, enhanced diversity of representation, and rebuilt public civic participation. Many of the projects the League is engaged in are a fundamental component of this over-arching program: the campaign finance reform projects, GOTV, civics education and participation in the development of a statewide voter registration system. Leaguers have enthusiastically embraced increasing our—and the public's—expertise in civic skills: how to increase diversity, how to build successful collaborations, how to run for office and win, how to moderate a community forum.

In the summer of 1998, LWVIL convened a statewide task force on Civics Education in the Schools to focus attention on the teaching of civics education as mandated by the state. Currently, local Leagues are determining if their school districts are in compliance with the mandates. Based on the findings, League will develop plans to promote compliance.

In conjunction with LWVIL Voter Service, local Leagues throughout the state developed and implemented extensive "Get Out the Vote" campaigns in their communities for the fall 1998 elections. Activity is expected to continue with the municipal elections in spring of 1999.

Campaign finance reform is an integral part of the MDW action focus. The statewide committee has been active on a variety of fronts, with an emphasis on education. The League of Women Voters of Illinois Education Fund received a \$19,265 grant for the "Campaign Finance Reform: Midwest Strategies for Success" project from the League of Women Voters of the US Education Fund. The LWVILEF awarded 9 grants to local Leagues who are using community meetings, brochures, library displays and web sites to provide information about campaign finance reform. Because these grants involve more than one local League, 15 Leagues are participating in grant-funded activities.

LWVIL in cooperation with the Illinois Campaign for Political Reform (I-CPR) distributed the Political Reformer, a newsletter about campaign finance, to a statewide mailing list of over 7,000. The I-CPR, funded by a LWVILEF grant from the Joyce Foundation, and local Leagues have participated in 56 public forums, radio interviews or news conferences.

In the legislative arena, the General Assembly passed ethics reform legislation in the spring of 1998. League is generally supportive of the measure as the first step in reforming campaign finance in Illinois. Unfortunately, the method of funding campaigns was left unchanged. The committee is developing plans to move forward on reasonable contribution limits legislation and the development of a statewide voter's quide.

#### II. ACTION FOCUS: BREAKING THE CYCLE OF VIOLENCE Promote efforts to prevent violence, in all forms, in the lives of children.

The 1997 LWVIL Convention continued to focus on the membership's commitment to children's issues with the readoption of this action focus. This item is based on state and national positions on violence prevention, early intervention for children at risk meetine basic human needs and children's services.

A statewide committee encouraged local Leagues to participate in a variety of community based activities. Many local Leagues hosted informational programs and initiated work in their communities. Local Leagues were encouraged to work in concert with local violence prevention/infervention efforts, and to forge alliances with like-minded, concerned citizen groups in their communities towards the goal of reducing the violence in the lives of all our children.

#### PROGRAM ACTIVITY BASED ON NATIONAL POSITIONS

#### HEALTH CARE

The LWVUS believes that a basic level of quality health care at an affordable cost should be available to all US residents.

Leagues across the state have participated in a variety of health care projects. The Illinois Campaign for Better Health Care has been the primary supporter of an Illinois Managed Care Patients Bill of Rights. Local Leagues have participated in this debate and have co-sponsored community forums. LWUS has taken an active role in the US health care policy debate and is currently promoting local League participation in community-based discussions on Medicare.

#### II. PUBLIC POLICY ON REPRODUCTIVE CHOICE

Protect the constitutional right of privacy of the individual to make reproductive choices.

The League opposed measures to restrict access to abortion services, especially to teenage women and poor women. League opposed legislative efforts in 1997 to prohibit 'partial-brith' abortions and efforts in 1998 to restrict the use of Medicaid monies to fund abortions. The election of George Ryan as governor, a foe of unrestricted reproductive rights, will likely bring this issue to the forefront of League's legislative activity

The League is represented on the board of the Illinois Pro-Choice Alliance and will continue to work against restrictive legislation and to collaborate with other members of the Alliance and the broader reproductive choice community.

#### III. CIVIL RIGHTS/WOMEN'S ISSUES

Support for equality of opportunity for education, employment and housing for all persons in the United States regardless of their race, color, gender, religion, national orgin, age, sexial orientation or disability. Support for equal rights for all regardless of sex; and support of action to eliminate laws that have the effect of discrimination on the basis of sex.

#### LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT

While planning the upcoming Voter's Guides for the April election, I have become very appreciative of those of you who serve as observers for the League on governing bodies in our communities. In order to prepare these resources we need to prepare questions to which candidates will respond giving voters an indication of the priorities each candidate may have which might influence his/her decisions if elected. With the input of the observers and others who monitor our local boards, we will be able to ask questions which most need to be answered. Thank you for your involvement.

Last month a small group of League members sat down with State Senator Terry Link and State Representative Susan Garrett for a legislative interview. Both were very accommodating with their time and candid with their answers. In this newsletter we've included a summary of the many topics discussed at the interview. Both Link and Garrett indicated a willingness to participate in a program for all League members in the fall. We'll try to get that scheduled as soon as they know their schedules for the legislative session. This is a great opportunity to hear what has handened in Springfield, what is likely to hancen in the future and how they both score the session.

Several of us met to discuss the LWVIL Program for the next biennium Each individual league is asked to review existing positions and to make reconumendations to retain, restudy (or update) or drop a position. We discussed each position and voted to retain all existing positions but had some questions were raised regarding a few of the positions. We have submitted our questions to the state League for clarification. We also voted to support the four ideas submitted by other leagues (Charter Schools Study/Marnington LWV; Charter Schools Study/Wheaton LWV; Large Livestock Facilities Concurrence/Jackson County LWV, and Proportional Representation Study/ Chicago LWV). In addition to the state program, we reviewed our local positions and voted to recommend retention for all existing positions but have requested advice from the state League regarding inclusion of Knollwood in existing positions. The local positions will be voted on by our entire membership at the Annual Meeting in May.

The study regarding Shield Township is gearing up. Co-chairs Ann Hamlin and Bev Adamczyk met with Barb Lippai, LWVIL Vice President / Programs to discuss parameters and to get guidelines for the study. If you are interested in participating in this project, please contact either Ann or Bev.

The Nominating Committee has been hard at work getting commitments from members for next year's board. To those of you who have said yes, many thanks. If you had to decline this year, please think about serving on the board in the future or working off-board or on a committee. There are never enough hands...

Hope to see you at Kathy Lawson's on the 20th for our annual fundraiser - cocktail party - evening to get together! This is the third year we've had this event. It's been fun, it's casual; and spouses and friends seem to be able to survive the evening with Leaguers! ### LEGISLATIVE INTERVIEW UPDATE - A LWV LF.LB EXCLUSIVE

About a dozen League members met on Friday, January 22, 1999, at Gorton with State Senator Terry Link and State Representative Susan Garrett for a legislative interview open to League members. The purpose of the interview was to share the League's state and local concerns as well as to better understand their positions on the issues. Their comments regarding LWVII. Programs follows:

#### Constitutional Implementation and Amendments:

Both Senator Link and Representative Garrett agreed that there needs to be better voter information especially regarding selection of judges. Regarding the suggested combination of state comproller and state treasurer, Mr. Link is not in favor of appointed officials in high level offices and believes that currently the two offices offer a good system of checks and balance.

#### County Government Structure:

Mr. Link will bring SB 9 to the floor of the Senate which will allow for the at-large election of the county board chairman in order to open up this process to the voters. Ms. Garrett believes the county board chairman should be elected within the ranks of the county board members.

#### Criminal Justice:

Both legislators shared a concern that the prison industry is one of the fastest growing industries in the state. (Four new prisons have been opened recently or are in the process of being built in the state.) Also of concern was that funding for the education of juvenile detainces be offered on a year- round basis rather than on a 180-day basis. Both would like to see a shift in legislative thinking from incarceration and prison building to preventative and rehabilitative alternatives.

#### Election Laws:

There was a discussion of the potential for fraudulent Motor Voter registration, of open primaries, the length of the campaign trail from primary to election, and fundraising efforts.

#### Gun Control:

Both legislators have a concern regarding the introduction of bills allowing for concealed weapons.

#### Schools:

Both feel there is a need for solid education funding but it is not likely that bills concerning educational funding will be brought up this session. Mr. Link felt that the Legislature only did a band-aid approach last session. Ms. Garrett wants us to hold the Governor accountable for his promise to return \$0.51 on the dollar into education.

#### State Redistricting:

There is to be a redistricting of state legislative districts in 2001. Both agree that this process will heavily tie into the next election, predicting that election will be highly contentious. Mr. Link pointed out that his legislative district is served by three State Senators and Ms. Garrett's legislative district which includes the diversity of communities from Lake Forest to Waukegan is also served by three State Representatives.

#### Social Policy:

Both had concerns about the expenditure of large amounts of human services monies for an adult population (i.e. welfare, prisons) as opposed to early preventative interventions for children and families such as early start programs, daycare, family preservation/support, and health insurance for uninsured children. Mr. Link commented on how easily the legislature will approve, with little discussion, millions of dollars for building a new prison versus appropriating funds for early childrond purposes.

#### Mental Health:

They both agreed that the number one issue to be dealt with this term will be managed care reform. Who can sue whom will be heavily debated in the midst of very strong lobbies for managed care.

#### Campaign Finance Reform:

Mr. Link pointed out that a cap on campaign funds is uscless without there also being a campaign cap on the candidate's personal financial contributions to her/his campaign or "people like myself won't be able to run against wealth'v candidates."

LWV LF-LB sponsored two presentations by Jeanne Hanson of the Barrington League covering "from dollhouse to White House ... fostering leadership in girls and women "Ms. Hanson approached this issue from several directions. First she profiled women leaders by noting most of our legislators becon first as community activists, then as state level legislators. only then participating in the national arena. Title IX was profiled because this generation has sporting opportunities that were not available to their mothers. #### Affordable Senior Housing

The concurrence results are in. Sixty-six percent of our members responded (a phenomenal return rate) to the statement:

The League of Women Voters of Lake Forest-Lake Bluff supports the development of below market value rental housing for seniors in Lake Forest and Lake Bluff.

Ninety-four percent of League respondents favored this position. This allows us to speak and write publicly in favor of affordable senior housing on behalf of our membership. The statement will be added to our official position statements.

#### Legislator Interview at Lake Bluff Middle School

Abortion and euthanasia! These are two questions that were not posed to Senator Terry Link and Representative Susan Garrett on Monday April 13th. The Debate Club students ant Lake Bluff Middle School had the opportunity to question State Senator Terry Link and Representative Susan Garrett about their work, and with two hundred questions to choose from, there simply wasn't time enought to get to them all. The students at the all-school assembly, along with moderator Stephanie Kearney, did hear about the death penalty and gun control, and current bills on the floor. Other questions covered Clinton's impeachment troubles, the qualifications of a politician, and how time is divided between Springfield and home. (The answer: It's not easy! It's not a 9 to 5 job!) The most frequently asked question from the student body was about driver's license requirements. The second most nonular question concerned the validity of the electoral college (both 7th and 8th graders are studying the constitution this year). Rep. Garrett and Sen. Link both affirmed their belief that church and state must be separate; and both urged the students to contact them directly anytime. More than a few students noted the legislators' e-mail addresses. The event was a joint production of the LWVLF-LB and the Lake Bluff PTO.



#### ORSERVER REPORTS

#### VILLAGE OF LAKE BLUFF PLAN COMMISSION, JANUARY, FEBRUARY & MARCH, 1999.

The Commission meets on the third Thursday of each month at 7:00 pm in the Board Room of the Village Hall.

The Commission discussed the Viiel Center's assessment of historic homes in the viillage and a plan to photograph the homes and talk with owners about their homes' history, particularly before architectural renovation to maintain the integrity of the building or before tear down. The Commission developed recommendations for consideration by the Viillage Board concerning the time period for such action prior to sale or the issuance of permits.

There was also discussion about easements and other village-owned spaces. A review has been under way to decide whether or not these lands should be deeded to owners of abutting properties in order to add additional land to the tax rolls.

The possible establishment of conservation areas for part of a homeowner's property in order to secure tax advantages and the preservation of certain sensitive areas was discussed.

The Village has hired a firm to study the area around the intersection of route 41 and route 176. Lake County and adopting municipal areas are discussing the property at the northeast corner of route 176 and Wautegan Road (this is not within the Village limits but businesses located there could be of significance to Lake Bluff.

#### LAKE BLUFF SCHOOL DISTRICT 67 NOVEMBER, 1998, MARCH & APRIL, 1999

The Board meets on the fourth Tuesday of each month at 6:30 pm. in the library of Lake Bluff Middle School.

The School Board discussed the Partners for Progress initiative.

There was discussion of the possibility of starting a foreign language requirement in the elementary grades. Surveys had shown that this was favored by a majority of Lake Bluff parents.

The Board agreed to look into the possibility of quality after-school care for children betwen the ages of 6 and 11. This was said to be an urgent need owing to the possible closure of the Village Children's Center.

## LAKE BILLIFE VILLAGE BOARD OF TRUSTEES - SUMMARY REPORT

The Board meets on the second and fourth Mondays of each month at 7:00 pm. in the Village Hall Board Room.

Two major issues for the Board's consideration were the threat of legal proceedings concerning the annexation of the Sanctuary, and the redevelopment of the central business district on Scranton Avenue where the concern seems to focus on the residences surrounding the business district of

In April the 1999-2000 budget was adopted. Lake Bluff has greatly increased the revenue from sales tax by encouraging automobile dealerships to open in the west business area.

#### LAKE BLUEF PARK DISTRICT - SUMMARY REPORT

The Park District meets on the third Monday of each month at 7:30 pm. in the District's office in Blair Park.

The major issue has been the Commissioners' decision to build and remodel the current Park District building at Blair Park. They have been renting West School from the School District since 1993. However, West School is in need of major repair and the Park District believed it was in its best interest to use its funds to build its own facility. The new additions can be made without an increase in property taxes. There is some opposition to the present plan because two building referenda were voled down in the past few years. If additional space is not added to the Blair Parks but only the present of the past few years. If additional space is not added to the Blair plants but only the present of the present of the program will be halved, after school programs will be imitted, programs for adults will be offered only if outside space can be found, and there will be no gymnasium for Park District use.

#### LAKE FOREST CITY COUNCIL - SUMMARY REPORT

The City Council meets on the first and third Thursday of each month at 7:30 pm in the City Hall Council Chamber.

During the past year, the City Council sub-committees have studied and reported back to the Council on the relocation of the Municipal Services facilities, the purchase and reuse of the Grove School property and the establishment of an Historic Preservation Criticane.

In coming months the City Council will be examining the issue of senior housing. In May the Mayor appointed a committee to examine the implementation of an idea proposed by outgoing Alderman Tom Tropp, that Senior Cottages be scattered throughout the City. Committee members are Tom Tropp, chairman; Peter Witmer; Robert Shaw; Michael Burns; Anthony Danielson; Charles Fitzgerald; and Edward Wehmer.

- Q: What evidence exists that global warming is already occurring?
- There is strong evidence that global warming has already begun: average global temperatures have risen by one degree Fahrenheit over the past century; all ten of the warmest years on record have occurred in the past 15 years: the 1990s already have been warmer than the 1990s— the warmest decade on record—by almost 0.2%, according to the Goddard Institute of Space Studies; and the 20th. century has been the warmest century in the last 600 years. Scientists agree that these temperature changes could not have occurred through natural forces alone. Many scientists also believe that the observed increase in temperature is responsible for the melting of glacers and ice sheets that has resulted in an unprecedented sea level rise of 4-6inches in the past 100 years.

### LWVUS - GLOBAL WARMING SOME QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

#### O: What are the effects of global warmine?

A: According to the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change, average global temperatures will increase by L8F - 6.3F over the next century. This rapid rate of climate change — the fastest in history — is likely to have wide-ranging adverse impacts on the environment and human health, with significant loss of life. Warre temperatures will cause sea levels to rise, threatening coastal populations. There likely will be a more vigorous hydrologic cycle, resulting in more intense rainfall, floods and droughts in many areas. Health effects could include illnesses and deaths due to exposure to longer, more intense heat waves and the spread of tropical diseases to higher latitudes. Global warming also will disrupt agriculture through changes in temperature and water resources, as well as severely stress forests, wellands and other econsistens.

Developing nations are especially unlerable to the impacts of global warming. Many developing nations are located in low-lying, tropical areas, making them especially unlerable to changes in the hydrologic cycle, sea level rise and coastal flooding, and more virulent tropical diseases. Furthermore, few developing nations have the necessary economic or medical resources to adult to or recover from these immach.

#### Q: What is the League's position on global warming?

A: The League of Women Voters believes that global warming is a serious problem that requires immediate action. It supports the goals of both the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change and the Kyoto Protocol. In order to avert the potentially serious consequences of a warmer climate, the League supports Senate ratification of the Kyoto Protocol. Before the protocol is brought to the Senate, however, the world's leaders must fairly and equitably negotiate the committed participation of developing nations.

The U.S. government should move ahead immediately — without waiting for Senate ratification of the Kyoto agreement — on initiatives to reduce domestic emissions of heal-trapping gases, as such actions will not only reduce the threat of global warming, but also combat local air pollution, increase energy security and create new jobs nationwide.

Q: What is Congress doing about global warming? What political actions can a citizen take to help solve the global warming problem?

A: Both houses of Congress have been active on global warming issues. Because the Kyoto Protocol is an international agreement, it must be ratified by the Senate before the United States can be an official party to the treaty. The main legislative activity in the Senate has been a resolution introduced in July of 1997 by Senator Robert Byrd of West Virginia and Chuck Hagel of Nebraska that focused attention on the developing nation issue. Although the Byrd-Lagel "Sense of the Senate" resolution does not challenge the science of global warming, it demands that developing nations be included in any climate treaty before it is ratified by the Senate. The resolution passed the Senate unanimously. Unfortunately, a number of Senators who are opposed to the Kyoto Protocol have introduced bills or amendments to handicap the ability of the Administration and Federal agencies to pursue measure that would reduce U.S. Emissions of heal-trapping gases, regardless of their environmental and economic benefits. Thus far, none of these anti-climate efforts have passed the Senate, primarily due to constant pressure from environmental and sustainable energy organizations.

In the House, the main activity on global warming is a resolution introduced in June of 1997 by Repultion.

Mayne Glichrest of Maryland and Democrat Henry Waxman of California. The resolution would require the United States to reduce greenhouse gas emissions to 1990 levels by the year 2005. The bill gained about 40 sponsors but has not passed the House. Since then, a number of Representatives have tried to block progress in combain global warming. These anti-climate efforts have focused on restricting the Administration's ability to require emissions-reduction measures without congressional consent and freezing miles-per-gallon standards for cars and trucks. Constant pressure from organizations and citizens is needed to prevent the House from passing these no-action measures.

In addition to reducing your personal contribution to heat-trapping gas emissions, the best action you can take to help solve the global warming problem is to make your voice heard. Contact your senator, your representative or the White House. Let them know that you support efforts to slop global warming by curbing heat-trapping gas emissions. Remind them that there are many steps the U.S. can take, including raising miles-pergallon standards for cars and trucks, increasing energy-efficiency and supporting renewable energy initiatives, that will help curb global warming and boost the U.S. economy.

#### COMMUNITY UPDATE WITH ROBERT KIELY & KENT STREET, APRIL 28, 1999

Lake Bluff Village Administrator, Kent Street, opened his remarks by noting that Village government is in Irraristion, with three new trustees recently elected. The issue of most discussion is the Central Business District which many groups are studying. The goal of the discussions taking place in all the Commissions is to identify the future needs of residents and to maintain economic viability downtown. Zoning changes to selbacks and maximum heights have already been put in place, and recommendations for changes to the streetscape are currently being considered. The Village is in the process of acquiring the former Citigo properly at the corner of Scranton Avenue and Sheridan Road. Also in the news is the property adjacent to the library, now known as the Villed Centerfulbrary Annac Kent thanked the various groups who worked towards securing matching state funds for the property purchase; building studies are now underway. Traffic studies are also in progress in the Village, Particular attention is being given to the several Roalut 176 corners; at Waukegan Road, at Road 41; and at the business district in general. Kent concluded his remarks by congratulating the Village Police Department's recent accreditation achievements, the smallest department in the state to have achieved that recognition.

Lake Forest City Manager, Bob Kiely also opened his remarks by noting change, though Lake Forest's new mayor has much experience in government, having saverd as Alderman and Plan Commissioner. The biggest news in Lake Forest this year has been the continuing discussion over the location of municipal service. The impacts of various options have been studied. The question may be settled by this summer, though Mr. Kiely noted that the recent call-up of reserves may affect negotiations for the Fort Sheridan option. Also in the news is the use of the recently purchased Grove School property. Tenants may include the Symphony, Senior Center, and Recreation Department. Traffic is also big news in Lake Forest. Roule 41 repaying from Old Clim south, and improvements at routes 41 and 137 may convince the through traffic to go elsewhere this summer. Alfortable senior housing continues as a hot issue, with the City establishing a task force. As long as the economy remains strong the demand for development will continue, with activity in Comway and Elawa Farms expected. Continued infill and tear down redevelopment is expected for both east Lake Forest and Lake Blutt, though Lake Forest's new Historic Preservation rules are expected to have an impact.

Comments from League membership elicited additional information from the speakers. In response to a question about recreation Kent Street noted that the recent downtown studies identified a desire to have more entertainment. and recreation in the town center. Both managers noted the need better to coordinate taxing districts, though Mr. Kiely noted that new construction is definitely called for when community groups are displaced by paying tenants. In response to a question about the viability of caucuses both managers applauded the communities, the various caucuses, and the League for their combined efforts. Mr. Kiely noted that the caucus system is not the norm in most communities, and can be very confusing to new residents. In response to a question about Lake County Leagues' position on Fort Sheridan (preservation of open space and public use of open space) Mr. Street noted that Lake Bluff opted not to take a position on Lake Forest's municipal services proposal, or the recent Forest Preserve referendum. The Village Board felt it should not seek out positions in conflict with other taxing bodes. Mr. Kiely stated that the Lake Forest City Council unanimously supported the referendum, and will continue to support open space. The McDonald's lawsuit expense was questioned by one member; another applauded the effort. The status of solid waste, particularly recycling was questioned. Mr. Kiely remarked that some towns limit the volume of household waste to encourage recycling. Mr. Street noted that the premier level of service enjoyed by the communities is one that residents especially value, and should not be changed. In response to parking and traffic issues a member requested vigilance on the part of government, because the integrity of residential neighborhoods can be threatened by poor planning. The final question from membership asked how each of the managers envisions the outcome of the Partners for Progress effort. Kent Street felt the objective was to build community networks by engaging more residents. "taking back the community". Bob Kiely stated that government spends much of its time mediating disputes, and hoped to find ways to build better relationships.



Jane Partridge is now the LWVLF-LB lialson to the Lake Forest Senior Housing Committee. The City of Lake Forest has set up a committee, chaired by Tom Tropp, to investigate the feasibility of senior housing in the city. Jane Partidge will be attending committee meetings as a League epresentative. We are very grateful to Jane for giving us a presence in an issue that we support.

# OBSERVER REPORT LAKE BLUFF VILLAGE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Discussion at Lake Bluff Village Board meetings during the summer months included a rehashing of the issue of the year-old Sanctuary annexation. However, as the Lake Forester reported in depth, few area residents attended to voice opposition to the annexation when various aspects of the issue were being reconsidered. A resolution to amend the annexation process in the future — which would have required more time for large-scale annexation to be completed — reportedly met with little reaction from area residents, according to comments made by Village Trustess during meetings.

Village residents may be interested to know that an ordinance restricting the use of feat blowers during summer months is currently under consideration by the Village Board. Highland Park does not allow feat blowing during May through October (Highland Park has more freedom to impose restrictions than does take Bluff as if is a Home Rule Community). If you have an opinion on this issue you are urged to contact a member of the Village Board.

Concern over the issue of the granting of zoning variances by the Lake Bluff Zoning Board has led the board to authorize the village attorney to draft an ordinance which would amend the current Zoning Code, allowing for the Village Board to have the final say on the granting of zoning variances. The Zoning Board is currently working on a redraft of the Bulk Ordinance; the ordinance being drafted by the Village's attorney is meant to give the Village Board final authority only until the new Bulk Ordinance is finalized.

# ILLINOIS LEAGUES REAP BENEFITS FROM LWVEF

Illinois Leagues have been at the front of the line to take advantage of the increasing number of training opportunities, pass-through grants, and programs offered by the (national) League of Women Voters Education Fund (LWVEF). Recent examples include:

It is an intervoven set of strategies designed to provide citizens with the access, training, information, and opportunity they need to participate effectively in the democratic process. And it's a capital campaign to equip the League to carry out these strategies.

To achieve its vision for the League and for our country, the LWVEF is seeking \$20 million in new funds. Approximately two-thirds of this goal has been raised thus far from major donors, foundations, and corporations.

A committee of Illinois League members has been assisting LWVEF board members throughout the campaign. They are committed to making the campaign a success because they believe that a strong national Education Fund benefits every League in Illinois.

And they are excited about future VISION 2000 offerings. Training and materials for more public agenda dialogues as was provided for the Medicare reform project. A workbook and training to help Leagues implement new approaches to their program work, based on recent LWVEF research on civic participation. Pass-through grants, PSAs and election publications for Get-Out-The-Vote activities in the year 2000. And more.

As you are owore, the League is a non-partison political organization whose credibility in your community, in Illnois and across the country is embedded in our ability to keep our voice above the 'tumuit' of politics'. The public looks to us as a voice of reason, knowing that we carefully—thoughtfully—study on issue and reach concensus before taking any action. # **NEWS FROM THE COMMITTEE ROOM**

State League's study of Charter Schools is underway with the first meeting of the Charter Schools Study Committee last August 19. League members from Chicago, Glencoe. Batavia, Carpentersville, Dundee, Elmhurst, Wheaton, and Lake Forest-Lake Bluft Area gathered in Chicago with State board members and Donna Baiocchi, Executive Director of ED-RED, to begin work on the study, which is expected to take nearly two years to complete. Preliminary topics to be covered include a review of existing charter schools, a study of state law pertaining to school charters, a look at foundations and their involvement with charter schools, an investigation of for-profit school management companies, a comparison of other states' laws on charter schools, and the reactions of school boards, teachers' unions, and universities and colleges to the formation of charter schools.

Charter schools, public schools which are "chartered" by local school boards or by the State of Illinois, are schools which are exempt from certain requirements to which other public schools are held. In exchange for this greater freedom in matters of personnel, curriculum, organization and requirements for parental involvement. Charter Schools in Illinois are held accountable for the academic performance of their students. Funding is generally provided by the school district in which the charter school is located, although additional funds are available from the State. Forty-five charters are available under current Illinois law, 15 in Chicago, 15 in the collar counties surrounding Chicago, and the remaining 15 downstate. Nineteen such schools are presently open or scheduled to open this fall.

The committee is asking anyone with an interest in the topic for help in producing the study guide and consensus questions. League members and non-Leaguers alike with interest, expertise or both are being sought to participate. The committee is developing a flexible work schedule and can accommodate individual time constraints. Downstate members are especially needed to give the study a balanced statewide perspective and to participate in site visits to Sprindfield and East St. Louis.

Meetings can be attended via phone or fax. The next meeting of the Charter Schools Study Committee is scheduled for Thursday. October 14th, from 10 a.m. to noon at State headquarters, 332 S. 

### STATE LEAGUE TRANSFERS LOBBYIST DUTIES TO ITS MEMBERSHIP

Last spring, at its annual convention, State League announced that there would no longer be a designated lobbyist on League's payroll. This generated a rather lengthy floor discussion, and at one point a motion was made to raise the State PMP in order to afford a lobbyist. State's position is that it is able to address key votes and attend key hearings by virtue of many of the coalitions to which it belongs and by utilizing grass roots interventions, alerting members to contact their leaislators.

There now exists within the League's extensive listing of Things to Do", the ways in which a member can support League, a possibility for members to become e-mail activists. State League has the capabilities of e-mailing its Action Chairs with Action Alerts that are minutes, out of the chambers of Springfield or Washington. That "hot" action alert can then be disseminated to members of our own league.

If the LWVLF-LB had a core group of members willing to have our Action Chair, Joan Kathsas, e-mail them with these alerts, we could respond to Action positions in a more timely way than in the past when telephone trees were initiated. It is anticipated that any information necessary for each particular action item would be included in the e-mail, such as which legislators needed to be contacted, their e-mails or addresses and possibly a sample letter.

# Campaign to Override Governor's Veto

Child support collection has been a major problem for all custodial parents in Illinois. It is a particularly frustrating problem for those parents on TANF (Temporary Assistance for Needy Families), causing those families tremendous financial hardship.

HB 1232 passed the Illinois House and Senate last spring only to be vetoed by Governor Ryan, citing liscal spending as the problem. The bill has biparlisan sponsorship and bipartisan support in both houses because it makes a great deal of sense to help the children in TANF working families to receive maximum financial support from both parents.

HB 1232, called "Child Support Pays", would allow working parents receiving TANF to keep two-thirds of child support collected by the State on behalf of their children. Under current state policy, these families are allowed to keep only a \$50 "pass-through per month, no matter how much the State collects from the estranged parent.

According to chief sponsor Representative Hamos (D-Chicago), "Last year, \$88 million was collected on behalf of children receiving welfare, but the familiar received only \$3.8 million — a meer to percent of the total. The state and federal governments kept 90 cents of every dollar in child support collected. By helping low-income working families keep a larger portion of child support payments, HB 1232 demonstrates the State's commitment to helping families become self-sutficient in this er ad wellater reform."

"A parent who receives child support becomes less dependent on welfare payments. HB 1232 will allow working custodial parents on welfare to move from welfare more quickly. It will also create incentives for more momes and dads to participate in the State's child support program. It's a 86 million investment in the short run but will be much more economical in the long run," said co-sponsor Representative Eileen Lyons (R-LaGrange).

Senator Barack Obama (D-Chicago), chief sponsor of the legislation in the Illinois Senate, added, "Before this law, were creating a disincentive for dads to do the right thing. When parents are willing to face up to their responsibilities, money queer indit to their children, not to bureacrats."

# LEGISLATIVE UPDATE LUNCHEON REPORT

A lunch at Lovell's of Lake Forest provided the occasion for our biennial get-together with our local legislators, Terry Link (D-30th) and Susan Garrett (D-59th) In his opening remarks Senator Link noted the breadth of the last legis-lative session during which over 4,000 bills were introduced 83 of those title were votoed and 400 are now law One of the new laws requires a check mack on a death certificate if a death is due to domestic violence thus enabling figures on this cause of death to be compiled

Representative Garrett began her remarks by complimenting the league for giving her the foundation she needed to run for office. She noted that a legislator has to take into account partisanship, the viewpoints of special interest lobbies and state agencies, and regionalism as well as the impact legislation will have on one's home district. She said that partisan politics often takes a backseat in Springfield. To illustrate the said that 80% of her votes were cast the same way as the Democratic speaker of the House cast his: 81% of her votes were cast the same way as the Republican minority leader cast his. In other words the minority and majority leaders often voted the same way on bills.



Rep. Garrett also spoke about regionalism in Illinois the differing viewpoints of residents of the City of Chicago, the collar counties and the downstate counties. This regionalism, she said, is more responsible for legislative divisions than is partisan politics. A later

discussion on handgun legislation illustrated this point well According to Sen. Link, downstate voters fear being deprived of their hunting weapons by proposed legislation to limit the purchase of handguns to one each month. This legislation did not pass.



Legislation to fund the manning of weigh stations for trucks has been drafted and Rep. Garrett said that the Illinois Dept. of Transportation will not oppose the funding request because the money will be recouped from fines on trucks not complying with regulations.

In response to a question about the outlook for campaign finance reform Rep. Garrett said nothing will be happening in the near future on this issue. Sen. Link implied that the reason for this was the opposition of Republican Senate Leader Pate Phillips.

Sen. Link noted that the recently passed Senate bill allowing seventeen year-olds to be election judges was supported by County Clerks and viewed as a means to involve young adults in the poli-tical process before they are called upon to vote.

There was a question about eligibility for the comprehensive insurance program (CHIPS). 2.3 million people in Illinois use this program. Rep. Garrett noted that 62000 to 70,000 to 20,000 to 20,000

# Jane Partridge reports on Affordable Senior Housing in Lake Forest - Lake Bluff

A blue ribbon committee, spearheaded by former Alderman Tom Tropp of Lake Forest, presented the Senior Cottage idea to the City Council on June 22, 1999. The committee consists of Rev. Tony Danielson and Charles Filzgrad III), both Senior Resource Commission Representatives; Robert Shaw, local developer; Edward Wehmer, local banker, Michael Burns, real estale adviser, and Peter Wilmer, architect. The Committee's proposal was favorably accepted by the City Council, subject to the findings of need, possible sites, city Ordinances, zoning and building codes, funding and the extent to which the city would be involved in the funding. Act. The committee is proven month since.

In September Tom Tropp delivered the research findings of the committee:

Three categories of potential sites were identified: Property owned by the City of Lake Forest, property which may be exchanged by individuals, and property which may be exchanged by individuals for the right to live in the cottage either at reduced cost or no cost.
 Eleven properties were located near the Market Square perimeter. West Park South Park.

Northcroft Park, Deerpath Golf Course, Lake Forest Hospital, Lake Forest High School, Lake Forest College, Barat College, and city-owned property in West Lake Forest.

The potential demand in Lake Forest and Lake Bluff in 1997 was identified as being between 20 and 35 units. The need is higher now.

 Seniors in households with annual gross income between \$55,000 and \$90,000 would qualify for senior collages.

Most seniors want to be within walking distance of shopping, cultural and recreational facilities.
 Many do not want to give up the privacy of single-family homes but also want companionship and peers nearby.

The committee proposal suggests the construction of a series of small, two- or three-unit cottages, scattered around town in close proximity to stores and activities. These senior-friently cottages would blend into the streetscape of the neighborhood. The individual units would be small but adequate for one or two persons and would be accessible to the disabled. Protected parking and small common areas such as gardens or decks would be included in the design. To the extent possible these homes would be designed to reduce maintenance costs.

After the City Council unanimously approved the plan, Tom Tropp asked that a woman be appointed to the committee. The committee's next report is expected early in the new year. The goal of the committee is to have at least one unit ready to intabili in all 2000. The Lague notes with sadness the death of one of our former members, the Honorable Mary A. Pappas. Mary served on the Lake Bluff League Board from 1958 through 1954 and chaired the Illinois Constitutional Convention Trogram Portfolio. From that position she consented to stand for election as a Delegate to the 1970 Illinois Constitutional Convention. Successfully elected Mary sponsored the first proposal adopted by the Convention body which provided for separate submission to the voters of controversial parts of the new Constitution so as not to leopardize the passage of the basic document. When the Convention adjourned she lobbied successfully for its passage.

Mary supported the Equal Rights Amendment and drafted the Illinois Paternity and Blood Test Acts which became law. She was honored for her pro bono services to indigent children, and was also the "lead" administrative Judge for the Equal Opportunity Commission.

Mary's service to the League and the community at large were most significant and she will be renembered by her League friends and associates.

#### CAROL GILBERT REPORTS ON THE COUNTY LEAGUE'S

### "SMART GROWTH" PROGRAM

On September 29th the three panelists of Lake County League's "Smart Growth" left us considering three words: education, oc-operation and regionalism. These three words were provided by George Clark, a social scientist with the EPA, Chicago Region, Michael Ebner, History Professor at Lake Forest College; and George Ranney, representing Chicago Metropolis 2020, a business and civic-minded consortium. Though they were from diverse bockgrounds, the panelists were often in agreement. In common, they felt the huge (and imminent) growth expected for Lake County is a sink or swim opportunity, even going so far as to suggest Chicago may be called "the LA of the Midwest" in terms of its Iransportation flaws.

George Clark, of the US EPA, opened his presentation by asking how many hours the audience had spent in a car, noting that sprawl encourages our dependency on the automobile. When we shop, live, and work in separate places, our land use and car use patterns denignate both the quality of the environment and the quality of tife. He described his work at the EPA as "reminding the Lawyers, engineers and scientists about people". Michael Ebner echoed this theme, noting that in 1972 about 55% of metropolitan Chicago's jobs were located in the city, a number that has now dropped to 40%, with the suburbs still gaining, and becoming ever more dependent on the ever-more inefficient highways. George Ranney agreed, noting that traffic problems are key to the health of the business community, if people card' get to jobs the entire region suffers. He also felt that automobile users were paying only 25% of the costs associated with the privilege of driving.

The panelists and audience proposed many solutions. Much discussion centered around the idea of municipal cooperation, because coordinating mechanisms are largely attent. Comprehensive plans of regional growth are faneded. New interstructure proposals should precede any development proposals. When a development benefits one community and not its neighbor stronger governmental connections must be in place. Policies that encourage sprawl and "Balkanzation" must be dropped. Incentives should be given to encourage proposals for adaptive reuse and infill. Environmental preservation should be rewarded. The stagnant rail industry must be expanded, particularly from Chicago to Milwaukee II take County is to benefit. The panelists favored the "transit village" concept, a compact mixed use community that is not car-dependent for jobs or essential services.

The panelists agreed that the availability of public transportation was a key measure of sustainable growth in Lake County. When asked to assess the health of the RTA system Ramey called it "shameful" the RTA does not interface with other transportation networks and provide a fare that allows use of multiple systems. He also termed the proposed route 53 extension as problematic, stating "it has been sold as a way to deal with traffic but instead increases congestion in nearby communities." Mark Tuothy, developer of the Lakehurst proposal for Lake County's new state university, also echoed this sentiment. He said the existence of good roads to Lakehurst made it an attractive site, and wished that strategic planning would extend beyond the county's limits, and invite Wisconsin's participation.

The possible solutions presented were varied, with the panelists often disagreeing. When asked by the audience how spraw can be controlled Michael Ebner flatly stated that a legislative solution was required to force municipalities to coordinate. George Raney disagreed, believing that social issues should not be solved in an authoritarian fashion, but rather be achieved through advocacy and closely monitoring new devices such as open space initiatives. All seemed to agree, though, that the current suburban patterns may not prove functional in the future. We may need to consider more mixed-use zoning, higher density residential development (especially in older communities), and initiatives that reward infill construction and reuse of sites afteredy developed.

Some of the panelists' ideas, such as removing power from the independently financed tollway authority were cheerfully velcomed by the audience. Other ideas, such as encouraging mixed income communities seemel tess useful. If current development trends continue will Lake County still be a desirable place to live? Perhaps Mary Matthews and the Lake County League will plan a follow-up forum sometime in the next century and give us a report!

# **OBSERVER CORPS**

The League Observer Corps continues to expand! We now have an observer at the Lake Forest Central Business District Task Force meetings. The work of the CBD Task Force relates directly to our League's interest in "Smart Growth.

The Task Force was appointed several weeks ago by Mayor Kerr and is charged with examining the potential for growth in the Central Business District in order to identify the opportunities, implications and effects that this growth could bring to the City of Lake Forest. Emphasis is being placed on defining and preserving the character of the town while maintaining the quality of life that makes a community desirable. The Task Force is working with Thompson Dyke, planning consultants, and is currently focusing on defining the historic character of Lake Forest in order to direct future growth in a way that will preserve the character of the town and at the same time offer solutions to current problems such as traffic and parking.

Of particular concern is the potential for commercial development that would double the amount of built commercial space that currently exists in the downtown area. The CBD Task Force welcomes input and questions from the public.

Preschool Programs and Services: Support of improved child care and recreational facilities in Lake Forest. Given the resurgence of births in the community, the League supports regular monitoring of births to provide community agencies and institutions with information necessary to plan effectively for our provide community agencies and institutions with information necessary to plan effectively for our provided to the provided of the provided to the pro

Solid Waste: Support of federal and state policies to reduce the quantities of waste, to reclaim useful materials, and to safely restore the residue to the environment. Municipatities should combine their efforts to solve waste problems regionally. Recycling and reuse should be given priority. The federal government should continue or increase its financial aid for research and development in this area.

Affordable Senior Housing: Support of the development of below market value rental housing for seniors in Lake Forest and Lake Bluff. (1998)

#### Lake Bluff Positions

Lake Bluff Comprehensive Plan: Support of an effective comprehensive plan which encompasses potential and existing land use in Lake Bluff and surrounding unincorporated areas, as well as capital improvements, including the infrastructure of the village.

Conservation: Support of measures to preserve the natural resources of Lake Bluff; protection and preservation of the table Bluff; preservation of ravines and other open areas; preservation, through restricted use, of the flood plain lands along the Skokie River; establishment of walkways and biovide paths.

Land Use: Monitor the disposition of village-owned properties west of the West Terrace. This land is in its natural state, and some of it is in the flood plain.

Coordinated Nominating Systems: Support of the coordination of procedures of the Lake Bluff School Caucus, the Lake Bluff Park Caucus, and the current Lake Bluff Park comicipal elections, which would improve their efficiency without impairing their independence. Specifically, the League favors coordination with respect to area maps, the timing of area meetings and the preparation and release of certain public notices and publicity. The League recommends that the nominating bodies explore together the possibilities of improving procedures and determining other areas of cooperations.

#### Lake Forest Positions

Lake Forest Caucus: Support for the formal adoption of operating procedures which more fully inform the residents of the workings of the caucus, of the desired qualifications of candidates which it is seeking, and of the qualifications of those selected for candidacy. Support of procedures of the annual meeting which allow for informed selection of candidates and the opportunity to select each candidate individually by secret ballot. Support of procedures which enable direct voter participation in the election of COC members.

Recreation: Support of the development of additional programs and facilities, such as Deerpath Community Park, for non-athletic and unstructured activities. Additional use should be made of existing facilities, such as schools, for such activities. A public annual report should be made designating the use of tax dollars.



# Hitting the Jackpot: The Gambling Industry and Illinois Politicians, Part II November 1, 1999 (Issue Briefing #5)

On June 25, 1999, Governor Ryan signed into Jaw a dramatic expansion of gambling in Illinois. Though still the subject of legal wrangling, the law allows a new casino based in densely populated Cook County. The state's existing riverboat casinos can drop anchor and offer dockside gambling day and night. And finally, the Illinois government will hand over \$56.9 million yearly, in tax breaks and subsidies, to the state's alling horseracing industry. The Illinois Economic and Fiscal Commission estimates that taxpavers could lose as much as \$14 million yearly thanks to the new law.

Initially, a reluctant public was told gambling would raise money for education and other state needs. The new reality is different: the state will subsidize the failing horseracing industry and its revenues to the state will be reduced to a trickle. It's an ironic twist that of all the industries the legislature could have chosen to subsidize, they chose a so-called "sin industry" such as horse racing.

Here's how the tracks get their \$56.9 million yearly from the state. First, tracks will receive \$15.4 million in direct payments from Illinois's coffers. Second, tracks will benefit from another \$15.4 million from the state to increase the purses paid out to winning horses, to attract more bettors to the tracks. And third, the new law slables the reacteracks'

tax burdens, netting them \$26.1

The greatest beneficiary of this crony capitalism is Richard Duchossois, owner of Arlington International Racecourse. Over the years, Duchossois has become one of the largest conflibutors to state politicians, giving \$1,460,886 from 1993 through June 1999. "While this amount seems large, it is dwarfed by the estimated total Arlington Racecourse will receive each year in state assistance. \$17.2 million dollars. This total includes \$7.8



million in state subsidies to the track, \$5.6 million in tax breaks, and a \$3.8 million real estate credit. (See graph this page.)

When viewed side-by-side (see figure, this page), Duchossois's "investment" of \$1,460,886 in our state's politicians appears to be a good one. It will bring him, on a yearly basis, 12 times his original investment, and over a decade 120 times his investment.

The other big winner in the expansion law is Rosemont Mayor Donald Stephens, who gave \$501,980 to our state politicians from 1993 through June 1999. The Rosemont casino will bring \$4.5 million or more in tax revenues yearly to this small suburb, which has a oppulation of only 4,100.5

Illinois's existing riverboats donated \$2,104,274 to state politicians, from 1993 through June 1999. These existing casinos weren't thrilled with allowing a casino license to be



transferred to populous Cook County. So lawmakers had to throw in a sweetener to get the established riverboats to sign onto the May '99 deal: dockside gambling.

For years the state's riverboats wanted to nix the requirement that they cruise in order to allow gambling, it's a matter of competition, the boat owners say, as neighboring lows and Missouri allow dockside gambling, Indeed, since the passage of the new law and the elimination of cruising requirements, profits at Illinois's riverboats have jumped considerably. The intake of the state's nine casinos reached a new record of \$13.14 million in July 1999, just after the new legislation took effect.

The next logical step, according to casino owners, is for the permanently anchored boats to give way to glizy barges, so that more gamblers can be accommodated. The round-the-clock frenzy will be a far cry from the innocent "excursion boats" that riverboat proponents initially promised. "It's now wide open, hard-core, Las Vegas-style gambling," claims Rev. Tom Grey of the National Coalition Against Legalized Gambling.

There was no public clamour for land-based gambling or for more casinos: about 60 percent of Illinoisans were against both." "Our experience is that campaign money speaks louder than the public will," concludes anti-gambling activist Lucy Kokal, of St. Andrew United Methodist Church in Homewood.

### LEAGUE FILES LAWSUIT

At their September 25th. Board meeting, the LWVIL Board of Directors authorized the filing of a lawsuit in federal court challenging the constitutionality of Illinois' 1999 Tuition Tax Credit. This law allows for state income tax credits of up to \$500 to parents of public and private school students. Signed into law by the governor in August, this statute allows parents who spend a minimum of \$250 per student in grades K through 12 on schoolbooks, lab fees or tuition to qualify for the credit. The \$250 minimum qualifying expense means that parents of most Illinois public school students will not qualify for the credit. The League believes that the bill was designed to keep most public school students ineligible for the credit.

The League is seeking additional plaintiffs — individual members who have children in public schools and civic organizations with an interest in opposing the credit.

The League has a long history of opposition to tax credits and school vouchers, based on our school funding and equality of opportunity positions, and League principles.

Paul Mollica, of Meites, Mulder, Berger, and Mollica, is representing the LWIL pro bono. Paul also served as the League's attorney in our successful lawsuits in both state and federal courts which required the state to implement the National Voter Registration Act, or Motor Voter, and then to abolish the two-tiered system of registration which the state had set up to get around the requirements of the Act.
