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## ABOUT THE LEAGUE

#### HISTORY

The League of Women Voters was organized in 1920, the year women's suffrage was incorporated into the Constitution. It grew out of the National American Woman Suffrage Association. As its first task, the League worked to inform the 29 million recently enfranchised women of their new voting responsibilities. League goals have always been to shape public policy and promote informed citizen participation at all levels of government. The League has chapters at the state, county and local levels.

#### MISSION

The League of Women Voters, a nonpartisan political organization, encourages the informed and active participation of citizens in government and influences public policy through education and advocacy.

#### PURPOSES

- · To increase citizen participation in the election process.
- To enhance citizen participation in federal, state, county and local government decisions.
- To establish positions on public policy through member participation and agreement.
- To take concerted actions that secure public policies consistent with League positions.

#### PRINCIPLES.

The League of Women Voters believes in representative government and in the individual liberties established in the Constitution of the United States.

The League of Women Voters believes that democratic government depends upon the informed and active participation of its citizens and requires that governmental bodies protect the chizer's right to know by giving adequate notice of proposed actions, holding open meetings and making public records accessible.

The League of Women Voters believes that every citizen should be

to free public education that provides equal opportunity for all; and that no person or group should suffer legal, economic or administrative discrimination.

The League of Women Voters believes that efficient and economical government requires competent personnel, the clear assignment of responsibility, adequate linancing and coordination among the different agencies and levels of government.

The League of Women Voters believes that responsible government should be responsive to the will of the people; that government should maintain an equitable and flexible system of taxation, promote the conservation and development of natural resources in the policin interest, share in the solution of economic and social problems that affect the general welfare, promote a sound economy and adopt domestic policies that facilitate the solution of International problems.

The League of Women Voters believes that cooperation with other nations is essential in the search for solutions to world problems, and that development of international organization and international law is imperative in the promotion of world peace.

#### MEMBERSHIP

All citizens of voting age who subscribe to the purpose and policy of the League are eligible for member in the League of Women Voters of Lake Foresti Lake Bluff. Local league membership automatically enrolls a member in the national, state and county leagues. Senior memberships are available. The League is a volunteer organization and no salaries are paid to its officers or directors.

#### OBSERVERS

Members of the observer corps are the eyes and ears of the League at public meetings. Observers are League members who regularly attend the meetings of various official bodies - councils, boards, commissions, etc. They report on what they have beard and, in the process, they learn a great detail about these governmental bodies, how they function and what issues they address. Partiaphants in tha observer corps limit their role to observation. They do not speak or testify about any League positions on the issues that may come up, but instead notify the Board when such action is necessary.

#### NONPARTISAN POLICY

The League of Women Voters of Lake Forest/Lake Bluff is a nonpartisan organization. While it may take action on governmental policies and measures in the public interest, it does not support or oppose any political party or any candidate.

#### ACTION

The League of Women Voters of Lake Forest/Lake Bluff takes action on governmental policies and measures in the public interest and in conformity with the principles of the League of Women Voters of the United States. Action, which is always preceded by a thorough study, includes providing information, building public opinion and supporting or opposing legislation.

#### CONSENSUS AND CONCURRENCE

"CONSENSUS" is the term used by the League to indicate membership understanding and agreement on an issue. It is a continuous process beginning with:

- · membership selection of the program,
- · determination of scope of the study,
- · gathering facts.
- . studying and analyzing all points of view, and
- · discussion by the membership.

Consensus is determined by the League Board after evaluating the resulting membership opinions, the quality of the research and discussion, and the number of members who attended.

A League "POSITION" is the consensus appropriately worded by the League Board.

"CONCURRENCE" is the act of agreeing with, or concurring with, an existing position. Concurrence can take place in many ways. Groups of League members or League boards can concur with:

- · recommendations of a resource committee or group,
- · statements formulated by League boards or
- · positions reached by another League or Leagues.

#### LEAGUE MEETINGS

GENERAL MEETINGS are held several times during the year to present an expert speaker on some part of League program or to provide an opportunity for the entire membership to discuss and act as a body.

PROGRAM PLANNING MEETINGS are meetings at which League members suggest local, county, state or national issues which they wish to study and/or act on. Local program planning meetings are held annually, county, state and national program planning meetings are held binnially before their respective conventions.

UNIT MEETINGS are basic meetings for all League members. It is at unit meetings that program and study items are presented and discussed.

ANNUAL MEETINGS are held each spring. At this time the entire membership is invited to select the local League program for the following year.

CANDIDATE MEETINGS are sponsored prior to most general elections.

BOARD MEETINGS are generally held every first Wednesday of the month

EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETINGS are held on call. Members are invited to attend.

All meetings are announced in the monthly newsletter, League Lines. Guests are welcome at any meeting.

#### LEAGUE PROGRAM

The League studies issues at the national, state, county and local level.

items pertaining to national, state and county government are suggested by local League members and developed at the respective biennial conventions of the national, state and county Leagues.

Issues pertaining to local government are suggested annually at the local program planning meeting and chosen at the Annual Meeting of the local League.

Program items may involve study and review of past positions, study and formation of new positions, and/or action on existing positions.

#### NATIONAL PROGRAM (LWVUS) 1998-2000

#### GOVERNMENT

Promote an open governmental system that is representative, accountable and responsive; that has a fair and adequate fiscal basis; that protects individual liberies established by the Constitution; that assures opportunities for citizen participation in government decision making; that provides sound agricultural policy; and that preserves public health and safety through quin control measures.

#### AGRICULTURAL POLICY

Promote adequate supplies of food and fiber at reasonable prices to consumers and support economically viable farms, environmentally sound farm practices and increased religince on the free market.

#### CITIZEN RIGHTS

Citizen Right to Know/Citizen Participation. Protect the citizen's right to know and facilitate citizen participation in government decision making.

Individual Liberties. Oppose major threats to basic constitutional rights.

Public Policy on Reproductive Choices. Protect the constitutional right of privacy of the individual to make reproductive choices.

#### CONGRESS AND THE PRESIDENCY

Congress. Support responsive legislative processes characterized by accountability, representativeness, decision-making capability and effective performance. The Presidency. Promote a dynamic balance of power between the executive and legislative branches within the framework set by the Constitution.

DC SELF-GOVERNMENT AND FULL VOTING REPRESENTATION Secure for the citizens of the District of Columbia the rights of self-government and representation in both houses of Congress.

#### **ELECTION PROCESS**

Apportionment. Support apportionment of congressional districts and elected legislative bodies at all levels of government based substantially on population.

Campaign Finance. Improve methods of financing political campaigns in order to ensure the public's right to know, combat corruption and undue influence, enable candidates to compete more equitably for public office and promote citizen participation in the political process.

Election of the President. Promote the election of the President and Vice-President by direct popular vote and work to abolish the electoral college. support uniform national voting qualifications and procedures for presidential elections.

#### FISCAL POLICY

Support adequate and flexible funding of federal government programs through an equitable tax system that is progressive overall and that relies primarily on a broad-based income tax; promote responsible deficilipoticies; support a federal role in providing mandatory, universal, old-age, survivors, disability and health insurance.

#### **GUN CONTROL**

Protect the health and safety of citizens through limiting the accessibility and regulating the ownership of handguns and semi-automatic weapons.

#### **VOTING RIGHTS**

Protect the right of all citizens to vote; encourage all citizens to vote.

INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS

Promote peace in an interdependent world by cooperating with other nations, strengthening international organiza-tions, fostering long-term development, negotiating arms control measures and encouraging the successful resolution of conflicts through nonmilitary means

ARMS CONTROL

Reduce the risk of war through support of arms control measures

MILITARY POLICY AND DEFENSE SPENDING

Work to limit reliance on military force; examine defense spending in the context of total national needs.

TRADE

Support systematic reduction of tariff and nontariff trade barriers and support broad long-range presidential authority to negotiate trade agreements.

LINITED NATIONS

Support measures to strengthen the United Nations, in recognition of the need for cooperation among nations in an interdependent world.

ILS RELATIONS WITH DEVELOPING COUNTRIES

Promote U.S. policies that meet long-term social and economic needs of developing countries.

NATURAL RESOURCES

Promote an environment beneficial to life through the protection and wise management of natural resources in the public interest by recognizing the interrelationships of air quality, energy, land use, waste management and water resources.

RESOURCE MANAGEMENT

Promote resource conservation, stewardship and long-range planning with the responsibility for managing natural resources shared by all levels of government.

ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION AND POLLUTION CONTROL Preserve the physical, chemical and biological integrity of the ecosystem, with the maximum protection of the public health and environment

#### PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

Promote public understanding and participation in decision making as essential elements of responsible and responsive management of our natural resources

#### SOCIAL POLICY

Promote social and economic justice, secure equal rights for all, achieve universal health care coverage at reasonable cost, promote the well being of children, and combat discrimination, poverty and violence,

#### CHILD CARE

Support programs, services and policies at all levels of government to expand the supply of affordable, quality child care for all who need it.

FARLY INTERVENTION FOR CHUDREN AT BISK Support policies and programs that promote the well being development and safety of all children.

#### FOLIALITY OF OPPORTUNITY

CHILDREN'S SERVICES: Support for improved state and local services by Illinois state agencies serving children and their familles.

CONSTITUTIONAL IMPLEMENTATION & AMENDMENTS: Support for League positions to implement, amend and uphold the 1970 Illinois Constitution

COUNTY GOVERNMENT: Support for expanded initiative powers to address county government structure and support for changes in the Illinois County Executive Act.

CRIMINAL JUSTICE: Support for improved criminal justice procedures and alternatives to incarceration.

ELECTION LAWS: Support for improved election laws and procedures and opposition to term limits for members of the illinois General Assembly.

GUN CONTROL: Support for handgun control and assault weapon control.

# LOCAL PROGRAM (LWV LAKE FOREST /

## LAKE FOREST and LAKE BLUFF

PRESCHOOL PROGRAMS AND SERVICES: Support of improved child care and recreational tacitities in Lake Forest. Support of regular monitoring of births to provide community agencies and institutions with information necessary to plan effectively for our community's greschool population.

SOLID WASTE: Support of federal state policies to reduce the quantities of waste, to reclaim useful materials, and to safely restore the residue to the environment. Municipalities should combine their efforts to solve waste problems regionally. Recycling and reuse should be given priority. The federal government should continue or increase its financial aid for research and development in this area.

#### LAKE BLUFF

LAKE BLUFF COMPREHENSIVE PLAN: Support of an effective Comprehensive Plan which encompasses potential and existing land use in Lake Biuff and surrounding unincorporated areas as well as capital improvements, including the infrastructure of the village.

CONSERVATION: Support of measures to preserve the natural resources of Lake Bluff; protection and preservation of the Lake Bluff shoreline and bluff; preservation of ravires and other open areas; preservation, through restricted use, of the flood plain lands along the Skokie River; establishment of walkways and bicycle paths. LAND USE: Monitor the disposition of village owned properties west of the West Terrace. This land is in its natural state, and some of it is in the flood blaid.

COORDINATED NOMINATING SYSTEMS: Support of the coordination of procedures of the Lake Bluff School Caucus, the Lake Bluff Park Caucus, and the Lake Bluff Village Progressive Party which would improve their efficiency without impairing their independence.

Specifically, the League favors coordination with respect to area maps, the timing of area meetings and the preparation and release of certain public notices and publicity. The League recommends that the nominating bodies explore together the possibilities of improving procedures and determining other areas of cooperation.

#### LAKE FOREST

PRESCHOOL PROGRAMS AND SERVICES: Support of improved child care and recreational facilities in Lake Forest. Support of regular monitoring of births to provide community agencies and institutions with information necessary to plan effectively for our community's preschool population.

LAKE FOREST CAUCUS: Support of the formal adoption of operating procedures which more fully inform the residents of the workings of the caucus, of the desired qualifications of candidates which it is seeking, and of the qualifications of those selected for candidates. Support of procedures for the annual meeting which allow for informed selection of candidates and the opportunity to select each candidate individually by secre ballot. Support of procedures which enable direct voter participation in the selection of COC members.

RECREATION: Support of the development of additional programs and facilities, such as Deerpath Community Park, for non-athletic and unstructured activities. Additional use should be made of existing facilities, such as schools, for such activities. A public annual report should be made designating the use of tax dollars.

VOTING

All citizens of the United States 18 years old by the election date who have resided in the precinct for 30 days prior to the election and are properly registered are eligible to vote in any national, state or local election. Change of name requires registration in person. Change of address within the same voting invisdiction can be handled by signing the form provided on the voter's verification of registration card. Registration is necessary in person if the change is to another voting jurisdiction. If the voter has failed to vote for the past four years, he/she will receive a notification by mall and an application to he reinstated. If he/she falls to return the application within 30 days, registration will be canceled and he/she must re-register before voting.

#### ABSENTEE BALLOTS

Requests for absentee ballots for voters who may be away on election day or who are members of the armed forces or who are physically handicapped my he obtained from the above mentioned sources. An absentee ballot may be obtained not more than 30 days or less than 5 days before the election.

#### CLOSE OF VOTER REGISTRATION

Under election law, the County Clerk is required to close voter registration during the 28-day period preceding all elections. This allows time for the voter files to be prepared for the election. During this time no new registrations, changes of addresses, or other administrative changes can be made to the voters' files.
