


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




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

#### WHAT'S GOING TO BECOME OF FORT SHERIDAN?

Members of the League of Women Voters are invited to two programs on Fort Sheridan.

On Wednesday evening, Feb. 14, the AAUW will hold a panel discussion moderated by State Rep. Virginia Frederick and featuring the mayors of Lake Forest, Highland Park and Highwood and representatives from Fort Sheridan and the U.S. Dept. of Defense. The program will be held at 7:30 p.m. in the Gorton Center Community Room.

On Wednesday morning, March 21, the LWV of LF/LB will hold an informational session featuring members of the Lake County LWV Fort Sheridan Study Committee. The meeting will be held at 9:15 a.m. in the Gorton Center's Friends Room.

The two programs will privide background information that should prove helpful in answering the Fort Sheridan Study concensus quesions which will be mailed by the County League in March, Please come.

#### PESTICIDE STUDY COMMITTEE SPONSORS SPEAKER

The use of toxic pesticides for "cosmetic" numbers can pollute our food supply and can put our health and that of the ecology at risk. What are the safe alternatives?

Our speaker, Barbara A. Mullarkey, will discuss our role as environmental caretakers. She will share her experiences in reducing pesticides in Oak Park and other communities. Her "hands on", "grass roots" approach offers practical information, and shows how she and a handful of helpers- with truth, persistance and humor- were able to influence decision makers.

Bring your concerns and questions about ecology issues, and our speaker will show how, together, we can find the solutions.

#### SCHOOL BOARD STUDY COMMITTEE

TO HOLD PANEL DISCUSSION

In mid-January, the Lake Forest City Council was presented with the results of the city-wide survey. SRI (the people who compiled the results) stated that 57% of the respondents favored electing our representatives for School District 67. Given the somewhat biased version of the question, I believe this is a significant response. The actual breakdown of response to the question (available at the Lake Forest Library) was as follows:

- -Those who believe the Board should be apponinted: 34 9%
- -Those who believe the Board should be elected: 46.9%
  - -Those who said they don't know: 15.9%
  - -No Response

#### LAKE BLUFF PARK DISTRICT OBSERVER REPORT - BEACH PROJECT

January 3, 1990 Nancy Melick

SUBJECTS DISCUSSED: Pertinent to League: Beach Project

General manager explained that by 1991 the district will have reduced its debt level sufficiently that, together with increased assesments, the district could go ahead with financing project by bonding without a referendum. It was the sense of the Board, however, that since this project has been previously defeated. they would prefer an advisory referendum of the electorate, a referendum to be fied into another election. to eliminate the cost of a special election. While this

was not voted on, it appeared to be their thought that improvements should be considered on one of three possibilities: a) shoring of bluff only, b) shoring of bluff plus minimal beach improvements, or c) shoring of bluff plus more adequate extensive beach improvements ( e. g., Lake Forest.) It was also felt that a more adequate job of informing the electorate was necessary than was employed at the time of the failed referendum. The amount of necessary consultation will be discussed at a subsequent meeting.

The problem of bluff and beach improvements. on Park District property is one of the Lake Bluff ongoing studies.


#### FUNDRAISER A SUCCESSI

Committee members have been studying the issue for over a year, and will bring it to League consensus on May 23, 1990.

Bathara Carriy, Lake ForestLake Bluff Vice president, will moderate the louru. Within questions with be submitted by the audience. As was done during the Candidate Forum just heidby the Legue, the questions will be screened to avoid duplications. Panelist swill include Sybil Yastrow, Regional Suparintendant of Schook, Mr. Murray Corpariena, city attorney for Lake Forest; Mr. Richard Mittleman of Morgan, Mittelman & Rapin, who researched the legal questions for the Legaue; and Elaino Fandell, Wilmette Legaue president from 1981-1983. Wilmette operate under a system where they have a separate School Baord Caucus, which ammiates candidates for Wilmete School District 39, and also recommends candidates for New Trier. Either James P. Richter or Lorraina Tweed will be on hand from the Lake Forest Caucus to discuss how the caucus would anticipate handling District 87 elections.

## CHANGES, ADDITIONS AND DELETIONS TO THE BY-LAWS

The following changes to the by-laws will be presented and voted on at the Annual Meeting May 9. The original version or explanation is shown in the left column, the change is shown and underlined in the right.

#### ORIGINAL VERSION OR EXPLANATION

This section was originally Article IX, Section 6. There is no change in wording, simply in location.

#### ARTICLE IV - Board of Directors

Section 3. Vacancies. Any vacancy occurring on the board of Directors by reason of resignation, death or disqualification of an officer or elected member (other than the President) shall be filled until the next Annual Meeting by means of a majority vote of the remaining members of the Board of Directors. Three consecutive absences from a Board meeting by any member without valid reason shall be deemed a resignation.

#### .....

Section 4. Powers and Duties. The Board of Directors shall have charge of the property and business of the organization with full power and authority to manage and conduct same, subject to the instructions of the Annual Meeting. The Board shall plan and direct the work necessary to carry out the program adoned at the National Convention and the Annual Meeting. The Board shall accept responsibility delegated to it by the Board of Directors of LWWUS and LWVIL. The Board shall create and designate such special committees as it may deem necessary.

#### ARTICLE V - Officers

Section 2. The President. The President shall preside at all meetings of the membership and of the Board of Directors, except as provided in Section 3 of this Article.

The Board shall plan and direct the work necessary to carry out the program adooted at National. State and County Leacue Conventions and the Annual Meeting. The Board shall accept responsibility delegated to it by the Board of Directors of LWWLS, LWYIL and LWYLC, The Board shall create and designate such special committees as it may deem necessary.

#### ARTICLE V - Officers

Section 2. The President. The President shall preside at all meetings of the membership and of the Board of Directors.

The books of the Treasurer shall be audited each year prior to the Annual Meeting or upon completion of the Treasurer's term (whichever comes first by an auditor appointed by the Boart.)

#### DISTRICT 67. SCHOOL BOARD STUDY SCHEDULED FOR CONSENSUS

We are fast approaching the end of the League year, and the elected school board study is drawing to a close. The study has heen difficult as we are one of only 13 remaining charter districts and noty 1 other (Chicago) has an appointed board. All other dictriets have elected boards, and there is not much legal precedent for the committee to draw upon

The school board study committee met on March 7th to report the results of the survey of various charter districts. As expected information was difficult to obtain due to its dated nature. Many of the districts that have changed to regular districts did so many years and and many of the charter districts were originally chartered as elected school boards. However we did find that Rockford District 205 voted by referendum approximately 10 years and to change to an elected board but still remain in their charter. We have contacted the Regional Superintendent of Schools to determine what statutory authority was used. Mr. Bowen, the deputey superintendent at Rockford indicated that some time and the differences between regular and charter districts were more substantial, but as Illinos School I are supercorded the provinces of the charter they are becomingless and less meaningful. The committee was unable to find any districts that had been charter districts that had any negative consequences of becoming regular districts with the exception of Waukenan. The superintendent of the Waukenan School District 60 mentioned that they did have difficulty finding enough candidates to run for the elected positions and that they had a hetter heard when it was appointed. The committee felt however, that our Caucus system does a good lob of recruiting candidates and that this would not be a factor in Lake Forest The committee will wind up the study with an educa-

There are many other highlights that the three of us will share with you; space does not allow for all of them here, but for us the most exciting was that after two long years of work by a national task force, LWVUS adopted a position in favor of federal control of hand guns and semi-automatic assault weapons and a ban on "Saturday Night Specials". On the last day of convention Sarah Brady, head of Hand Gun Control came and congratulated us on adopting this strong position. Mrs. Brady's husband, James, former presidential press secretary, was shot nine years ago and permanently disabled from a hand gun. She is now a league member.

We can't leave out our lobbying endeavors. The three of us joined eight other Lake County Leaguers in a 1.1/ 2 hour long meeting with one of Secretary of Defense, Richard Cheney's Assistant Deputy Secretaries, David Berteau. We presented and discussed the league's position on the disposition of Fort Sheridan. We, also, met with Jonathon Stein, congressional aide to Senator Paul Simon on the same topic

All in all, as always the opportunity to interact with other delegates from across the country renews one's sense of the importance of LEAGUE.

#### ANNUAL MEETING A SUCCESS

The Annual Meeting held on the evening of May 9 was well attended, efficiently run and wonderfully productive. A big Thank You goes out to Bonnie Cross and Colleen Regan for coordinating the event.

The budget and slate of candidates were approved as

presented and published in the last Bulletin. All changes to the by-laws which were proposed were adopted as published except for Article V, Section 5 which deals with the Treasurer's duties. The sentence which would have required the Treasurer to obtain Board approval before disbursing funds for any expenditures over budget was deleted. It was fell that this put too great a burden on the treasurer to keep a running balance on each budget item as well as putting the treasurer in the possible position of being unable to pay vendors or suppliers for services already rendered. Instead, the treasurer will only bring to the Board's attention any invoice which seems unreasonable.

Changes made to Existing Positions consisted of deleting the Lake Bluff positions on the College of Lake County and the continuation of paths to the northern boundaries of the village since both have been rendered obsolete by the completion of those projects, as well as the Lake Forest Recreation Study position which was judged to be too old to still be valid.

The Lake Bluff Shoreline Study was deleted from the Local Program for 1990-91 since it has been completed. This will be reworded and placed in the Position section. The proposal to study the existing recycling program in Lake Bluff was also rejected since this has been done. A complete list of those items approved for Program is included in this Bulletin.

## CONSENSUS ON DISTRICT 67 ELECTED SCHOOL BOARD

The League held its consensus on the elected school board question on May 21, 1989 and the position statement that is a result of that consensus follows. Consensus was easy to reach on the major question as the vast majority of those responding left hat changing to an elected school board was preferable. Consensus was not quite as strong with regard to how, specificus ly, hose elections should be handled. The majority of the respondents watnet to see the Late Forest Caucus hardle the decions, but also the constitution of the constitution of

I have spoken with Mayor Clarke, who has

indicated that there should be no problem putting this question on the ballot in November. I hope to meet with him and the city attorney soon to determine how specifically that will be accomplished.

#### DISTRICT 67 ELECTED SCHOOL BOARD POSITION

The League of Women Voters Lake Forest/ Lake Bluff supports an elected school board for the city of Lake Forest School District 67. The League believes his is preferable to the current method of appointment by the Mayor.

The League also believes that an elected school board would be more responsive to the citizens of Lake Forest.

The Inajority of the responding members felt hat changing to an elected school board would not hamper Lake Forest's ability to attract qualified canditates willing to serve.

preferred, however, by a minority of the respondents who stated that doing so would not be detrimental to Lake Forest.

League members indicated that both the City of Lake Forest and the League of Women Voters Lake Forest/Lake Bluff should be involved in sponsorship of the referendum on the elected school board question. The membership did not leef that the City Council should create an elected school board by resolution as this method involves becoming Regular District, and does not give the citizens of Lake Forest an opportunity to vote on the issue.

Slating more than one candidate for elective office to District 67 school board positions was the choice of the vast majority of the responding League members. The Lake Forest Caucus was the preference vehicle for the selection of candidates to District 67 School Board positions among the majority of the respondents, with a substantial minority favoring a separate school caucus. A small minority preferred open, general elections.

## NATIONAL GUN CONTROL POSITION

The League of Women Voters of the United States believes that the profileration of handguns and semi-automatic assault weapons in the United States is a major health and safety threat to its citizens. The League supports strong idearal measures to limit the accessibility and regulate the ownership of these weapons by private citizens.

The League supports licensing procedures for gun ownership by private citizens to include a waiting period for a background check, personal identity verification, gun safety education and annual license renewal. The license fee should be adequate to bear the cost of education and verification.

The League supports a ban on "Saturday Night Specials," enforcement of strict penalties for the improper possession of and crimes committed with handguns and assault weapons and allocation of resources to better regulate and monitor gun dealers.

## AREA MAN IN WASHINGTON MEETINGS ON NEGATIVE CAMPAIGNING

Bruce L. Felknor, a Knollwood resident and a trustee of Lake Forest High School Diskrict 115 (and the husband of League member Edith Felknor) was recently a panelist at two Washington conferences on ways to improve the conduct of election campaigns in America. He is an authority on election campaign tactics and the aurthor of two books on the subject, the standard Dirty Politics (1966, 1985) and the forthcoming Political Chicanery in America. From 1964 through 1986 he wrote biennial syndicated newspaper roundups of unethical campaign tactics in presidential and congressional efections.

The first conference was sponsored by the Annenberg Washington Program of Northwestern and Pennsylvania universiteis. Its subject was the "Challenge of Creating an Informed Electorate". Mr. Felknor was featured on the panel "Proposals for Change."

The League of Women Voters of the United States conducted the second conference on the topic "Positive Thinking About Negative Campaigning: The Citizen's Role". Mr. Felknor participated in the concluding session, "Mobilizing Citizens - What Citizens Can Do About Neadtive Campaigning".

Both conferences were limited to invited participants chosen from among scholars, politicians, political consultants, journalists and concerned civic organizations.

#### CAUCUS COMMITTEE TO MEET

Because of the recent changes in procedure being proposed for and by the Caucus, the LWUT-FLB Caucus Committee is being reactivated to monitor and study the suggestions being made. ## HIGHLIGHTS OF MAY 22 JOINT BOARD MEETING

A tentative schedule of meetings for the 1990-1991 year was decided upon. This list includes a Board Meeting on August 28, Coffees on September 19 and October 3, a meeting on recycling October 17, and Board meetings November 13 and December 11.

To encourage local leagues to seek new members, the LWVIL has agreed to cut its PMP in half to \$8.50 for each member who exceeds this year's count. There will be no increase in national dues. There has been a 6.8% decline in national membership. Eight staff were laid off.

The Lake Bluff League gives a social science award at LB Junior High School on behalf of the League. A committee will check into whether Lake Forest should give such an award at Deer Path Junior High.

#### **COUNTY GOVERNMENT STUDY**

Although the LWVIL County Government Study Committee has been relatively quiet during the past few months, we have been steadily working on our study. At a yet to be scheduled meeting during the 1930-91 least year, our proposed concurrence will be presented to you and you will be asked to vote your agreement or disagreement with each of its statements.

The exact concurrence wording is not yet final, but we do know what topics we will be covering. Therefore, we will begin printing a series of excerpts from our Study Guide. Please read and save them so that you will be prepared to give an informed opinion on our concurrence.

This first except: which is printed on the back of this page - deals with the litinois County Executive Act. You may recall that in 1988 we participated in a LWV of Lake County study of this Act. The poston as arrived at states that the Act is seriously flawed. The Lake County League has been unable to lobby for changes in the Act because the state league has no position on it. This is a problem that our concurrence may remedy.

The Study Guide excerpt on the following page should refresh your memory about the County Executive form of government and Lake County's concerns.

## **ELECTED COUNTY EXECUTIVE**

History of the County Executive in Illinois As has already been noted, the 1970 Constitution granted home rule power to any county which elected a chief executive officer. And, as mentioned earlier, Cook County was the only county that elected its chief executive officer. In 1970 until 1985, any Illinois county that wanted to change to an elected executive had to simultaneously debate the merits and limitations of both home rule and a county executive.

In 1985 the County Executive Act was amended by the Illinois General Assembly to uncouple these two issues, allowing counties to elect a chief executive officer with or without home rule. It is uncertain whether or not this uncoupling is constitutional. Only one referendum on a county executive without home rule has been successful. Will County chose that option in 1988

Referendum Language
Probably because the issues of home rule and a county executive were initially tied together, the reguired wording for a referendum on county executive government without home rule is confusing. The Illinois County Executive Act requires the referendum to substantially state:

"Shall the county of . . . adopt the county executive form of government and elect not to become a home rule unit?

Some voters have interpreted this language as meaning that they are voting on a home rule referendum. Actually, when a county considers adopting the county executive form of government without home rule, its non-home rule status does not change, regardless of the outcome of the referendum.

#### Form of County Executive Government

In the county executive form of government, departments are administered by a single county official called the county executive, who is elected at-large for a four-year term. The county board or board of commissioners acts as the legislative body of the county under this form of government. The Illinois County Executive Act defines county executive government for any county with an elected executive except Cook County. (The president of the Cook County Board is an elected executive, but a variety of other statutes define Cook County's government.) As mentioned earlier, only Will County has chosen to operate under the Illinois County Executive Act.

According to the Act, the county executive is the chief county administrator, exercising virtually all the adminstrative powers which are performed by county boards in non-elected executive counties. The county executive hires (with board approval), fires and supervises appointed county department heads.

The county executive does not directly supervise

elected county officers (e.g., sheriff, recorder, etc.) but does exercise more control over their budgets than a county board or board chair can. This is because the county executive has a veto power, including the power to yeto line items in the county budget. A three-fifthe majority is required for an override.

The County Executive Act states that "the salary of the county executive shall be fixed by the board and shall not be less than 1 1/2 times the amount of the compensation to which a member of the board is entitled." According to a Will County State's Attorney, the county executive also serves as the county liquor control commissioner. The salary for that position also is set by the board.

#### Professional Administrator

Like a county board, a county executive can defenate duties to an appointed, professional administrator. Such an appointment is subject to the approval of a board majority. Under the Illinois County Executive Act, the county executive is not compelled to appoint a professional administrator; only in Cook County is the executive to do so. Since the county executive form of government tends to appeal to larger, urban counties where many Leagues have worked successfully to institute professional administrators, there is concern that the adoption of the county executive form outside Cook County could threaten professionalism in county administration.

#### Separation of Powers

Under the Illinois County Executive Act, the county board retains its legislative powers. This is reminiscent of the separation of powers at the national and state levels. There is one provision of the Illinois county Executive Act, however, which makes the county executive's role particularly different from the U.S. president's. That provision states that the county executive presides over board meetings and votes to break ties. The Illinois version of county executive government is thus similar to the structure of those corporations in which the chief executive officer is also the chairman of the board

We are aware of only two states, Arkansas and Kentucky, which give a county executive any voting power; in those states the county executives are weaker in other ways, particulary since they have no veto power. The power to preside is apparently granted only in Illinois

In the United States, the elected county executive form of government is generally used when there is a desire to model county government on the state and federal systems. Given the powers of the county executive as enumerated by the Illinois County Executive Act, there is concern that in Illinois, the Act makes the county executive both the administrative and legislative leader instead of providing for a traditional separation of powers between the branches of county government.

# Committee Reports

### Caucus

The Caucus Study Group met in July to discuss the purpose and goals of the committee. A decision was made not to align with any particular group as the strength of the League lies in independence and impartiality.

One of the key issues the committee wishes to address is the direct voter participation in Lake Forest governance. This is the only item from the League's 1988 concensus on the Lake Forest Caucus which remains open.

During the course of the year the study group will update the League's 1988 information on other North Sinore caucuses. They will also meet with representatives of the Caucus, Heritage Party, COG, and Coalition For Caucus Reform to learn the precise details of proposed changes to the current candidates elections system. In November, the committee will hold an educational form to update League members on imalementation of our 1988 recommendation that "COC members be chosen in a manner which promotes direct voter participation".

The committee will decide at a later date whether a new concensus and position are needed. Anyone interested in joining the Caucus Study Group should call Barbara Garrity at 234-3769.

### Schools

In June of 1990, the League of Mone Voters Board approved the consensus opinion reached in May in support of an elected school board for School District of (the elementary district). The full League position is contained in the previous Lorgue Lines. The League position stated that it was the desire of the League that the City of Lake Forest be given the opportunity to join the League in bringing this question to the voters. During the Auguest4, 1990

meeting, the City Council discussed what role it would like to take in this issue.

After much discussion, and a 3-3 tie vote that was broken by Mayor Charles F. Clarke, Jr., it was determined that the city council would prefer a "hands-off" role in this, and would prefer that the League carry this initiative on our own. Some councilmen feared that assisting the League in bringing this question to the public would lead to the impression that the council supports an elected board.

It will not be possible to bring the Elected School Board question to the public in November. School Law differs from general election law, with the requirement that the petitions be presented to the Board of Education. It would have been insufficient to present the petitions at City Hall prior to the August 20th deadline as is the case with other petitions for referendum. Since the School Board does not meet in August, it was not possible to present petitions to the board. Luckley the Study Committee discovered this before gathering signatures.

The Study Committee will begin agthering signatures soon in order to place the initiative on the April place. ### Pesticides

Anne Shannon, pesticides chair and Ginny Wolf, of the Deerfield LWV attended a three day agricultural tour sponsored by the University of Illinois

College of Agriculture, the Illinois Dept. of Agriculture, the Illinois Farm Bureau and industry organizations promoting fertilizers and pesticides. The purpose was to develop dialogue between farmers and environmentalists.

Anne and Ginny found that farmers are reducing their use of insecticides by wiser use of physical methods but herbicide use continues to be high. Industry representatives contended that herbicide products are "safe", implying that health risks are known. An attornev from the Environmental Protection Agency explained that most pesticides used today still have incomplete human health data. Currently, no large scale neurological study on pesticide exposure is being conducted.

It was suggested by a representative of the Office of Management and Budget that farmers may see a time that polluted farm water run-off is tested and fined as are commercial sites presently. Farmers were concerned that environmentalists were unaware of their need for the agricultural chemicals to handle farm pest problems. Although farmers seem interested in developing research and education in non-chemical methods, the financial risks in the transitional period discourage most farmers from switching to a non-chemical method.

Presently, the University of Illinois is developing a program to help farmers switch to organic and sustainable methods of farming. Agribusiness leaders discussed new developments in the industry such as a new herbicide which is active on one enzyme system of plants and degrades quickly. We may see these new herbicide products used on lawns and playgrounds in the future. Although considered safer, studies must be made before we allow their use in our communities.

The Lake Michigan inter-League group is submitting the consensus of their study for adoption by each of the state LWV boards in the Lake Michigan basin. The consensus statement supports the reduction in pesticide use and government regulation in environmentally sensitive areas. It also supports organic labeling laws and organic farming certification laws.

Funding for increased testing for pesticides in food is essential and public notification of pesticide use should be improved. The LWV-LF+LB pesticide committee will meet in September to determine member consensus.

# LWV-Lake County Recommendations On Ft. Sheridan

The following are recommendations to be made by the LWV-LC. If you would like additional copies of this report or references as to information contained herein, call Alice Pierce at 295–2801.

The League of Women Voters of Lake County

- SUPPORTS ownership/operation of Fort Sheridan by one or more governmental entities, with usage of the Fort determined by a master plan, because:
- a. Ownership/operation by governmental entities would keep this historic Lake Michigan site accessible to the public in perpetuity.
- b. Usage according to a master plan would prevent fragmentation and inappropriate zoning/development of the Fort Sheridan site, both initially and in the future.
- c. A master plan would minimize redundancy and would keep down development costs by allowing project financing to be coordinated with successive phases of construction and of infrastructure development.
- d. Development under a master plan would assure compatibility of usage and appearance between areas adjacent to and areas within the Historic District, Nature Conservation Areas, and the public park and beach.
- OPPOSES sale of the Fort Sheridan property to private developer(s) because:
- The land was donated to the Army by three local families.
- b. Our taxes have paid for the buildings and development of the land.
- c. The purpose of closing military bases was to cut operating costs, not to run a real estate profit scheme.
- d. Lake County, Illinois is the 12th most rapidly urbanizing area of the

United States, and local residents consider it very important to keep the hmited open space areas along Lake Michtgan in public hands.

e. Sale of Fort Sheridan to the highest bidder threatens dense development of this lakerion property, with resultant gridlock on access roads, strain on infrastructure, and costs to local taxpayers. Although part of the Fort is zoned for single family 0.5 and 3.0 acre lots, there is concern that this zoning might be contested because adjoining areas contain commercial, hotel and apartment buildings.

3.SUPPORTS the protection of environmentally sensitive and unique areas, including those presently in the Illinois Natural Areas Inventory:

- a. The eroding bluff community, which is one of the best remaining examples in the state, currently is not represented in the Illinois Nature Preserve System. The bluff contains seven endangered, threatened and relic plants.
- b. Jane's Ravine, which contains several endangered and rare species is "one of the finest examples of this kind of natural area in Illinois"
- c. The Fort Sheridan tower is a breeding site of the peregrine falcon ( a federally listed endangered species).

4.SUPPORTS major usage of Fort Sheridan as a public park, to include a beach, marina, golf course, swimming pool, tennis courts and other recreational facilities. User fees, or user fees plus taxes, should be the means of support. A public park (National, State, or County) is highly desirable because:

- There is no National Park in Illinois.
- b. Fort Sheridan has 1.75 miles of Lake Michigan beaches, backed by distinctive bluffs and extensive open space and wooded areas. The Fort can be easily reached by public transportation,

unlike Illinois Beach State Park. which not readily accessible by public transportation.

- c. In Illinois, only the City of Chicago beaches and parks allow easy and free public access to Lake Michigan
- d. Golf courses on the North Shore are in great demand and short supply There is no public course in the Highwood area, except that at Fort Sheridan. The revenues from this course could support other public uses of the Fort.

5.SUPPORTS preservation of the Fort Sheridan Historic district in its entirety, and its control by a single board, agency, with powers to set use and maintenance conditions. The more historically significant buildings, including the museum, should be open to the public. Rehabilitation should be according to the standards of the U.S. Department of the Interior. These measures have the League's strong support bocause:

- ne Noother comparable fort existin the Midwest. Fort Sheridan was established in 1887 and designed by floabild and Roche, well-known architects of their day. The bricks used in its construction were hand-kilned on the property. The Historic District, which is listed on the National Register of Historic Places, includes 278 acres and 90 buildines. It has been keet intact. with
- few original building demolished.

  b. The integrity of the Historic District can only be assured if its use and maintenance are tightly controlled.
- c. Many of the buildings in the Flistoric District have undergone interior modernization to meet current healing and electrical needs. They would be readily adaptable to new occupants and are a potential source of revenue.

6.OPPOSES major use of Fort Sheridan housing by the Navy, because:

- a. Existing housing is a potential source of revenue for support of the rest of the Fort, including the maintenance of the historic buildings and of open space.
- b. Substitution of Navy housing for Army housing at Fort Sheridan does not constitute closing the base for purposes of saving operational costs.
- c. Impact aid to local schools is grossly inadequate to cover the cost of educating the children from the base, and has been a burden on the affected school districts and taxpayers.
- 7.SUPPORTS a University/Research Complex as a minor re-use of the Fort, because:
- a. A University/Research Complex could utilize buildings in the Historic District in a non-destructive way, and would not conflict with retention of open space or with public use of the grounds.
- Several universities in the area have been cooperating to develop a Great Lakes Ecological Research Center with access to Lake Michigan.
- 8.OPPOSES discount stores, car dealerships and condominiums of any height on the Fort Sheridan site, because such usages:
- a. Would result in excessive traffic and/or population density.
- b. Would be inconsistent with the nature of the Historic District, with Nature Conservation Areas and with preservation of open space at the Fort Sheridan site.
- 9.SUPPORTS environmental impact and cost studies to determine demographics, traffic public transportation, utilities, and water and sewer needs prior to the implementation of any specific plan for the re-use of the base.

The League assumes that the Department of Defense will also conduct a method of the Department of Defense will also of the Mazardous method of the Department of the Defense and within the lake), since such information is essential to decisions on re-use of the base. The Department of Defense has stated that it is their responsibility to clean up hazardous waste before they dispose of the property.

# Highlights of August Board Meeting

SCHOOL BOARD STUDY: The School Board Referendum will be in April. The petition will be drawn up and checked by an attorney for conformity with Petition Law. A program, to include speakers and a brochure is tentatively planned for the March General Meeting.

CAUCUS UPDATE: The Caucus Committee met in July to review the 1988 consensus position, which specified direct ovter participation in the process. The committee identified possible steps in candidate selection (Committee on Candidates, Annual meeting, ballot box) or platform construction where over participation should take place. The study group will meet with other groups interseted in caucus reform and will look at procedures in other committies. An Educational Forum and consensus update are planned for the November Ceneral Meeting.

SOLID WASTE: Lake Forest has apparently committed to city wide at-door pick-up of separated cans, glass and paper, starting after May 1991, who participation being voluntary. An October General Meeting will examine the possibility of expanding recycling to other materials pick-up and guidelines for materials pick-up and guidelines for handling toxic materials in the home.

MEMBERSHIP: Invitations will be sent for the two scheduled New Member Coffees. Dues for 1990-91 are payable by Sept. 30th. A membership booklet will be published in October.

VOTER SERVICE: Voter Registrars are needed for the Newcomers Lunch (Sept. 27, 11:00 a.m. – 12:00 p.m.) and at all three Sunset Foods locations (Sept. 27, approx. 9:30 a.m. – 2:30 p.m.). Our League has been asked to sponsor the Washington Post/Newsweek Forum on Long Term Health Care, scheduled for Sept. 21 at the Marriot Lincolnshire, to be moderated by Mr. Franzin. # Lake Bluff Park Board

The Lake Bluff bluff and beach project, a continuing concern for Lake Bluff members following lineir study several years ago, is also a continuing project for the Lake Bluff Park Boos The Board has assigned three priorities to a less extensive plant han that which was rejected by referendum in 1925. Current plans are to, first, preserve the south end of Surrise Park which appears most chadagered by exceeded, shore the bluff, and third, protect the beach.

Financing of the project will be feasible by using retirement funds from previous bonds, thereby making aretendum unnecessary, although the Board has stressed a desire for input from Lake Bluff residents. It is anticipated that the project will entail no rate increase or at most a nominal one.

Charles Shabica and Associates of Northfield, coastal consultants, was the firm selected at the July 18th meeting to provide design and more specific estimates for the first part of the work. W. F. Baird and Associates, the firm which had worked on the previous project which was defeated by referendum, had also submitted a proposal; but Shabica was the choice of the Board. The Park Board hopes that work on the bluff can begin in 1991.

In other matters, the Board accepted the resignation of Board President Geoffrey Woie, who anticipates a move from the village. Vice President Marlene Miller will serve as president.

### Ft. Sheridan Petition

The LWV is currently circulating a petition to support preservation of open space at Fort Sheridan. It calls for protection of the present conservation areas including the ravines and the bluffs and preservation in entirety of the Historic District.

The petition will be at the two New Member Coffee Meetings. Please look for it and include your signature on this important issue.

# LWV-Lake County Composting Questions

Since yard waste comprises about one-fifth of the county waste stream, we need to address the issue of turning this segment of our solid waste into a resource. A state law, prohibiting acceptance of yard waste in landfills, has recently gone into effect, resulting in greatly expanded composting activity across Illinois. While composting sounds like a benign procedure, we have to address certain environmental issues which may accompany operations on such a large

# LWV-LC County Government Study

The following is the second in the series of updates on the LWV-IL County Government Study. The first was published in the July issue of League Lines.

This is the second in the series of articles preparing us for the LWV-IL County Government Structure concurrence meeting this spring. This article focuses on the subject of independently elected county officials (such as sheriffs and county clerks) and one way in which the potential for patronage and contracting abuses in their offices can be limited. As the article explains, Cook County (with help from the Cook County League) has already adopted this protection. A change in state law is required if other Illinois counties wish to follow Cook's example. One section of our proposed concurrence would allow Illinois Leagues to lobby for such a statutory change.

EXCERPT FROM PROPOSED CONCURRENCE STATEMENT

The LWV-IL believes that county legislative bodies should have the right to require independently elected county officials to adhere to the same personnel and procurement systems as appointed county department heads. EXCERPT FROM COUNTY

Independently Elected County Administrative Officers

In addition to the members of county boards or boards of commissioners, Illinois is characterized by a large member of independently elected county administrative officers, including county clerk, sheriff, coroner, stal's attorneys, treasurer, clerk of the circuit court, county superintendent of schools, assessor, auditor and recorder of deeds.

Because these officers appear on the same row of county organizational charts as county board members, they are sometimes called row officers.

Some counties have eliminated some of these officers, or made them appointed positions. For example, at one time in Cook County the medical examiner and comptroller were elected, but they are now appointed by the president of the county board.

The legislative bodies of a number of Illinois counties, including Cook, Lake, DuPage, and Peoria, have instituted modern personnel and procurement practices designed to ensure fairness in county employment and contract awarding. Cook County, encouraged by the Cook County League of Women Voters and others, centralized its purchasing and personnel functions many years ago. Independently elected county officials as well as appointed department heads must apply to one office for purchasing and contracting and another for personnel matters. Under current Illinois law, no other counties (because they lack home rule power) can require their independently elected county administrative officers to abide by the personnel and procurement practices established by county ordinances., Some independently elected officers voluntarily abide by such ordinances, but they are not legally obligated to do so.

## Update on 1988 Caucus Concensus

On Wednesday, November 14, at 9:15 a.m., the Caucus Study Group will present an update on the League's 1988 Caucus Concensus.

There have been many developments in Lake Forest politics since 1988. First, the Caucus adopted some of the League's recommendations. Then the Citizens For Open Government (COG) was born. Next, the Lake Forest Survey revealed that some twothirds of those answering believe "The Caucus should recommend more than one candidate for each elective office." Soon after, the Coalition For Caucus Reform surfaced. Then the Heritage Party organized, and successfully ran Richard Ernest for Fourth Ward alderman against the Caucus-backed incumbent. Now the Caucus is making changes which attempt to allow more direct citizen participation, a goal the League has promoted since 1988.

Come learn more about these new players and proposed changes in Lake Forest politics. The Caucus Committee has interviewed representatives of the Caucus, COG, the Coalition and the Heritage Party, and look forward to sharing with you each group's ideas for Lake Forest's candidate selection process. There should be plenty of time for questions and discussion of what further action the League should take.

# Highlights of Sept. Board Meeting

TREASURER'S REPORT: For the month ending 8/31/190, there are starting/ending balances of \$8,744.16 and \$5,068.41. Cumulative actual vs. budgeted expenditures for the current fiscal year were \$1,370.25 and 1,355.00, respectively. Treasurer's Report also included a breakdown of budgeted expenses by month, which Jennifer Hamilton will be using to track actual vs. budgeted expenditures on a monthly basis.

MEMBERSHIP: Dues statements have been sent. A September 30th deadline for getting names in the membership directory was set. The Membership Coffees have been scheduled.

VOTER SERVICE: 139 voters were registered at the Art Fair. After the November elections, the committee will set up voter registrar training session for those who are interested.

LEAGUE LINES: Sue Walsh has taken over as editor from Shella Hopkins, who is now Voter Service Chair. The Board thanked Shella for a job well done over the past years. SOLID WASTS: Lake Forest is buying equipment now for city—wide at—door pick—up of recyclable materials an emeeting on Recycling and Hazardous Waste has been set for October 24th. This meeting will be open to the public. Volunteers will be recruited to set up a Hazardous Waste Pick—up program. We will try to get a grant from the state League to cover control.

FUND-RAISING: Plans are being made for a Monte Carlo night. A fund-raising chair is needed. The date will be set in late January, but not to proceed Superbowl Sunday. There may be a December solicitation of donations toward the Education Fund, which can be used toward PMP's and public education.

SCHOOL BOARDSTUDY: The city of Lake Forest has declined to sponsor a referendum. An attorney in Municipal Law will need to be employed to check the appropriateness of the wording of the referendum if the League sponsors it. Donations for associated costs may be solicited through a special mailing and the committee will try to get reduced fee legal advice. An educational brochure will be will be needed in the spring to educate the electorate on the study.

CAUCUS UPDATE: Barbara Garrity and Wendy Stotts met with Jim Richter and Kate Sackman of the Lake Forest Caucus to discuss details of the proposed revisions in the Caucus procedures. The possibility of mailin ballots, going to a P.O. Box held in the name of the League of Women Voters, with ballots to be counted by Lake Bluff members was discussed. Possible ways to increase public participation in municipal elective office were considered. Members will meet with COG and the Coalition on September 23rd. The group will also meet with Richard Ernest. A presentation on the Caucus has been scheduled for November 14th.

### How To Contact Your Elected Officials

Few people communicate with their elected officials. Your voice is important. A letter to Congress represents the view of 100, a telegram, 250. Here are some tips to make sure your letter gets the attention it deserves:

To set it apart from thousands of computer generated letters Congress receives, make your letter as personal as possible, offering your own views on a legislativie issue.

Often, writing in longhand opposed to typing will cause your letter to get noticed. Focus on one issue and keep the letter short, preferably no more than one page.

The correct salutation for the envelope to U.S. Senators or Representatives is: "The Honorable...", The correct salutation within the letter is "Dear Senator..." or for a Representative, "Dear Miss./Mrs/Ms./Mr...".

Identify yourself as a homemaker, attorney, teacher, teenager, salesperson, etc. especially as it relates to the bill you are discussing.

Summarize your position in the letter and give your reasons for supporting or opposing a specific bill.

Telegrams called Public Opinion Messages may be sent at any time by calling Western Union at 1-800-325-6000. The charge is about \$9-\$12 depending on length.

## Committee Reports | Protection of LB Sunrise Park Bluff and Beach

On Saturday, November 17, the Lake Bluff Park District held an inf mational meeting to discuss preliminary recommendations and design plans for a project to protect the Sunrise Park bluff and beach. The Park District has retained Dr. Charles Shabica of Shabica & Associates as a consultant for this project. The meeting included a bustour to inspect current conditions at the Lake Bluff beach and bluff south of the North Shore Sanitary District facilities and then on to Highland Park to view a bluff and beach protection project south of the Park Avenue Water Treatment Plant which was designed by Dr. Shabica and is similar to the one being proposed for Lake Bluff. Three members of our League were present for this meeting and tour: Nancy Mellick, Park Board Observer. Phyllis Albrecht, Co-President, and lody Jacobs, representing the press.

The plan under consideration involves the construction of a 320 foot quarrystone revelment along 3/4 of the south bluff's base and a 100-foot quarrystone offshore breakwater which would be placed at the end of the present north groin, with beach fill to be placed behind the breakwater. Repair of scarred areas of the south bluff and of the bluff at the north end of Sunrise Park is also proposed. According to Park District representatives, all funds for these specific projects, which are initial phases of a longer term plan to address bluff and beach protection, have already been secured by the Park District.

Dr. Shabica is interested in historical knowledge of the bluff and shoreline (old photographs, personal recollections of changes in the bluff and beach configurations) in order to more accurately determine what the rate and pattern of erosion have been so that the most environmentally sensitive approach to protection may be taken. Please contact Milton Meigs, Chairperson of the Park District's Beach and Pool Committee if you are able to provide any information of this nature.

Construction is targeted for 1991. and the Park District will be finalizing decisions about the design in the next month. Based on consensus obtained in our 1989 local study of shoreline problems in Lake Bluff, our League has a position in support of bluff protection. We will continue to monitor the planning and implementation of this proposed project. Interested individuals should plan to closely follow the Park District's deliberations in the coming weeks. The Park Board meets on the 1st and 3rd Mondays of each month at Blair Park Activity Center at 7:30 pm.

## **Highlights of October Board Meeting**

### School Funding Debate Launches LWV Campaign

In the next few weeks, you are likely to notice increased discussion of the problem of inequitable school funding in Illinois. Some 44 school districts from across the state are expected to file a lawsuit on November 13, challenging the constitutionality of Illinois' current funding system. They will argue that the present heavy reliance on the local property tax to fund education results in unacceptable disparities in per pupil spending between school districts. Similar lawsuits in other states have resulted in court decisions mandating complete revision of existing school funding systems.

The LWV is supporting this effort through its participation in the Coalition for Educational Rights Under the Constitution. The coalition will be working to build public and legislative support vstem. To

# Leaf Burning Fuels LWV-LF/LB Action

Meeting, the Leaf Burning Ban failed 53 at the second reading. A motion to
adopt a referendum on the April balow
was approved and at the October 13th
City Council meeting, Mayor Charles
Clarke asked that it be sent back to the
Urban and Environmental Affairs Committee for wording.

At the November 19th meeting of the Urban and Environmental Affairs Committee, the following wording of the referendum was approved:

"Shall the city of Lake Forestamend city code from restricted to a leaf burning ban to be effective October 1, 1991?"

The wording will go back to the City Council for final approval at the December 3rd LFCity Council Meeting. If approved, it will appear on the April, 1991 ballot.

The LWV-LF/LB Board approved a motion to send a letter on behalf of the League to the editors of local newspapers stating the official LWV-IL position against leaf burning. An action committee within our League has stemmed from the controversy on leaf burning. The committee will meet in January to discuss a cours of action in educating voters on the issue before the April election. If you are treetsed in being a member of this committee call Brenda Bogan at 234-5471.

Brenda has suggested that there are many actions we may take immediately to help make this ban effective. She suggests that if you or someone you know is affected by leaf burning, make your concerns vocal after the first of the year by writing letters to the editor of the Lake Forester, writing to your aldermen and to the Illinois Pollution Control Board who can issue an area ban if they get enough complaints.

Dear Lake County League Member:

As we draw close to the time when Secretary of Defense Dick Cheney and his staff will decide the future of the Fort Sheridan property, the LWV of Lake County Fort Sheridan Task Force sees an uphill battle in trying to convince our representatives in Washington, DC that we don't want the property sold to private developers. At the public forum on Fort Sheridan, Charles Smith, legislative aide for Senator Alan Dixon, stated that the property must be sold for top dollar.

By introducing contrary logislation specifically geared to transfer the Fort Sheridan property to the National Park Service, the US. Fish and Wildlife Service, or a similar agency this can be prevented. Currently our Senators are not motivated to stick their necks out. Dixon and Simon will have to do more than pay lip service to this concept in order to achieve this goal. Apparently these base closings are different than those in the past, because Congress is insisting upon "top dollars". The Lake County Forest Preserve Board and/or the State of Illinois could request some of the land at reduced or no cost for a public park. The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Agency has recently announced that they are also interested in protecting the conservation areas and could work with the Lake County Forest Preserve District to develop a park. They have indicated that they could get money to do this.

# Referendum To Wait

The LWV-LF/LB will bring to referendum the issue of whether School Districtó School Board members should be elected rather than appointed in November, 1991, rather than in April. There are several reasons for this change in

The League is concerned that the impending High School bond referendum and the possibility of a TIF referendum in April of 1991 may cloud the issue of an elected school board. The choice between school board election or appointment should be made dispassionately by an informed electorate. The additional time will allow the League to provide more complete voter education materials and allow for voters to focus solely on the issue of election vs. appointment.

The League did not undertake the stody of the elected vs. appointed school board in order to unseat any incumbent Board of Education members. The League recognizes that the current board is in the middle of several important matters, including the Conway Farms annexation and the Strategic Plan, and would not like to upset these delicate matters.

If Lake Foresters voted in November of 1991 to have an elected school board, the first election would occur in November of 1993. School board members who are appointed in the interim would know that they would face an election if they planned to continue in office. The League feels that this gives the City of Lake Forest and School District 67 time to assimilate this significant change in an orderly fashion.

# Caucus Study Makes Suggestions

The following is a letter to the editor sent by Barbara Garrity, Chair, LF Caucus Study, on behalf of the League, on December 11,1990. It was sent to local newspapers and distributed at the Lake Forest Caucus Annual Meeting.

The League of Women Voters of Lake Forest/Lake Bluff met last month to review the Lake Forest Caucus' response to the League's 1988 LF Caucus Consensus. In its consensus, the League stated "Lake Forest voters should have a larger part in the [candidate] selection process..." Ten points were listed whose implementation would increase the voters' role in candidate selection. The most important urged election of COC (Committee On Candidates) members "in a manner which promotes direct voter participation." Election by mail ballot sent to all registered voters by ward was suggested

This fall, the Caucus instituted such a direct mail ballot. Lake Forest registered voters now may choose their ward's two new COC members from among at least four individuals. We believe this procedure, once formally incorporated into Caucus Rules, is responsive to the League's 1988 position.

In addition, the Caucus is offering a choice among two candidates for the aldermanic positions for which the incumbent is no longer eligible to serve. To the League's concern, the plan publicized by the Caucus did not allow for voter choice in retaining incumbents. We were pleased to see voters send retention ballots for mayor and 1st ward alderman, and assume the Caucus will take responsive action if either fails to receive majority support.

There remain three areas of League concern:

(1) We still suggest the Caucus publish an explanation of standards and qualifications for open positions, elected or appointed. This is the last open item from our 1988 Consensus.

(2) There is only limited opportunity for voters to learn about the candidates' vision for Lake Forest and their qualification for office. Perhaps more advance notice for and better timing of the ward meetings, and giving candidates a full page for their statements sent with the ballot would help.

(3) The new candidate selection process needs to be spelled out in detail and adopted into the Caucus Rules at the Annual Meeting so it becomes standard operating procedure.

We applaud the Lake Forest Caucus for its steady response to the League's 1988 Consensus, as well as the concerns expressed by Lake Forest voters through the city survey, COG, the Coalition For Caucus Reform and the Heritage Party. We are proud to have been catalysts in this round of caucus reform through our 1987-88 study and consensus, and look forward to helping "de-bug" these new procedures in light of this year's expe-

# LWV-IL County Government Study Reference

EXCERPT FROM THE PROPOSED CONCURRENCE ON COUNTY GOVERNMENT STRUCTURE

A) The LWVIL believes citizens in each county should have the power to initiate change in the structure of their county government.

Structure refers to form of government; number of county board members; single member districts, allarge or multi-member districts or a combination thereof; county board chairman elected at large or by peers; elected county executive.

Governments derive their just power from the consent of the governed. Responsible citizens in a democracy must retain their sovereign power to structuregovernment to serve them. The Illinois Constitution recognizes the likelihood of conflicts of interest when legislators are asked to change the form of the government they serve in. Citizens already have the right to change the structure of the state legislature and the structure of municipal government by inititye. Citizens need this same right at the county level. The League notes the need for safeguards in this process to ensure that the initive right be limited to county government structure issues. This concurrence does not propose the broad initive power made famous in California by tax cutting Proposition 13. EXCERPT FROM COUNTY

Court Limits Referenda Changing the Number of County Board Members.

LWV of Peoria v. County of Peoria

In November of 1987, the voters of Peoria County overwhelmingly approved a referendum proposition to reduce the number of members of the Peoria County Board from 27 to nine, without changing the 1981 district lines, by electing one instead of three board members from each district.

In 1988 the Illinois Supreme Court in League of Women Voters of Pooria v. County of Peoria v. Constitution in Article VII, Section 343 vests in the county board exclusive authority to determine the number of members of the county board. The Constitution provides:

A county board shall be elected in each county. The number of members of the county board shall be fixed by ordinance in each county within limitations provided by law.

The court rejected the League's argument that a referendum is a "law" within the meaning of this section and went on to hold that "the method of electing board members" specifically subjected to county-wide referendum by the 1970 Constitution, did not include the number of county board members to be elected. The courtstated that only the method of electing the number fixed by the board, whether in multi-member or single-member districts, could be put to a county-wide referendum.

Finally, the court held that the referendum authority of county voters "to adopt, alter or repeal their forms of government provided by law" did not include the power to fix the number of county board members.

Reviewing Specifics of the Peoria Case

The LWV of Peoria has set up what seems to be an unusual set of rules: (1)The people, by inititive, can

- change the number of representatives in the General Assembly.

  (2) The people, by referendum, can
- change the number of representatives in home rule municipalities.

  (3) The people, by referendum, can
- change the number of representatives in non-home rule municipalities.
- (4) The people in counties governed by three-at-large commissioners under theold commission form of county government may, by referendum, choose to change the number of county board members.
- (5) The people in all other counties cannot, by referendum, change the number of county board members. They are permitted, by referendum, to change the method of electing county board members, and may "adopt, alter, or repeal the form of government".

Impact of the Peoria Decision

The bottom line is that for the time being, Illinois voters cannot change the being, Illinois voters cannot change the stage of their county boards by referendum. Experts have also stated that the Peoria decision means that voters also cannot choose by referendum whether to have anat-large or peer-elected board chair.

# Education Fund Benefit Set at Second City

At least two possible solutions to this dilemma have been suggested. They include:

 a constitutional amendment specifically giving Illinois voters the right, via referenda, to change county board size and chairman types;

(2) a state law defining several forms of county government similar to the township forms now exist, but with provisions for varying county board sizes and chairmanship types.

### Note from Study Committee

If Illinois Leagues approve section concurrence, the Illinois League will have the ability to lobby for either a constitutional amendment and/or a state statute to ensure that Illinois voters have the right to change their county's legislative body via citizen's inititive.

# Fort Sheridan Commission

On January 7th, the Fort Sheridan Commission, chaired by Representative John Portor recommended to the Department of Defense that the Fort Sheridan property be placed under a single management for all future public uses, to include public ownership and access to the beach and lakefront preservation of the ravines retention of the parade eround as open space, preservation and rouse of all historic and related brick buildings principally for publicand notfor-profit purposes maintenance of the museum in its present location and creation of a park above a portion of the lakefront. These recommendations were similar to the postions taken by the League of Women Voters

The Commission members voted to oppose Navy housing, a 162 acre Veterar's Administration cemetary, tention of the Reserves on the site, and commercial development of the interior of the fort, and commercial development along Sheridan Road, south of the Historic District. The Commission members decided to seek acquisition of the property from the Department of Defense at a 100% discount. It was also decided to ask Governor-elect Edgar to seek the site for re-use as a state park.

Commission members, the consultant and the staff were instructed to actively seek prosepective tenants forneuse of the base and to investigate funding sources. Decisions on a smaller cemetary/memorial park/museleam and on the golf course and other matters were deferred until the next (January 28th) meeting.

# LWV-IL Gun Control Action

Gun Control Action is needed. The Brady Bill HR 7 has been reintroduced in the House and pressure is needed to help the bill pass this year. This legislation was named for Jim and Sarah Brady.

The bill would require a mandatory 7 day waiting period before a hand gun could be purchased. During the waiting period, local police would have an opportunity to run a criminal record check of the purchaser.

This goes along with our own National position on handgun control which state, in part:

> "The LWV-US bolieves that the proliferation of handguns and semi-automatic assault weapons in the United Statesisa major health and safety threat to its citizens. The League supports strong federal measures to limit the accessibility and regulate the ownership of these weapons by private citizens.

> The League supports licensing procedures for gun ownership by private citizens to include a waiting period for a background check, personal identity verification, gun safety education and annual license renewal. The license fee should be adequate to bear the cost of education and verification."

Please write to Speaker of the House Foley asking for the bill to be allowed to come to the floor for a vote. Send letters to:

The bond sale (handled by Northern Trust) of \$24,000,000 will be awarded Thursday, Feb. 14th at 730 p.m. with a slightly lower interest rate than originally expected if the 6.7% current rate remains stable. A West Campus lease to the First Presbyterian Church was extended six months with additional inconero(\$2,400.

With successful asbestos abatement in the boiler room completed by the Gonzales firm, the Board approved retaining them for continued work.

Mr. Tom Taylor, project manager and Mark Dufton, Asst. Project Manager of the Greeby Co. have been retained as Owner's Representative for the renovation and additions to LFHS.

The architects reviewed the current plans for the expansion of LFHS.

### Ft. Sheridan's Future Unclear after Meeting

On Saturday, February 23rd, the Fort Sheridan Commission held a public meeting to allow various groups to give their comments on the future of the Fort. Beryl Flom, President, LWV-LC attended on behalf of the League.

At the meeting, it was disclosed by Gary Patterson, a representative of the Army Corps of Engineers, that the Army will retain 111 acres of the 700 acre base and that there is a possibility the Navy will take 180 acres of military housing. The Losque opposes the use of the Fort for Navy housing, Patterson also stated that the Army will continue to operate a 7-acre cementary at Ft. Sheridan and retain 104 acres being used by reserve units.

### Treasurer's Report

For the month ending, there was a starting balance of \$10,182.65, with income of \$106.40 and expenditures of \$870 35: for January 1991, income was \$2 195.74 and expenditures were \$858.62 (both largely due to fundraiser). The fundraiser cleared in excess of \$1,400. The ending balance for 1/31/91 was \$10,955.82. Membership dues, newslettor ade and fundraiser income were below budget, but actual expenses were also below budget Donations to the education fund will be used to pay part of the PMP. The board approved placing \$5,000 in a 3 month CD.

### Fundraising

The Finance Committee was thanked for their hard work and Wendy Statts for the use of her home for the January event. Preliminary figures showed that ticket sales, donations and auction proceeds were \$712.50.\$230 and \$1080, respectively, Program Booklet Ad refunds will be \$400. The Finance Director reported that it was difficult to get ads for the newsletter with today's business climate. It was suggested that we highlight a sponsor each month in League Lines. The Treasurer suggested that next year's fundraiser be run through the education Fund so that donations would be tax-deductible and we would not have to pay sales tax on items purchased

#### LWV-LC

The Co-President recommended that we give more emphasis to increasing attendance at County concurrence

and consensus meetings, since the County League has taken the place of local Leagues in initiating studies which interest our members

### Program Planning

It was recommended that we contact members via Lengue Lines and phone, about proposed program items. It was also recommended that a list of speakers, dates and times be made available in September with the year's slate of programs. An item on equal access to mental health care was suggested. It was suggested that we plan some daytime programs and some that are fun and interesting. A liaison with the AAUW Board was suggested to allow coordination of programs.

### Special Awards

Local programs and activities to he submitted to the State League for consideration of special awards included League Lines, Caucus Committee Action, 1990 Fundraiser ("A Night of Mystery, The Sequel"), the October forum on Recycling and Hazardous Waste, and the Preschool Directory publication.

House Bill 6, a bill which is do cioned to facilitate the siting of more landfills and incinerators in our slate has been reintroduced by Representa tive Myron Kulas and assigned to the House Energy, Environment and Nature ral Resources Committee. In effect this will be a step backwards, as more land fills will reduce the incentive to develop etrong waste reduction and recycling programs. Because of strong industry support for this bill, action is needed immediately.

HB 6 would alter the municipal solid waste planning process by completely restructuring the Solid Waste Planning and Recycling Act. The current Act mandates that counties develop and implement plans for handling municipal solid waste.

The League feels that Illinois is facing a garbage crisis. The average citizen currently generates about one ton of earhage per year and if this rate continues we will soon run out of sname in our current disposal facilities

Furthermore, it is a huge, complicated, and confusing bill containing both positive and negative components. In addition the hill does not contain a funding mechanism. Our biggest concern with HB6 is that if passed, it would bring confusion and delay to the solid waste management planning process.

The LWV-II, has been working with state-wide civic and environmental organizations and grassroots citizens groups to oppose House Bill 6. These groups formed the Alliance for Reduction and Recycling of Waste (ARROW), to coordinate our efforts. In addition to this grassroots opposition, last fall 95 out of 102 counties in Illinois came out in opposition of this Bill.

Under the current Illinois law governing waste facility siting, potential waste facilities must be reviewed and approved by local elected officials, giving voters the opportunity to control the types of facilities that come into their

communities. The League believes this bill is working. Since it was approved in 1981, 18 new sites were approved through the local siting process; 16 were rejected. Of those 18 sites, only 7 received EPA permits and five were constructed.

The solution to our solid waste problem is aggressive waste prevention measures and recycling. The emphasis should be on reducing as much as possible, then looking to the safest available technology to handle the remaining waste. By doing this, we will be able to extend the life of the landfills and incinerators already in operation.

It is time for Illinois lawmakers to support the solid waste management hierarchy through strong waste prevention, reduction and recycling initiatives. Building new landfills and incinerators should be our last resort.

#### LAKE BLUFF

#### Lake Bluff Comprehensive Plan

The League supports an effective Comprehensive Plan which encompasses potential and existing land use in Lake Bluff and surrounding unincorporated areas, as well as capital improvements, including the infrastructure of the village.

### Conservation

Support of measures to preserve the natural resources of Lake Bluff. Promote appropriate use of flood plain lands. Establish walk ways and bicycle paths.

The League promotes the preservation of the beach, bluffs, ravines and open  $\boldsymbol{\cdot}$ 

The League supports the restricted use of flood plain lands along the Skokie River.

The League supports the continuation of paths to the northern boundaries of the Village.

### Support of Coordinated Nominating Systems

The League favors the coordination of some of the procedures of the Lake Bluff School Caucus, the Lake Bluff Park Caucus, and the Lake Bluff Vilage Progressive Party which would improve their efficiency without lampairing their independence.

Specifically, the League favors coordination with respect maps, the timing of area meetings and the preparation and release of certain public notices and publicity. The League recommends that the nominating bodies explore together the possibilities of improving procedures and determining other areas of cooperation.

### Support of Knollwood Annexation

The League believes that the annexation of Knollwood by Lake Bluff will bring about better control of zoning in Knollwood. Since Lake Bluff and Knollwood share the same parks and schools and are compatible neighbors, we feel that annexation will not change the character of either community.

### Land Use

Monitor the disposition of village owned lands. The League will monitor disposition of property owned by the Village west of the West Terrace, which is in its natural state, and some of which is in the flood plain.

### LAKE FOREST

#### Preschool Programs and Services

Given the resurgence of births in the Lake Forest area, the LWV-LF/LB encourages regular monitoring of births to provide community agencies and institutions with information necessary to planefectively for the Lake Forest preschool population. The LWV-LF/LB supports recreational programs and child care facilities in Lake Forest.

#### Lake Forest Caucus

Although the LWV-LF/LB believes that a non-partisan system of candicidate selection is perferred in Lake Forests to a two-party system, the LWV-LF/LB recommends that the caucus amend its operating procedures to more fully inform the resident of the workings of the caucus, of the desired qualifications of candidates which it is seeking and of the qualifications of those selected for candidates, We recommend changes in the procedure for the annual meeting and that a scere biallo viole be used at that meeting to select cach candidate. See the selection of the seeking the selection of the candidates for the chargest specifically verification of the selection of board. As a result of pinet LWV-LF/LB and Caucus meetings the above recommendations were accepted and are being implemented by the caucus.

Still outstanding is the recommendation that the COC members be chosen in a manner which promotes direct voter participation.

#### Lake Forest District 67 School Board

The Losgue of Women Voters of Lake Forest • Lake Bluff believes that electing the Board of Education for School District 67 (the elementary district) is preferable to the current method of appointment by the Mayor. The Losgue believes that an elected school board would be more responsive to the citizens of Lake Forest and that a change to an elected board will not reduce the number of qualified candidates willing to serve.

League members prefer that Section 32-1.5 of the Illinois School. Code be used to effect the change, which would leave District 67 within the scope of the Lake Forest Charter. League members prefer a caucus system for selection of candidates for board positions, with the vast majority supporting the slating of more than one candidate for elective of fice.

### Recreation Study

More programs and facilities, such as a Deerpath Community Park, should be developed for non-athletic and unstructured activities. Additional use should be made of existing facilities, i.e. schools, for such activities. A public annual report should be made designating the use of tax dollars.

#### Solid Waste

The soil dwaste management policy of the U.S. and Illinois should be to reduce the quantities of waste, reclaim useful materials, and safely restoretheresidue to the environment. Municipalities should combine their offorts to solve waste problems regionally. Recycling and reuse should be given priority. The Federal Government should continue—and perhaps increase—its financial aid for research and develop-

#### Cluster Housing and Empty Nesters

Empty nester housing is inadequate in Lake Forest. Lake Forest should encourage the building of single family detached homes in a group of residences on smaller lots with common land.

Section 1. Name. The name of this organization shall be the Leapue of Women Voters of Lake Forest-Lake Blutt, also referred to as the LWVLF/LB. This local league is an integral part of the League of Women Voters of the United States (LWVUS), the League of Women Voters of Illinois (LWVIL) and the League of Women Voters of Lake County (LWVLC).

### ARTICLE II - Purposes and Policy

Section 1. Purposes. The purposes of the League of Women Voters of Lake Forest–Lake Bluff shall be to promote political responsibility through informed and active participation of citizens in government, and to act on selected governmental issues.

Section 2. Policy. The League of Women Voters of Lake Forest-Lake Bluff may take action on local governmental issues and policies in the public interest in conformity with the Principles and Positions of the LWVUS, the LWVIL, and of the LWVLC

League of Women Voters of Lake Forest-Lake Bluff shall not support or oppose any political party or candidate.

### Article III - Membership

Section 1. Eligibility. Any person who subscribes to the purposes and policy of the League of Women Voters shall be eligible for membership.

Section 2. Voting Members. Citizens at least 18 years of age residing within the United States, a territory or an associated commonwealth, who join the League shall be voting members of the local and state leagues of their place of residence and of the LWVUS.

(1) Those who reside outside the area of any local league may join a local league or shall be State members-at-large.

- (2) Those who have been members of the League of Women Voters for 50 years or more shall be life members excused from the payment of dues.
- (3) Those who make a lump-sum membership payment to the League of Women Voters of the United States shall be paid life-members excused from the payment of dues.

Section 3. Member Action. Members may act in the name of the LWVLF/LB only when authorized to do so by the Board of Directors.

Section 1. Board of Directors. The Board of directors she composed of the officers, a minimum of six elected directors, and appointed directors not no exceed the number of elected directors. One-half of the elected directors hall be elected at each annual meeting, and shall serve for two years. The elected directors and officers shall have the appointed directors whose terms of offices shall be one year.

Section 2. Qualifications. All elected and appointed officers and directors of this organization must be voting members of the League of Women Voters of Lake Forest–Lake Bluff

Section 3. Vacancies. Any vacancy occurring in the Board of Directors by reason of resignation, death or disqualification of an officer or elected member (other than the President) shall be filled until the next Annual Meeting by means of a majority vote of the remaining members of the Board of Directors. Three consecutive absences from a Board meeting by any member without valid reason shall be deemed a resignation.

Section 4. Powers and Duties. The Board of Directors shall have charge of the property and business of the organization with full power and authorily to manage and conduct same, subject to the instructions of the General Membership and the Annual Meeting. The Board shall plan and direct the work necessary to carry out the program adopted at National, State and Gounty League Conventions and the Annual Meeting. The Board shall accept responsibility delegated to it by the Board of Directors of LWUS and LWVIL. The Board shall create and designate such special committees as it may deem necessary.

Section 5. Executive Committee. The Executive Committee shall consist of the elected officers of the LWVLF/LB. It shall meet at the call of the President or Co-President and shall transact such business as the Board of Directors shall designate.

Section 6. Meetings. There shall be at least nine regular meetings of the Board of Directors of the LWVLF/LB each year. All Board and Executive Committee meetings of the LWVLF/LB are open to all members.

Section 7. Special and Emergency Meetings. (a) The President or Co-President may call a special meeting gof the Board of Directors, and must call a special meeting upon the written request of five members of the Board. Members of the Board shall be notified of the special meeting at least one week prior to such meeting, (b) The President or Co-President may call an Emergency Meeting and must call such a meeting upon the request of three members of the Board, by giving personal notice to each member of the Board at least 24 hours in advance of such meeting.

Continue

Section 8. Quorum. A majority of the members of the Board of Directors shall constitute a quorum. In the presence of a quorum, a majority of the members in attendance at any Board meeting shall decide its action.

### ARTICLE V - Officers

Section 1. Officers. The Officers of the League of Women voters of Lake Forest-Lake Blaff shall be a President or two Co-Presidents, two Vice-Presidents, a Recording Secretary and a Treasurer. The President or nec O-President, one Vice-President and the Recording Secretary shall be elected in odd-numbered years and the remaining Co-President, Vice-President and Treasurer in even-numbered years. Their terms of office shall be two years. Officers shall be elected by voting members at the Annual Meeting and take office immediately. The retiring President or Co-President may serve as an ex-officio member of the Board of Directors for one year.

All reference in the By-laws to "President" shall be construed to mean President or Co-President.

Section 2. The President. The President shall preside at all meetings of the membership and of the Board of Directors. The President may, in the absence or disability of the Treasurer, sign or endorse checks, drafts and notes. The President shall be, ex-officio, a member of all committees except the Nominating Committee, shall have such usual powers of supervision and management as may pertain to the office of the President, and shall perform such other duties are may be designated by the Board.

In the event of the absence, disability, resignation or death of the President or a Co-President, the Board shall elect a Vice President to fill the vacancy. If that is not possible, the Board shall elect another of its members to serve as President or Co-President

Section 3. The Vice Presidents. The Vice Presidents shall perform such duties as the President and the Board of Directors shall designate. One of the Vice Presidents shall be designated by the President in her absence or in the absence of the Co-President to serve as Acting President.

Section 4. The Recording Secretary. The Recording Secretary shall act as secretary for meetings of the membership, the Board of Directors and of the Executive Committee.

Section 5. The Treasurer, The Treasurer shall collect and receive all monies due. The Treasurer shall be the custodian of all monies and shall deposit them in a bank designated by the Board of Directors and shall disperse the same inaccordance with the budget. Where the expenditure(s)

exceed the budget, it shall be disbursed only upon order of the Board and/or the General Membership.

The Treasurer shall perform all other functions as may be partinent to the office.

The Treasurer shall present statements to the Board at its regular meetings and an Annual Report to the Annual Meeting. The books of the Treasurer shall be audited each year prior to the Annual Meeting or upon completion of the Treasurer's term (whichever comes first) by an auditor appropriated by the Board.

### ARTICLE VI - Financial Administration

Section 1. Fiscal Year. The fiscal year of the LWVLF/LB shall begin on July 1. The Treasurer's books shall be verified annually by an auditor appointed by the Board.

Section 2. Dues. Dues, when applicable, shall be paid annually in the amount approved by the Board. Any member who fails to pay dues within two months after notification shall be dropped from the membership call.

Section 3. Budget. A balanced budget for the ensuing year shall be submitted by the Board of Directors at the Annual Meeting for adoption. The Budget shall included support for the work of the league as a whole.

Section 4. Budget Committee. A Budget Committee shall be appointed by the Board of Directors at least four months prior to the Annual Meeting to prepare a budge for the ensuing year. Upon appointment, the Budge Chairman shall serve as an ex-officio member of the Board of Directors until the discharge of her duties. The proposed budget shall be sent to all members at least one month before the Annual Meeting. The Treasurer shall not be eligible to serve as Chairman of the Budget Committee, but shall act as a member ex-officio.

Section 5. Distribution of Funds on Dissolution. In the event of a dissolution for any cause of the League of Women Voters of Lake Forest-Lake Bluft, all monies, securities and property of whatever nature will be distributed to the League of Women Voters of Illinois after all expenses have been paid.

In the event of a decision to separate the LWVLF/LB into two leagues, all monies and property shall be divided in an equitable manner as decided on by the Board of Directors of the LWVLF/LB, so that both leagues can continue to operate according to the State and National Policies.

#### ARTICLE VII - Meetings

Section 1. Membership Meetings. There shall be at least four meetings of the membership each year. Time and place shall be determined by the Board of Directors.

Section 3. Quorum. A quorum shall consist of 20% of the membership.

Section 4. Voting, A voting member shall be one as deined in Article III of these bylaws. Only voting members who are present at the time the vote is being taken shall be qualified to vote. Absentee or proxy voting shall not be premitted. A majority vote shall mean a majority of those voting on a particular item or issue in question. A twothirds vote shall mean two-thirds of those voting on the particular item or issue in question. Those who do not vote shall not be counted in computing the vote.

### ARTICLE VIII - Nomination and Elections

Section 1. Nominating Committee. The Nominating Committee shall consist of five members. The chairman and two members shall not be members for the Board, shall be nominated by the current Nominating Committee, and shall be elected at the Annual Meeting. The other two members shall be appointed by the President with the approval of the Board of Directors at least three months prior to the next Annual Meeting. Any vacancy on the Nominating Committee shall be filled by Presidential appointment. Suggestions for nominations for Officers, Directors and Nominating Committee shall be sent to this committee by any voting member. Consideration shall be given to geographical representation in all nominations.

Section 2. Report of Nominating, Committee and Nominations from Floor. The report of the Nominating Committee of its nominations of Officers, Directors and members of the succeeding Nominating Committee, shall be sent to all members one month before the date of the annual Meeting. At the Annual Meeting, following presentation of this report, nominations may be made from the floor by any volting member provided the consent of the nominee shall have been secured.

Section 3. Elections. Elections shall be by voice vote, except when there is a contest and then elections shall be

written ballot. The candidate having a majority vote shall nations, it shall appear that only one peson been nominated for any of the above offices, the presiding officer shall instruct the Secretary to cast a unanimous ballot at the Annual Meeting for the nominees for the respective offices.

### ARTICLE IX - Program

Section 1. Authorization The governmental principles adopted by the National Convention, and supported by the leagues as a whole, constitute the authorization for the adoption of Program.

Section 2. Program. The Program of the League of Women Voters of Lake Forest-Lake Bluff shall consist of:

- (a) Study and/or action to implement those governmental issues adopted by the National Convention;
- (b) Study and/or action to implement those governmental issues adopted by the State Convention;
- (c) Study and/or action to implement those governmental issues adopted by the County Convention; and
- (d) Study and/or action to implement those governmental issues adopted at the Annual Meeting of LWVLF/LB, hereinafter referred to as Local Program.

Section 3. Local Program. The Local Program of the LWVLF/LB shall consist of those local governmental issues chosen by its membership for concentrated study and action.

Section 4. Action by the Annual Meeting. The Annual Meeting shall act upon the program using the following procedures:

- (a) The Board of Directors shall consider the recommendations sent in by the voting members two months prior to the Annual Meeting, and shall formulate a proposed program.
- (b) The proposed program shall be sent to all members one month prior to the Annual Meeting.
- (c) Items in the proposed Program presented to the Annual Meeting by the Board of Directors shall require for adoption a majority vote of voting members present and voting who reside in the local government(s) concerned with the item(s). Following shall be a majority vote of concurrence by the voting members present and voting who reside outside the government(s) concerned with the item(s).
- (d) Recommendations for program submitted two months prior to the Annual Meeting by voting members who reside in the local government(s) concerned with the litem(s) but not recommended by the Board may be considered by

the Annual Meeting provided: (1) The Annual Meeting shall order consideration by a majority vote of the voting members present and voting who reside in the local government(s) concerned. (2) The Annual Meeting shall adopt the items by a two-thirds majority vote of the local voting members present and voting who reside in the local government(s) concerned followed by a majority vote of concurrence by voting members present and voting who reside outside the local government(s) concerned.

(e) Changes in the program, in the case of altered conditions, may be made provided that: (1) information concerning the proposed changes has been sent to all members at least two weeks prior to the Annual Meeting at which the change is to be discussed and (2) final action by the membership is taken at the Annual Meeting in accordance with the procedures outlined in Article IX, Section 4 (c) and (d).

Section 5. Emergency Program Item(s). Emergency program item(s) not adopted at the Annual Meeting may be adopted as follows:

- (a) Agreement on need for emergency item(s) must be reached by the Board of Directors.
- (b) Subsequent to Board approval of consideration of the item(s), members must receive written notification of intent to consider the item(s) two weeks prior to a General Membership meeting.
- (c) The item(s) must be discussed at a general membership meeting; action may or may not be taken at this meeting.
- (d) At this, or a subsequent meeting, the item(s) may be adopted by a majority vote of the membership present in accordance with the procedures outlined in Article IX, Section 4(c)

### ARTICLE X - Conventions and Councils

Section 1. National Convention. The Board of Directors shall select, at a meeting before the date on which names of delegates must be sent to the National Office, delegates to that Convention in the number allotted the LWVLF/LB under the provisions of the Bylaws of the LWVLF.

Section 2. State Convention. The Board of Directors shall select, at a meeting before the date on which names of delegates must be sent to the State Office, delegates to that Convention in the number allotted the LWVLF/LB under the provisions of the Bylaws of the LWVIL.

Section 4. Interleague Organization Conventions. The Board of Directors, at a meeting before the date on which names of delegates must be sent to the Interleague Organization Board, shall select delegates to those Conventions in the number allotted the LWVLF/LB under the provisions of the Bylaws of the interleague Organization.

### ARTICLE XI - Bylaws Amendments

Section 1. Bylaws Committee. A Bylaws Committee shall consist of three members who shall be appointed by the President with the approval of the Board of Directors at least three months prior to the Annual Meeting.

Section 2. Procedure. (a) Proposals for change may be submitted by any voting member of LWVLF/LB to the Board of Directors at least three months prior to the Annual Meeting.

(b) The Bylaws Committee shall submit to the Board of Directors at least two months before the Annual Meeting its suggested amendments and those others which were considered but not recommended.

(c) All such proposed amendments, together with the recommendations of the Board, shall be sent to the membership at least one month prior to the Annual Meeting.

(d) The Bylaws may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the voting members present and by voting at the Annual Meeting.

### ARTICLE XII - Parliamentary Authority

Section 1. Parliamentary Authority. The rules contained in Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised, shall be the parliamentary authority in all matters not specified in these Bylaws.

# LWV-LC Position On Transportation

The League of Women Voters of Lake County believes that yard waste composting can be an important method of reducing the volume of waste received at landfills, while at the same time providing an excellent soil amendment for a number of landscaping uses. The League believes that onsite composting is the best way to handle vard waste. When commercial / public composting is necessary, emphasis should be placed on small, local, well-managed operations. Further, large-scale composting should not be established in or near conservation. preservation, or recreational areas nor in forest preserves. The League also believes that all composting operations. whether large or small, require regulation. Individuals must assume responsibility both for all toxic substances used on their property and the cost of disposal of any yard waste removed from its source.

While backvard composting should be strongly encouraged, education in this area must be stressed. Backyard composting can take several forms. the most desirable being drooping grass clippings while mowing. Instead of entering the waste stream, the clippings become a natural fertilizer. Another form of backyard composting is the individual compost bin or pile, but this must be regulated through nuisance ordinances which reflect community standards. Such ordinances should include provisions to control size, odor, distance, from lot line, contents, animal pests, blowing materials, and the noise and vibration attendant on the use of chippers and grinders.

While the above are the preferred methods of handling yard waste, areas which require any more extensive composting should emphasize small, local, well-managed operations. Sites should be located as close to the source of material as possible. This would eliminate long-distance hauling and re-

duce the possibility of anaerobic conditions developing in bagged grass.

Truck traffic is one of the problems associated with large-scale composting. Sites should be located near major road systems. When yard waste is hauled, it should be covered in transit to prevent escaping materials from creating a traffic hazard.

Current regulations may not be adequate to handle the scale of statemandated composting operations. In order to ensure a well-run site which could be considered a good neighbor, hours of operation should be regulated to mitigate the potential annovance of noise and vibration from trucks and other equipment. Regulations should be in place to discourage animal pests and to control blowing materials at the site. Odors must be minimized. The area should also be well-buffered and well away from any residence. In addition, no large-scale composting should be established in or near conservation. preservation, or recreational areas.

In order to protect our water resources, distance from the water table, rivers, and permeable soils should be regulated. Composting operations should not occur within the hundredyear flood plain and runoff must be controlled.

The League is concerned about the danger of possible pesticide and herbicide contamination of the compost and the spread of such contamination when the compost is used. Thus the League believes that the use of pesticides and herbicides should be regulated. FDA standards should be used initially until more definitive information on pesticide degradation is available. Commercial compost should not be used on food crops. Homeowners should minimize the use of pesticides and herbicides, and such treated material should be retained by the homeowner after use

by means of mulching and leaving clippings on the lawn. Property owners who hire landscapers should request that they leave grass clippings on lawns and handle vard maintenance in the safest manner possible. All such companies should educate themselves on proper disposal techniques and laws. All public and private generators of yard waste have the responsibility of keeping waste close to the point of origin; they must assume the cost for their decisions and be held responsible for any toxics used on their land. A local registry of substances used by companies and citizens would be a good way to determine what is being applied to lawns and trees in the community.

Governments at all levels should be involved in setting standards and regulations to protect the environment. The Federal government should mandate that each state produce plans for recycling and the composting of yard waste, as well as provide education to ensure the success of these programs. State government should write regulations and set minimum standards. It should issue site permits and inspect and review sites to assure compliances with its regulations. The Department of Energy and Natural Resources should provide should provide support through education and funding grants. The State has minimal but undeniable enforcement obligations; practically speaking, however, enforcement is best accomplished at the county or municipal level, where a shortened response time and greater concern can make for greater efficiency. The County should provide educational and testing programs as well as set more stringent regulations with strong and efficient enforcement. The Zoning Board of Appeals should hold public hearings and set such rules for Conditional Use Permits for compost site as reflect public opinion. Municipal governments must provide leadership by preparing and enforcing regulations consistent with standards

# Proposed By-Law Amendments

At the Laque of Women Voters of Lake County Convention on May 30th, many Bylaw changes will be proposed and clarified. Since there are so many changes to be made, League Lines will only give a brief overview of the proposed changes. If you would like a copy of the LWV-LC Bylaws with proposed changes to review, please call Alice Pierce at 255-8001.

The bylaws of the League of Women Voters of Lake County have been adjusted to make the following changes:

- Stay in line with the changes made in LWVUS Bylaws in 1990;
- → Allow for Co-presidents;
- Extend the time that documents are sent to local Leagues prior to Convention and Interim Council by two weeks, so that local Leagues have enough time to get them into their newsletters;
- → Improve grammar and punctuation;
- Clarify meaning.

In addition, the following comments refer to Article and Section numbers:

- A. Article IV, Section 5 "an authorized financial institution" is the wording in LWVIL. Bylaws and allows more flexible and yet safe means of earning interest. Since the Convention is usually in the late spring and the fiscal year ends on 6/30, the audit should come after the books are closed.
- B. Switching Articles VI and VII seems more logical, so that all meeting articles are together.
- C. Article VII (new), Section 1 the sentences at the end are a liability safety factor — they are also in LWVIL's Bylaws and in Article XIII (new), Section 1D in LWVLC Bylaws.
- D. Article X (National and State Conventions and Council) was removed and put into Article V, Section 3 (Board of Directors — Powers and Duties).

The LF Library Board of Trustees met on April 16th. All officials were present. Items discussed included a lighting plan which will be available in a week to 10 days and the hiring of a children's librarian for the end of the school year. The Finance Report indicated a necessity for slowing the proposed heavy expenditures which will affect the long range planning. The Trustees were alerted to possible changes affecting inter-library lonas. These proposed changes were accetable to the trustees. A State-formulated fee of \$246 for non-residents was adopted, which will be an increase from \$180.

Subjects discussed included a Ryder Transportation agreement which extends transportation through June. 1992 with a 2% increase over this year. This agreement provides coverage of 2/ 3rds of transportation costs for the district and was worked out in conjunction with District 67. There was also discussion concerning the LFHS legal liability policy and a potential increase in that policy. No decision was made.

### Fort Sheridan

Alice Sievert, Chair 234-4133

On March 25, the Fort Sheridan Commission approved a plan for the future uses of Ft. Sheridan which is in general agreement with the League's position. The plan sets aside the north open space, ravines, lakefront and bluffs as a nature preserve and park, except that the golf course could be retained. The Historic District's nonresidential buildings should be reused, preferably by an educational or research facility. and residences could be sold to individuals. Reuse of the Historic District and its buildings would be subject to stringent historic preservation provisions. The proposed Veterans' Cemetery should be in the southeast section, to replace military housing, which should not be transferred to the Navy, because the inadequate impact fees were bankrupting School District 111. The Army Reserves would retain the southwest portion plus the northern Reserves Area. The existing Army cemetery would be maintained by the Army. Two commercial areas are planned east of Sheridan Road, to the south of the main gate.

The LWV-LC's Rt. Sheridan Study Group has prepared an informational hand-out asking people to contact the Governor and Senators to ask their support of the Commission's plan. It will be included in Lake Co. League newsleters. The committee also passed it out at Gorton's Old Fashioned Sunday on April

# LWV-LC Composting Consensus Report

The League of Women Voters of Lake County believes that yardwaste composting on he an important method of reducing the volume of waste received at landfills, while at the same time providing an excellent soil amendment for a number of landscaping uses. The League believes that on-site compositing is the best way to handle yardwaste. When commercial public compositing is necessary, emphasis should be placed on small, local, well-managed operations. Further, large-scale compositing should not be established in or near conservation, preservation, or recreational areas nor in forest preserves. The League also believes that all compositing operations, whether large or small, require regulation. Individuals must assume responsibility both for all toxic substances used on their property and the cost of disposal of any yardwaste removed fromits source.

While backyard composting should be strongly encouraged, education in this area must be stressed. Backyard
composting can take several forms, the most desirable being
drooping grass clippings while mowing. Instead of entering the
satestream, the clippings become a natural fertilizer. Another
form of backyard composting is the individual compost bin or
lip, but this must be regulated through nuisance ordinances
which reflect community standards. Such ordinances should
include provisions to control size, odor, distance, from lot line,
contents, animal pests, blowing materials, and the noise an
vibration attendant on the use of chippers and grinders.

While the above are the preferred methods of handling yardwaste, areas which require any more extensive composing should emphasize small, local, well-managed operations. Sites should be located as close to the source of material as possible. This would eliminate long-distance hauling and reduce the possibility of anaerobic conditions developing in bagged grass.

Truck traffic is one of the problems associated with largescale composting. When yardwaste is hauled, it should be covered in transit to preventescaping materials from creating a traffic hazard.

Current regulations may not be adequate to handle the scale of state-mandated composting operations. In order to ensure a well-run site which could be considered a good neighbor, hours of operation should be regulated to mitigate the potential amoyance of noise and vibration from trucks and other equipment. Regulations should be in place to discourage animal pests and to control blowing materials at the site. Odors must be minimized. The area should also be well-buffered and well away from any residence. In addition, no large-scale composing should be established in or near conservation, preservation, or recreational areas.

In order to protect our water resources, distance from the water table, rivers, and permeable soils should be regulated.

Composting operations should not occur within the hundred-

year flood plain and runoff must be controlled.

The League is concerned about the danger of possible pesticide and herbicide contamination of the compost and the spread of such contamination when the compost is used. Thus the League believes that the use of pesticides and herbicides should be regulated. FDA standards should be used initially until more definitive information on pesticide degradation is available. Commercial compost should not be used on food crops. Homeowners should minimize the use of posticides and herbicides, and such treated material should be retained by the homeowner after use by means of mulching and leaving clippings on the lawn. Property owners who hire landscapers should request that they leave grass clippings on lawns and handle vard maintenance in the safest manner possible. All such companies should educate themselves on proper disposal techniques and laws. All public and private generators of yard waste have the responsibility of keeping waste close to the point of origin; they must assume the cost for their decisions and be held responsible for any toxics used on their land. A local registry of substances used by companies and citizens would be a good way to determine what is being applied to lawns and trees in the community.

Governments at all levels should be involved in setting standards and regulations to protect the environment. The Federal government should mandate that each state produce plans for recycling and the composting of yardwaste, as well as provide education to ensure the success of these programs. State government should write regulations and set minimum standards. It should issue site permits and inspect and review sites to assure compliances with its regulations. The Department of Energy and Natural Resources should provide should provide support through education and funding grants. The State has minimal but undeniable enforcement obligations: practically speaking, however, enforcement is best accomplished at the county or municipal level, where a shortened response time and greater concern can make for greater efficiency. The County should provide education and testing programs as well as set more stringent regulations with strong and efficient enforcement. The Zoning Board of Appeals should hold public hearings and set such rules for Conditional Use Permits for compost site as reflect public opinion. Municipal governments must provide leadership by preparing and enforcing regulations consistent with standards.

Financial responsibility should rest primarily with the individual to encourage source reduction; municipalities should also be involved to guard against illegal disposal.

Large-scale composting should be operated by a combination of public and private interests, and the sites used can be either publicly or privately owned. However, since forest preserves exist for the purposes of preservation and recreation, the League believes that the Lake County Forest Preserve District should have no role in large-scale composting.

The League of Women Voters of Lake County has participated in two years of research and discussion on the Commission), which is chaired by Rep. John Porter.

The Commission has now formulated a plan, which is outlined on the reverse of this page. Under this plan, which is based on extensive input from Lake Courty residents and incorporates many of the recommendations of the League of Women Voters, much of this beautiful property remains in public hands.

The Commission's plan is now being forwarded to Secretary of Defense Cheney, who also has received requests from several federal agencies and private developers to various sections of Fort Sheridan. The Commission will therefore need the strong support of our governor and congressional delegation in order to convince the Department of Defense to accept the Commission's plan.

It is particularly important that Governor Edgar and Senators Dixon and Simon be contacted and asked to lend their support to the Commission's recommendations. The addresses and telephone numbers of the governor and the two senators are listed on the reverse of this page.

Gov. Edgar's support is essential to obtaining financing for the acquisition of Fort Sheridan. Please ask him:

- to help to arrange financing for the acquisition of the northern part of Fort Sheridan, including the Historic District. This area would include a public park to provide open space for active/passive recreation, and would provide protection for the lakefront, bluffs, ravines and Historic District. This Historic District could be reused, preferably by a university or research institution.
- to provide leadership in setting up a single governing authority for the Historic District and park areas, with responsibility for development and operation of the Fort Sheridian site. This authority could include representatives from the State, the Lake County Forest Preserve District and local governments.

Sen. Dixon serves on the Armed Services Committee and his strong recommendation of the Commission's plan to the Secretary of Defense is essential. In contacting Senators Dixon and Simon, please ask them to:

- support the Commission's recommended plan for open space, park and recreation areas to the north of the Historic District and the proposed Veterans' Cemetery to its south.
- oppose transfer or sale of housing to the Navy.
- request a discount from the Secretary of Defense for the acquisition of the north public park areas, the

### Summary of the Fort Sheridan Commission's Recommendations

- Designation of approximately 200 acres of open area north of the Historic District, including the current golf course, for use as a public park/open space area to include nature preserves and facilities for passive/active recreation. The Dept. of Defense would retain the existing small Army cemetery and the north Army Reserves facilities.
- Preservation/protection of the parade ground and Historic District, and its reuse by a university/research institution or similar facility.
- Public access to the lakefront.
- 4. Protection of the lakeshore, bluffs and ravines.
- A single managing entity/authority should control and develop the Historic District and the park/open space areas north of it.

or

6. The proposed Veterans' Cemetery should be located to the south of the Historic District rather than to its north, so that the northern open space and the Historic District can be preserved for public use. The area south of the Historic district (except for commercial strips along Sheridan Road) would be under federal control, to include the Army Reserves area and the Veterans' Cemetery. Should the Army Reserves eventually leave the fort, the cemetery could be expanded into the Reserves area.

# Proposed By-law Changes

The following are the proposed byław changes for Convention 1991. All are recommended by the State Board and will be presented by the state byławs chair to the delegate body on the first day of convention. Words to be added are underlined and words to be deleted are in Graeretheses.

ARTICLE II Purposes and Policy

Section 1. Purposes

Pationale: Conformance with I WVIIS bylaws

ARTICLE III Membership

Sec. 1. Eligibility. Any person who subscribes to the purposes and policy of the League shall be eligible for membership.

Rationale: Conformance with LWVUS bylaws

Sec. 2. Types of Membership. The membership of the League shall be composed of voting members and associate members.

(a) Voting members. U.S. Citizens at least 18 years of age residing in Illinois who join the League shall be voting members (of a local League, the LWV-IL, and the LWVUS).

 Members who are enrolled in a local League shall be voting members of that local League, the LWV-II., and the LWVUS and shall pay annual dues to that local League as determined by the local League.

Re-number and amend Sec. 2, a) 1), 2), and 3) as follows:

2) Honorary life membership shall be granted to any (voting) member of the LWVLL who has been a member of the LWVUS for fifty years or more. No further dues will be collected and all privileges shall be retained (as a voting member).

 Paid life members shall be those members who make a lumpsum life membership payment to the LWVUS. No further dues will be collected and all privileges shall be retained.

4) Members-at-large shall be members who reside outside the area of, and/or are not enrolled in, any local League. They shall pay annual dues to the LWV-II. as determined by the state board and shall be yoting members of the LWV-II. and of the LWV-II.

Rationale: Clarification and conformance with LWVUS bylaws.

Article IV League Organization

Section 3. Inter-League Organizations

a) Inter-League organizations, hereinafter referred to as ILO, are those groups of (Leagues which have been so recognized by the LWVUS) Local Leagues organized to promote the purpose of the League and to take action on county, metropolitan, or regions of the country of the co

Rationale: Incorporate the language used in the LWVUShylane

c) In the event of recurring failure of an ILO to maintain national recognition standards, the state board shall recommend to the national board that it withdraw recognition from the ILO. All funds held by the ILO from which recognition has been withdrawn shall be protated among the Lougues responsible for funding it, after all financial obligations have been met.

Rationale: Consistent with practice.

Section 4. Member-at-Large (MAL) Units.

a) The state board may authorize the establishment of member at-large units (in communities in which the establishment of a recognized local Lesgue is not feasible MAL units) where cicumstances dictate. Such units shall be composed of membersal-large who wish to group together for meetings, and shall operate within the limitations established by the LWVUS and within guidelines adopted by the state board.

Rationale: Clarification and conformance with LWVUS bylaws.

b) In the event of recurrent failure of an MAL unit to adhere to guideness for members-al-large units or to operate within limitations established by the LWVIS, the state board may withdraw approval of the MAL unit. All funds held by an MAL unit from which approval has been withdrawn shall be paid to the LWV-IL, after all financial obligations have been met.

ARTICI F VII Convention

Section 2. Composition

a) The convention shall be composed of the following voting delegates:

 One delegate (from) representing each local or provisional League and each MAL unit for each 25 voting members or major fraction thereof based on the record in the state office of voting members as of January 1st preceding the convention.

 A president or designated delegate from each local or provisional League and each MAL unit.

1) One alternate (from) representing each local or provisional League, and each MAL unit, for each 25 members or major fraction thereof based on the record in the state office of voting members as of January 1st preceding the conven-

 2) Members-at-large of the LWV-IL unless appointed as a voting delegate by a local or provisional League, or a MAL unit.

Rationale: Allow more flexibility in appointing delegates

Section 3. Qualifications of Delegates and Voting. Each delegate and alternate shall be a voting member (enrolled in, or a member-at-large appointed by, a local or provisional League in the state) of the LWV-IL.

Rationale: Simplification

### ARTICLE VIII Council

Section 2. Composition. The council shall consist of:

a) Two delegates chosen by the board of each local and

Rationale: Encourage MAL unit participation.

ARTICLE X Nominations and Elections

Section 3. Report of the Nominating Committee. The report of the nominating committee of its nominations for officers, directors, and the chair and two members of the next nominating committee shall be sent to the presidents of local Leagues, provisional Leagues, ILOs and to the chairs of MAL units two months prior to convention. Failure of presidents and MAL unit-chairs to notify their members of the proposed slate of the nominating committee shall not invalidable the momination or election process. The report of the nominating committee shall be presented to the convention at its first session. Nominations may be made from the floor immediately thereafter provided that the consent of the nominee has been obtained.

Rationale: This provision protects the validity of the bylaws amendment process in ARTICLE XIV and would provide the same kind of safeguard here.

Section 4. Election. The election shall be in the charge of an election committee appointed by the president and ratified by the convention at its first business session. The election shall

be by ballot or by voting machine, except if there is but one nominee for each office it shall be by (voice vote) adoption of the slate. A majority of those present and qualified to vote and votine shall constitute an election

Rationale: This is the usual procedure at convention.

### ARTICLE XI Program

Section 3 Adoption

a) Five months in advance of the convention the state board shall send to the <u>presidents of local Leagues</u>, <u>provi-</u> sional <u>Leagues</u>, <u>ILOs and the chairs of MAL units</u> a status report of the current program.

Rationale: Clarification.

c)Two months in advance of the convention, the board of directors shall submit the proposed program and the notrecommended tiems to the presidents of local Leagues, provisional Leagues, and ILOs and to the chairs of MAL units. Failure of presidents and MAL unit chairs to notify their members of the proposed program shall not invalidate the adoption of program.

Rationale: This provision preserves the validity of the process for adopting program.

#### ARTICLE XII Financial Administration

Section 3. Budget Committee. The president shall appoint a budget committee, to be chaired by a local League member, for the purpose of preparing a proposed budget in advance of the convention or Interim Council meeting. The treasurer shall be ex-officio a member of the budget committee (but shall not be eligible to serve as chair). The proposed budget shall be submitted to the board of directors for approval.

Rationale: Reflects current policy.

Section 4. Budget. The board shall submit to the convenion of Interim Council for adoption by a three fifths wote a proposed budget to provide support for the LWV-IL. A copy of the proposed budget shall be sent to the president of each local League, provisional League, and ILO and to the chairs of MAL units at least two months in advance of the convention or Interim Council. Failure of presidents and MAL unit chairs to notify their members of the proposed program shall not invalidate the adoption of the budget.

Rational: This provision preserves the validity of the budget adoption process.

## Facts Distorted On Fort Sheridan Plan

On July 27, 1991, the following letter to the editor was submitted to the Lake Forester and the Chicago Tribune.

"Lack of a united front may scuttle two years of work by local citizens and governmental representatives who helped to develop the Fort Sheridan Commission's reuse plan for Fort Sheridan. This plan has wide community support because it increases open space areas, provides both a public park and a national Cemetery, preserves the historic district and prevents new housing developments and associated traffic problems.

The League of Women Voters, and its Lake Forest members, support both the Commission's thoughtful plan, which is outlined below, and also the proposed purchase of the fort's north open space and lake-front by the Lake County Forest Preserve District, which wants to use fees from the existing golf course to help finance the park. Because alternate plans which would eliminate a park at Fort Sheridan are being presented to the Secretary of Defense, the League urges Lake Forest and Lake County residents to write to him asking him to accept the Commission's recommendations

The Commission's plan 1) designates the existing golf course, open space and lake-front in the fort's north section for a publicly owned park, with golf course and/or conservation areas. 2)

cedes the 150 acre southeast section to the VA for a National Cemetery, to be phased in - as needed - to replace existing military housing, and with the potential of expansion into the adjacent 90 acre Army Reserve area, if that should be closed 3) phases out military housing, which has been a financial drain on School District 111, 4) keeps the historic district intact for potential reuse as private homes and a university/research complex, 5) avoids build-out of the Fort Sheridan site by private developers, and 6) yields substantial income to the Army from the sale of small sections of the fort for strictly defined uses.

The Commission's plan is threatened by the Navy's request for existing housing on the site designated for the cemetery, and by the Va's request for a 162 acre cemetery on the north rather than the southeast section of the fort-mainly because it would be less expensive to construct. In this they are supported by the Lake Forest City government, which lears 1) loss of buffer zone if the Secretary of Defense denies land transfer for a park and the VA selects another cemetery site in the interim, and 2) heavy traffic, based on Illinois Beach State Park figures.

However, the Department of Defense has assured the Commission that if its preferred plan were denied, it could submit a fall-back plan. Concerns about heavy traffic are also unfounded, because the proposed 250 acre park, unlike the 4,160 acre Illinois Beach State Park, would be held by the Lake County Forest Preserve District, which requires that parks close at sunset and have no facilities for campers. Since the VA estimates traffic for the proposed cemetery to average 400 cars per day - including 27 funeral corteges, and since the proposed park would principally be a golf course (typically with maximum traffic of 20-25 cars per hour) and nature preserve, neither the park nor the cemetery would generate heavy traffic, Moreover the VA never issued a statement that it would turn down the fort's southeast section as a cemetery site.

Because a cemetery on the forts north section would destroy the golf course, leaving no golf course income to finance an adequate public park anywhere at the fort, the League of Women Voters opposes a cemetery at the notice. The League also opposes transfer of housing to the Navy, because inadequate federal payments for educating children from the base are bankrupting School District 111.

We hope for the continuing support of Lake Forest and Lake County residents for the acquisition of a park at Fort Sheridan."

### Incineration Interest Renewed For Lake County League

The Lake Co. League is reviewing their position on incineration as stated in the publication "Juggling Our Carbage Problem" which was issued about three years ago. It favored incineration under very strict controls. The LWV-1 is claiming a position that puts a moratorium on incinerators for the next five years.

This is an issue for the County League because the Solid Waste Agency of Lake Co. (SWALCO) will be deciding whether to build an incinerator in the future. For more information or a copy of the mentioned publication, call Di Kieckhefer, 381-1824.

### County League Recycling Committee Established

The Lake County League's Board gave its support for the establishment of a new Recycling Committee. The committee will take action in various ways to encourage sourse reduction and recycling in Lake County. A preliminary meeting was held in mid-April to determine if there was significant interest in the concept. Some areas of concern voiced by representatives from five of the six county Leagues, includeds: grassroots coordinated education and lobbying on waste reduction, coordinated publicity to county leagues on related events and issues concerning the county, creating a speakers' bureau and possibly holding a forum on the subject of source reduction and recycling.

The Board also voted to encourage and support the Model Community Program of Lake County (R.E.A.C.H) which has been in operation for a full year and just received a sizable grant from Chicago Community Trust. The concept of the model community program is to encourage source reduction and recycling through education. It awards certification to businesses or institutions after they have achieved specific goals of reduction and recycling.

### National Health Care Study Begins Consensus Process

A meeting is being sponsored by the LWV-Lake County on January 8th at Deerfield High School featuring several panelists to discuss the National Health Care situation and to answer any questions you may have on the subject. #### Background

On November 16th, the Lake Forest City Council unanicommission's recommendation for open space, a park and nature preserves on the north section of the fort and a national cemetery at the south end. They also supported a Lake county Forest Preserve District proposal for an 18-hole golf course and nature preserves on the north section of the fort, on the condition that an inter-governmental agreement or funding ideallines and on annexation be drawn up between the City and the forest Preserve District. Until November 16th, the City of Lake forest was the only member of the Fort Sheridan Commission to support a National Cemetery on the northern section of Fort Sheridan.

The support of the City of Lake Forest for the Fort Sheridan Commission's proposal makes it more likely that Secretary of Defense Dick Cheney will go along with the Commission's recommendations, which now have the unanimous support of the three surrounding communities, the county and our elected representatives. Representative Porter is now arranging a mid-December meeting between Secretary Cheney, the three mayors and representatives of governmental and community organizations to press for the Forest Preserve District Park for the north section of fort Sheridan.

Details about the two conflicting proposals of the north section of Fort Sheridan are outlined below, together with the League's concerns about their environmental impact. Copies of the League's position on Fort Sheridan can be obtained from Alice Sievert, Fort Sheridan Study Chair, at 234-4133.

#### Proposal for a Forest Preserve District Park

A 250 acre park on the north section of Fort Sheridan, to include the existing 18-hole golf course, ravines, natural areas and the northern lake-front is proposed by the Foreat Preserve District, which has offered to purchase this property for \$10 million. The golf course is to be gradually improved and landscaped with native vegetation, nature trails would be developed, and the road to the lake-front would be closed to the public. No swimming would be permitted, and the emphasis would be on protection of the natural areas. Funding for the purchase would come from a bond issue proposed for 1993, though funding may also be available from other sources. Development costs could be partially met from revenues from several Forest Preserve District colf (corses.)

The LWV supports the Forest Preserve District's Proposal for a park on the North section of Fort Sheridan. Proposal by the Department of Veterans' Affairs

A 188 acre cemetery is proposed for the north open spectations of Fort Sheridan, but would not incorporate the bluffs and ravines, since the DVA would prefer to delegate responsibility for these to another agency, as yet not identified. The cemetery is projected to accommodate up to 200,00 burials within a 21 to 35 year period, with double depth interment resulting in up to 1740 burials per acre. The peak burial rate is projected at 6700 per year, or 27 per weekday, and rates exceeding 6000 per year are projected to prevail for up to 18 years.

#### Environmental concerns about the proposed cemetery

There was no requirement that caskets or concrete liners be watertight, even though the lower casket would be at a depth of 7 ft, while the early spring water table was reportedly at or below 36" (though this would probably vary by location and rainfall.) The cemetery would be on bluffs fronting on Lake Michigan, a short distance from water intake plants for neighboring communities, and from swimming beaches. While the Final Environmental Impact Statement indicates that only a low and localized increase in nitrates and organic matter could be expected in the immediate vicinity of an interment. it does not state whether these data were derived from single interment sites, from cemeteries where only occasional burials take place or from burial operations similar in intensity to those projected for the Fort Sheridan site. Because many of the larger national cemeteries front on the ocean or on brackish water, the possibility that cemetery run-off may contaminate drinking water supplies may not have had to be addressed in the past

In assessing the impact of the proposed cemetry on drinking water supplies of surrounding communities, the erroneous assumption was made that they derive their drinking water from aquifers (i.e. wells), which were unlikely to be polluted. In reality, shoreline communities get their drinking water from Lake Michigan water intake plants on the lake shore.

In an attempt to reduce its costs, the DVA is moving away from operating smaller veterants' cemeteries at multiple sites (which has been the pattern in Illinois) and instead is planning a single central cemetery with an associated scaleup in burial density, acreage, and burial rate—but without checking into the potential adverse effects of such a scale-up. We believe that it is essential to

Environmental Concerns pertaining to both cemetery and park.

Based on aerial photographs, erosion losses to the top of the Fort Sheridan bluffs have ranged from 14 to 75 ft. during the SO years between 1937 and 1987, and this should be taken into consideration in any plans for the site. The use of fertilizers and herbicides should also be as limited as possible.

POINTS TO MAKE IN LETTERS TO PRESIDENT BUSH AND MR. CHENEY:

The 250 acre section of northern Fort Sheridan should become a park, not a national cemetery because:

It is the last large open land area along the Lake Michigan shore in Illinois which still contains beautiful and unique natural areas, including the lakefront, butfs and ravines and also contains an existing golf course, in which revenues can be used to maintain and develop the nature preserves. In our rapidly urbanizing area, this site is our last chance for a lake front public park, with well-preserved natural areas. The Fort Sheridan Commission has recommended that the site become a a park. The Lake County Forest Preserve District, with the support of the Department of the Interior, has offered to buy it for use as a park and nature preserve, to be fanded from local four federal) sources.

The site is not suited to a large national cemetery because it lies in a rapidly growing suburban area, a startiffic congestion and a premium on open space and public access to the lake front. Moreover, a 188-acre cemetery located on an eroding lake front, and intended to accommodate 200,000 interments within a 21 to 35 years, and with no requirement for sealed caskets or grave liners, could have a potential negative impact on the environment, including the stability of the fragile bluffs and ravines and on Lake Michigan water quality.

The Department of Veterans' Affairs (DVA) had not placed ads for a cemetery site in Lake County, II. Wisconsin papers, and so had not considered other sites in this area which could accommodate the 265-acre cemetery intit

The recommendations of the Fort Sheridan Commission represent a consensus of local elected officials, the county board and state legislators, and reflect the wishes of local residents, since the commission received extensive public input.

### ACTION Needed to Support House Proposal

On October 9th, Representative Sam Gedenson (D-Ct.), dair of the House Task Forceon Campaign Finance Reform, unveited his proposal to cut special interest campaign contributions and provide limited public financing to candidates for the House of Representatives who agree to abide by reasonable spending limits.

Please write and call your members of Congress and urge them to: -support public financing of House elections,

-cut special interest funding of elections, and

 oppose any efforts to weaken the Gejdenson proposal to reform campaign finance laws.

The Gejdenson proposal sets a voluntary \$600,000 spending limit for House candidates. Those who agree to abide by the limit would receive up to \$200,000 in public financing in the form of matching payments for individual contributions of \$200 or less. Participating candidates would also receive reduced costs for television, radio, and postage. The funds for the public financing would not add to the deficit or be taken from other programs. The money would come from ending the tax deductibility of lobbying expenses by corporations and trade associations.

All House candidates, even those notophing for the spending limit, would have their political action committee (PAC) receipts limited to \$200,000, tunder the Gedenson proposal. Contributions above \$200 from individuals would also be limited to a total of \$200,000.

Campaign finance reform is the real solution to much of what is wrong with Congress. Only by enacting campaign finance reform can congress reduce the influence of special interests, ensure fair political competition and get the public back into the election process.

## Fair and Adequate School Funding, Do the children of Illinois have this right?

On Wednesday, February 19th, at 730 p.m. our February General Meeting will present "Fair and Adequate School Funding" as the topic for discussion. The meeting will be held in the South Meeting Room in the basement at Gorton Community Center in Lake Forest.

School districts poor in property with often only have a half or a third as much to spend per pupil as do districts endowed with great property wealth. This is manifestly unfair. The quality of a pupil's schooling should not depend upon the wealth of the school district in which that child's parents happen to reside.

Illinois is one of the few states in the union to have actually reduced its percentage committenent to education. For the better part of a decade and a half, is tate government in Illinois has simply tried to ignore the problemas state funding of the local schools slipped from 48% to 39%. A group of 55 Illinois school districts and several individual school children filed a law suit challenging the fairness of Illinois' current funding system.

Judy Berliant, a Libertyville LWV member, and chairman of the school funding committee and Nancy Paul, LF-LB LWV member and District 115 School Board member will address us on this issue. Judy and Nancy will explain the progress that this LWV-IL study item has taken. There is an article in the Winter 1991-1992 issue of the Illinois Voter which explains background of the League's involvement and the lawsuit itself. ## Committee Reports

#### Fort Sheridan

Alice Sievert, Chair 234-4133

On December 17, 1991, Congressman John Porter and a Lake County delegation met with Secretary of Defense Dick Cheney to present the Fort Sheridan Commission's master plan for the future reuse of Fort Sheridan, Governor Edgar and Senators Dixon and Simon also sent representatives to this meeting to state their support for this locally developed plan, which has the unanimous support of adjoining communities. The Lake County delegation included the mayors, representatives of the affected school districts, presidents of the Lake County Board and the Lake County Forest Preserve District, and the president of Advocates for the Public Interest in Fort Sheridan (a group of organizations including the LWV of Highland Park, which support public use of open space at Fort Sheridan).

Congressman Porter's presentation of the proposed master plan was illustrated by plans and maps. He also emphasized the financial drain of military housing on local school districts. The Lake County Forest Preserve District, which has made a \$10 million purchase offer for the northern section of the fort, presented its proposal for a golf course and nature preserve on the site. The Department of Veterans's affairs. which wants a cemetery on the fort's north section, declined an invitation to attend this meeting but will meet separately with Mr. Cheney, Mr. Cheney made no commitment, but was impressed with the unity of the delegation.

In order to be able to lobby the entire Illinois congressional delegation in support of the League's position on Fort Sheridan, the Lake County League wrote to all Illinois Leagues to ask permission to contact their congressmen. Such approval has now been obtained.

Ft. Sheridan Committee Report Continued

Our thanks go to LWV of Illinois President Eleano Revelle who guided us through this lengthy procedure and to all the Illinois Leagues who support our efforts. Also, belated thanks to LWV LF-LB member Ginny Alexander, who was inadvertently omitted last month form the list of members of the Fort Sheridan Study group who had worked hard in support of the League's position.

### ACTION ALERT

The US faces a crisis in solid and hazaradous waste. Americans throw away enough bottles and jars to fill the Twin Towersat New York's World Trade Center every two weeks; enough aluminum to rebuild the nation's commercial air fleet every three months; and enough writing paoffice and a 12-foot per to build Los Angeles wall from 100 to New York every year. As landfills reach capacity across the country, we are fast running out of space to dispose of wastes. At the same time, Americans are becoming increasingly concerned about toxic chemicals and hazardous wastes.

To solve these problems, our nation must move from a throw-away economy toward one based on waste reduction and solid waste recycling. Several steps must be taken at the federal level.



## 1992-1993 Proposed Local Program

#### Lake Bluff

Lake Bluff Comprehensive Plan

Support of an effective Comprehensive Plan which encompasses potential and existing land use in Lake Bluff and surrounding unincorporated areas, as well as capital improvements, including the infrastructure of the village.

#### Conservation

Support of measures to preserve the natural resources of Lake Bluff:

- Protection and preservation of the Lake Bluff shoreline and bluff;
- Preservation of ravines and other open areas;
- Preservation, through restricted use, of the flood plain lands along the Skokie River:
- Establishment of walk ways and bicycle paths;

#### Land Use

Monitor the disposition of village owned properties west of the West Terrace. This land is in its natural state, and some of it is in the flood plain.

#### Coordinated Nominating Systems

Support of the coordination of procedures of the Lake Bluff School Caucus, the Lake Bluff Park Caucus, and the Lake Bluff Village Progressive Party which would improve their efficiency without impairing their independence.

Specifically, the League favors coordination with respect to area maps, the timing of area meetings and the preparation and release of certain public notices and publicity. The League recommends that the nominating bodies explore together the possibilities of improving procedures and determining other areas of cooperation.

#### Knollwood Annexation

Support of the annexation of Knollwood by Lake Bluff. The annexation of Knollwood would bring about better control of zoning in Knollwood; and, since Lake Bluff and Knollwood share the same parks and schools and are compatible neighbors, annexation would not change the character of either community.

#### Lake Forest

Preschool Programs and Services

Support of improved child care and recreational facilities in Lake Forest. Given the resurgence of births in the community, the League supports regular monitoring of orities to provide community agencies and institutions with information necessary to plan effectively for our community's preschool population.

#### Lake Forest Caucus

Support of the formal adoption of operating procedure, which more fully inform the residents of the workings of the caucus, of the desired qualifications of candidates which it is seeking, and of the qualifications of those selected for candidacy. Support of procedures for the annual meeting which allow for informed selection of candidates and the opportunity to select each candidate individually by secreb ballo. Support of procedures which enable direct voter participation in the selection of COC members.

#### Recreation

Support of the development of additional programs and factories, such as Deerpath Community Park, for non-athletic and unstructured activities. Additional use should be made of existing facilities, such as schools, for such activities. A public annual report should be made designating the use of tax dollars.

#### Solid Waste

Support of federal and state policies to reduce the quantities of waste, to reclaim useful materials, and to safely restore the residue to the environment. Municipalities should combine their efforts to solve waste problems regionally. Recycling and reuse should be given priority. The federal government should continue or increase its financial aid for research and development in this area.

## Does The Forest Preserve District Have A Chance?

The legal requirement that contaminated areas of Fort Sheridan be cleaned up before it can be sold to non-federal agencies, may be the reason why the Forest Preserve district's purchase offer and the Fort Sheridan Commission's recommendations are being ignored by the Department of Defense.

Instead, the Department of Defense wants to defer cleanup by keeping most of the site in Federal hands. Although no section of the Fort can be transferred to other federal agencies until HIDD has decided if it its neceded for the homeless. The Department of Defense wants to transfer 142 acres of existing housing, plus 40 acres of land (for potential housing construction) to the halvy and retain over 100 acres for the Army Reserves. These areas contain a number of waste sites, including an entire waste-filled ravine which ends on the lakefront, so that its contents may wash into the lake if crossion takes its full. It now appears that the Army has completed its check for hazardous waste, but the fillinois FPA has not approved it because of differences of opinion about the testing done.

The Department of Defense has not announced what would happen to areas occupied by the Navy or the Reserves if they should again become surplus.

Recently, 120 acres along Sheridan Road, including most of the present golf course, were reportedly assigned to the Veteran's Administration for a cemetery. Therefore, it would be impossible for the Forest Preserve District to utilize golf course income for developing a nature preserve on the remaining 60 acre section of lakefront and the separate 60 acre parade ground for which the Department of Defense apparently still wants an addition \$5—\$10 million! It is unlikely that any other conservation agency could come up with that kind of money, especially since cometery construction activities could be detrimental to the stability and ecology of the ravines and bluffs. Our concern is that the Department of Defense will then be free to sell off this lakefront land to real estate interests.

No occupant has yet been found for the Historic District. However, the Lake County Board is seeking to attract one of the proposed Defense Finance and Accounting Centers to occupy the site. The Institute for Illinois is also interested in placing an environmental research center there, but no funding has yet been obtained.

What can the League do now? We will continue to fight for open space at Fort Sheridan. The League will lobby the Governor and our congressional delegation to:

- Put their full support behind the Forest Preserve District's purchase offer;
- 2) insist on prompt and complete cleanup of the
- request transfer of the site to a local public agency from which the Navy, the Army Reserves and any future occupant of the Historic District could lease their sections;
- provide full public access to the ravines, beach and lakefront; and
- continue funding for the Fort Sheridan Commission's office, which is responsible for finding occupants for the Historic District.

Lake Co. R.E.A.C.H. Needs Volunteers To Assist With Recycling Training Program

Volunteers are trained to assist businesses, schools, churches, banks, shops, garges, etc., in developing sound environmental prachees in regards to waste reduction, lessening use of toxic substances, using products made of recycled materials, and recycling.

This is a positive educational program of no cost to the participants. The certified model is affirmed publicly for its success in meeting the standards. In the first year of model community in Lake County, over 30 models have been certified with more in progress. In District 2, we have four certified with 4 others beginning. #### LWV-LC Board News

The Lake County League Board has chosen its 1992-1993 Action Priorities as: Solid Waste, Transportation and Criminal Justice.

Board Member Lauren Gash, has been selected by the Democratic party to run for State Representative in District 60 against Charles Cardella. In keeping with the League's nonpartisan political policy, she has resigned from the Board.

#### Compost Testimony Given

LWV-LC gave testimony last month on the renewal of the permit for the compost site in Lakewood Forest Preserve. Our statements concluded that although there is no immediate harm, pesticides and their products as well as other chemicals are building up at the site. This will probably affect the ecology of the site and the safety of the compost in the future.

The testimony was based on our Forest Preserve and composting positions plus the literature research of two Northwestern graduate students of Environmental Engineering. For more information, call Bervi Florm at 945-1937.

#### 1992 Legislative Priorities

This agenda is intended to be flexible to respond to public, League and legislative support and interest and will depend on available League volunteer and lobbyist time, legislative expertise and financial resources. These priorities also reflect input from local Leagues.

The League is concerned about the state's inability to pay its bills as well as the disproportionate tax burden that poor families pay. Still unresolved are two critical areas: how to achieve equitable and adequate education funding and how to achieve adequate funding for human services.

- Begin discussion of a constitutional amendment for a graduated income tax.
- Suport initiatives to make the Illinois income tax more progressive.
   Support school funding reform to reduce financial disparities
- Maintain current funding levels in League priority areas such as
- education, services to children, the environment, mental health and public aid.

#### Children and Families - Support for:

- · Coordinated and adequate state services (DCFS, Juvenile Court, etc.)
- · Early intervention programs for children at risk
- · Family and medical leave.

#### Environment — Support for:

- · Drafted household hazardous waste legislation
- Wetlands protectin and measures to reduce solid waste and pesticide use.

#### Health Care - Support for:

- · Improved access to health care.
- Measures to implement the new national League position in Illinois.

#### Reproductive Choice

. Opposition to restrictions on a woman's right to choose.

#### Third Level Priorities

The League will also work on selected legislation on social policies, mental health, gun control, elections and sexual harassment.

#### School Funding Lawsuit Update

The wheels of justice grind slowly. On February 28th, Cook County Circuit Court Judge O'Brien heard oral arguments on the State's motion to dismiss the school funding lawsuit. On March 26th, he held a conference in chambers with the counsel for the plaintiffs (the school districts challenging the constitutionality of the school funding system) and the defendants (basically, the state). The judge indicated that he would reconsider the plaintiff's request to amend their complaint because, in the event of an appeal, he did not want the Appellate Court to reverse his decision merely on technical grounds.

The plaintiffs were to present amended complaint within one week for review by the Attorney General. If the Attorney General. If the Attorney General does not object to the amendments, the judge will presumably allow them; if there are no objections, the judge will hear and rule on them. In any event, a decision on the merits as to the motion to dismiss should be forthcoming shortly.—
But whatever the judge rules, we are a very long way from a final decision.

#### Gun Control Law A Success

As of January 1992, a back-ground check is required for all firearm purchasers in Illinois. Gun dealers call a hotline for updated information about the would-be purchaser. Thus far, about 100 people each month have been dented a new gun purchase because of events that have taken place since thier Firearm Owner's identification Cards were issued (for example, arrest for alcohol or drug abuse, or robbery, and so on). In addition, about 20 people each month have been found to have warrants out for their arrest.

## Early Intervention For Children At Risk

Jean LeBlond and Judy Rossmiller

In less than a generation, the small children of America will be adults. Marian Wright Edelmann, President of the Children's Defense Fund, said "In twenty years, children born today will either be working for us, living with us, or shooting at us." Consider the following statistics about today's pre-schoolers:

1 in 4 is poor

1 in 4 is raised by a single parent 1 in 5 is at risk of becoming a teen parent

1 in 6 has no health insurance

1 in 7 is at risk of dropping out of school.



Neglected children become tomorrow's troubled adolescents and society's problems. Research tells us that the first 3-5 years are the most crucial in a child's development. Early intervention is about preventing negative outcomes, about intervening early, when the most benefit can be obtained.

We all pay dearly for violent crime, school failure, and teenage childbearing. It is expensive to support prisons and unproductive citizens. It is a disgrace to live in fear of violence and crime on the streets. Early intervention is a bargain compared with the price of child abuse, drug addiction, school dropout, teen pregnancy, welfare payments and prison. We must pay now or pay later.

The cost of caring for our children may seem high now, but failure to do so will cost much more. Most important to some of us is the cost of preserving human potential. There are many cost effective, successful programs and policies that work in preventing negative outcomes for human lives, but we are not doing what it takes to fulfill these needs for children. To meet these needs will require leadership and financial support from federal, state and local government, as well as businesses and individuals. We will all benefit from this investment.

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

# **Program Reviews**

#### September

On September 30, members and guests were given insight into tactics used by politicians to carry out "smear" campaigns. Examples of negative campaigning in the recent election were shared by Bruce Felknor, Mr. Felknor also provided interesting historical perspective on this topic. Mr. Felknor, an editor for Encyclopedia Britannica and author of the recently published book, Political Mischief gave a highly thoughtprovoking presentation and shared insight on candidate evaluations based on their publicity practices.

#### October

The October meeting on "Children at Risk" was presented by Jean LeBlond, long time advocate for children at risk and chairperson for the State of Illinois LWV Farly Intervention for Children at Risk Committee

Children at risk are defined as those who are likely to suffer severe problems later in life if the cycle of disadvantage and dependence in which they are a part is not broken. Risk factors include: poverty, a chemically addicted parent, divorce, and child abuse.

According to Ms. LeBlond, the first priority is to make high quality, well-coordinated and appropriate services available very early in a child's life.

#### November

A view of health care in the 21st century was given to the League November 18 by Joan Sayre, manager of the Hospital Products Division of Abbott Laboratories

According to Ms. Savre, the medical scene is rapidly changing due in part to the aging of the population. accelerated use of high technology. and pressures for cost-cutting.

At present, the number of hospital beds in use is declining, vielding to out-patient care, preventative medicine, and in-home care. These changes are made possible by the introduction of medical technology which allows less invasive medical procedures. Also contributing are the development of new drugs, sophisticated prenatal care, timely intervention for older patients, genetic engineering, and the use of microscopic implants to administer medication.

#### December

Our holiday luncheon meeting on December 9 honored Ginnie Frederick, who this year celebrates her fiftieth year of membership in our League. Ginnie becomes the fourth Honorary Member of our League, joining the ranks of Eleanor Beidler, Jan Ullman, and Esther Velde

Ginnie entertained us all with remembrances of the early days of our League as well as many anecdotes from her life in public office.

#### October 7, 1992

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# The League Continues Efforts To Preserve Fort Sheridan

Alice Sievert, Fort Sheridan Study Chair

The Fort Sheridan Commission disbanded in November 1992, citing frustration that all of its recommendations had been ignored by the Department of Defense (DOD). The DOD is now negotiating with a developer to trade much of the Fort's north acreage and the Historic District for a small parcel of land near the Pentagon for a future Army museum.

With the hope that the election results had alerted Washington to the electorate's unhappiness at having its needs ignored, we sent a letter and a 17-page packet of background information to President Clinton. Copies of these, accompanied by cover letters, went to all members of the Illinois Congressional delegation, Vice-President

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The following is a summary of Judy Berliant's briefing on North Chicago School District #187 from the LWV of Lake County.

#### North Chicago School District #187: The Current State of Affairs

There are about 900 school districts in Illinois and more than 100 of them are on the State's Financial Watch list. Sixteen are being supervised by the state and must produce a balanced budget for the 1993-94 school year. Individual school districts can decide to dissolve if they feel they cannot provide adequate services to their students. If that happens, the surrounding districts must absorb the students (North Chicago has about

4,000 students). North Chicago would present a plan to the Regional Superintendent of Schools who would decide how to draw the lines. The seven school districts that could legally absorb these students are Waukegan, Lake Bluff Elementary, Lake Forest High School, Oak Grove Elementary in Green Oalso, Libertyville High School, Woodland Elementary in Gurnee, and Warren High School in Gurnee.

The primary causes of North Chicago's financial woes are:

- Low assessed valuation. Great Lakes Naval Training Center pays no property tax and about 2,000 students are from the station.
- Insufficient Federal impact aid for Great Lakes Naval Base children.
- 3. Failure of the state to make a promised payment because the district corsolidated two years ago. In addition, the state did not pay any school district one of ist 1992 payments. The state is funding only a percentage of their categorical aid, so all schools are underpaid for special education and bussing.

Legislation has been introduced by both Barkhausen and Frederick. Sen. Barkhausen's bill would create a special category in the state school aid formula just for District #187 and could produce \$3 million. Rep. Frederick's bill would require the Illinois State Board of Education to loam money to North Chicago and other military-teaching schools when their payments from the Federal government are late (source: Chicago Tribune, 1/30/93).

John Maitland and Art Berman, the co-chairs of the Illinois School Funding Task Force, are going to introduce a package of bills which would increase the foundation level from \$2,500 to \$4,000, increase the weighting for disadvantaged children, and alter the property taxes.

Program. Topics discussed were Joan Sayre's talk on National Health Care in the year 2001, Ginnie Fredericks' presentation at the annual luncheon, the inter-league Health Care program and the biannual county convention.

Fundraiser. Joan Barrus said the "non-event" letter will have virtually no associated expenses. The December minutes were corrected and approved.

The treasurer's report was approved. A donation to the education/action group for early childhood intervention: Kids First Network was suggested.

Membership. Bonnie Cross reported that there are 82 paid members to date. The target date for the directory is February 1, 1993.

Program. February 17 is the joint program with AAUW on gender bias in education. March 17 is the coffee with local city officials. School Board Consolidation Study, Barbara Garrity and Iudy Grisamore have joined the study Lorraine reported disturbing financial developments in the North Chicago District #187 which could completely change the conclusions of the consolidation study. The state-promised funds for consolidation of District #187 were \$700,000 short. The impact aid from the Federal government for Great Lakes Naval Base children is insufficient-there is little or no industry to add to the tax base and some mis-management of funds has been suggested as reasons for financial woes. A similar situation in Highwood schools resulted in a merge with the Highland Park school district. The Regional Board of School Trustees might like to see North Chicago merged also with a more fiscally sound district. Lake Forest/Lake Bluff would seem one of the likely three candidates. The next meeting of this group is February 23 at 7:30 p.m. at Gorton.

Action. It was decided that several Board members should meet with Ginny Fredericks to determine her position on the situation with North Chicago School District #187.

Lake County Update. Lynn James announced that the Kirk Players will be performing March 5 and 6 to raise funds for the county league. The bi-annual county convention will be at Gorton on May 5 and is expected to have 40 attendees.

New Business. The student govemment day will be held in April.

# City Managers speak to league about past accomplishments and future initiatives

On Wednesday, March 17, Leaguers gathered at Gorton to hear the managers of Lake Bluff and Lake Forest talk on current issues facing the two communities.

#### Lake Bluff

Ken Long, interim manager of Lake Bluff, discussed recent changes in the village. A new manager, Kent Street, has been appointed, as well as a new treasurer and two attorneys. A new president will be chosen between candidates Vera Schreiber and Fred Wacker, Jr. at the April 20 election.

Past accomplishments mentioned were a state-of-the-art building to house fire and police departments, the re-vamping of the central business district, the completion of the Lake County Water Agency and general improvement in flood control for the village.

Challenges that lie ahead for the new manager include helping the village board to clarify its goals and to work well together, the completion of a new village plan, improved communication between citizens and the board, and taking a close look at the town's fiscal integrity and financial controls.

#### Lake Forest

Robert Kiely, manager of Lake Forest, mentioned the coming election on April 20 for mayor (Rhett Butler, running unopposed) and four aldermen, three of which will be contested. There will also be referendums on a leash law and term limits.

Lake Forest has embarked on an extensive program to maintain its infrastructure. Recent accomplishments include a new train station near Everett and Waukegan roads and a new fire station for the same area.

Three city parking lots will be renovated this summer. New construction will occur at the Deerpath Inn, Jewel Food Store and the former Lakeside Food site. Also, storm sewers and water mains will be renovated in certain areas over the next several years.

Mr. Kiely sees a need for Lake Forest and Lake Bluff to look at problems regionally, and to increase their planning with other communities. Route 41 will be expanded and Lake Forest should try to be in on the planning process. The city is also concerned about the future of Great Lakes Naval Training Center and the North Chicago school system. There will be an important informational meeting about Fort Sheridan April 14, 7:30

It was a pleasure to hear two such informed gentlemen speaking on matters of concern to all of us.

The Fair is targeted for families at or below the poverty level. We are planning to serve 1,350 children ages 0-14 years.

Children will be given inoculations, physical exams and preschoolers can have hearing, speech, and vision screenings.

Parents will be asked to pay \$5 per inoculation, but if they are unable to afford \$5, the Health Department will waive payment.

In addition, school age children will be given school supplies and pre-schoolers will be given an age-appropriate item for home.

Child care and entertainment will be provided while children are waiting for services. Parents will be screened and referred to agencies who will be represented at the Fair.

Other possible services include dental cleaning and sealing, a reading book give-away, and voter registration. Other ideas include a clothing give-away and donated haircuts and shoes.

All this is going to take a lot of work and preparation. The Health Department is going to take all of the screenings and health care. A league steering committee has determined the need for following committees:

- Site selection, set-up, and layout of the building
- & Transportation to the site
- ☆ Volunteers for the day/ refreshments for participants
- ☆ School supply and book donations
- ☆ Fundraising for school supplies, etc. (with the Health Department)
- Children's agency contacts (with the Health Department)

- & Child care and entertainment/education programs
- Publicity (Health department will do photocopying and mailings)
- ☆ Voter registration

#### FORT SHERIDAN LIPDATE & ACTION PLAN

At the August 18, 1993 public meeting of the newly established Fort Sheridan John Planning Committee (The Joint Committee), the Equitable Real Estate Co., and its local developer, John Buck Co. presented their development goals for Fort Sheridan. Helic draft proposal incorporated goals agreed to in principle by the Joint Committee, which consists of delegates from the 3 adjoining communities and the County - such as approximate municipal boundaries, a public golf course and club house, and some public access to the lake front and runnines.

However, several very serious concerns remain, which we will bring up at public hearings to be held at the Moralne Hotel on Thursday, August 26th, at 7:00 p.m. and again on Saturday, August 28th at 10:30 a.m.:

- The Army still wants payment of full market value from the Forest Preserve District for the north open space that is planned for a public golf course/(park?), even though the Dept. of Interior recommended transfer at 100% public benefit discount
- The special legislation for the land swap with Equitable, which the Army wants to attach to the Defense Authorization Bill in fall 1993, in order to by-pass Base Closure Law process, contains no provisions for protecting the Historic District.
- The Equitable wants 575 600 housing units, with 105 new and 40 existing single-family homes planned for Lake Forest and 430 multi- and 30 single-family in Highland Park and Highwood. This would cause the following problems:
  - a. 105 new \$ 500,000 (large?) single family homes plus garages, drive-ways, etc. for existing officer homes, would be wedged along or between wooded sections in the Historic bistrict and south of the present air strip, leaving room for a golf course but apparently not much else. Lot sizes, set backs from ravines and blufts, and bulk of homes have not been specified.
  - b. The developer committed only to preserving the Tower block and barracks along the parade ground for 80 - 100 housing units, which leaves the rest of the Historic District without safeguards against demolition and inbuilding.

- It puts an inequitable tax burden on Highland Park-Highwood schools, which would lack the higher tax revenues from single tamily hornes, and would heave to subsidies the education of children from Nays housing. They would also need to construct an additional school, but there is no provision to set aside land for the school and for any playing fields. 

# FORT SHERIDAN UPDATE

The fate of a compromise plan for the reuse of Fort Sheridan now rests with the Secretary of Defense and Congress. The legislation was introduced by Senators Simon and Warner as an amendment to the Defense Authorization Bill, was challenged by Senators Nunn and Glenn of the Senate Armed Services Committee, and now awaits the outcome of a review by Secretary of Defense Aspin.

The amendment principally authorizes a land trade between the Equitable and the Army, with Equitable required to pay to the Army the amount by which the appraised value of the Fort Sheridan land exceeds that of the Equitable's Virginia land. It also requires the essentially cost free transfer of 2504 acres to the Forest Preserve is net. Unfortunately, it lacks sufficient protection for the Historic District, would permit the Army to require additional payments or services from the Forest Preserve District, and emphasizes the Equitable's Conceptual Land Usage Plan which the Fort Sheridad point Planning Committee did not fully support, but adopted only with many caveats.

The League, the Advocates for the Public Interest in Fort Sheridan, the Open Lands Project and the Sierra Club have been lobbying our legislators and the Department of Defense to modify the wording of the legislation so as to protect the Historic District from inbuilding and dismantling, and to give the surrounding communities, rather than the developer, the final say on changes in Historic District structures. These changes could not be made in time to meet the deadline for introducing the amendment, but we have some assurance that this modification will be introduced if the legislation gets to a House-Senate conference committee.

The League also lobbied Senator Simon and the Secretary of Defense for modification of the conceptual land use plan developed by Equitable, so as to prevent the proposed construction of new housing along the north side of Hutchinson Ravine, on part of the Parade Ground, and between lake-front officers' homes. We also asked that no further services or payments be required from the Forest Preserve District.

Even if the proposed legislation stalls, the three communities and the county have succeeded in forging an agreement on the future ownership and reuse of Fort Sheridan – something which had eluded them for a decade. Their representatives on the Fort Sheridan Joint Planning Committee agreed on land use, annexation boundaries, and on keeping the entire Fort in the Highland Park – Highwood school districts where it had been for over 100 years. Although some homes on the Fort would have a Lake Forest address, students and school revenues from real estate taxes, would go to Districts 112 and 113. This would offset the estimated \$2 million annual shortfall caused by inadequate federal impact aid for students living on the military sections. Next year's per student impact aid is estimated at \$200, compared to elementary and high school costs of \$9,200 and \$11,500.

Illinois' revenue system is outdated and structurally flawed: it is unable to grown in line with the economy. In fact, since 1979 growth in the state's general revenue funds has generally failed even to keep up with inflation. No matter what level of services and funding lawmakers agree to one year our current tax system ensures that without a tax increase we won't be able to fund the same level the next year.

Since 1994, the state legislature has enacted a series of stop-gap measures to help meet expenses, yet listinois began FY 94 owing 3.17 billion; its pension systems are underfunded by nearly \$13 billion; its credit rating has dropped, resulting in higher borrowing costs; and it is under costly court orders to provide services. At the local level, property owners are reeling from escalating pressure on the property tax. League action efforts on a multitude of state issues -education, health care, child welfare, environment -have been stymied by inadequate state funds. It is time for comprehensive tax reform.

# Fort Sheridan Update . . .

The land swap between the Army and Equitable Co. has been killed or sidelined (?) by the Department of Defense, because it avoided steps 3 through 5 in the disposal process for closed bases; Step 3 - Offer site to agencies serving the homeless, Step 4 - offer to state and local governments, # Step 5 - Public Auction.

However, we are left with some hope that the priorities of local communities would be considered. Undersecretary of Defense Deutsch wrote to Sensle Armed Services Committee Chairman Sam Nunn that current base closure procedures would still allow our Forest Preserve District to obtain 250 acres at a public benefit discount - though he did not specify if would obe a 100% discount and if it would apply to use of part of the site as a golf coupt to use of part of the site as a golf concernant before covenants for the Historic District, but made covenants for the Historic District, but made covenants for in place before disposal of the site.

Matters are further complicated by the number of agencies involved in the disposal of Fort Sheridan, so that local communities have found

it almost impossible to determine whom to contact and who has the ultimate responsibility for decisions.

As a result, the Landmark Preservation Council of Illinois, the League, and other organizations will seek to have a Transition Coordinator appointed who could guide our communities through the maze. Such ombudsmen for local communities have already been appointed for bases tagged in the more recent round of closures.

In the mean time, we will continue to encourage our senators to work toward local preferences for reuse of the Fort.

We also have to work toward passage of the Forest Preserve District Referendum of November 2, since part of the funds would be used toward up front costs for Fort Sheridan. Moreover, passage of the bond Issue would help to emphasize to the Army that we are willing to pay for development of that site.

# Fort Sheridan Update . .

The land swap between the Army and Equitable Co. has been killed by the Department of Defense and the Congressional Armed Services Committees. because it avoided three steps in the base closure process. Nevertheless, we are left with some hone that the oriorities of local communities would be considered, based on a letter from Under Secretary of Defense Deutsch to Senate Armed Services Committee Chairman Sam Nunn, which states that current base closure procedures would still allow our Forest Preserve District to obtain 250 acres at an (unspecified) public benefit discount, and supports (but does not promise) protective covenants for the Historic District. The contents of this letter may make it easier to convince our elected representatives to continue to pressure the Army into honoring local preferences for reuse of the Fort.

Recently the Army, (via its Headquarters at Fon McCoy, Wisconsin, which now is responsible for the vacant and motiballed Fort Sheridan Property, decided to rehance the lines of communications with local communities. In early November, they sent two Public Affairs/Community Relations representatives from the U.S. Army Environmental Center in Washington to interview area residents and public officials who had been active in planning for the future use of Fort Sheridan. The purpose of these interviews was to determine the best means of disseminating information about the Fon Sheridan environmental activities and to begin to establish two-way communication between the Army and the oublice.

Shirley Williams, Beryl Flom and Alice Sievert from the LWVLC met with these two representatives. In addition to responding to their questions about the best methods and locations of presenting environmental clean-up information to the public, we learned that copies of reports on environmental assessment and on clean-up proposals will be placed in a lew public libraries at least one month prior to public hearing(s) that will be scheduled on these subjects in our area.

Bent was subsequently contacted by one of the interviewers with answers to some of our questions. He gave the names and phone numbers of the recently appointed Transition Coordinator for Ft. Sheridan and of Fort McCoy personnel with responsibility for environmental matters. He also reassured us that the vacant Historic District buildings were being heated.

From other sources Beryl learned that the Army still has not completed its listing of the various Historic Landmark Building and its assessment of their state of preservation and importance, even though the base disposal process now appears to be at the stage where agencies for the homeless may submit proposals for use of some of the buildings.

We will continue to urge our representatives to insist that protective covenants be in place before any part of the Historic District is transferred to any new owner, and will urge the three communities and the County to provide stronger local control on development at the Forb ty reaching agreement on zoning for the Fort, including the land requested by the Forest Preserve District. Now that passage of the Forest Preserve District Referendum has given local communities a stronger hand in negotiatives, a repeat request for a public benefit discount for transfer of 256 acres to the Forest Preserve District should be submitted promptly, and should include a man and exact describing to the land requested.

# School Articulation Discussed

On Wednesday November 10th the LWV LE/LB hosted a discussion between interested citizens and the leaders of our K-12 school community specifically Dr. Bobert Kessler (District 115) Dr. Arthur Jones (District 67), Dr. Mark Van Clay (District 65), Jim Marks (Lake Forest County Day School), Joan Branstield (St. Mary's School) and Sister Calude Demoustier (Woodlands Academy) The discussion began with introductory remarks from each participant about what articulation has meant to them in its beginning stages. Everyone reported a year positive reaction and for a variety of reasons. Articulation has opened lines of communication and has provided others support in specific instances. The hottom line is that all agree that this collaboration is necessary because it is and will be good for the students of our communities

To date several things are set in place:

- A commitment of time and creative energy to plan regular meeting dates and a planned agenda among the present school leaders.
- A public statement of intent and purpose of articulation has been composed.
- There is an articulated K-12 curriculum that is similar and complementary
- A unified calendar, including holidays and Institute

  Days has been adopted.
- There is work that has begun towards providing a

common focus of training and development of staff. Specifically, an Institute day in March will include teachers and personnel from all schools represented on this panel. This day could be the catalyst for a Fall Institute Day with more teacher sharing and collaboration.

 At present, certain groups of teachers and personnel from Districts 65, 67, and 115 meet regularly. A few mentioned were music teachers, special education teachers, those involved with the gifted and talented programs, and the business managers.

Audience questions centered around how and when can we expect this articulation process to touch the lives of teachers more directly in the area of curriculum and how will t benefit the students. The ensuing discussion revealed efforts in the area of Language Arts where District 65, 67, and 115 have shared grade level objectives.

This process is not quick, sometimes may not look efficient, but our leadership is committed to getting answers to questions in a thoughtful and patient approach that may involve 2-3 years. It also seems that our present school leadership is willing to talk, listen and share their ideas and future developments in this collaborative process.



- Recent state budgets have been balanced by putting off paying bills. Illinois began this fiscal year
  owing more than \$1 billion.
- The state's credit rating has been downgraded twice since 1991. As a result, more state dollars go to
  pay interest and less are available for services.
   Illinois' 5 pension funds are underfunded by nearly \$13 billion. Without funding changes, they will
- Illinois' 5 pension funds are underfunded by nearly \$13 billion. Without funding changes, they will
  begin to go bankrupt by 2008. This could force a major tax increase just for monthly payments to
  retired teachers and state employees.
- Chronic underfunding of education, children and family services, and mental health has resulted in
  court orders and pending lawsuits that could force Illinois to spend billions more.
- Current underfunding of such services as education, preventive health care and job training is increasing the present and future costs of welfare, law enforcement and medical care.

#### Illinois revenue does not keep pace with the economy.

- Since 1979, Illinois revenues have failed to keep up with the costs of providing existing state services
  and have failed even to keep up with inflation.
- Because Illinois' tax revenues do not grow in line with the economy, nearly annual "emergency" revenue increases have been needed, and we continue to struggle to maintain services.

#### Illinois taxes hit the poor the hardest.

- According to a 1991 study, the poorest Illinois citizens (family of 4, \$14,700 income) pay 16.5% of
  their income in state and local taxes. But the richest Illinois residents (family of 4, \$960,000 income)
  pay only 6% of their income in state and local taxes.
- In fact, Illinois places a greater tax burden on the poor than 46 other states, making its tax system one of the most regressive in the nation.
- The regressivity of our tax system comes from our sales and property taxes, because lower income taxpayers pay a greater share of their income for housing and tangible goods.

#### Fairness affects revenue growth.

- During the 1980s the only substantial income growth in Illinois was for the wealthiest 20% of families.
- A tax system that falls heavily on families whose incomes are shrinking or flat and lightly on families
  whose incomes are growing all but guarantees that state revenues cannot keep up with the economy.

#### A graduated income tax is the solution,

- Currently, our income tax rate is the same for everyone. A household earning \$10,000 a year is taxed
  at the same 3% rate as a household earning \$250,000.
- A graduated income tax can build needed fairness and growth into our tax system, compensating for our regressive sales and property taxes. It could also reduce current overreliance on the property tax.
- The Illinois Constitution requires a flat rate income tax. A constitutional amendment mandating a
  graduated income tax has been introduced in the state legislature. To get on the November 1994 ballot,
  the General Assembly must amortove it by early May.

### Fort Sheridan Update . .

After the Senate rejected the Army - Equitable Life Insurance Co. land swap and the redevelopment proposal for Fort Sheridan, the Fort Sheridan Joint Planning Committee (consisting of officials from the 3 border communities and the Forest Preserve District) half a public meeting on 11/23/93, where:

- the Fort Sheridan Joint Planning Committee passed a resolution supporting the Forest Preserve Districts 1991 plan, which would preserve 299 acres of the Fort for public use as a park, to include the current golf course and parade ground, the beaches, bluffs and ravines. They also voted to continue their joint efforts to plan for redevelopment of the Historic District according to local preferences, with preservation of important structures and with limits on density fails.
- the frustrations of local officials at the conflicting signals issued by the various federal bureaucracies with jurisdiction over Fort Sheridan were clearly evident. The communities decided to track down the key decision maker (if anytt) for the disposal of Fort Sheridan, and to ask for a meeting.
- a proposed amendment to the Base Closure Law, which had been introduced by Senator Pryor, was also discussed. (This amendment has now become law, as part of the Defense Authorization Act. The Act permits the military to convey property to communities or the state at less than fair market value, in order to enhance the economic development of their area. Apparently, transfer would be made to a redevelopment authority set up by local and/or state government. Unfortunately the act does not facilitate such public benefit transfers for one space or historic preservation purposes.)
- the LWV, the Illinois Landmark Preservation Council, and others urged the Committee to (a) again request transfer of the 289 acres to the Forest Preserve District at the 100% public benefit discount recommended on 6/11/93 by the Department of Interior, and (b) insist that restrictive covenants be in place before the transfer of any part of the Historic District from the Army to any new owner. Succeedings are the only effective means of protecting the interiority of the Historico District Buildings and landscape in perpetuity, regardless of future ownership. However, restrictive covenants would reduce the Army's profits from the sale of the site.
- representatives from organizations for the homeless and from the Lake County Affordable Housing Commission stated that they were looking into using some of the Fort's buildings, but that the high costs of maintaining, adapting and operating Landmark buildings would have to be taken into account.

(Note: The Army's report on the condition and significance of existing and potential Landmark buildings at Ford Sheridan is now available at the reference desk of the Lake Forcest Public Library and at the Highwood and Highland Park Libraries. It is entitled "Literature Review, Architectural Evaluation, and Phase I Archeological Reconnaissance of Selected Portions of Forb Sheridan, Illianois Forbardan, Il

On 12/15/93 the Fort Sheridan Joint Planning Committee met in closed session with Army representatives. Apparently they discussed zoning, boundaries, land costs, and the implications of setting up a 3community redevelopment authority. The next public meeting of the Fort Sheridan Joint Planning Committee may be on February 3, 1994; please obtain the date, time and location from the offices of Mr. Klely (Lake Forest City Hall, 234-2600) or Mr. Limard (Highland Park City Hall, 925-1000).

There are now concerns that the Army will oppose the transfer of land to the Lake County Forest Preserve District at the 100% public benefit discount to which it had previously agreed. Therefore, please telephone the mayor and City Council members to urge them to contact the Department of Interior to ask for renewed support for cost-free transfer of the 289 acres to the Forest Preserve District.

# Fort Sheridan Update . .

- A <u>Public Meeting</u> on Reuse of Fort Sheridan will be held by the Fort Sheridan Planning Committee on Thursday, F may include county, and possibly other organizations. Such an authority, permitted by recent legislation, should proving greater local control.
- Advocates for the Homeless will receive a tour of the Fort on Wednesday, February 23, from 9 11 am, followed by a workshop on application procedures from 1 3 pm, This event may also interest advocates of non-subsidized but affordable housing, Shifley Williams, President of the Lake County League, will be attending. ENVIRONMENTAL CLEAN-UP. New logislation has authorized piecemeal clean-up of the Fort, so that clear areas can be transferred to new lowners, Representatives the US and Illinois EPAs and the Base Realignment and Closure (BRAC) Commission are part of the clean-up team. The BRAC representative is Alan Ballett, Environmental Management Division, 2160 South "U Street, Fort MoCop, WI \$4565-5182, Tel. (1609) 388-2100. Mr. Balliett told us that a public meeting, consisting of presentations from the Clean-up Team and requests questions and recommendations from the public is being planned for the near future. There also will be application forms available for a place on the Citizens Restoration Advisory Board (proposed membership of 15-20), which the clean-up team wants to set up. Mr. Balliett will alter us to the meeting date.

THE FATE OF THE HISTORIC DISTRICT. The Advisory Council on Historic Preservation and the Illinois Historic Preservation Agency will soon commence negotiations with the Army on the fate of the Historic District. Obviously, the Army would gain financially by not putting in place protective covenants for the buildings and landscape of this historic landmark, since such covenants tend to decrease the financial gain from its sale.

The Landmark Preservation Council of Illinois (LPCI) would therefore welcome extensive public support for the preservation of the Fort Sherdam Historic District, since that would strengthen the bargaining position of the Advisory Council for Historic Preservation and of the Illinois Historic Preservation Agency, which are the agencies that will be negotiating with the Army about the buildings and landscape to be saved. LPCI is encouraging individuals and organizations to send letters, FAXos or make pirone calls in support of preservation to the parities listed below, and to request becoming and "interested Party". This request should put one on the mailing list for meeting announcements and information about the process. If you have time for only one letter, please send it to Ms. Anne Hasker (the first address on the list) and ask that copies be forwarded to the other two parties.

The Leagues of Women Voters of Lake County and of LF - LB have written to all three parties, summarizing our position on Fort Sheridan and asking to participate as an 'Interested Party' in negotiations for the preservation of the Fort Sheridan Historic District.

Your communications should stress support of a) the preservation of the Fort Sheridan Historic District in its entirely, with no destruction of historic buildings and no inbullding, b) maintenance and rehabilitation of the historic buildings according to the U.S. Department of the Interior Standards and c) having the more historically significant buildings open to public leve. Please also emphasize that protective covenants should be in place before transfer of any part of the Historic District from the Army to a new owner since, without south covenants, there is no assurance that the historic buildings and the integrity of their setting can be preserved under new ownership. You may also want to state support for public benefit transfer to the Lake County Forest Preserve District of the 289 acres of open space areas, ravines, bluffs, lake shore and parade ground which they had requested.

# Fort Sheridan Update - April 1994 . .

Environmental clean-up responsibility for Fort Sheridan has been shifted to a new triumvirate, the Base Realignment and Closure (BRAC) team, which consists of representatives of the U.S. and Illinois EPAs and the Department of the Army.

This BRAC team met in March with local groups interested in Fort Sheridan's fate. Local leagues were represented by Shirley Williams, LUNLC president, and by Diane Lloyd from the LWV of Lake Forest - Lake Butt. The BRAC learn seeks nomination for appointees to a Federally mandated 10-12 beam for Restriction Advisory Board (RAB). The members of this board are to be drawn from among nominees submitted by local public interest groups, governmental bodies, etc., Selection criteria to be used by the BRAC team for determining the composition of the RAB, will be released at a May 4, 1994 public meeting of the BRAC team (the time and location of the RAB, the median will approach a first properties of the Lake Acril.)

The RAB is intended to provide public input early in the clean-up, planning and implementation process. The RAB will bok at Army goals and objectives for clean-up, prioritize clean-up, and get information out to the public.

There are still many unanswered questions about contamination at Fort Sheridan. The Illinois EPA had insisted that the Army pear evaluations were inadequals. The Army is seeking to Fee had had been that the Army pear the seeking the seeking the seeking to remedy this, and their revised findings should be released by June 1994. Our greatest concern is the long and deep Wells Ravine landfill within the Army Reserve and the Navy housing area which runs up to the lake front and through which storm sewers run to the lake. Leachate is draining from this site. The Army's proposed remedies, such as capping, patching, and regrading, are Bickly to be stop-gap, given the erosion rate of the lake front buffs. Excavation may have to be considered but if may be prohibitively expensive, Another concern is the limited depth of clean-up proposed for areas within and adjacent to the present golf course where buried unexploded ordnance has been found.

<u>The Forest Preserve District</u> continues negotiations with the Army for a lease of the Forfs golf course for public use, with the hope of later obtaining the 283 ouer ravine, butf and golf course section. We will urge the Department of Interior to continue to press their recommendation that this land be given to the Forest Preserve District at a 10% public benefit discount,

The Fort Sheridan Planning Committee (i.e. the three communities and the County) reluciantly agreed in Manch to fund 28% and to seek 78% matching Federal funding to hire a staff person who would deal specifically with Fort Sheridan issues. One more redevelopment plan is to be drawn by which may include a), support of a Forest Preserve District park, b) analysis of statisticity of the Historic District buildings for various uses and c), should reflect the needs of local communities. The plan would have to be flexible, because transfer of some buildings to homeless providers may be decided on as late as September 6, 1994. The plan may also include redevelopment proposals for sections of the Fort that may be abandoned by the military, if downsizing confilmes. The noxt public meeting of this committee is April 26, 1994 at 7:30 pm at Highland Park City Hall, 1707 St Johns Avenue. ## WVIIS NATIONAL CONVENTION - PRESIDENT'S REPORT



The 41st National Convention of the League of Women Voters of the United States was held in Washington DC from June 10-15. This was my second convention and every bit as exhausting and inspiring as the first.

The detailed report of convention actions is included in this issue of League Lines. In addition to the formal business of the convention, we heard speeches from First Lady Hillary Rodham Clinton, Attorney General Janet Reno, and the President of the National Council of La Raza, Raul Yzaquirre.

The League of Women Voters Education Fund presented leadership awards to Barbara Jordan, University of Texas professor and former member of Congress (in recognition of outstanding national

leadership that losters great citizen participation in the democratic process); Elizabeth Hanford Dole, President of the American Red Cross (for raising society's sights and elevating its standards through public and nonprosessive emphasizing the rights of women, the disabled and the consumer); the MacNeil/Lehrer Newshour (for increasing awareness of important public policy issues and encouraging citizen participation in the democratic process); and League leader Willie Campbell (for promoting women's rights, addressing global hunger and shaping better communities worldwise, especially through the Overseas Education Fund International). We heard from each of the honores.

We voted against several efforts to change the league name and against program items on deficit reduction, immigration and population impacts on a sustainable future. We attended workshops, training sessions and cauciuses and lobbled on the Hill

We were treated throughout the convention to vignettes from the League's past, anniversary celebration indeas and plans for the future. Perhaps the best news for leaguers in Illinois is that <u>Convention</u> '96 will <u>be</u> held in Chicago. June have a chance to participate.

#### 1994 LWVUS CONVENTION REPORT

#### PROGRAM Current Positions

All LWVUS positions were readopted in each of the four program areas: Government, International Relations, Natural Resources and Social Policy.

The League's position on gun control was amended by adding the following:

The League acknowledges that the U.S. Supreme Court and the lower federal courts have ruled consistently that the Second Amendment confers a right to keep and bear arms only in connection with service in a well resulted militia-known today as the National Guard.

The following position on Violence Prevention was added to the Social Policy area through delegate concurrence:

The LWVUS supports violence prevention programs in all communities and action to support: "public and private development and coordination of programs that emphasize the primary prevention of violence.

\*the active role of governmental and social institutions in preventing violent behavior.

\*the allocation of public monies in governmental programs to prevent violence.

The following position on Early Intervention for Children at Risk was added to the Social Policy area through delegate concurrence:

The LWVUS believes that early intervention and prevention measures are effective in helping children reach their full potential. The League supports policies and programs at all levels of the community and government that promote the well being, encourage the full development and ensure the safety of all children. These include:

\*Child abuse/neglect prevention

\*Teen pregnancy prevention

\*Ouality health care, including nutrition and prenatal care

\*Early childhood education

\*Developmental services emphasizing children 0-3

\*Family support services

\*Violence prevention

Issues for Emphasis

Delegates adopted the three recommended issues for emphasis for 1994-96:

Health Care

Early Intervention for Children at Risk

Crisis in the Community (title amended from Crisis in the Cities)

and added a fourth issue:

Opening Government to Citizens

# 1994 LWYUS CONVENTION REPORT (con't)

#### CROSSROADS

Crossroads motion passed as follows:

Move that delegates request the boards at every level of the organization to work to implement the recommendations in the Crossroads report and request progress reports at Council '93 and Convention' 96 on implementation to date and further steps to be taken.

#### CROSSROADS RECOMMENDATIONS

- The primary focus of activity for most local Leagues should be their work on issues of concern to their community.
- To ensure that adequate resources are available to promote the work of the League at the community level, state and national Leagues should focus their advocacy efforts on significantly fewer issues.
- The program planning process at all levels should emphasize the range of methods available to Leagues in their work to influence public policy.
- To the greatest extent possible, Leagues should make use of standardized concurrence processes.
- The organization should establish a comprehensive computer network linking all Leagues.
- A plan should be developed to move the national League to a three-year cycle.
- Leagues should be encouraged to develop and test new membership categories and innovative procedures for forming new Leagues.

#### BUDGET

The budget as presented, with a PMP of \$19.00 for the next two years, was adopted.

#### BYLAWS

The following three bylaw amendments were adopted:

- 1) allowing chochairs, rather than a single chair, of the nominating committee
- 2) requiring per member payment obligations to be met for voting entitlement at Council
- 3) altering the paid life membership program

#### LOCAL LEAGUE REQUIREMENTS

The requirements for local Leagues were amended as follows:

- The League must have bylaws, the first three articles of which must be consistent with those of the LWVUS. The remaining articles must provide for democratic procedure.
- The League must establish and maintain a nonpartisan policy.
- The League must hold an annual business meeting(s) of the membership.
- 4. The League must hold regular board meetings.
- The League must (contribute to the financial support of the League as a whole) meet its financial obligations to the state and national levels of the League.
- The League must have a plan for membership growth and retention that encourages a membership as diverse as the community.
- Any advocacy policy pursued by the League must be consistent with League principles, positions and policies.


The LWVIL Education Fund, in cooperation with the University of Illinois at Chicago, has initiated a demonstration project to develop strategies to (1) define critical issues in the gubernatorial campaign, (2) expand media coverage of these Issues, and (3) evaluate the impact of greater

issue information on the campaigns, candidates, and voters

The Illinois Voter Project began with a statewide opinion poll shortly before the March primary to determine the issues of greatest concern to the electorate. The top three issues identified were crime, education, and taxes.

The project is now conducting a series of focus groups with Chicago voters and non-voters to clarify the three issues and to, explore participants' views as to possible solutions. The results will be presented to the media and the gubernatorial candidates.

in September, the project will convene two demographically balanced Critizen Agenda Panels who will examine expert witnesses about the three key issues. They will then determine how they believe these problem areas could best be resolved Selected panel members will also be invited to discuss these sissues with the leading gubernatorial candidates in a televised town hall meeting in Cotober.

The "Confrontation Clause Amendment" would change Article I, Section 8 of the Illinois Constitution concerning the rights of the accused in a criminal prosecution by replacing language giving the accused the right." On each the witnesses trace to face" with language giving the accused the right. To be confronted witn the witnesses against him or her."

The "Effective Date of Legislation Amendment" changes the deadline by which the state budget must be approved in order to be immediately effective. That date is now June 30. After June 30, bills approved must have a three-fifths majority in each

chamber to become effective immediately. The amendment changes the deadline from June 30 to May 31.

As you know, there has been much discussion in recent months about term limits and about (riverboat gambing. Neither of these issues will be on the general election bald, but they will return. The League of Women Voters opposes term limits at both the federal and state levels and the Illinois League also opposes riverboat gambling as a solution to the state's financial crisis.

Several copies of the excellent background papers prepared for each of these issues are available in the League mailbox at Gorton. Please help yourself (and make a obstoccopy when only one copy is left).

## Fort Sheridan Update September 1994.

The meetings upon which this report is based were covered by Beryl Flom, Diane Lloyd, and Shirley Williams; Sue Henderson monitored press coverage.

Environmental Clean-up. The appointees to the Restoration Advisory Board (RAB) have not yet been selected from among the persons who were nominated; apparently additional nominees are being sought in an attempt to include members of minority groups. In October, unexploded ordnance located within or near the lakefront bluffs will be detonated with precautions to minimize blast damage, but there still is concern that damage could result to the ecologically sensitive buffs.

Open space. The proposed VA cemetery for Illinois will be located at Joliet Arsenal and not at Fort Sheridan. The Lake County Forest Preserve District, with support from the JPC, and the Department of Interior has applied for 289 acres of the Fort, but the Army has made no decisions yet.

The Historic District. Several scenarios for redevelopment of the Historic District were prepared by J.IR, the consultant to the Joint Planning Committee (JPC). The draft plan which most closely reflected the League's position, retained the existing open space and preserved the historic buildings for residential use without further construction on the site. Three other scenarios showed escalating intensities of inbuilding, principally along the ravines, on the northern part of the parade ground, and near the Nicholson housing area.

The scenario favored by the League, would preserve the open space, and rehabilitate the historic buildings to preserve the historic aspects, while providing 300 residential unliss with modern amenatics. Restoration costs would be an estimated \$22 million. Given these costs, the selling price would have to be lower than that of other lakelront areas, and would range from approximately \$3.3 to \$13.1 million, depending on whether all units could be sold within 5 or within 10 years. Problems with selling the property include inadequate space for parking areas.

The U.S. Department of Education has recommended, and the Army has approved transfer of the gymnasium to Lake Forest College and transfer of Building 1 to the Skokie Valley Youth Symphony Orchestra (Midwest Young Artists).

The Draft Programmatic Agreement of (9/94) between the three partners, i.e. the Army, the National Council on Historic Preservation and the Illinois Historic Preservation Office, which was drawn up at their 8/10/94 meeting, went further toward preserving the Historic Landmark District than the previous draft, but it still had several shortcomings. These included the lack of "cast iron" protection for the Historic District, its landscape and its buildings, in that the Army could still find ways of avoiding the imposition of preservation covenants. The League wrote to all three partners and some members of the JPC, identifying our areas of concern.



Join us for our second brown han lunch and another informative discussion on gun control on November 29 The District 67 Association of Parents and Teachers asked the League to look into our control this fall and this is our local first step.

Finally, the League spoke at the Lake Bluff Village Board meeting on Oct. 24 in favor of the Lake Bluff Open Lands proposal for the Skokie River Preserve and Trail just west of the West Terrace area (south of Route 176 and west of Green Bay Boad) The Village Board was divided on this issue and President Fred Wacker cast the tie-breaking vote in favor of this plan. We based our testimony on our local position.

# Roycealee Wood Honored

League member Roycealee Wood, Assistant Regional Superintendent of Lake County Schools, was named the 1994-95 Partners in Progress recognition recipient. Partners in Progress is a community-school-business partnership which raises funds for the North Chicago schools.

Roycealee, who joined the North Chicago school system in 1964, has been a teacher, college counselor and scholarship director, director of guidance and curriculum, director of personnel and public relations and director of academic affairs.

She has served local, county, state and national organizations. Among them are the Lake County Council of Navy League, National Director of the Navy League, Lake County Urban League Board of Directors, North Chicago Chamber of Commerce and the North Chicago Rotary Club.

Community involvement has also included membership with the First Midwest Bank of North Chicago Advisory Board, the Illinois Prairie Girl Scout Council Advisory Board, YMCA Advisory Board for School Age Programs. the Allendale Association Board of Directors, Bradley Youth & Family Counseling Board and Partners in Progress. ## Update on League Issues . .

#### Affordable Housing



At the last LWV Lake County board meeting, the board extended and claffled the League's land use position by incorporating related league positions at the state and county level. The new wording of the second paragraph of the LWVLC Position on Land Use is: "The League believes that Lake County should plan for adequate supplies of low and moderate income housing. The League urges building affordable housing throughout the county with every community providing a percentage under some kind of fair share plan. Intergovernmental cooperation is necessary." (The League of Women Voters of Lake Forest/Lake Bluff continues to follow the issue of affordable senior housing in Lake Forest.)

#### Term Limits

The Supreme Court has scheduled oral arguments in *U.S. Term Limits v. Thomton* and *State of Arkansas v. Bobbie E. Hill,* for November 29. The former Arkansas League president and current national board member, Bobbie Hill, was the lead plannififf in the term limits case when the Arkansas term limits late was successfully challenged and overturned in court last year. The LWVUS and the LWVEF, as well as the LWV of Washington State (which successfully challenged state term limits on federal legislators) have submitted an amicus brief in opposition to the Arkansas law. (From the October 1994 LWVUS Post-Board Summary)

#### Yorkhouse Road Extension

From the minutes of the October 5 meeting of the Lake County League of Women Voters: "Yorkhouse Road proposed extension and widening: It was agreed that the League would give no testimony as far as this controversy is concerned. While there is an argument environmentally against destruction or damage of the wetlands, Jean Bearnziger pointed out the Lake County has built no new roads in 30 years and that this road is badly needed. Our transportation study verified the county's east-west traffic difficulties, and the need for improvements to the few that are available, as well as new roads where needed. Yorkhouse Road would be a needed direct link to the Waukegan Regional Airport from 1-94 as pointed out in the Lake County Framework Plan concerning transportation, and as included in the City of Waukegan in its Comprehensive Plan. The traffic is here and Lake County is far behind."

# LEAGUE INFLUENCES SWALCO'S UPDATED PLAN

The 1994-99 updated plan of the Solid Waste Agency of Lake County (SWALCO) includes several items from the testimony developed by a LWV of Lake County committee last spring. Specifically, the League comments accomplished the following broad changes plus some wording adjustments:

- 1) integration of the draft update and comments for a final document (5 years ago they kept the two separate)
- requiring haulers in Lake County to offer curbside pick-up for residents in 1-4 housing unit buildings, not just requiring municipalities (which excludes thousands of people who live in unincorporated areas). This concept needs an ordinance from the Lake County Board.
- 3) the formation of a Legislative Committee which will follow and initiate legislation important to Lake County.
- including larger buildings for mandate recycling SWALCO added the requirement for newly constructed large buildings to leave space for recycling collection. This concept needs an ordinance from the Lake County Board.
- 5) targeting construction and demolition debris recycling and reduction

In addition, we concurred with several of their changes such as downplaying waste-to-energy (incineration), supporting volume-based fees, emphasizing reduction as well as the manufacture of goods from recycled materials, emphasizing reduction and recycling at the commercial level, and requiring that curbside recycling be offered since some member communities have not voluntarily added it to their ofly services. — Beryf Flom, 11795.

#### REPORT ON SOLID WASTE IN LAKE COUNTY 10/94

By state law, the Solid Waste Agency of Lake Courty (SWALCO) has to update its plan every five years; they completed this process in the summer of 1994. The update de-emphasizes the use of incineration and emphasizes reduction, recycling and compositing, and landfilling, in that order. It also recommends that Lake County require hauters to offer curbside recycling pick-ups. Wautegan is the largest incorporated area that does not now have a community-wide curbside recycling program.

Meanwhile, SWALCO continues to promote reduction and recycling. Staff is currently planning the first of several "Environomics" sernitars, to be held in Deerfield in January, which will provide businesses the opportunity to learn about the benefits and technical aspects of setting up recycling and waste reduction programs. According to figures in the Lake County Solid Waste Plan, the commercial sector generates more that 50% of our arbade.

At this time, Lake County's waste is deposited in the following landfills: Countryside near Grayslake, Waste Management's Mallard Lake in DuPage Co., and Pheasant Run operated by Waste Management in Bristol, Wisconsin. Browning Ferris Industries' (BFI) landfill in Zion has been closed for about a year due to lack of permitted space.

The Countryside Landfill, formally known as ARF, is located on Rt. 83 between Peterson Rd. and Rt. 137, near Grayslake and Round Lake Park. It was purchased a few years ago by USA Waste Services, Inc. which applied for an expansion of the landfill both laterally and vertically. A hearing board composed of seven Lake Country Board members listened to many days of testimony and public input; they approved the lateral expansions but recommended that conditions be applied to the vertical expansions. The LWVLC did not testify. Due to the unregulated nature of landfilling before the time of the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA), it is feared that materials considered hazardous by today's standards were deposited at ARF prior to 1980, endangering the local ground water supply. USA Waste says that they will install gas and leachate collection pipes in the current landfill to remove accumulated leachage for treatment. Montoring wells will make possible

detection of ground water pollution. USA Waste proposes to put similar leachage collection systems under the north and south lateral expansions before turning to the upward additions planned for the top of the old site. The Lake County Board, concurring with the hearing board, approved the lateral expansions, but decreed that when these have been completed, the vertical expansion over the old site be re-evaluated. This could be more than ten years in the future. The application to expand Countryside Landfill must now be reviewed and approved by the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (IEPA) and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers before work can been.

Round Lake Park is concerned about the number of trucks that will carry garbage along their roads on the way to Countryside. They have worked out an agreement with USA Waste, rerouting some trucks to alleviate noise and road damage.

Meanwhile, agreements between USA Waste and several local entities who will share both the costs and the burdens of the expanding landfill have been reached. USA Waste will pay\*:

to Lake County -- \$25 million

to Round Lake Park - \$1.26 million

to Grayslake -- \$25 million

to Prairie Crossing development + \$4.2 - 6.3 million to Arbor Vista subdivision - \$1.25 million

BFI plans to submit their application to the city of Zion on November 4th to expand their landfill by 75 acres east of the existing landfill. The application will go through the same type of S.B. 172 hearing process as did Countryside. The City of Zion has already annexed the land that BFI wishes to use for this lateral expansion. Meanwhile, SYMALCO is working on the contract with BFI, similar to one already agreed to with USA Waste. Under this proposed contract, BFI would guarantee SYMALCO the use of 8,500,000 cubic yards of disposal capacity over twenty years or 425,000 cubic yards a year; an environmental liability coverage of \$6 million; and the lowest tipping fee charged any customer by the landfill.

SWALCO is now reviewing bids to build an intermediary Processing Facility (IPF) on land in an inclustrial park in Libertyville (R. 1.37 and Rt. 4.5 near the water tenks). They have carefully selected bidders who meet high standards both financially and environmentally. A review committee of SWALCO Board members plus the SWALCO staff are considering bids for both public and private ownership options. An IPF receives recyclables, sorts them, and bales them for shipment to companies who use them in manufacturing new merchandise. By combining all of Lake County's recyclables, the agency can command a better price, making recycling more profitable.

SWALCO had selected a site for a permanent household hazardous waste facility, to be operated jointly with the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (IEPA), but was turned down by the subject village which leared environmental problems. SWALCO felt these concerns were unfounded and is now working on a public relations brochure which would explain the program and process to County residents before another site is selected. Household hazardous waste could be dropped off at such a site one or two days a week and would be picked up by the IEPA once a month. No fong-term storage or spillage would occur. The building would be a temporary unit with traffic consisting mainly of cars.

In December, SWALCO will join with a number of state agencies in sponsoring an agricultural clean sweep day when farmers may drop off unwanted pesticides.

Finally, Wisconsin has passed a law banning the disposal of out-of-state waste from states whose recycling standards do not meet those of Wisconsin and/or which are deemed to have been deficient in landfill capacity over the past several years. According to the formula developed by Wisconsin, Illinois did not have sufficient capacity during one of those years. Since the SWALCO Board feels that this law violates U.S. interstate commerce law, it has become party to a suit against Wisconsin in this matter, filing a mirrulo shelf for clarification of the new Wisconsin law. Thus it may be that SWALCO's garbage will no longer be allowed in the Pheasant Puri Landfill after January 1, 1998.
