

MILLIONAIRE'S BAR IS LOOTED

Nab Thieves with His 25 Year Old Scotch

Burglary charges were made by Lake Forest police Friday against four Chicago men accused of stealing 12 cases of assorted liquors and four slot machines from the home of Col. Robert H. Morse, millionaire retired chairman of Fairbanks, Morse & Co., machinery manufacturers.

Police Chief Alex Brebner said the four entered the 20 room Morse mansion at 1299 Knollwood circle by breaking a rear door and took the liquors and machines from a basement recreation room.

Drink 25 Year Old Scotch

They loaded the liquors and machines into a small sedan the police said they had stolen earlier in Chicago. They had started sampling some 25 year old scotch whisky on the trip back to Chicago before they were halted by Deerfield Police Lt. Glenn Koets and Policeman Edward Patten at Waukegan and Deerfield roads at 2-a. m.

Lt. Koets said he stopped the car because there was no tail light. When he questioned the occupants, however, he found them "glowing" under the influence of the millionaire's whisky.

A call to Col. Morse's home disclosed that he was vacationing in Florida.

Chief Brebner said Walter

Cheass, 42, of 1659 N. Francisco av., one of the four seized, apparently had plotted the burglary Thursday when he delivered furniture by truck to the Morse home.

Machines to Be Returned

Chief Brebner said the liquor and the machines would be returned to Col. Morse.

Held with Cheass are Angel Pagan, 23, of 2010 Schiller st.; Luis Santiago, 35, of 1624 N. Wolcott av.; and Angelo Santiago, 19, of 1562 Milwaukee av., no relation. The three, who are Puerto Ricans, made statements in Spanish. They and Cheass were held to the grand jury, each on \$5,000 bond, by Police Magistrate G. M. Bax.
