




Dedication

We presented our Junior Class Play, "Meet Me In St. Louis", which went over the top, under the direction of Mrs. T. A. Knotts and Mr. Gay Cox. We sponsored the Mr. and Miss Red Devil contest. It was hard working but a very successful year under the leadership of Mrs. Phoebe Carpenter Engle and Mr. Gay Cox. For the year we elected the following officers: President, George Pease; Vice President, Peggy Monroe; Secretary, Barbara Jo Cunningham; Treasurer, Dick Laughlin.

At last forty-eight members reach their last and final year in high school. We are happy for the senior privileges such as the front seats in assembly, skip day, a week off at the close of school and Class Night. We presented the Christmas Play "Light Competition", directed by Mrs. Elinore Hutchinson and James C. Kessel. With Peggy Monroe as Thespian president, we helped launch the first Little Kanawha Festival in cooperation with eight other schools. One of our football players, Kenna Rardin, make All-State class B Football team. Maree Fleming from speech class won both the District and Sectional Legion Oration Contest. Bonnie Westfall represented Ravenswood High School in the "Spring Fashion Parade" at Parkersburg. The following officers were elected: President, Dick Laughlin; Vice President, Maree Fleming; Secretary, Mary Hall; Treasurer, Kenna Rardin.


Speech

THESPIANS HOLD DRAMA FESTIVAL







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
