


RECOVERING FROM BATTLE WOUNDS



Sgt. Gordon H. Walck

A message from the War Department that Sgt. Gordon H. Walck received a bullet wound in the forearm of the right arm was received by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Norman O. Walck of 328 East Chestnut street. Further information from members of his company was that the injury happened April 22 and that he was operated on and received treatment in two different hospitals in Germany and later transferred to a hospital in England where according to the government report he is making normal improvement.

Sgt. Walck is a member of Company "A" of the 926th Signal Bn. T. A. C. of the First Army which supported the 9th Air Force in the communication system and was chief of a squad of typewriter operators of this department. He entered the service on February 12, 1942 and received his training at Fort McClellan, Ala., New Orleans, La., and Birmingham, Ala., along with other points in the South. He went overseas in May 1943, landing in England. He was assigned to the 8th Air Force communications in which he saw service for about one year and at this time was placed in the 8th Air Force of the Tactical Air Command. He was in the "D" day invasion of Nor-

mandy in France, Belgium and Germany.

He is a member of the Christ Lutheran Church and Luther Bible Class, a graduate of the Hazleton High School and was prominent in basketball activities at the local YMCA. In civilian life he was employed as a plumber by Richard Walck's Sons.

A brother Cpl. Richard D. Walck is with the Seventh Station Hospital in northern Italy. He also saw service in the North Africa invasion and has been overseas 32 months. Both entered the Army together.
