Well, Erie used to have a military museum. It was a World War One Museum. But then the guy who owned it, closed it or moved it or, or something happened to it. Why why Broomfield? Well, it needed to be somewhere. And I think it was the fact that you had six residents here, five of whom are veterans, who were very dedicated to their vision of creating something that would honor their service and the service of everybody that they served with in Korea and World War Two. I think their vision enabled the project to get off the ground. And like a lot of projects, it expanded from the original vision. I think theirs was, let's just pay homage to the Broomfield veterans; if Boulder wants a veterans museum, let them build theirs. If Pueblo wants a veterans museum, let them build theirs. We're building the Broomfield Veterans Museum. And I think for a long time, that was their focus. And as other people came in, as

officers of the museum and directors, the vision expanded to what it is today. And I tell people, you know, it's called the Broomfield Veterans Museum or the Veterans Museum of Broomfield, but it's really the Colorado Veterans Museum. And there's no other museum in Colorado that does what we do. They do portions of it, you know, like Wings Over The Rockies, their focus is on aviation. And that's great. But they don't want to get involved with the Navy or the Marines or the Army. It's strictly aviation. And I think we're a little bit more broader in what we encompass here. And I think that's what makes us special.
