Sunday, February 16, 1958, is the date of the dedication of the new Broomfield post office. This event marks a milestone in the growth of Broomfield, and in a personal way, the dedication marks a milestone in the lives of Mr. and Mrs. Miles Crawford.

Miles Crawford has been postmaster of the Broomfield post office for the past 13 years, and Mrs. Crawford started working in the post office as clerk seven years ago. When Miles started his duties as postmaster, he served fifty families in Broomfield and approximately 240 families on the rural route. At the present time, approximately 700 families in Broomfield are served and 325 families are served on the rural route.

Miles Crawford was born in Broomfield, the oldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Crawford. His sister, now Mrs. Dora Karg, and his brother, H. J. Crawford, both make their home in California. Miles attended grammar school in Broomfield, but as his family spent their winters in California, he finished grade school there. He attended college for one year at Fort Collins A & M. His father was postmaster in Broomfield in 1898. He was an apiarist and Miles also followed his footsteps in this vocation, keeping bees here for many years, and still has a number of bees at different locations in this area.

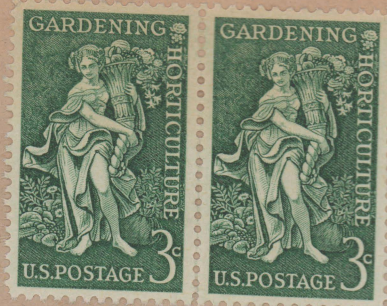

## Stamp Honors Garden Leader

The first commemorative stamp of 1958 will be placed on sale March 15 at Ithaca, N. K. This 3-cent Gardening and Horticulture issue will feature a figure emblematic of the bountiful earth, holding a horn of plenty, and surrounded by flowers, fruits, vegetables and shrubs. A rose and a columbine, two of the most popular flowers in the U. S. appear in the upper right-hand corner.

The new stamp is to be printed in green, in a vertical format, and in standard commemorative size. Initial printing will be 120 million. March 16, the stamps are to be generally on sale at Post Offices throughout the United States.

March 15 marks the 100th anniversary of the birth of Liberty Hyde Bailey. Release of the commemorative will be in conjunction with a centennial celebration in his honor sponsored by Cornell University in Ithaca.

Dr. Bailey taught at Cornell from 1888 to 1951, serving as Professor of Horticulture and later as Dean of the L. H. Bailey Hortorium. He wrote 41 books in the fields of horticulture and botany, Seven in the broader field of agriculture, and 15 in the fields of rural sociology and philosophy. His works continue to exert a marked influence on the millions of Americans who earn their livelihood from the land, or who derive pleasure from gardening. Stamp collectors desiring first-day cancellations of this stamp may send addressed envelopes to the Postmaster at Ithaca, N. Y., together with money order remittance to cover the cost of stamps to be affixed. Outside envelopes to the Postmaster should be endorsed "First Day Covers, Horticulture Stamp." Addresses on return covers to be returned should be positioned low enough to allow for vertical format stamps.

### PARK COMMITTEE FORMED SUGGESTIONS WELCOMED

The Explorer Scouts are anxious to have a park in their home town! According to Mr. Kenneth Howell, an Explorer Scout leader here in Broomfield, the boys' enthusiasm is high, but there is a need for adult cooperation. In an attempt to get this help for his scouts, Mr. Howell called a meeting last Wednesday evening at his home. He invited representatives from all the organizations in Broomfield. At that time, Mr. Howell, Mr. Wes Koenig, representing Kiwanis, and Mr. Francis Wright from the Civic Association outlined their on methods of obtaining a well planned park which would be a place of recreation for all age groups. They stressed the need for a master plan which should be drawn by experts and approved by the citizens of Broomfield, the Turnpike Land Co., and The Boulder County Commissioners. It was decided that this plan of the entire park area should be obtained as soon as possible and made available so that all organizations, families, and neighborhood groups can participate in any large or small project they choose.

They told the group that some preliminaries toward these goals have been accomplished. One of these is the building of two very handsome and sturdy redwood picnic tables. The work was done by the Explorer Scouts and the supplies were donated by the Broomfield Lumber Co. and The Turnpike Lumber Co. The scouts want to place these tables in the park along with some stone fireplaces which they will also build. The boys feel that picnic tables on a floor of weeds, mud or dust with hot sun overhead is not very appealing.

Realizing the need for lawn, shade trees, landscaping and proper drainage, the leaders consulted experts in these fields.

Mr. Harold Lathrop, director of the newly organized State Park and Recreation Board of Colorado has offered his services in setting up a master plan. Mr. Lathrop is a man of 34 years experience in the field of outdoor recreation. He is a former director of parks for the state of Minnesota and field representative for the National Recreation Association. It was agreed that this wide experience and knowledge and his generous offer of assistance would be invaluable to Broomfield. Mr. Lathrop suggested that a landscape architect be consulted.

Several landscape experts names were mentioned at the meeting. Among these was Mr. Charles M. Drage, Colorado State Extension Horticulturist with Colorado State University and Landscape Design Chairman for the Colorado Federation of Garden Clubs. A letter has been written asking that he help with the landscape plans for park. Mr. Terrell, the State Forester and Mr. Charles Nelson, Boulder County Agricultural Agent are willing to help obtain trees and give advice on conservation and wind control.

Turnpike Land Co. and Empire Savings have agreed to plant the lawn, and install water spigots. Their engineers are able to advise on drainage problems. There is a strong desire that mosquito control will be considered.

All organizations are urged to appoint or elect a representative to attend the next park planning meeting. Any other interested persons are also invited. The

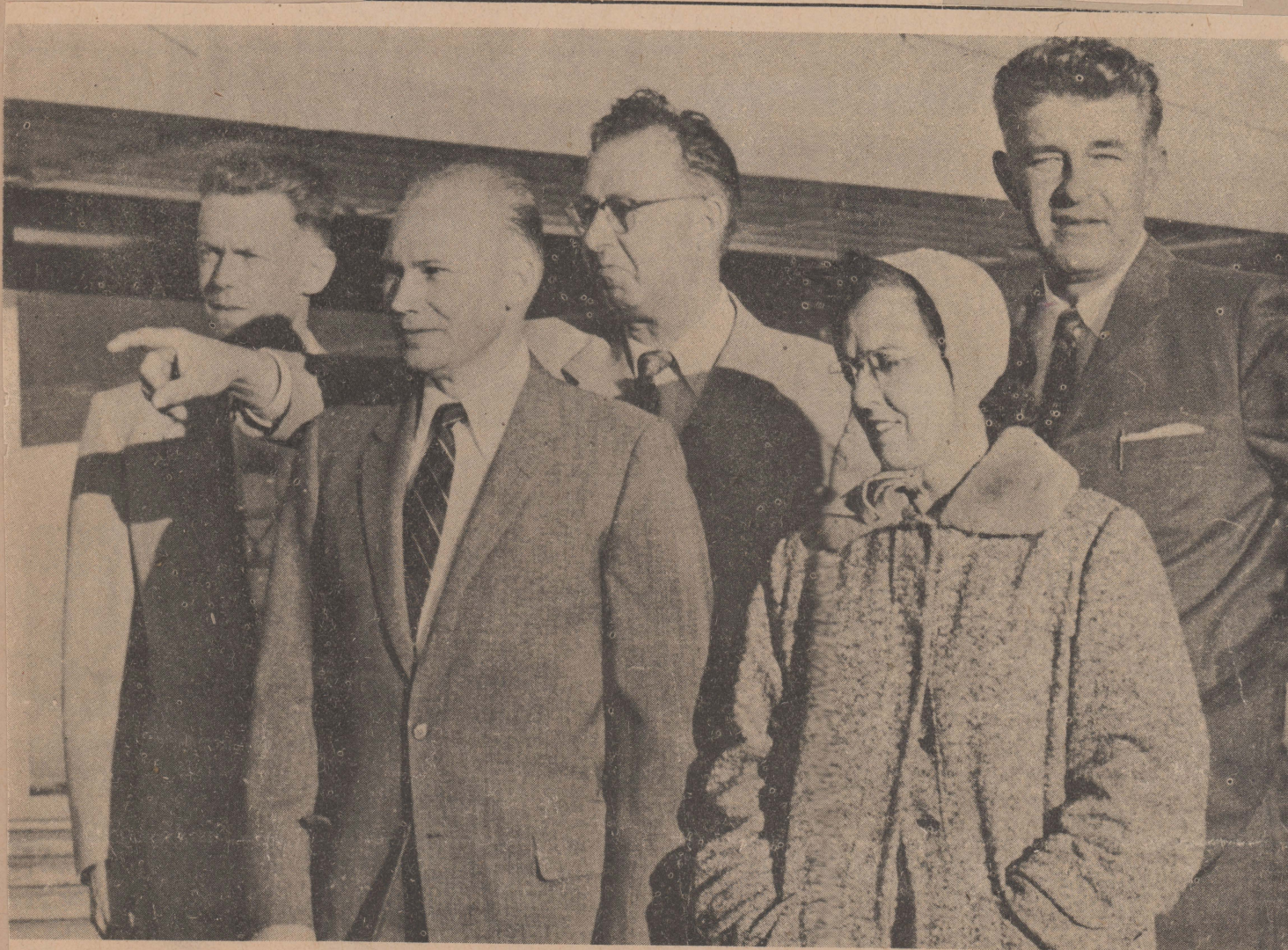
Clearing of the park area was done by Broomfield Heights Jaycees. Lions are furnishing labor to prepare and seed the entire park. Financing for the project

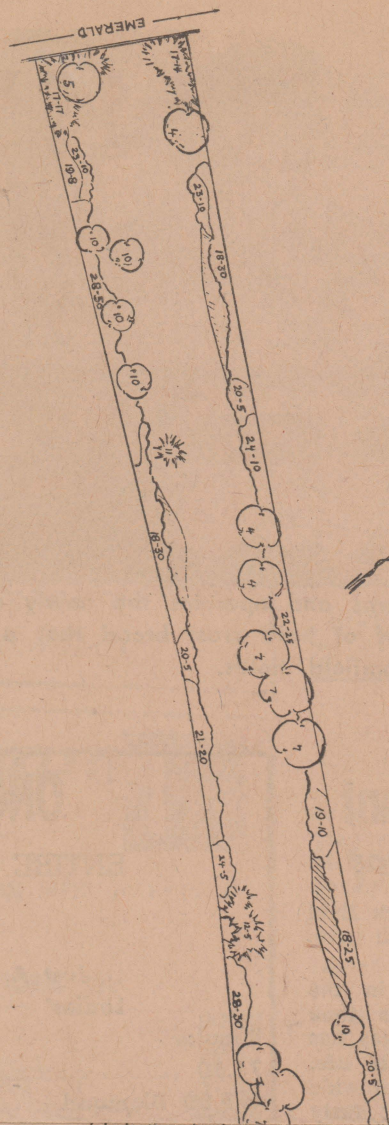

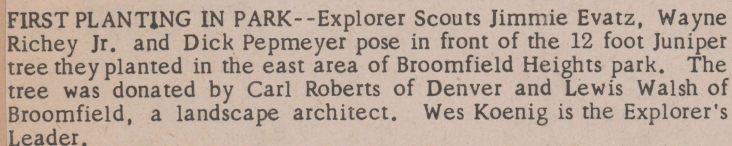

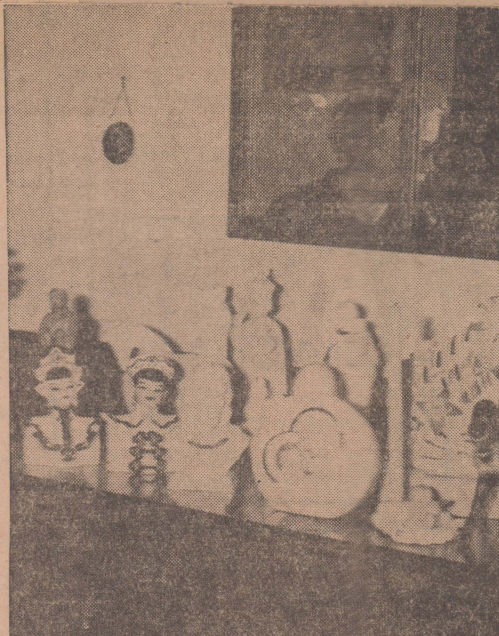

## What I Did Today

Well this was a very busy week. The rains brought up all weed seeds, they all had to be pulled up, if only our flowers had the stamnia of the weeds.

But they are made of more fragile material and need more care.

However the last rain did a lot of damage to everything, it came down so hard and packed the top of the soil and I think most of it ran off, I found my garden very dry but I sprinkled with a light spray several times so as to loosen the ground gradually.

It was wet enough down deep but the rain had packed a really thick crust on top.

Well then came the Iris.

The ancient and mythical gods called them, "Children of the Rainbow", and really this is a very fitting name. My garden is a rainbow.

On Wednesday there were about ten dozen Iris blossoms taken from my garden. This morning you can't miss a single one.

Thursday the Broomfield Garden Club had their Spring flower display at the Safeway store. It was very beautiful. Iris, Poppies, Painted Daisies, Viola's, and some beautiful arrangements, and I took 22 specimens of Iris. The next morning I had several other varieties in bloom.

I think possibly I have some thirty varieties. The "Clover Leaf Junior Gardeners" also were invited to display flowers, and they brought in several nice arrangements and potted plants.

A large number of people viewed the display and they all proclaimed it wonderful.

Now our annuals should be coming through the ground. They may need thinning soon, but wait until they are a little larger.

The roses are all full of buds and a few are in bloom. Watch your roses very carefully now, Aphids and Aphids can appear almost overnight they will be found on the new tender tips, and start working on them. "Ortha puts out a dust also a liquid to take care of these pests. So get a start on them, before they get the roses. Also be on the watch for red spiders on your evergreens.

Take a sheet of white paper, hold it under a branch of the evergreen and tap the branch. If there are crawling things on the paper, you know it is the mites of the red spider, spray it with "malathion" several times.

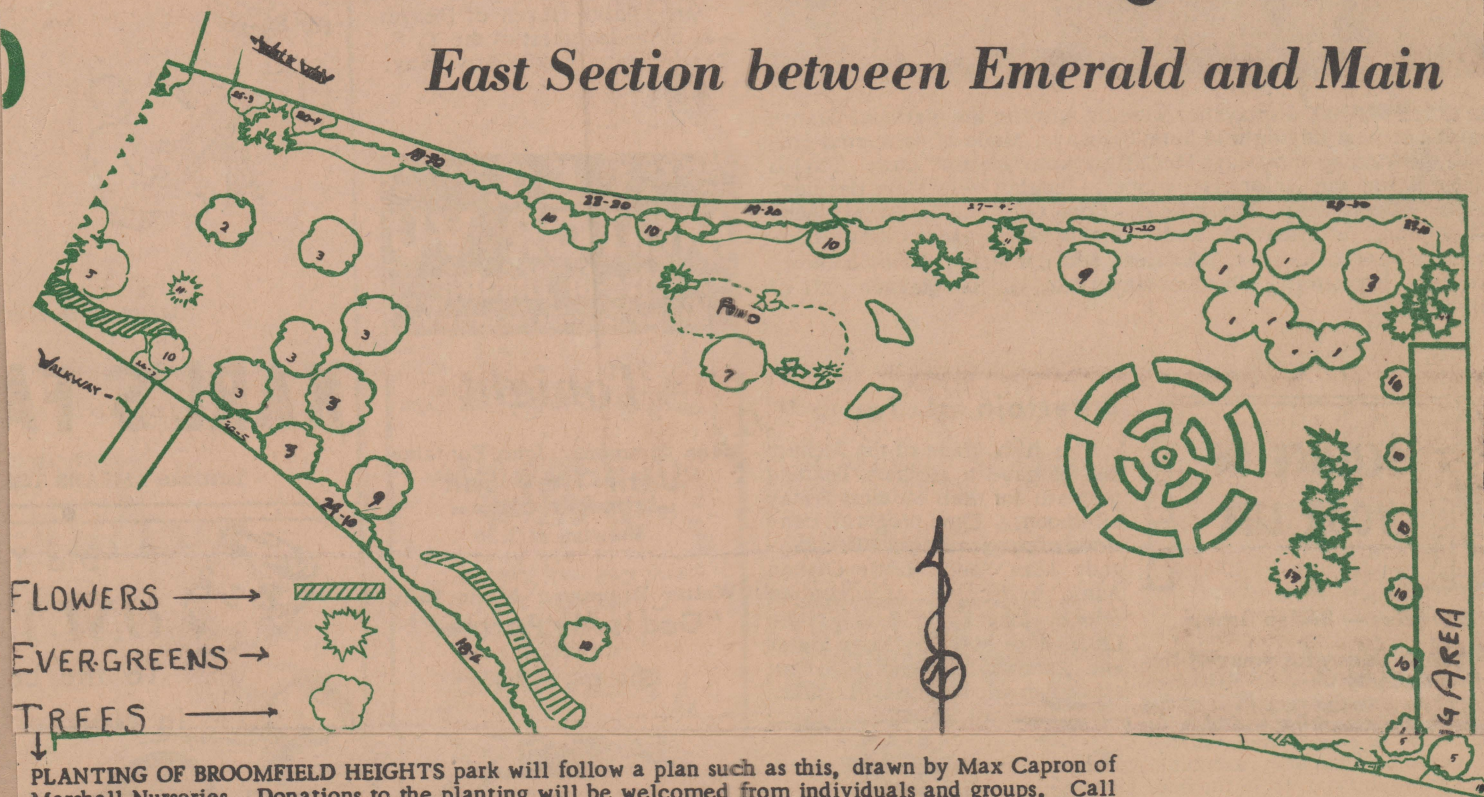

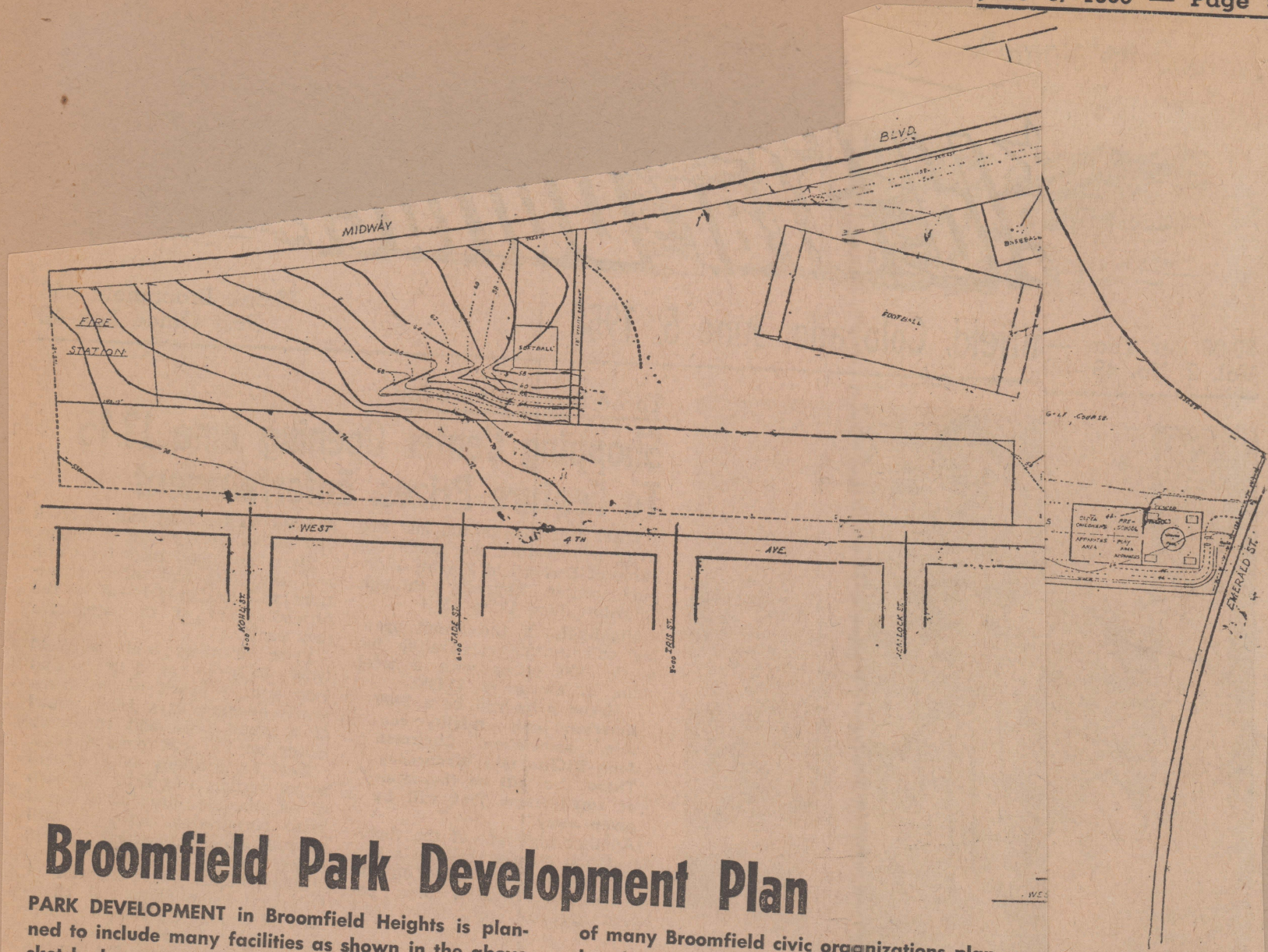

### BY-LAWS FOR PARK PLANNING COMMITTEE

I. Name: Park Planning Committee.

II. Object: To coordinate the efforts of the various garden clubs, service clubs and youth organizations of Broomfield in the development and planning of Broomfield Park, pursuant to the turning over of the park to the future city of Broomfield and its citizens.

III. Policies: To offer a service to the citizens of Broomfield.

IV. Membership and Dues: Membership shall consist of representatives of clubs, service organizations, youth groups and any other interested person.

Dues: There shall be no regular dues for membership in this committee. However, it is hoped that various civic organizations service clubs shall aid us financially by voluntary contributions.

V. Officers: To consist of a Chairman, Co-Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer.

VI. Duties of Officers: The Chairman shall preside at all meetings and represent the committee at all functions, shall have the power to appoint sub-committees as the necessity may arise, be a member ex-officio of all sub-committees. Co-Chairman shall have the responsibility of presiding at the direction or in the absence of the Chairman and shall act in the

official capacity of the Chairman when so designated. The Secretary shall keep minutes of all meetings with names and addresses and phone numbers and act as publicity agent for the committee, and shall notify said members of meetings a day in advance. The Treasurer shall keep all monies, the record thereof, and shall make disbursements at the direction of the Chairman.

VII. Election shall be held the fourth Wednesday of January. The new officers shall assume their duties the first meeting in February following election. Candidates shall be nominated from the floor and elected at the January meeting.

VIII. Meetings: Meetings shall be held the fourth Wednesday of each month with additional

meetings each month to a reasonable number.

IX. Amendments: By-Laws may be amended at a regular meeting by a two-thirds vote of members present after a notice at the previous month's meeting.

### Park Planning Group Renders Great Service

Park Planning Committee was organized as the result of planning of two men, Kenneth Howell and Wes Koenig, leaders of Broomfield Explorer Scouts. An election of officers was held with Wes Koenig elected chairman; Kenneth Howell, co-chairman; Marie Evatz, secretary, and Gene Watson, treasurer. Later, Lou Walsh

cided that the park area east of Emerald be kept as a natural area with various types of trees, shrubs and flowers. Marshall Nurseries submitted a free landscape plan for the east area and it was accepted with plans to revise it if necessary.

Since there are no watering facilities in the park, it was decided to establish a nursery area directly east of Turnpike Land Co. offices where water is furnished free this year by Turnpike Land Co. All donations to the park will be planted in this area to be cared for by volunteers of the community. Later, these donations of trees, shrubs and flowers will be moved to permanent locations in the park when water is available.

To date, Wilmore Nurseries has donated \$2,000 worth of nursery stock. Lou Walsh, local landscape designer, has secured several large trees that were planted in their permanent locations on the east side of the park. Plans are underway for regular work days in the park area when all interested citizens will turn out to work in a concentrated effort.

Garden clubs will plant perennial flowers and bulbs this fall. At the present time the Park Planning Committee is concentrating on securing recreational facilities this summer on the west side of the park. It is hoped that plans for a permanent baseball field may be worked out in the near future. Other future plans include a girls' softball field and tennis courts.

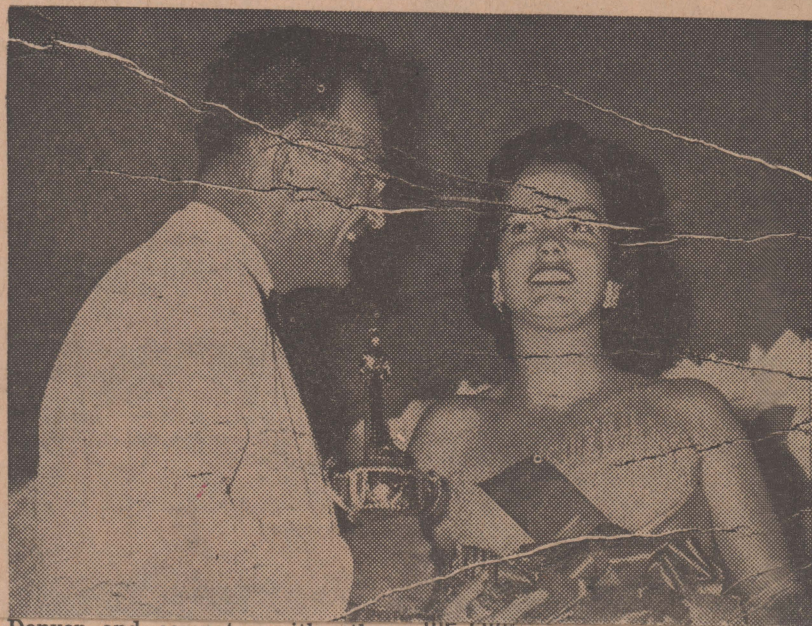

## What I Did Today

Well there's no use to buy nice shrubby trees or plants, let the grasshoppers eat them up. We might just as well get the animals all killed right now before we add any more to our gardens.

The fungus in the roots, until they couldn't resist and the grass started to die off just as if you would put a board on a piece of your lawn, leave it there a few weeks and the grass under it will be dead or at least very sick.

## What I Did Today

Now its clean up time again the annual coarse grass and weeds are coming up in the flower beds faster than you can pull them.

We cut off all our old iris stems That makes the plants look cleaner, also gives strength to the roots I do not cut the blades off.

So lets all pitch in and add more beauty and color to our already "Colorful Colorado".

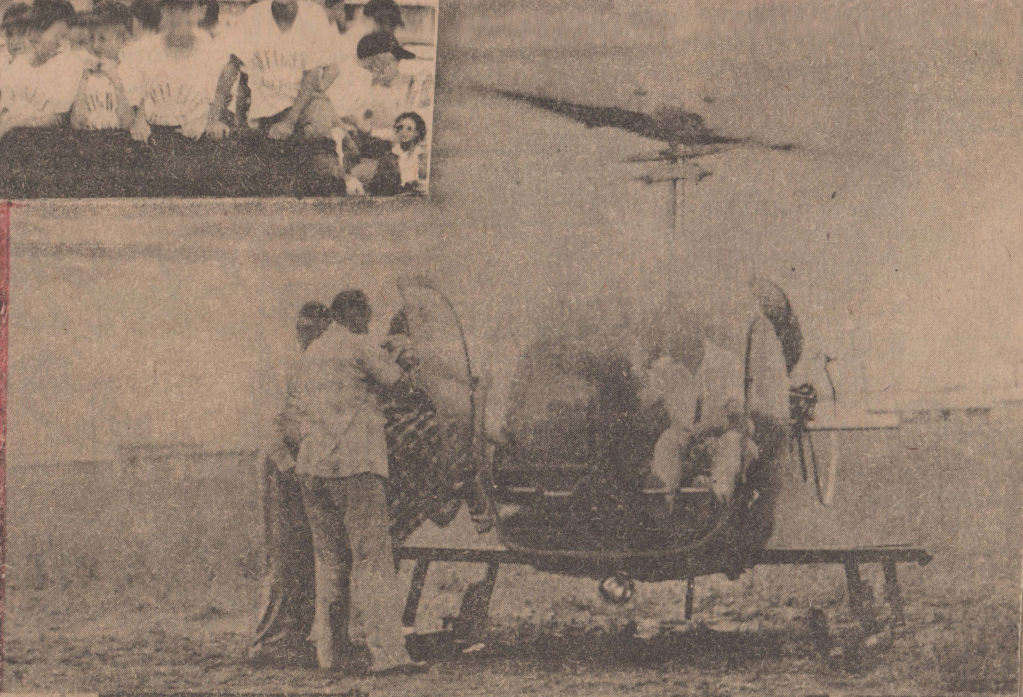
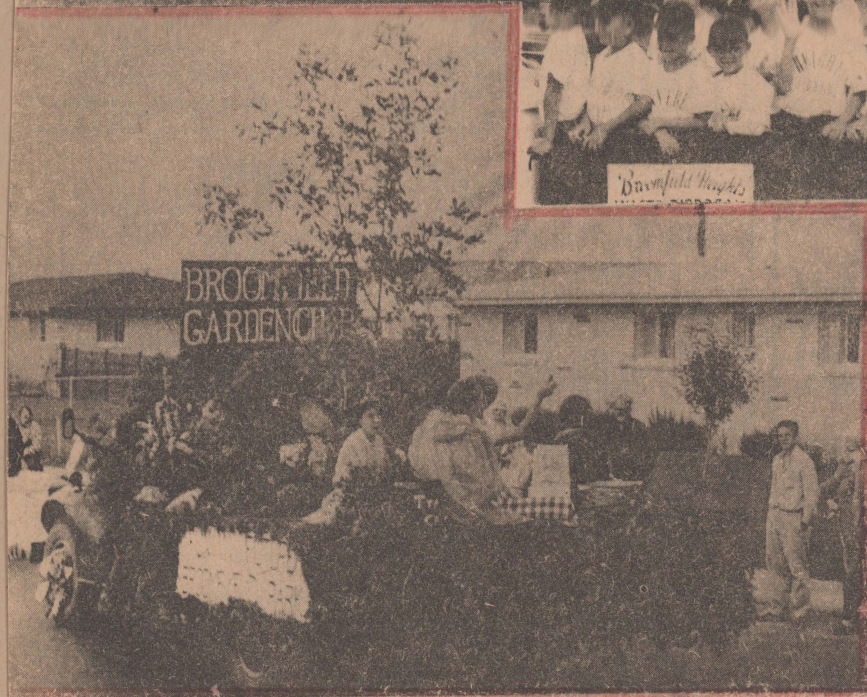
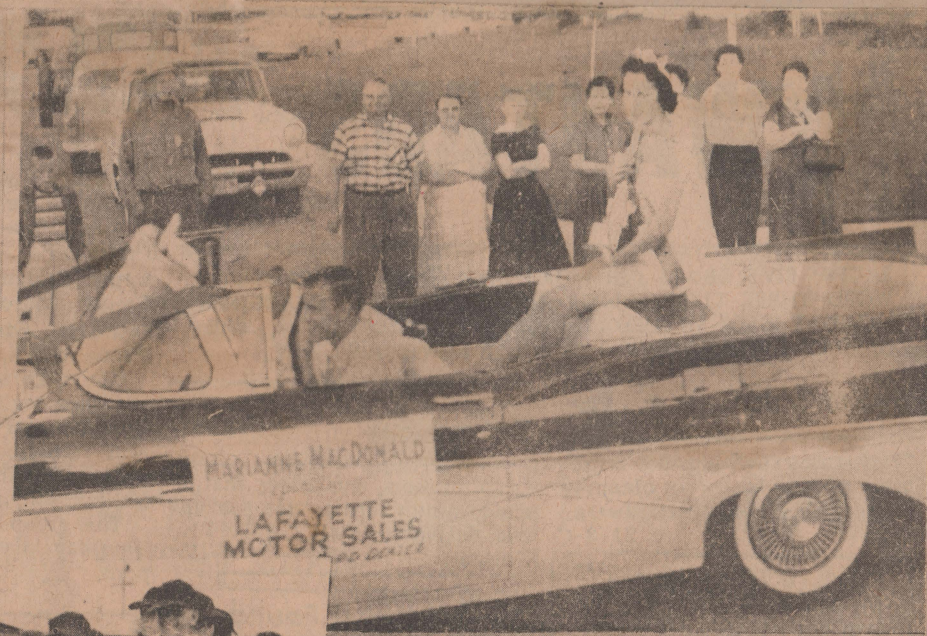
#### July meeting of Broomfield

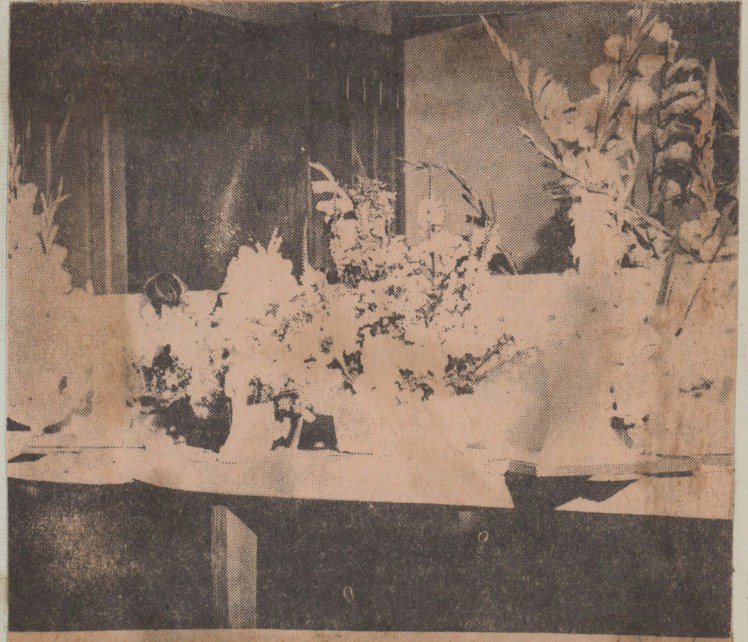

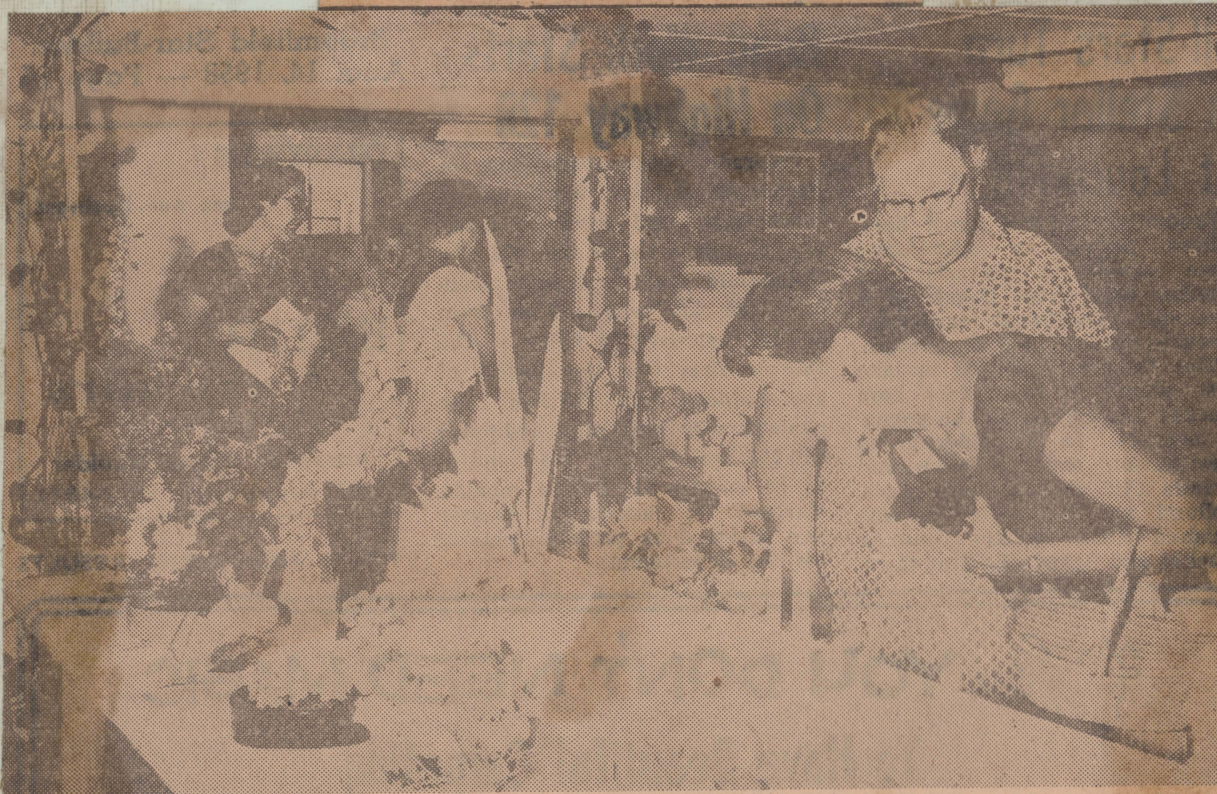

## Park Planning Committee Sets By-Laws, Goals

Here are recently inaugurated by-laws of the Broomfield park planning committee that is working with many civic groups and garden clubs to prepare a community park in Broomfield Heights:

I. Name: Park Planning Committee.

II. Object: to coordinate efforts of various garden clubs, service clubs and youth organizations of Broomfield in the development and planning of Broomfield Park, pursuant to turning over of the park to the future city of Broomfield and its citizens.

III. Policies: to offer a service to the citizens of Broomfield.

IV. Membership and dues: membership shall consist of representatives of clubs, service organizations, youth groups and any other interested person. Dues: there shall be no regular dues for membership in this committee. However, it is hoped that various civic organizations and service clubs shall aid us financially by voluntary contributions.

V. Officers: to consist of a chairman, co-chairman, secretary and treasurer.

VI. Duties of officers: the chairman shall preside at all meetings and represent the committee at all functions, shall have power to appoint sub-committees as necessity may arise, be a member ex-officio of all sub-committees. Co-chairman shall have the responsibility of presiding at the direction or in absence of the chairman and shall act in official capacity of chairman when so designated. Secretary shall keep minutes of all meetings with names and addresses and phone numbers and act as publicity agent for the committee and shall notify said members of meetings a day in advance. Treasurer shall keep all monies, record thereof, and shall make disbursements at direction of the chairman.

VII. Election: election shall be held the fourth Thursday of January. New officers shall assume their duties the first meeting in February following election. Candidates shall be nominated from the floor and elected at the January meeting.

VIII. Meetings: meetings shall be held the fourth Wednesday of each month with additional meetings being held as required. It shall be our policy to restrict number of meetings each month to a reasonable number.

IX. Amendments: by-laws may be amended at a regular meeting by a two-thirds vote of members present after a notice at the previous month's meeting.

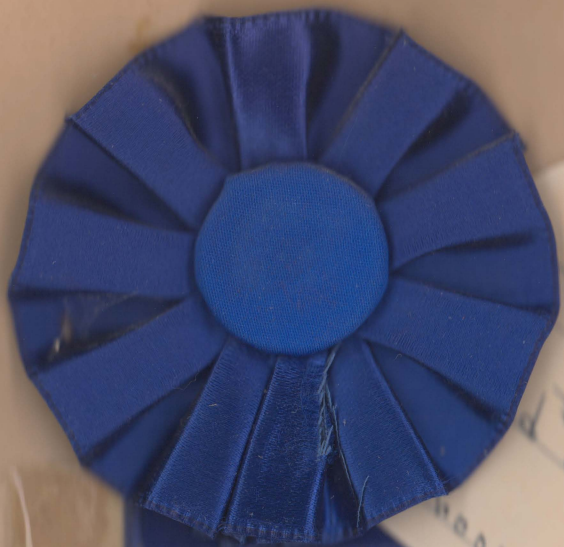
