The \$37,500 Environmental Quality Bond Act grant announced this Spring should shortly begin to show dividends as work gets underway on the restoration of the exterior of the kitchen ell and north facade. This grant is being matched with funds raised in the Elmendorph Etc thrift shop, last summer's Auction and your membership dues. Even more exciting is the very real prospect of restoring and opening for public use the south wing of the building. A fundraising effort has recently begun under the direction of board members Rev. Elliot Lindsley and Lottie Kittner. The response to the fundraising campaign is very successful. We hope to open this part of the Inn --Red Hook's first Town Hall -- by the fall of 1990. Your support in the past has taken us a long way, and our mutual goal -- a restored Inn that is once again a center of community life -- is now in sight.

A great part of working towards the restoration is getting to know you and those daring individuals who volunteer to serve on the Board. Even when you think you really know them, there's always something new to learn. Did you know.....

JOE O'BRIEN was born in Yonkers, N.Y. At 20 he went to New York to be an actor, but was unsuccessful, so he went into radio. (He was very successful at that!) He started on the New York City station, WNYC, then he did a brief stint on WHN and became staff announcer on WMCA in 1936. He was a sports announcer of baseball, boxing and football, and M.C. and did straight announcing. He was part of the famous Gallagher and O'Brien morning team in the fifties and was the morning personality on WMCA in the sixties, the infamous "Good Guys." Joe's life centered around the early hours in the morning as the morning personality on WNBC between 1969 to 1972 and the morning man on WHUD, Peekskill from 1972-1986. 
