

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Introduction: 59 West Market Street at a Glance

During its construction in 1895, a writer in *The Red Hook Journal* described this elegant house as "an ornament to our village" (Figure 1). The house is a classic Queen Anne. This style boomed widely between 1880 and 1910. It is widely thought to have been a more whimsical and charmingly chaotic architectural reaction to the earlier more serious and dour Gothic and Second Empire buildings. The turret, asymmetrical massing, wrap-around porch, and large pane one-over-one double-hung windows are classic and defining elements. Queen Anne houses were status-signifiers within a community--built to impress.

The current property was once part of Maizeland, a large 19th century estate in what is now the Village of Red Hook (Figures 2-4). Originally owned by Revolutionary War General David Van Ness, the 364-acre Maizeland estate was purchased in 1841 by William Chamberlain, a successful New York City merchant who became first president of the Hudson River Railroad in 1846 and who established the First National Bank of Red Hook. After Chamberlain's death in 1875, the property passed to his son, William L. Chamberlain, who died five years later, leaving three executors to sell the property. The Chamberlain estate was divided up into three smaller parcels, the easternmost parcel including the brick mansion and 130 acres (Figures 5-6). Theodore Timpson, one of the executors and a good friend of William L. Chamberlain Jr., acquired the 130-acre property for himself and his wife, Mary Hasbrouck Timpson. They carved it into several parcels in 1882, reserving one "for the benefit of" Dr. Robert J. Carroll, a prominent local doctor, and officially deeded it to Dr. Carroll in 1894 (Figures 7-8). Dr. Carroll first built a carriage house on the property and then started work on the house in April 1895, completing it in November of that year (Figures 9 and 1). Dr. Carroll operated his medical office out of the house, and served as Health Officer of Red Hook, Village President, and Coroner of Dutchess County (Figures 10 and 11).

After Dr. Carroll died in 1911, his widow sold the house to William H. Boice, who transferred ownership to his future wife, Ethel Mae Bliss, in 1916.⁸ William and Ethel lived there

until 1941 when the home was sold to Edward Mehlig (Figure 12).⁹ It changed hands several more times before being purchased by John C. and Helen B. Maynard. John, a regional manager with the Maytag Company, and Helen, who taught at RCHS for 19 years, owned the house from 1947-1991 and raised five children there.¹⁰ After the Maynards sold 59 West Market Street it was owned by the Wasiks and then the Monahans before being purchased by the current owners David Weir and Camille Norvell in 2012 (Figures 13-14).¹¹

The house retains, for the most part, its original interior layout. There is evidence of alteration to the basement stair and kitchen area, some reconfiguration in the rear area of the second floor, and a later conversion of the attic space. Notable original features include the handsome carved wood trim throughout (the magnificent staircase with leaf-motif carved newel posts is truly remarkable) and the word "Office" etched in the beveled glass pane of the door to the waiting area where Dr. Carroll received his patients. (Figures 15-18).¹²

Notable Residents of 59 West Market Street

Robert J. Carroll (1843-1911) and Angeline Weaver Carroll (1847-1926)

Dr. Carroll was born in Ohio to parents who had immigrated from Ireland (Figures 19-21). He enlisted in the military in 1863 and was discharged in 1865.¹³ The 1890 Civil War Pension index lists him as a surgeon in a U.S. hospital.¹⁴ He studied medicine with his brothers William and Thomas Carroll of Philadelphia, attended lectures at the Jefferson Medical College there, and graduated from Albany Medical College in 1871. He practiced for a year and a half in Staatsburg and then came to Red Hook, commencing practice in 1876.¹⁵ He married Angeline in 1883 and we have found no evidence that they had children.¹⁶

Within his local community, he was known for being a man of good character. In 1891 when he was nominated for the office of coroner, the local newspaper described him as "enjoy[ing] the

confidence and esteem of all. A more capable man could not have been chosen" (Figures 22 and 23).¹⁷ Upon his death of stomach cancer at the age of 68, the author of his obituary described Carroll as "of a retiring, domestic disposition and took great pride in his beautiful home and grounds... he specialized in raising choice fruits on the grounds..."(Figure 24)¹⁸. He was known for his dislike of running up large bills on his patients. Robert and Angeline are buried in the lot of Charles W. Massonneau at Albany Rural Cemetery.¹⁹

William H. Boice (1874-1953) and Ethel Mae Bliss Boice (1896-1994)

William was born in Upper Red Hook to John H. Boice and Mary Elizabeth Hoffman. Mary Elizabeth was born in Tivoli, and the couple married in 1872 (Figure 25). ²⁰ In 1920, the Federal Census listed William H. and his wife Ethel. He was described as a bookkeeper in a tobacco factory (Figure 26). ²¹ Five years later, in 1925, an advertisement in an issue of the *Red Hook Advertiser* listed him as a dealer in Hudson-Essex cars (Figure 27). ²² By 1930, William and Ethel had two young children, William and Ellen, and William's father-in-law, Charles H. Bliss resided with the family. In 1940, the Federal Census listed the same residents as ten years prior, and described William as a paint salesman (Figure 28). ²³

William died at age 79 in 1953 and Ethel Boice died at the age of 98 in 1994 (Figure 29). William H. Boice, his parents, Mary and John, and his wife Ethel are all buried in St. John's Reformed Dutch Cemetery.²⁴

John C. Maynard (1916 – 2000) and Helen Beardslee Maynard (1917-2016)

John Maynard was born in Walla Walla, WA Sept 6, 1916, graduated from Culver Military Academy, Dartmouth College and earned a Master's Degree in Educational Administration from Columbia University. He served in the Navy in World War II. Helen Maynard, born in Lansing, Michigan, did graduate work in Education at the University of Chicago and SUNY New Paltz. They

married in 1939 and moved to Red Hook in 1946 (Figure 30).²⁵ John had been hired by the Maytag Company as regional manager and bought the 59 Market Street house in 1947 (Figure 31 and 32).²⁶ When road construction threatened the village's linden trees, Helen led the campaign to save them.²⁷ In 1960 John Maynard got a new job in Chicago and the family put the house on the market. It did not sell however and was rented by the Iraca family for the year they were gone. The Maynards returned to Red Hook when John left his job and kept the house for another 30 years. They raised five children there and Helen taught in the primary grades of Red Hook Central School for 19 years. In 1991 the Maynards moved to Seattle. John died in 2000 at age 83 and Helen died in 2016 at age 99 (Figure 33).²⁸

Bringing the story of this property full circle to the original owners, Helen Maynard's sister, Bethany Winham, bought the Maizeland mansion in 2001 and still owns it.²⁹

Chain of Title

Unfortunately, there are no government or civic agencies that keep track of building information for most of Red Hook's history. The most reliable source of data covers the land, rather than the structures built upon it. The chain of title table below traces the evolution of the lot over time, as it passed from one owner to the next. Prior to the construction of Dr. Carroll's home, the story of this site was tied up with the larger narrative of Maizeland. From these land records, we can deduce a more detailed history of the house over time.



The 1858 John E. Gillette map of the Village of Red Hook marks the Maizeland property as "W. Chamberlain."




Figure 3 The 1867 Frederick W. Beers map of the Village of Red Hook shows Maizeland as the "Res. of W. Chamberlain."




Figure 7 The Maizeland property on the 1891 Beers map is labeled with "T. Timpson" as owner.






Figure 15 Hand-tinted color photo, date unknown "Maynard home" HRH 2015.008.354.




Figure 20 Dr. Carroll, seated on horse "Don Pedro," May 1878. HRH 2017.005.294.




Figure 21 Dr. Carroll seated in horse-drawn buggy, c 1878. Written on the back "Rokeby doctor of the '70s and '80s". HRH 2017.005.289.

Dr. Robert J. Carroll.

Dr. Robert J. Carroll, who has been ill for a long time with Cancer of the Abdomen, died at his residence on West Market Street, early last Saturday morning.

He was born at Keene, Ohio, October 20th, 1843, and lived his boyhood days on the farm with his parents.

Having decided to take up the profession of a Physician he went to the Jefferson Medical College at Philadelphia, and during his course out, and he enlisted as a Hospital Steward in the United States Army, serving in that capacity with credit. After the war was over he returned to the Jefferson Medical College and completed his course, receiving his diploma.

He located at Fayetteville, Arkansas, where he practiced his profession, and while there he met Lieut. Edwin S. Curtis, who was in charge of the Military Academy there, and through his advice he came to Red Hook in 1876 to take up the practice of Dr. Benedict, who had just died. He proved himself a careful, competent Physician and built up an excellent practice, treating many of the best families in both the town and the village.

He served his town and village for a long time as Health Officer and during his administration because of the strict quarantine he established and maintained, no contagious diseases became epidemic. He was Coroner of the County of Dutchess for several terms and served the interests of the people faithfully, without fear or favor.

He was President of the Village for two years and was re-elected for the third time, when he declined, because of failing health and having too many other duties.

He was a man of kindly personality, absolute honor and probity, a man of strong opionions and who always stood for what he thought was right. He was of a retiring, domestic disposition and took great pride in his beautiful home and grounds. He was unusually well posted on Pomological subjects and made a specialty of raising choice fruits on his place. Quiet in his deportment, genial in his disposition, without brag or bluster, he made many friends.

He was faithful in his medical work among his patients, being noted for his dislike to run up a large bill against a patient needlessly and was always moderate in his dealings with his fellow men.

Though knowing for a long time

Though knowing for a long time that his malady was a fatal one, he never complained and bore his suffering with great fortitude.

He married Mrs. Lina Weaver Kelly, who survives him.

We extend to his family and friends, our sincere sympathy and feel that their loss is a great loss to our village and community.

His funeral services were held from his late residence at 4 P. M., on Tuesday and on Wednesday his body was interred in the Albany Rural Cemetery.






Figure 28 1940 Federal Census, entry for William H. Boice.

William H. Boice, 79, who had been ill over a long period, died Sunday at his home in Red Hook. Mr Boice was a native of Upper Red Hook and had made his home in Red Hook for many years. He moved to the village of Red Hook after the death of his parents in 1915, when he retired from farming.

Mr Boice was born in Upper Red Hook, March 22, 1874, the son of the late John H. and Mary Hoffman Boice. He was graduated from Trinity Military Institute, Tivoli, in 1892.

For a brief time in 1918, Mr Boice was employed at the Nelson House in Poughkeepsie. He later was associated with the Hoffman Tobacco Co., in Red Hook, as a bookkeeper and later, for four years, had the contract for carrying mail from Barrytown to Red Hook and Elizaville.

Mr Boice was a member of St. Paul's Lutheran Church, Red Hook; Hendrick Hudson Lodge, F & AM, Red Hook, and a member of the Society for the Apprehension and Detention of Horse Thieves.

Surviving are his wife, Mrs Ethel

Bliss Boice; a son, William A. Boice; a daughter, Mrs David S. Wager, and several cousins.

Funeral services were conducted at the Burnett and Rockefeller Funeral Home, Red Hook, at 2 o'clock Wednesday. The Rev. Herman F. Vesper officiated. 


Figure 32 1950 Federal Census, entry for John C. Maynard.


