

Craft Construction Company of Hyde Park has been awarded the contract. We were very pleased with the work they did on the north end of the building last year.

The south end has the most structural problems, but already we can see the building straightening up. A crooked window on the west side is back in place, and support columns are being installed in the crawl space.

The old building sills have already been removed and the foundation walls are now being rebuilt. Some new framing is needed, but most of the posts on the south side appear to be in good shape.

We will need to replenish our treasury after this phase of the restoration is done, so we hope you will support our Apple Festival and Raffle. I hope to meet many of you at the October 2nd CLEAN-UP. Thank you for your support.



FALL CLEAN-UP SLATED

Volunteers are needed for a clean-up of the inn and its grounds, scheduled for Saturday, October 2, from 10 am to 4 pm.

Two years of restoration have resulted in an accumulation of lumber and other discarded building materials, not to mention several dozen pounds of plaster dust. This material will be removed from the inn, and any salvagable materials are welcome to Friends who can put them to good use. Depending upon whether or not documentation photograph of the interior of the building has been completed, some mid-20th century additions to the inn (partitions, cupboards, bathroom fixtures) may be dismantled on Saturday, as well.

The grounds will be weeded and debris removed from the lawn. This will include edging the driving and raking stones from the front lawn.

Persons interested in volunteering are asked to call Doug Traudt, head of the Building and Grounds Committee at 758-]4]4. Volunteers are requested to bring along whatever cleaning materials and tools that they can -- buckets, mops, sponges, grass rakes, stone rakes, dust pans and work gloves. The Friends can particularly use the loan of several pick-up trucks and an industrial vacuum cleaner. Refreshments will be provided.

ARCHAEOLOGY

Cynthia Morrison has volunteered to put in order the archaeology collection accumulated from several past excavations on the Elmendorph property. Cynthia was contracted to excavate a section of the cellar of the inn in 1980, and in 1978, she volunteered to excavate several test pits in the back yard at the building. Just recently, she tested the area where a pole for a new security light will be installed. The security light has become necessary due to a number of incidents of vandalism that have occurred on the east side of the building.

Cynthia is a 1977 graduate of SUNY at Albany, where she received degrees in anthropology and history. She has been employed as an archaeologist by the National Park Service and the State Education Department. She is currently employed as the Interpretive Program Assistant at Clermont.

The Elmendorph's archaeology collection includes artifacts unearthed during Cynthia's digs, plus objects uncovered at an earlier excavation outside the kitchen and a collection found on the surface of the cellar. Cynthia has begun cleaning these artifacts, which will then be "tagged and bagged." She will also be conducting research on a number of the ceramic objects found in the cellar. The archaeology collection will be placed in appropriate storage and it is hoped that a display can be arranged sometime next year.

PULVER FAMILY REUNION

On September 11, seven members of the Pulver family gathered at the Elmendorph to tape record their recollections for us -- they came from Red Hook, Yonkers and Connecticut, and we are delighted with the information that they gave us.

Thanks to the diligence of Evalena Hanlon (who grew up at the Elmendorph), we have several photos which tell us more about our building -- a photo of Charles and Susan Pulver in the rear of the building revealed a wealth of new information about the cellar entrance as well as the shutters. Other photos showed us when the building had wooden porches and an aerial view of the building revealed how it looked as a store and gasoline station. These important photos will help us to document our history on the building and to restore it correctly.

It should be noted that Jennie Loweth also gave us an Oral History on Hardscrabble Day. She remembered the Jewells who lived there early in this century, and was a great help to us. If you have early recollections of the building, we will be glad to put them on tape -- contact us.

MORE HISTORY UNCOVERED

Bruce Naramore has uncovered a very important new piece of history. In 1817, the Agricultural Association of Dutchess and Columbia Counties held a FAIR AND CATTLE SHOW at Loop's in Red Hook at which the premiums offered amounted to \$200.

Some of the prizes were given for the best 5 acres of winter wheat, best acre of potatoes, best 5 acres of Indian Corn, best 5 acres of barley and best pair of pigs 4 to 9 months old.

So, our building grows in importance, as this may have been the way the Dutchess and Columbia County Fairs really began.

HERE AND THERE

In our last newsletter, we noted that Joe Zalenski (our first President) was going to demonstrate harnessmaking at Clermont State Historic Park's Independence Day Celebration. We are now delighted to report that Joe has generously decided to donate his fee to the Elmendorph. Thanks, Joe.

Rosemary Coons was one of the featured speakers at a Labor Day weekend program held at Clermont. Her presentation, "Early Commerce Along the Old Post Road," spotlighted the Elmendorph.

The new "I Love New York Dutchess County Travel Guide" included the "Elmendorf Inn". Spelling aside, we appreciate our listing as a "place worth visiting" in Northern Dutchess County.
