

AND THEN ONE DAY THE COVER CAME OFF,


THE FACE OF A BEAUTIFUL DREAM.

A tear sheet has also been included at the end of this newsletter for the convenience of those wishing to contact us by mail.

Your TAX DEDUCTABLE donations of auctionable items are especially needed in order to insure a successful fundraiser.

The following are some of the items we can use:

- >>> Small (working) appliances, glassware, pewter, copper, brass, silver, china, pottery, tinware, cookware, crocks, jugs, ironware, wooden bowls, utensils, boxes and lanterns
- >>> Dolls, toys, bicycles, children's furniture, jewelry, political buttons, coins, dresser sets, buttons, military items, knick-knacks
- >>> Tables, chairs, dressers, chests, washstands, trunks, lamps, baskets, desks, love seats, benches, stools, mirrors
- >>> Quilts, linens, rugs, antique clothing (Victorian ca. 1930's)
- >>> Clocks, radios & TVs (in working order)
- >>> Paintings, prints, and old books
- >>> Tools woodworking and garden

Donated items need not be "antique" - good, serviceable items of any age are welcome. We cannot use large appliances (stoves, refrigerators, washing machines, etc.) or large pieces of overstuffed furniture unless they are in remarkably good shape.

BUSINESSES may wish to donate SERVICES. For instance, the RED HOOK INN has donated a dinner for four.



HUDSON RIVER CRUISES

Based on last year's success, the Friends of Elmendorph welcome residents of the Hudson Valley to join them on another Hudson River Cruise on Sunday, August 18th.

Two boat trips have been scheduled that day in conjunction with the annual "Steamboat Days" program at Clermont State Historic Site, aboard the 149-passenger "River Queen". The "River Queen" is operated by Riverboat Tours of Pleasant Valley, New York. Tickets for both four-hour cruises are \$13.50 per person. Proceeds for the trip will be used to continue restoration on the Inn.

The First Cruise will depart from the Rhinecliff Dock at 10:00 AM. Since ample parking is available in Rhinecliff, no shuttle bus service will be available to the dock site. The "River Queen" will cross the Hudson and cruise up Roundout Creek, a hub of steamboat activity on the River prior to the Depression, before docking near the Hudson River Maritime Center. Passengers will be able to tour the Center and its boat building shops between 11:00 AM and 12:00 PM. Afterwards, passengers will return to the "River Queen" for a lunch cruise to Hyde Park and then back to Rhinecliff.

The Second Cruise is scheduled to depart from the North Germantown dock at 4:30 PM. Passengers should park at Clermont State Historical Site and take the free shuttle bus to the dock. The "River Queen" will tour the stretch of the Hudson River between the Roeliff Janssen Kill (site of the manor house of the Lords of Livingston Manor) and Mills Mansion in Staatsburg. This stretch encompasses the Clermont Estates and Sixteen-Mile National Register Historic Districts, which are dominated by scores of riverfront mansions built by the Livingston family and their descendants on the east shore of the Hudson.

You are encouraged to bring your cameras, binoculars, and a picnic lunch or supper. A cash bar, soft drinks and snack foods are available on board. Tour guides will point out sites of interest on both cruises. The cruises will take place rain or shine unless conditions are a potential safety hazard.
