DEAR FRIENDS,

Major work has been completed on the restoration of the Elmendorph Inn -- important work, EXPENSIVE WORK!

Although difficult to see from the outside, the work involved extensive stabilization of the building -- the foundation walls were strengthened, new sills are under the house and most of the first floor framing has been either replaced or reinforced. The building gave a few old groans when it was jacked up, but the floor feels good and solid when you walk on it now. Some large beams in the cellar were reinforced with new wood and steel. When the building was opened to the second floor (and sometimes further), it was discovered that a major timber had to be replaced. Other parts of the framing were reinforced, and the blending of old and new wood was exciting to watch.

The chimney on the east addition was about to topple over, and this has now been rebuilt, using the old bricks above the roof line.

The Board of Directors hired Craft Construction Company of Hyde Park for this important job. Not only were we very satisfied with the work done, but we were enormously grateful to find that Norm Craft and his skilled workers had that special feeling for the Elmendorph that we have.

Detailed photographs and note taking took place every day during the three months required for the stabilization.

So far, we have spent only our own money (over \$25,000), which was necessary before we could receive the matching grant money. When we begin to receive the grant money, we can look ahead to the next step. We will have a major membership/fund raiser in 1982 to help us fund PHASE II.
