

Dear Friends,



We have shared many gloomy moments, but when things looked bleakest, a new supporter stepped out of the wings to help us. The Rev. James Elliott Lindsley wrote to and then met with James Wood, the President of the British-owned Grand Union Company. An agreement was reached and this was followed with a Letter of Intent to the Friends. This letter was received the same day that we received our FEDERAL TAX EXEMPTION.

The terms are as follows: Purchase price: \$30,000. \$2,000 paid down when the contract was signed; a 30 year mortgage for \$28,000 with the Grand Union Company. We will pay \$350. every three months starting December 1, 1977, or a total of \$1400 a year which includes principal and interest. If you figure the interest rate, you will realize that it is very, very low.



ANNUAL MEETING

At the Annual Meeting on March 1, a new Board of Directors was elected. The Board then met and elected its own officers.

Also, with regard to Preservation, the Village Historian has an understanding with the Village of Red Hook Board that she will be notified on an impending

demolition in order to record by photography or architectural drawings the property that is being destroyed. She has already been informed of one impending demolition and one exterior building alteration.

If we work with our public officials and educate them about preservation, we will accomplish much more than crying after the demolition of a landmark.

HISTORY

In an 1811 Poughkeepsie newspaper, we find the Elmendorph is called "LOOP'S HOTEL" while other places were still called Inns or Taverns. Perhaps this means that the Elmendorph was more elegant than most places. We are now zeroing in on who built the Inn. We are down to either David or Christian Feroe, Philip Jacobs or George Sharp. If anyone turns up any information on these people, please share it with us.

HARDSCRABBLE DAY

June 11, 1977 will be the third Annual Community Day. This year, the Elmendorph will be open from 10 AM until 4 PM for a peek inside. The Dutchess County Quilt and the Red Hook Town Quilt will be displayed there. Until the building is stablized, we cannot allow more than one or two rooms to be open on that date, but you'll get a good look at the beams, floors, chair rails, moldings & mantles. There will be walking tours in the Village from 10 to 12 and 1:30 to 3:30. Among craft people will be spinners, weavers, potters carvers and silversmiths. Some of them will be at the Inn and others will be near the Grand Hall on Prince Street. There will be a historic exhibit at the Grange Hall. This will include some of Red Hook's early newspapers, photos of old schools, Indian artifacts and enlarged, mounted photographs of the 1899 and 1900 glass negatives which were donated by SYLVESTER PULVER. George Englert (father of Georgia Coon) will have an art display.
