DEAR FRIENDS,

WE DID IT AGAIN! We have raised the \$15,000 we needed to match a federal restoration grant (and we did it in less than a year).

It is only because of the strong support we have received from our Friends that we could get so far ahead in such a short period of time. Red Hook is a small community, and it is truly amazing that we were able to match our goal so quickly. Our friends in other communities and other states are to be commended for their continued support.

The money was raised in the following fashion: over \$5200 came from "Elmendorph Etc.", our thrift shop, which so many of you contributed to and bought from; over \$5,000 came from donations; \$2,000 came from memberships and the balance was from fund raising events which so many of you worked on.

You can take great pride in what you have done. We will continue to need your help. Next month we will send out a list of all those who were paid up members or contributors in 1979, and we will ask you to renew your memberships. NOW -- we are asking you to think about one person or family who you would like to see belong to the Friends of Elmendorph, Inc. If each one of you comes up with one new member (and this includes students), we will double our membership in 1980. With your help, we won't have to send out a mass membership mailing this year. You have amazed us so far -- let's see if you can do it again.

We have changed the date of our newsletter to run every three months, beginning in January. Next month, there will be a special mailing to you, informing you of our Annual Meeting in March, as well as asking you to renew your memberships with us.
