

SPOOKY SALE A SUCCESS






Immediately prior to the formation of the Historical Society, the LAST meeting of the Red Hook/Tivoli Bicentennial Committee was held. The Committee was the parent body from which the Friends of Elmendorph began, so it was appropriate that this last meeting of the Committee and the first meeting of the Historical Society were held at the Inn.

We recall that a Society for the Apprehension & Detention of Horse Thieves of the Lower Village was formed at the building early in the 19th century.

PULVER STORE RECEIPTS FOUND



HIDDEN CELLAR FOUND

Thanks to the late Sylvester Pulver, and more recently to Arnold and Raymond Pulver, we have just uncovered a cellar that had a new floor laid over it in 1933. We were fascinated to explore this dry storage area on the north side of the house. It will also be most helpful to us to have access to this end of the building for mechanical systems.

SPECIAL REPORT



On Monday, November 21st, Larry Gobrecht, Field Representative, and Michael Lynch, Technical Advisor, of the Historic Sites Division of New York Parks and Recreation, visited the Elmendorph for the purpose of determining whether we should submit an individual application for nomination on the National Register of Historic Places, or apply as part of a district, including other nearby buildings.

For two hours, Gobrect and Lynch ignored the bone chilling cold of the unheated building and made an enthusiastic inspection of the tavern. They were particularly interested in the evidence of "improvements" and enlargements made to the structure prior to 1830. They pointed out a deepening of the masonry support of the central fireplace and speculated that the original building may have consisted of the central room and stair hall, with the rooms to the North, as well as to the South, having been added They expressed great interest in returning with flood lights to conduct a more thorough study of the attic for clues to the tavern's development.

They recommended that we proceed with the termite extermination, removing the deteriorated sheds and porches at the rear, if necessary, but disturbing the soil about the foundations as little as possible, for this area can be rich in archeological evidence. They urged that we postpone any major work until a more thorough study of the building can be completed, and to this end, they encouraged us to submit an individual application for nomination as an Historic Site.

Such a nomination would make us eligible to apply for matching grants to fund a feasibility study to determine how best to restore and preserve the Elmendorph.
