

CONGRATULATIONS, NEIGHBORS

A National Register of Historic Places Recognition Ceremony was recently held at Clermont State Historic Site for the 16 miles of estates lining the Hudson in Northern Dutchess County and 4 miles of estates in southern Columbia County. This is now one of the largest historic districts in the country. We commend Hudson River Heritage and especially Cheryl Gold for the tremendous amount of work involved.

BE AWARE

A State Historic Preservation Act (S.4616/A.6532) has been introduced in both houses of the State Legislature on March 28. Last year, the Assembly passed the bill 143-0. If you want to learn more about this bill and wish to encourage its support in the State Senate, write to the Preservation League of New York State, 13 Northern Blvd., Albany, NY 12210. DO WE WANT IT?

Before we get swamped with great grandmother's sewing machine or Uncle Tony's pipe rack, we thought we had better establish an Acquisitions Committee for articles donated to the building (not the shop). The shop will take the sewing machine or pipe rack.

Please do not feel hurt if they feel that an article is not appropriate to the building because if we don't have guidelines, we are going to wind up with a hodgepodge. We are interested in reproductions of period furniture, if we cannot get the originals.

IN MEMORIAN

EVEN THEN, THEY WERE AWARE

Thanks to Wint Aldrich for sharing this delightful article with us. On July 25, 1835 in the Rural Repository, there appeared this verse:

"Penn's Cottage -- the first house built in Philadelphia after the arrival of William Penn's Colony is still standing; and if we had our own way on the subject, it should be permitted to stand as long as one brick would lie upon another. The antiquities of a country are always a valuable and interesting part of the public property, and as we are not yet old enough to be able to boast of any very ancient edifices, that is no reason why we should not enable our posterity to have some to exhibit after we are gone."

HISTORY LESSON

We have now learned the precise time that a kindergarten began in the Elmendorph. It was started between April 29 and May 6, 1887 through the generosity of Edward Martin, a philanthropist. This was Red Hook's first kindergarten, and on May 20, 1887, was "filled to its fullest capacity" according to the Red Hook Journal of that era.

In 1890 there was a singing class organized by Miss Estelle G. Platt which had "free use of the kindergarten rooms." When the group numbered 40 members, they moved their practice sessions to the Lutheran Chapel.

One of the most intriguing owners of the Elmendorph was Philip Jacobs, apparently a no-nonsense businessman.

On February 8, 1779, Jacobs advertised in the New York Journal and General Advertiser the following: "All persons that have any demands on the subscriber, by bond, note or book debt, are desired to bring their accounts, by the first of April. Likewise, they that are indebted, are desired to make payment by that time, or they may expect to be sued, as I am going to remove". PHILIP JACOBS

All of the above new information was uncovered recently by our sleuth, Clara Losee. Aren't we lucky to have such an alert Friend?

SHADES OF JACOB LOOP

The Town of Red Hook incorporated in 1812 and for the next 30 years, many of their Annual Meetings were held at the Elmendorph. During that period of time, the Inn was owned by Jacob Loop, George Ring, Philip Bonesteel, Peter DeReimer, Jacobus Eckert and David Wager.

On June 12, 1979 at 7:30 PM, the Town of Red Hook will hold a meeting at the Inn once again. If you come to the meeting, try to imagine the first Town Boards meeting at the Elmendorph, when they appointed fence viewers and pathmasters, and struggled with the problems of runaway pigs, bounties for the capture of wolves, school districts and yes, even then, ruts in the roads.

UPDATE ON "ELMENDORPH, ETC."

Our Thrift Shop has reopened and we are happy to see mahy of our new members working in it. We are now open two days a week (Friday and Saturday).

Elmendorph Etc. has a goal of \$6,000 to make this year.
