RESTORATION COMMITTEE

HANKS to all of you who so generously responded to our "Local History" fund drive. Work is already well underway on the second floor. Mason Lord, Craig Marchesault and their skilled crew from <u>Hudson Valley Preservation</u> are working under the direction of Herman Gorgens to level floors where possible, reproduce missing trim and doors, and all the other myriad details of the restoration. Later, Charles Hapeman will repair and replace plaster and Robert McCarthy & Sons will complete the electric wiring begun last fall.

We'll be adding a handrail to the stairway; and enlarging the doorway to the much used attic storeroom over the kitchen. For too many years our volunteers have been banging their heads on the low doorway as they moved art show flats and Christmas shop merchandise in and out of storage. This is the first significant modification we've made to our historic building but one long deemed necessary. The new door to the storeroom was found in the building. It probably came from a second floor south room partition removed before we acquired the Inn. As always, we try to preserve the original, historic features of our building as we strive to make it ever more useful to the community.

Members of the Egbert Benson Historical Society of Red Hook are currently working in the two unrestored second floor chambers - gathering together and indexing the Society's collections in preparation for the move into its new headquarters in the north room. They will be looking for help in furnishing their archive center with files and storage cabinets, a new copier, and, eventually, a computer to make the room a functional historic research center for the community.

NOTE: Sometimes needs are met in unexpected ways. A chance conversation with Red Hook Village Trustee Madeline Klein brought us an 8 foot wall hung projection screen for the South Room, donated by her daughter and son-in-law, Heidi and Dominick Andriola, who found the screen in their new home. All those who attend the annual April Clermont lecture series and other meetings where slides or films are shown will appreciate this new amenity as will our "Innkeeper" who struggled to set up our large tripod screen for each event. Thank you Madeline, Heidi and Dominick.

HISTORIC NOTES

ED HOOK Town Historian, J. Winthrop Aldrich, has given us a copy of <u>Taverns and Stagecoaches</u> of <u>New England</u> by Allan Forbes, published in Boston in 1953 from which we have excerpted the following description of travel by stage coach in 1877:

The best seat inside a stage is the one next to the driver. Even if you have a tendency to seasickness when riding backwards—you'll get over it and will get less bumps and jostling. In cold weather don't ride with tight fitting boots, shoes or gloves. When the driver asks you to get off and walk do so without grumbling. He won't request it unless absolutely necessary. If the team runs away—sit still and take your chances. If you jump, nine out of ten times you will get hurt.

In very cold weather abstain entirely from liquor when on the road; because you will freeze twice as quickly when under its influence.

Don't growl at the food received at the station; stage companies generally provide the best they can get. Don't keep the stage waiting. Don't smoke a strong pipe inside the coach — spit on the leeward side. If you have anything to drink in a bottle pass it around. Procure your stimulants before starting as "ranch" (stage depot) whiskey is not always "nectar."

Don't swear nor lop over neighbors when sleeping. Take small change to pay expenses. Never shoot on the road as the noise may frighten the horses. Don't discuss politics or religion. Don't point out where murders have been committed, especially if there are any women passengers. Don't lag at the wash basin. Don't grease your hair, because travel is dusty. Don't imagine for a moment that you are going on a picnic. Expect annoyance, discomfort and some hardship.
