### **Restoration Committee**

This summer, while Bob and I were away on vacation, an energetic crew of volunteers led by Joan Lewis and Larry Thetford cleaned out all the construction debris which had accumulated on the second floor, carefully storing away original moldings and other artifacts which preserve the architectural history of the building. Shortly thereafter the Field Services Division of the New York State Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation held a regional meeting at the Elmendorph. They're the folks who have to approve all our restoration activities, and Herman Gorgens was able to give them a tour of the second floor, gaining preliminary approval of our plans to create an Archive Center and exhibit gallery in the North Room and Central Hall.

At the direction of the Elmendorph Board, Herman is developing plans for heating, cooling and wiring the second floor and preparing a schedule of work which we hope can include some volunteer participation while maintaining our usual high standards for the restoration. Linda Keeling is working on a grant proposal to cover the cost of an air handling system which will protect the important historical treasures of the Egbert Benson Historical Society. We expect to formalize an agreement with the Society shortly for its expanded use of the building.

Your generous and faithful support as listed elsewhere in this and previous newsletters encourages us to continue working to bring the Elmendorph Inn to full usefulness as an historic and culturally focused center of community life for all of Red Hook and the mid-Hudson region. Our thanks to all of you for bringing the Elmendorph to life once again.

# 7TH ANNUAL FAMILY CHRISTMAS OPEN HOUSE and other Holiday Events

The Christmas season begins especially early this year, a few days after Thanksgiving. Our **Open House** is always held on the first Sunday of December in celebration of the Dutch Christmas and to coordinate with the Red Hook Chamber of Commerce-sponsored **Snowflake Parade** and **Village Tree Lighting Ceremonies.** Last year, more than 500 guests filed into the Inn to enjoy hot mulled cider, cocoa, homebaked cookies, bread fresh from the brick bake oven and Christmas music performed by local musicians. This year, we'll have the restored kitchen and tap room to celebrate as well.

Volunteers will be working around their Thanksgiving preparations to make the Inn festive with traditional decorations and, as usual, we'll be looking for lots of cookie bakers and servers. But whether you can help or not, we hope you will join us in welcoming the Holiday Season at our most exciting and festive Open House.

A week later, the Old Dutch Village Garden Club will hold its annual **Greens Show** from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday, December 7th and 8th. Ornaments from the Garden Club's Christmas Tree, which won first prize at the Dutchess County Fair, will be on sale and there will be lots of wreaths and decorations to inspire your own holiday preparations.

Finally, on Tuesday evening, December 10th, noted children's book author and storyteller, Mirko Gabler, will relate **Tales of Saint Nicholas and other Christmas Stories** at a special holiday meeting of the Egbert Benson Historical Society. Scheduled at 7 p.m so children can attend, the story hour will be followed by traditional holiday refreshments.



### Elmendorph Etc.

Our little thrift shop had its beginning shortly after the Inn was acquired. Helen Garlinghouse convinced the fledgling group, Friends of Elmendorph, that the homely cement block building should be used as a source of income for the restoration of the Inn. Furnished with card tables and the donations from the small group, it became a Garage Sale. It has grown every year since then. Counter, shelving and showcases have been donated; a small heater allows us to open in May and October. We are open three days a week (plus one workday to restock) and donations are so prolific that we have outgrown both the shop and the large storage shed we purchased as the rooms in the Inn were being restored and were no longer available.

For the past few years, we have pledged \$10,000 toward the restoration budget and, thanks to your generous donations and the dedication of a handful of volunteers, we have exceeded that amount 25¢ at a time. We like to think that we perform a community service in maintaining the shop, evidenced by the many bargain hunters who seldom miss a day that we're open.

Think about us this winter and pack away nifty, useful working items. We will be working in April in preparation for our first of May opening. Our half-price sale the closing week really emptied the shelves!

Many thanks to the community, the artists, and the helpers who made our Sixth Annual Art Show on Columbus Day weekend a great success. We had 44 artists participating, with a total of 150 works of art on display. The show was so big that we had to use the new Tap Room to extend our hanging space...and we were proud to do so. With record sales of \$2,635, the Friends of Elmendorph netted \$1,249 from commissions, hanging fees and donations. While we were ecstatic over the unexpected financial outcome of the show, our real pleasure came from enjoying the company of friends, old and new, who were able to be there.

On opening night, music flowed through the air, while visitors viewed the paintings and enjoyed the wonderful refreshments. Music was provided by some of our Red Hook High School musicians playing french horns and flutes, and was coordinated by Anne Oja. It was lovely.
