# A LITTLE HISTORY

More than 100 well-wishers gathered at the historic Elmendorph Inn in the Village of Red Hook, Saturday evening, October 13th, to celebrate the completion of the restoration of the South Room added to the structure in 1803. The completion of the South Room restoration will permit the 200-year-old building to again be used for meetings and social events.

The Friends of Elmendorph purchased the deteriorating building from the Grand Union Company in 1977. Since then the Friends have replaced the sills and other structural members and restored the west and south facades of the large frame structure. A central heating system has been installed to permit year-round use. Now, at last, we can invite the community to come inside the Elmendorph.

A chandelier copied from one found in a Shaker meeting in upstate New York illuminated the white plaster walls of the large, high-ceilinged room as guests examined the delicately fan-carved mantle and a display of 18th century artifacts found during the restoration process.

From 1785 until 1850, the Elmendorph Inn served as the community center for the growing Village of Red Hook and for thirty years after the Town of Red Hook was incorporated in 1812 the Inn hosted town meetings and local courts of law. The large room may have been added to better accommodate public gatherings.

The high point of the evening was the presentation to the Friends of Elmendorph of a facsimile check in the amount of \$12,300 by New York State Assemblyman Glen Warren. The check represented a grant from the State's Natural Heritage Trust to help fund the completion of restoration of the south half of the building. Future plans include construction of a handicap accessible bathroom and a space for local history research. Assemblyman Steven Saland, County Legislator Woody Klose and Town of Red Hook Supervisor John Gilfeather were also on hand to congratulate the Friends of Elmendorph.

The windows were washed (a lot of "pane"), the walls in the middle room not yet restored were scrubbed and cleaned and a lot of old loose plaster was wiped down. The floor, although it may not have looked it, was scrubbed on hands and knees by some of our ladies. If that's not dedication, then what is???

Cleanup Crew - Herman Gorgens and Dave Brown shop vac 'd the building for the party. Betty Franklin scrubbed and Doug Traudt scrubbed and vacuumed and Blanche Traudt scrubbed and scrubbed and washed windows. Helen Garlinghouse scrubbed on hands and knees and Harriet Norton scrubbed and vacuumed.

Bob Bielenberg and Joe O'Brien moved things that had to be moved. Herman Gorgens handled any problems that came up--front steps, rotted hallway floor.

The decorations that seemed to fit the room were perfect. No matter where you stood in any of the rooms used, you saw an eye-catching decoration or display from artifacts to candlesticks to pewter plates. It was heartwarming to see **Blanche Traudt** sitting on the floor in front of the fireplace arranging the dried grasses in the basket so it looked just so. The mantels that had just the right arrangement of pewter plates and candlesticks and even the middle room had a big cupboard that added to the warmth of the room.

It's so easy to take these things for granted as though it just happens. Someone had to think of it, someone had to bring it in and someone had to place it.

The decorations and the furniture were all lovingly thought of, brought in by Bob and Barbara Bielenberg and Shirley Brown and Blanche Traudt, Harriet Norton and Elliott Lindsley and from David Brown of Beekman Arms Antique Center. It truly looked like a meeting room in the 1800's. The furniture used that evening were all borrowed for the evening.

And. . . there are just lots of details requiring the cooperation of people like Lillian Gorgens, Harriet and Bill Johnson, and Richard Coons who handled the guest registry table, Mary Cioffi who was hostess/greeter, as were Rosemary Coons, Joe and Margaret O'Brien, Barbara Bielenberg, Elliott Lindsley. Photographs of before and after restoration and during the party were taken by Bill Johnson. Doug Wicks took photos at the party, and Dorothy Wegman also took some photos of the South Room.

There is a lot to do to coordinate a party, but it is not done by the coordinators. It takes the willing cooperation of so many people who work so very hard to make it happen. #### RESTORATION/BUILDING COMMITTEE

The South Wing was successfully completed on time, by the general contractor, Craft Construction of Hyde Park, Inc. The heating system for the first floor was also completed as part of this phase of construction.

The building will now function through the winter with heat, hot water, toilet facility, etc. for meetings that will be scheduled or other functions. Next, two phases are on the schedule to begin soon.

First, the processing of paperwork for the EQBA of 1986 State Grant is in its final stages. The Grant is for the restoration of the remaining facades of the building--east and north. This is a 50/50 matching grant, so we need dollars for our share of the cost.

Second, the handicapped-access toilet that is proposed for the "middle" room can be funded by another grant. This would over the entire cost of this project. plans and application are now being prepared to submit to the state for review and approval. This is in addition to the one toilet we have now.

# ACQUISITION COMMITTEE

The Directors of the Friends of Elmendorph have established an Acquisitions Committee to develop a collections policy for the organization. The completion of the South Room of the Inn has attracted a number of donations as well as created needs for a permanent collection of chairs, tables and other equipment and accessories to make the room useful for meetings and receptions.

Shirley Brown, Bruce Naramore, Elvira Nuccio, Blanche Traudt, and Bob and Barbara Bielenberg have agreed to review the existing Elmendorph acquisitions policy and develop an inventory filing system for the recording of additions to the collection. Important donations of a handsome reproduction Shaker meeting house chandelier for the South Room and a lantern to light the entrance hall were received in time for the opening reception, but most of the furnishings presently in use in the South Room have been loaned by generous friends.

As the restoration of the Elmendorph is completed, needs may change, but right now space is limited to the completed South Room where sturdy antique or reproduction Windsor chairs and benches, candle stands and country tables are badly needed. "We hope we never have to use modern folding chairs in that beautiful room," states Shirley Brown. An Adopt-a-Chair program is planned to acquire reproduction Windsor chairs at a cost of \$90 each. P.S. The shop is closed. Please save your donations until next May.



Hostesses and Cleanup Crew - To greet guests and keep guest book, keep things in order and tidy, and clean up after party.


