apple men.

he has the money. I know we
can sell him the property.

But you want to get there
just as soon as you can get him
there. He will see and orchard that
will equal any thing in Kinderhook
as I am up through there every
little while.

and he cannot buy any farm
there that has the buildings on it
and every thing that this has for
the money. Every one says that
the orchard is worth what we ask
for the whole thing.

The water is pumped up to the
house and barns by a gasoline
engine from a spring brook.

We expect another than there
near there the 16th or about the
1st of the week so you see you
want to hurry up. He has been

there once, I will try and hold
him off for a few days if I can
I do not know, I will write my
brother, He means business, He has
been looking for a place like
this all over the state, He has
been to Kinderhook and up through
the apple country in the central
and western part of the state and
this just suits him he says.
There is more fruit shipped at
Mollena than at Kinderhook
as this is a great peach country
and small fruits.
