Red Hook Married to Former Rhinebeck
Man at Church of Messiah Wednesday
Afternoon---Reception at "Mapleton"**

The wedding of Miss Elizabeth Platt Adams, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Platt Adams of Red Hook, and Radcliffe Heermance of Princeton, N. J., Assistant Professor of English in Princeton University, took place Wednesday afternoon at four o'clock in the Church of the Messiah.

Mr. Heermance is a son of Hon. Martin Heermance of Poughkeepsie and is a native of Rhinebeck. He was graduated from Williams College in 1904.

The church was decorated about the chancel and altar with palms, southern smilax and Easter lilies.

Harry Irwin Metzger, organist of the church, gave an organ recital from 3:30 to 4 o'clock. The choir sang as processional hymn "O Perfect Love" before the wedding party entered the church. The organist rendered the wedding music from "Lohengrin" and during the ceremony played the Adagio Canatible from Beethoven's Sonata Pathetique. Other music following was the wedding march from Mendelssohn's "Midsummer Night's Dream", a recessional hymn and the Hallelujah chorus from "The Messiah." The singing was rendered by the full choir of the Church of the Messiah augmented by additional singers.

The guests were ushered into the church from the chapel, the bridal party alone entering from the vestibule and proceeding down the main aisle along which white ribbons were stretched.

The bride was given in marriage by her father and was attended by her sister, Miss Katherine Elseffer Adams. Mr. Heermance accompanied by his best man, Henry Hopkins, Jr., of New York City, awaited the bride at the chancel. The ushers were Edward J. Saunders of Rhinebeck, Clarence Newman of Albany, Nathaniel Trefler of Princeton, N. J., Herbert Tuttersen of New York City, Kenneth Mygatt of Pelham Manor and Charles H. Raymond of Lawrenceville, N.
