The reception was a featured activity of the prestigious 4th Annual Country Seats Tour sponsored by Hudson River Heritage, New York State Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation, the National Parks Service, the Friends of Mills Mansion, Clermont and Olana State Historic Sites and Wilderstein Preservation.

The four-day event features tours of distinguished private homes and historic sites in Columbia and Dutchess Counties and we were pleased that the Elmendorph was selected as the site for one of the evening activities offered to tour participants. Many of our Board members were on hand to conduct guided tours and explain the significance of our historic Inn. One of the most delightful events of the year was our October Art Show. The timing could not have been better. The fall colors were coming on and the tourists were flocking up from New York City to view the beauty of our Hudson Valley.

After a month of paperwork and other preparations, we put up flats in the South Room and with some expert help proceeded to hang eighty-nine gorgeous pieces of work--oils, acrylics, photos, and watercolors. We opened on Friday evening, October 11th, with an artists' reception, to the music of the Alexander Schneider Quintet and the roar of rain on the roof.

Despite the weather, about 125 people showed up to sip punch, nibble cheese, and view the work. Two charming little girls from the middle school distributed programs, while the hostesses made everyone welcome. The old Inn did its best putting out ambience.

As the show continued over the weekend, sales improved until over twenty percent of the works had been sold. We covered our expenses and netted nearly \$1200 for the Elmendorph. It is really inspiring to see what the combined efforts of a lot of good people can do. As someone remarked, the show had class.
