Here, let's stand in line t'climb the stairs. We're allowed 5 minutes between classes. Some allow themselves more...













Mr. Barringer has been with Red Hook Central School since 1947. He started as a social studies and driver education teacher and became High School Principal in 1959.






SUMMER..


DUTCHESS COUNTY BOCES--DCS



Second team all-UCAL went to Marty Smith, Joe Smith, and Marty Higgins. Honorable Mention was received by Al Moore and Kenny Staats.





Even amidst widly circulated rumors that we were going to pot, the junior class came on stronger than ever this year.


1976 brought one of our strongest class governments, spearheaded by our everenthusiastic advisor, Herbie Elsemore.

Our exchange concerts are terrific (the bus rides aren't bad either).




When fun and games are in order, the band, as you can see, ranks number one. However, in reverse, when serious work has to be accomplished, this organization tops them all.






WRESTLING


JV VOLLEYBALL TEAM





TO THE FACULTY,



IV BASEBALL TEAM



This book is an experiment; an experiment and an attempt to capture true student creativity within the covers of the book. It is an attempt to reduce and simplify a yearly tradition into its elements and indeed an attempt to discover the meaning and purpose of a yearbook.

But before a purpose can even be discussed there are so many obstacles to overcome. They come in the form of opposition to change, misconceptions, and overgeneralizations.

"The yearbook is strictly a senior affair--no underclassmen allowed . . . Each yearbook is dependent upon the previous ones for style, content . . . its merely the students attempt at production, amusing isn't it? . . . We're the Class of '77 so lets do the yearbook like the Class of '76, '75, '69, '53. . . We're seniors . . . No change, change causes confusion which . . . a yearbook should have pictures and plenty of white space for autographs . . . No change . . . seniors . . . Class of '77."

--A barrage of misconceptions. A yearbook is not, or at least should not be a yearly chore, an annual habit. It is not created by a "bunch of seniors" in the name of a class year.

A yearbook has a simple purpose apart from all these misconceptions; it is a true expression of who we ARE and what we DO. We are not a block of humanity bearing the label Class of '79 or '78 or '77. We are six hundred different individuals with six hundred different sets of values, dreams, hopes, ideas, and each having a style of his or her own. The purpose of a yearbook is to demonstrate this array of ideas and to catch people in the act of being themselves, doing what they do. It seems odd that something this simple should be experimental, but nevertheless it is, and the success of this experiment is entirely in the eyes and heart of the beholder.

Because of this redefinition of the actual purpose of a yearbook, a totally different approach was necessary this year. The yearbook was not put together by ten seniors in Room 265 on a Monday night late in February. It was created, first of all, (rather than put together) by freshmen, sophomore, junior, senior, and faculty members throughout the year. Individuals involved in various organizations wrote from within the activity about the activity rather than having "staff writers" objectively view what the club accomplished this year. It would be difficult indeed for me to mention every single person who has contributed an article, an idea, or a part of themselves to this book. It is truly a school effort, and I believe that the variety of writing styles is evidence enough of this fact.

This yearbook was named THE LEGEND OF OUR YEAR, and rightfully so for it is a legend, a legend not to be confused with '76 or '69 or '53 or any other high school. Red Hook High in 1977 is unique and has a style of its own, and more importantly each person in the system is unique and has a style of his or her own. This yearbook has a message. Who we are and What we do--THE LEGEND says it now. I can only hope that this spirit remaines with this book as its most important feature.
