20. Significance. What makes this building significant in the architectural and historical development of the neighborhood, town, city and/or state? How is the building related to the economic and social development of the locale? What are the outstanding architectural features of the building?

Entrance is by old style door on knob (Butcher door)
 The original handle still does its work as well as
 when it was fashioned by a blacksmith at a shop
 near by. ^{Also original knob on this door} Heavy wooden beam cut in the
 front of the room length-wise. Stalls are
 of stone and have hollow space between them,
 which holds an air chamber, so that it is warm in
 winter and cool in summer.

The Martin House was built by Gottlieb Martin
 the son of Simon Salatin. His father's house, whose
 descendants continued to occupy it until 1934. Local
 historians state the house was built "during the summer
 of 1776, the very time the Declaration of Independence

21. Other information needed: was being proclaimed. Gottlieb
was later commissioned an officer in Col. Martin
Beckham's militia unit. First porch put in place 1812
by soldiers under command of Col. Henry Armstrong son
of John Armstrong (Sec. of War). After Gottlieb died house went
to his son John who married Rebecca Guston - relative
of Robert Guston. House remained in Martin family from
1776 - 1934.
