AMID A BRILLIANT SCENE.

The Faure-Halpine Marriage Last Night
—Other Weddings.

A large and distinguished gathering assembled in St. Andrew's Church yesterday evening to witness the ceremony which joined together Miss Lucie J. Halpine, second daughter of the late Charles G. Halpine (famous in lyric literature as Miles O'Reilly), and Mr. John P. Faure, the well-known wholesale dry-goods merchant, of New York.

The interior of the edifice was beautifully decked with flowers, which, with the great variety of costumes, made the scene a brilliant one. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. J. B. Perry, rector of St. Andrew's. The bride's costume was of faille Francaise with Duchesse lace and diamond ornaments. She carried a magnificent bouquet of bridal roses and garlands of the same beautiful flower adorned her robe.

The bridesmaids were Miss Adelaide M. Halpine, sister of the bride, and Miss Juliet Greene, of New York. They wore white India silk, with point d'esprit lace, and their bouquets were of La France and Marechal Neil roses tied with appropriately-hued ribbons. The bride was given away by her brother, Lieut. Nicholas J. Halpine, of the steamer Blake. Mr. J. H. Elseffer, of New York, was best man, and the ushers were Mr. Charles Halpine, brother of the bride; Mr. Francis Halpine, Mr. Hewitt Curn, jr., and Mr. Abner Scott.

After the ceremony the wedding party adjourned to the home of the bride's mother, 1202 Twenty-first street, where a reception was held until after 11 o'clock. A large number of friends attended. The bridal party left for a trip through the West, and expect to be absent about three weeks. The presents received were more than ordinarily numerous and costly, and were the objects of universal admiration.
