

HUDSON RIVER CRUISES


Friends planned two separate excursions aboard the River Queen on Sunday, August 18, 1985. The 149-passenger replica paddlewheeler left from the Rhinecliff public dock for a 4-hour morning cruise that included a stop at the Hudson River Maritime Center in Kingston. The passengers then toured the Center.

The afternoon excursion departed from the Germantown dock going north to the Roeliff Janssen Kill and then south past Clermont State Historic Site and back to Germantown—also covering approximately 4 hours.

The cruises were offered in conjunction with the Hudson River Steamboat Days program at Clermont State Historic Site. Both trips totalled 283 people with a profit towards restoration efforts of \$905.

Much thanks to Clermont State Historic Site and Apple Valley Realty for ticket distribution.

Another trip is being planned for next August. To allow for more time and see more of the area around Barrytown and Tivoli, only one cruise will be conducted and that will leave from the Germantown dock. Watch for further details.
