DEAR FRIENDS,

We have some very exciting news for you! On January 26, 197, we received a letter from Orin Lehman, State Historic Preservation Officer, informing us that the ELMENDORPH has been accepted for a \$15,000 Historic Preservation Grant from New York State's share of federal preservation funds. This is a real vote of confidence from our State officials.

This is a MATCHING GRANT. We have committed ourselves to MATCH the \$15,000. The \$30,000 total must be spent on the following essential (and costly) projects:

1. Project Sign (required)

2. Preparation of an Historic Structure Report which will include detailed drawings of the building.

3. Repair of foundation walls

4. Replacement of sills and first floor framing.

At last, we can begin the <u>real</u> work of restoration. The \$15,000 may be matched by fund raising, other grants, donated materials or services-in-kind (donated labor specifically for the above projects).
