


CRAFTS & MUSIC AT THE INN ON AUGUST 7

Set aside Sunday, August 7th, on your calendar for a "Hudson Valley Arts & Crafts Festival" at the Elmendorph Inn. This day of crafts demonstrations, tours, traditional eats and music will culminate a two month program sponsored by the Friends of Elmendorph, with assistance from the Dutchess County Arts Council and the Egbert Benson Historical Society. The program will start at 1 P.M. in and around the historic Elmendorph Inn, and will conclude around 6 P.M.

The Festival is the final segment of a three part project focusing on the traditional arts and crafts of this part of the Hudson Valley during the late 18th and early 19th century. The first segment of the program consisted of arts classes in portrait painting and spinning & weaving, which were conducted in the Elmendorph on five consecutive Saturday mornings between July 9 and August 6.

The portrait painting classes were conducted by Tivoli artist Margaret Luckett. During the course of this class students painted in acrylics a portrait of model Joan Wright, of Red Hook. The class also was instructed in the techniques used by early painters from this area such as Ammi Phillips and Edward Mooney.

The Spinning & Weaving classes were conducted jointly by Barbara Thompson, of Milan, and Ellen Phelan, of Tivoli. Mrs. Thompson conducted classes in spinning, using both wheel and drop spindle, as well as in natural dyeing. Mrs. Phelan, who previously instructed weaving in San Francisco, taught two sessions on weaving.

The second part of the program is an Open House scheduled for the week of August 1-6. Tours of the inn will be offered, and visitors can view the results of the arts classes, in addition to other exhibits.

The "Arts & Crafts Festival" will be held both in the building and beneath a tent on the grounds starting at 1 P.M. on Sunday. Crafts to be demonstrated include: Candlewicking, Arlene Borm; Candle Making, Julia Schreiber; Woodcarving, Frank Nuccio; Stencilling, Kate Charbonneau; Splint Seat Making, Douglas Brown; Quilling, Peg Mowry; Spinning, Barbara Bielenburg; Weaving, Ellen Phelan; Natural Dyeing, Barbara Thompson; Rug Making, Holly Brown; Bob and Lace, Helen McLallen. We are still seeking persons who can demonstrate basketry, tinsmithing, glass making, earthenware potting, coopering, broom making, and quilting- among others. IF YOU CAN HELP CALL ROSEMARY COONS at 758-6334.

In addition to the crafts, musical entertainment will be provided during the afternoon. At 1:30 the West Point Woodwind Quintet, under the leadership of Sgt. Major Derek Brinkman, will get things under way. This group, based at the United States Military Academy, will perform music of the first half of the 19th century. Folk tunes of the stagecoach & steamboat era will be performed by Susan Deane-Miller, a Poughkeepsie resident, between 3:30 and 5:30.

Refreshments during the program will be handled by members of the 4-H Golden Fleece Sheep Club. Members are also reminded that Elmendorph, Etc., our shop, will be open Sunday afternoon during the program.

Funding for this program was provided, in part, by the New York State Council on the Arts Decentralization Program, administered by the Dutchess County Arts Council.

RESTORATION REPORT

1983 is the year!

This year the community will finally be able to \underline{see} actual evidence of restoration work on the Inn. The restoration plans for the front of the building may well be complete by the time you read the newsletter.

In preparation for this work, the remaining 20th century asphalt siding has been removed from the entire building. It was decided to remove all of this siding this year so that the characteristics of the clapboard siding could be thoroughly studied and documented. In addition, the two front porches were removed intact. They are to be given to Don Carpentier of Eastfield Village in East Nassau, New York. After careful study, it was determined that the porches were not appropriate to the period the Elmendorph is to be restored to. Don has a village of transplanted historic buildings, and we're sure the porches can be usefully recycled at Eastfield Village.

The removal work (siding and porches) was done under contract with Craft Construction Company of Hyde Park, New York. The concrete porch slab in front, and another out back, were broken up and removed by John Denter at no cost to the Friends of Elmendorph.

Now comes the good part... The front of the building will be restored this summer and fall. A brief description of the work to be done is: 1) removal of clapboard siding; 2) repair of all window frames; 3) install all new 12 over 12 window sash on first floor; 4) removal of the ca. 1945 center door; 5) repair or replacement of the two earlier doors; 6) insulation of walls from exterior; 7) sheathing (subsiding); replace clapboard siding (with new materials where required); 8) repair/replace trim; 9) install new gutters and leaders. Finally, the front will be painted and, if possible, two chimneys will be repaired.

In addition to this work, which will be contracted out, Bob McCarthy has agreed to move, and at the same time enhance, our electrical service. The service will be moved to the north end of the building and will be buried underground in a trench that will run from the northwest corner of the Inn to the telephone pole in front of the shop. Archaeological testing will be done prior to the start of the work. Bob McCarthy will donate his services and Bucky Coon will provide the back-hoe and his time free of charge.

We submitted an application for a restoration grant-in-aid through the NYS Office of Parks, Recreation & Historic Preservation this spring. Unfortunately, we were not among the 25 finalists out of 157 applications. Therefore, we are going to fund this phase of the restoration project <u>ourselves</u>. It is very difficult to put a dollar estimate on the work, but we do have a preliminary figure of \$20,000.

The tentative starting date for the restoration is AUGUST 15th. This is contingent upon the completion of drawings, specifications, invitations to bid to selected contractors, and the signing of a contract. The completion date is prior to November 15th.
