Dear Friends,

Here is some Modern History on the Elmendorph. On June 7, we closed on the building. Board members cleaned around the property and inside the building to prepare it for Hardscrabble Day on June 11. On June 15, three men representing the State came to look at the building and were enthusiastic about it. Electricity was hooked up to the building on June 17, and on the 25th, volunteers began to dismantle an old shed on the property and cleared brush. Partitions in the cellar were dismantled at this time as well.

On June 27, Phil Seymour worked with his equipment. A large group worked on July 2, going carefully through the piles of materials from the shed, and an iron strap hinge plus many other things were found. Harold Fell carted some of the burnables away. On July 6, Ray Ruge went through the building and pointed out some architectural details that we had not been aware of. Cleanup crews continued working on weekends and then on Monday night, July 18, a large crew of volunteers worked on one of the hottest days to get rid of the remains of the shed. Georgia Coon then hauled the scrap metal away on July 23.

At the present time, estimates are being gathered for electricity, paint, plumbing, heat, etc. Our garage is going to be repaired. Shingles have been donated for the garage roof.

We are always looking for a dump truck to use and a place to get rid of non-burnable materials. Please help us if you can.


TOWN BOARD MEETING

purchased a similar flag and has donated it, so now we have our own to use.


WE HAVE AN ARCHITECT
