Carol Branch Massonneau Baldwin and James had 4 children. Marguerite B. Houston, Priscilla Winslow Crowell, James Fredrick Baldwin and Edward Philip Baldwin (Ted). Of interest is that Baldwin /Nickerson line has been in the country since the early 1600's with direct lineage to the founders of Chatham, Massachusetts, William and Mary Nickerson, through Mayflower Pilgrim Howland (an indentured servant who fell over board and was thankfully saved). It is said that a good portion of the descendants of William & Mary Nickerson can trace their lineage back to the Mayflower pilgrims. The Baldwin line finds a well recorded history back to the early 1400's (William Baldwin of Orange, UK), but most recent ancestors were individuals responsible for the fighting in the Revolutionary War and engineering. Colonel Loammi Baldwin (January 10, 1744 - October 20, 1807) was a noted American engineer, politician, and a soldier in the American Revolutionary War. Baldwin is known as the Father of American Civil Engineering. His five sons, Cyrus Baldwin (1773-1854), Benjamin Franklin Baldwin (1777-1821), Loammi Baldwin, Jr. (1780–1834), James Fowle Baldwin (1782–1862), and George Rumford Baldwin (1798–1888). were also well-known engineers. He surveyed and was responsible for the construction of the Middlesex Canal, and remembered for the Baldwin apple, a most difficult fruit to propagate so the story goes.
