#### Red Hook Turns 200 - Again!

Not to confuse things, but 2013 is Red Hook's actual bicentennial. But don't worry. We're not about to call out the troops to put on another celebration. Once in a lifetime was enough!

Technically, the legislation creating Red Hook was approved June 2, 1812, hence last year's birthday bash. But it wasn't to take effect until "the first Monday of April next..." – April 5, 1813. Promptly on Tuesday the 6<sup>th</sup>, town officials met at the "house of Henry Walter."

Then as now, agriculture and keeping the peace were prime concerns, as one of their first resolutions suggests: "... no boar or male swine shall be permitted to run at large... [and] if found... any person shall have the right to castrate the same at the risk of the owner or put such boar into the public pound."

## Notes from the Archives

During our Bicentennial year we were fortunate to add some important new items to our local history holdings. Joan Lewis generously donated papers belonging to her late husband Jack (1931-2012), including many interesting documents related to the history of Red Hook schools (where he excelled as athlete, coach, teacher and principal) and the companies he worked for, among them Voorhis-Tiebout Co. and STAMP, Inc. (Smithers Tool and Machine Products). Born and raised in Barrytown, Jack penned a delightful memoir, available in our archives, of growing up there.

Other treasures gifted by EBHS members in 2012 include a photo from Joyce Cole, of Red Hook's 1916-1917 champion basketball team, and a rare cocoa tin from the W.H. Baker Chocolate Company, donated by Susan Ellis. Such generosity helps to preserve and illustrate Red Hook's rich heritage for future generations.

Thanks to the Bicentennial Legacy Fund, we were able to acquire from Richard Coons a set of 1934 Red Hook maps produced by the Sanborns Insurance Company, with detailed information about each village street and building. Accompanying the maps were several boxes of files relating to local churches, family genealogies and the Red Hook Grange. A favorite item from that collection is a tiny notebook containing minutes of the Red Hook Grange #918's first meeting in Upper Red Hook. Dated March 7, 1902, it lists charter members and their positions: Overseer, John H. Clum; Steward, John G. Kerley; Lecturer, Rev. Chas. Maar; Treasurer, Elmer Teator; all locally familiar names, offering glimpses into Red Hook's agrarian past.
