RESTORATION COMMITTEE

Charles Hapeman and his crew have completed the plaster repairs and carpentry required for the restoration of the two small chambers on the second floor. Under their contract, they will also prime the walls and ceilings as well as all the trim and doors. We hope volunteers will apply the finish coats of paint in the chambers as well as the adjacent gallery. The spaces should be ready for your inspection by the time of the annual meeting!

The Restoration Committee, consisting of Dave and Shirley Brown, Mary Kelly, Madeline Klein and Bob and I, met with Herman Gorgens in the second floor South Room to discuss the work to be done in that area. We estimate that approximately 50% of the plaster will need to be replaced. Carpentry work will include trimming the windows, repairing and replacing the fireplace mantle and replacing a small area of flooring in the northeast corner where a steep stair led to the lower floor when the Inn was a two-family house. Rudimentary wiring and heating have already been installed. It was decided that the fluorescent fixtures which have proved so satisfactory in the Historical Society's Archive Room will be used in the South Room as well.

We envision that the large, well lit room will serve as a space for small meetings and workshops. There has even been talk of reinstating art and craft classes held in the Inn in the years before restoration began. But best of all is the knowledge that the restoration of the South Room will complete the entire restoration of the entire Elmendorph Inn, a project which has taken 23 years to date! What a celebration we will have!

Herman will develop a cost estimate based on our decisions and then fund raising can begin in earnest. We would like to complete the restoration during the year 2000 so we can begin the millennium with a fully functioning Elmendorph Inn. We hope you will all help us as you always have in the past!
